### CANADA AND THE NAVY.

Would Expect Larger Share of Protection If Contributing To Its Cost. The debate on the address recently

The debate on the address recently was enlivened by a statemanlike and tactful speech from Mr. Balfour dealing with Mr. Harold Cox's proposal that the question of larger colonial contributions to the cost of the navy should be raised at the approaching Colonial Conference.

The proposal was ill-advised. If we study the question from the colonial standpoint, we shall see that there are strong political reasons against any such a request being pressed by the Mother Country. Canada, for example, needs first and foremost the assistance of a powerful army to defend her southern frontier. That England is not attempting to give her. The Monroe doctrine incidentally protects her against aggression on the part of any power other than the United States. She knows that the British Navy is now almost entirely concentrated in home waters, and if she contributed to its costs she could scarcely be expected to acquiesce in this condition of affairs. As for Australia, that country is much exposed to foreign attack because its nonulascarcely be expected to acquiesce in this condition of affairs. As for Australia, that country is much exposed to foreign attack because its population is so exiguous, but even here a contribution in cash is undesirable. Far better would it be for the Australians to form a navy of their own or to train and equip a strong land force, which would be of infinitely greater service to the Empire they greater service to the Empire they

greater service to the Empire than any tribute of gold.

Mr. Balfour pointed out that the daughter-States of the Empire incur some danger from the Imperial tie, if they else degine and advantaged of the control of th some danger from the Imperial tie, if they also derive real advantages from it. He doubted, and with reason, whe-ther the British Fleet could be dimin-ished even if this country lost its colonies. Mr. Winston Churchill indi-cated the sound lines on which the Government will act in the Confer-ence. It will endeavor to secure the organization of colonial forces on principles similar to those accepted inciples similar to those in England, and it will not put for-ward foolish claims on account of services conferred on the Empire by the British Navy.

### CROP HAS DOUBLED.

Saskatchewan last year produced did Showing In Crop Reports.

Saskatchewan las year produced 63,052,210 bushels of grain, against 46,647,464 bushels in 1905, and 27,525,-27.2 in 1904, or a gain of very considerably over 100 per cent. in two years. This is the information which the Department of Agriculture will give officially to the world in a few days in their final bulletin on the crop of 1906, a forecast of which President Hopkins appropried to the Grain Hopkins announced to the Growers' convention on Wedn

Growers' convention on Wednesday in so far as wheat was concerned.

The grain crop of the Province last year consisted of 37,040,098 bushels of wheat, 23,965,528 bushels of oats, 1,-816,415 bushels of barley, 710,689 bushels of flax, and 19,480 bushels of speltz. In 1905 the figures were: Wheat, 26,107,286 bushels; oats, 19,-213,055 bushels; barley, 893,396 bushels; flax, 398,399 bushels; and speltz, 35,328 bushels.

Inasmuch as the average yield per

Inasmuch as the average yield per acre last year was not as high as in 1905, although higher than the yearly average for the past nine years, during which records have been kept, the figures demonstrate all the more forcibly the tremendous rate at which the fertile virgin project leads of the Person fertile virgin prairie lands of the Pro-vince are being brought under cultiva-

The area sown in wheat last year was increased by 600,502 acres, oats by 189,975, barley by 20,619, and flax by 50,690, the latter being an increase of 200 per cent. Out of a total area of 73,048,960 acres in districts wholly or partially under settlement, only 2,501,247 acres were under crop last year, which was an increase of 860, 684 acres over 1905. The number of grain farms increased from 18,102 in 1905 to 30,289 in 1906. The average area under crop per farm was 8,257 acres, as compared with 9,057 acres in 1905. The number of threshers employ-ed increased from 1,194 to 1,947.



St. Petersburg, March 23.—After a long debate yesterday in the Douma on the formation of a "Famine Relief Commission," in which the Social Democrats and other Radicals fought the Centre party, who defended constitutional control of the commission, as proposed by M. Roditcheff, Constitutional Democrat, Premier Stolypin announced that the Government fully joined in the proposition made by M. Roditcheff, and would give its full assistance to the work of the commission. M. Stolypin's speech was delivered in a conciliatory manner. He admitted the Government had made many mistakes in the famine relief work.

The Premier's announcement of the Government's agreement with the Constitutional Democrats was the first approval by the Government of the policy of that party.

Slayer of Famous London Merchant to Hang.

Rayner, the Man Who Shot William Whiteley, Sentenced-Was Not His Son-Tried, Convicted and Doomed In a Few Hours-Counsel Sets Up Insanity Plea, But Judge Waves It

London, March 23.—Horace George Rayner was arraigned in the Central Criminal Court yesterday, charged with the wilful murder of William Whiteley, the dry goods merchant, of Westbourne Greve, on January 24th.
The general interest taken in the case
was evidenced by the crowded court
room, many women being among those
present. In his opening statement,

room, many women being among those present. In his opening statement, counsel for the prosecution, whose assertions were subsequently corroborated on the witness stand by Louisa Turner, who lived under Mr. Whiteley's protection, disposed of the fiction that Rayner was an illigitimate son of the man he killed.

