

Here was a genuine popular verdict founded on a practical trial of the system. Nor was it really reversed by the subsequent provincial plebiscite in favor of Prohibition carried by a majority in the proportion of nine to eleven, whilst only 58 per cent of the vote was polled, and the balance might safely be set down as in the main opposed or indifferent.
