





Sir Percy Scott Has Given Brit. New Gunnery Advantage. Under the Scott system it is sible to discharge a projectile from each of ten guns simultaneously on a Dreadnought of the latest type at ingle broadside. Thus, the enemy, ll shots are accurate, can be with more than five and a half tons metal. There are eight Dread-oughts in each of the first two quadrons of the home fleet, and, consequently, if all their weapons directed their fire at once they would end projectles weighing nearly nine tons on a deadly mission at one ischarge.

The exact character of the contrivance is confidential, but it may be aid that it is carried on the foremast f the vessel, so as to be high above he waterline. By its aid all the uns of the ship are brought to one evel and throw shells at the same pot. In effect, all the guns are conrolled as by one hand. At a word all can be fired in unison, so as to btain the deadliest effect from roadside.

At present each gun finds its own range. Firing, as a rule, takes place in succession from various turrets, with the result that some guns fire more effectively than others, every inconvenience is suffered from arly if the wind is contrary.
Under the new regime the personal

element is largely dispensed with. Each Dreadnought becomes a unified and standardized machine, with which officers may hope to hit first and hit hard, and keep on hitting, which is a maxim of victory.