The rest of the evidence presented in behalf of the prosecution was merely a repetition of the Police Court testimony regarding the murder.

George Elliott, counsel for Rayner, in his opening speech for the defence, said it was not part of his case to prove that the prisoner was a son of the late Mr. Whiteley. Rayner, rightly or wrongly, believed he was his son and counsel was going to show that Rayner was insane, in the legal sense that he was a degenerate, whose that he was a degenerate, whose mind was tainted, defective and weal ened by the over-indulgence of tw generations of his family in drink. The jury, after being absent nine minutes, returned a verdict of wilful

54 Ships and 199 Lives Lost During the Winter.

the Winter.

Boston, Mass., March 23.—A total of 199 lives and 54 ships have been sacrificed to the storms and treacherous coasts of New England and the Maritime Provinces for the winter just ended, according to the statistics compiled by the Associated Press yesterday. Of the vessels, no account has been taken of the dozens that have been driven ashore, but later refloated, and the figures do not include the loss in Connecticut waters. The long list of dead is swollen out of all proportion to those of many previous years by the sinking of the steamer Larchmont in Block Island Sound the night of Feb. 11, with an estimated loss of 150 lives. This was the one great disaster of the year in these waters, the largest loss of life in any other single wreck occurring in the foundering this month of the Newfoundland schooner Harry Louis, with her entire crew of eight men.



The animal reared on its hind legs and attempted to close with the man. Mr. Barnum, who had nothing but a stout stick in his hand, dealt the bear a desperate blow on the snout. This sent her head down for a moment and allowed Mr. Young to get busy with the axe which he was carrying. The two little cubs came to their mother's aid, and blow followed blow, few of them seeming to have any effect as the two men were at too close quarters to defend themselves effectively. Finally, Mr. Barnum sidestepped and distracted the bear's attention for a moment, which allowed Mr. Young to land a knockout blow just behind the ear with his axe. But the animal was game, and even in her death struggles clawed and bit savagely at the two men.

WHY UNIVERSAL PENNY POST-AGE IS A NECESSITY.

Henniker Heaton, M.P., Thorn In the Side of Successive Postmasters-General, Tells of Its Advantages-Ambitious Aim of the Man Who Has Been a Boon and Blessing to the People-Preserve Family Ties.

Few persons deserve so well of their countrymen as Mr. Henniker Heaton, M.P., that stubborn champion of the people's rights in relation to postage. For years Mr. Henniker Heaton has been fighting the battle of postal progress, and in spite of the deadly influence of departmental red-tape, he has succeeded in carrying reform after reform until he has almost made the British an ideal post-office. Sixty important changes have been credited to his great perseverhouse recently vacated by W. Anderson.

### With an Ambitious Aim.

The reduction of the twopenny halfpenny rate of postage to a penny is of such supreme importance that I called upon Mr. Henniker Heaton the other morning (writes a representative) for the purpose of having a talk with him on the matter. Mr. Henniker Heaton's aim is, briefly (I use his own words), to establish universal penny postage so that any inhabitant of our planet, white, black or yellow, may be enabled for the sum of one penny to communicate with any other, at the lowest possible rate, and the highest attainable speed; Englishman with Frenchman, German, Italian or Russian; European with American; Asiatic with Australian or African; so that when one soul has something to say to another neither color, nor religion, nor greed, nor diplomacy, nor national antipathy, nor latitude, nor longitude, nor poverty, nor any other barrier shall stand between them.

To those who are not overburdened with a supply of shekels, a universal penny post would be of enormous advantage, and it was on this point that I commenced to cross-question my goshead host.

To Preserve Family Ties.

"I have had a vast number of letters from poor people dealing with the subject," Mr. Henniker Heaton observed; "and some of them have been exceedingly touching. It is the charge of twopence-halfpenny, of course, that prevents people from communicating with their friends abroad. When you break into a shilling to buy a twopenny-halfpenny stamp the change seems to be very small. Universal penny postage would remedy this; it would have the effect of keeping members of a family, some of whom are resident in distant lands, in touch with each other. At present, when an individual emigrates, he writes home once a week at first, then once a month, and, finally, he ceases corresponding. If there was a popular rate he would write every week.

"De you know that last year at To Preserve Family Ties.

popular rate he would write every week.

"Do you know that last year at least 200,000 people from Great Britain and Ireland went to America. There you have 200,000 letter-writers at once. The poor emigrants sent home during the year no less a sum than £1,500,000. That is nearly £5,000 a day—nearly £5,000 posted daily to the folk—wives, brothers, sisters—in their village homes; and certainly a proportion of it despatched with a view to bringing out sweethearts. view to bringing out sweethearts. This immense sum was forwarded in the shape of money orders ranging in value from five shillings to five pounds."

pounds."

The absurdity of the opposition that is being manifested in certain quarters towards universal penny postage is rendered apparent on the instant. Every Friday 250,000 British letters pass through France and Italy for India, Hong Kong and Australasia—distances exceeding 12,000 miles. The postage on each of these letters is a penny. By the same boat a few British letters are carried for residents in Calais—twenty-one miles from Dover; and on these letters the postage is twopence-halfpenny.

A Question Not Easy to Answer.

"How can this distinction be justified?" Mr. Henniker Heaton, who had alluded to these facts, asked me.

I replied that no sane man could answer the conundrum correctly, upon which Mr. Henniker Heaton put me another poser:

"Why should a letter to New York cost twopence-halfpenny, and another in the same bag be carried through that city and 1,000 miles into Canada for a penny?"

It is fortunate that Mr. Henniker Heaton is not frightened by obstacles. A born fighter, he pursues the even tenor of his way until he gets what he wants. Some weeks back he and several wealthy men offered to compensate the Government if, on the establishment of a universal penny postage, a loss during three years was incurred. This generous proposition was refused. In reference to this event Mr. Henniker Heaton observed:

I calculate that when it is possible to send a letter to America for a penny our correspondence with the United States will in the first year be double what it is now. People will write once a week instead of once a month, and the loss entailed by the decrease in the price of postage will be only £25,000 for the first year. In the fourth year it will show a profit."

Vast Deposits In Mexico-Nature Does What It Requires Expensive Machinery Elsewhere to Do.

Machinery Elsewhere to Do.

Mexico's treasure is its ready made soda. Under the blazing sun of the great desert south of Yuma, at Adair bay, surrounded by bleak and barren sand dunes, lie vast lakes of crystals of carbonate of soda, to all appearances great masses of snow and ice, but in reality a substance which will be making millions of tons of soap and millions of panes of glass.

At only one other place in the world is natural soda found under conditions which admit of industrial development, and at that place it must be shipped several hundred miles by rail, and many tons of water must be evaporated by coal to obtain a ton of the product. The lakes are within 300 yards of the sea, and the fierce sun and heat of the desert attend to the evaporation. The world's consumption is large, amounting to several hundred thousand tons annually, and at present nearly all of it is manufactured from common salt and with the use of expensive machinery.

At Adair bay, in Mexico, when the temperature is right, the water of the

At Adair bay, in Mexico, when the temperature is right the water of the lake crystallizes into pure carbonate of soda, nature doing what man requires expensive machinery and vast amounts of coal to do. The source of the soda is evidently found in the numerous springs of comparatively. the soda is evidently found in the numerous springs of comparatively fresh water around the edges of the lakes. This water contains a small percentage of carbonate of soda, but centuries of continual evaporation of the water, leaving the soda residue, have formed a practically unlimited amount of pure soda. An engineer estimates that there is enough on the surface to produce 100 tons doily for surface to produce 100 tons daily for seventy-five years.

New Invention For Treating Flax. A new Australian machine for treating flax is reported from Melbourne A new Melbourne. It is said to produce a much larger yield of fiber, of greater strength and of unstained or natural color, which for the purpose of manufacturing such lines as linen, damask, etc., requires no chemical bleaching in the finishing operations. The Government expert strongly favors this new process after exhaustive trials on account of its expedition in producing fiber of exceptionally fine quality. The flax in its rough condition is passed through a machine consisting of three pair of rollers, then immersed for an hour in a bath of het water containing added ingredients (not chemicals). Then the material is drained and dried, put through the breaking machine and finally through the scrutcher. To make a superfine quality it is washed twice, which makes the fiber pure white.

Relief From Hay Fever.

Breathing through a wet handkerchief at night has given relief to hay fever patients. This has suggested to Dr. A. C. Heath a novel filter, which consists of two rings connected by a bridge, each ring having stretched over it a fine netting of silk gauze. The rings are to be worn in the nose, half an inch from the openings. This device has been tried without discomfort in a number of severe cases of hay fever, and the removal of pollen or dust has invariably improved the breathing within fifteen minutes to an hour.

Hydroplanes on Ships.

Inventors are still experimenting with hydroplanes, or flat surfaces attached to the underside of the hulls of steamboats in such a way that as the boat is forced through the water it is more and more lifted out, much as a kite rises with the pressure of the wind under its slanting surface. Recent tests of devices in the form of submerged hydroplanes show that at moderate speed, say about 15 miles an hour, a boat's hull may be lifted entirely out of the water by this invention.

Hon. Jabez Bunting Snowball,
Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick who dropped dead last week in
Fredericton while on his way to attend service in the Cathedral, had
had a long and useful career in Canada. He had not been very well for
more than a year, but was able to
attend his public duties. He opened
the session of the Legislature on February 14, and had since been daily at
his office in the Parliament Buildings.

On February 5 last Hon. J. B.
Snowball completed his five-year term
as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, but was still in the office when
death came. He was born in Lunen-

death came. He was born in Lunenbugg, Nova Scotia, in 1837, his father being Rev. John Snowball, a divine of the Methodist Church. After graduating at Mount Allison Academy at Sackville, N. B., young Snowball took



up his residence at Chatham, and entered into partnership with John McDougall in a general store. Later he became interested in the fishing industry, and the company, of which he was later president, now controls looster featuring along the relations. he was later president, now controlled lobster factories along the whole Gulf lobster factories along the whole Gulf coast. As a lumber operator he was probably at his best. He owned the largest saw mill on the Miramichi river, and ranked second only to Alexander Gibson as a manufacturer and exporter of lumber in New Brunswick. About four years ago Mr. Snowball formed his business into a joint stock company, under the title of the J. B. Snowball Co., Ltd. His sons, William B. and Robert A. Snowball, are respectively, manager and ball, are respectively, manager and outside manager of the company. Between 30,000,000 and 40,000,000 feet of lumber are cut by the company each year. Mr. Snowball also assisted in the building of the Canada Eastern-Railway, and the branch of the Intercolonial to Chatham, and to the time of his death he controlled the latter branch. time of his death he controlled the latter branch. For some years Hon. Mr. Snowball sat in the Commons, and when he retired, in 1891, was call-ed to the Senate, retiring in 1902, to accept the Lieutenant-Governorship.

### THAW DENIES THE RUMOR

Says There Is No Dissension Sentenced To Five Years in Between His Counsel

### EVELYN VISITED THAW CHARGES ARE DROPPED

New York, March 25.—Harry K. Thaw last night made public another statement, this time denying a rumor, which he believes is current, that there is a dissension among his coun sel. He also refers to the affidavite filed with Justice Fitzgerald by his attorneys, opposing the appointment of a lunacy commission to examine

him.

The monotony of Thaw's Sunday at the Tombs was broken by an unexpected visit from his wife. This was the first time since his detention that the prisoner was allowed to receive callers other than his counsel on

Mrs. Thaw had come to the Tombs with a message for her husband, and was agreeably surprised when told that she might visit him. The two were together for a half hour, and when Mrs. Thaw left she said:

"Harry is in excellent Health, and is sure everything will come out in his favor."

his favor."

During the afternoon, which he devoted chiefly to correspondence, Thaw received a note from Lawyer Daniel O'Reilly, explaining that none of the legal staff would call during the day, and that Mr. Hartridge and the writer were busily engaged in preparing briefs to be presented to Justice Fitzgerald to-day.

Twelve Affidavits.

District Attorney Jerome for about two hours dictated to a corps of stenographers a long statement to be used in rebutting the statements sworn to by Thaw's mother, his lawyers and his alienists, and contained in the twelve affidavits filed by the defence Saturday.

It was reported, but not confirmed, that Mr. Jerome intends to present, not only facts refuting the affidavits presented by the defence, but to submit to Judge Fitzgerald new and corroborative facts supporting the affidavits on which he originally made his suggestion to the court that Thaw's present sanity should be enquired into.

Letters to Lyon.

In his attempt to show that Thaw is insane, District Attorney Jerome filed with his affidavits a number of letters written by Thaw to J. Dennison Lyon, his banker in Pittsburg. Some were written prior to White's death, and some subsequent to it, from the Tombs. They were made public Saturday night through Assistant District Attorney Garvan.

III-Spelled, But Sane.

The letters are odd specimens of correspondence, being, in the main, disconnected sentences, with not a few misspelled words, yet they apparently show an appreciation of the practical matters of the life the young Pittsburg man was leading before he was locked up in the Tombs for shooting White, and his plight when he was imprisoned. The contention of Mr. Jerome is, however, that their incoherence and other characteristics, show that the writer is not sane.

The matter has been laid before the Home Secretary, and a bill is to be introduced into Parliament during the present session to give validity to the marriages.

London, March 25.—William O'Brien, Nationalist member of the House of Commons for Cork, has announced his intention of absenting himself from the present session of Parliament, in order to avoid further friction with the Irish party, which has now virtually accepted the Government's proposals for Irish legislation. Thus there is no longer any serious divergence, Mr. O'Brien explains, between himself and the party. It is understood further that Mr. O'Brien and his friends have decided to drop all pending litigation with the followers of John E. Redmond.
