Municipal Council.

The Municipal Council of Kings County met at the Court House, Kentville, on Tuesday, January 19th, at 10 a. m. All councillors were present.

After reading of minutes, etc., a petition from residents of Ward 8 was read, asking that a proposed road to Wolfville Ridge be not allowed.

Couns. Reid, Hamilton and Donaldson all expressed the opinion that there was no interest of the public that would be served by the construction of the proposed road and, on motion, the report of the commissioners was not received.

Prof. A. B. Colwell was proposing a committee to lay out road in Ward 1, from Brown's Corner to New Road.

A petition for the arrangement of bounds of Districts 6 and 35, in Ward 10, attaching Conquest Road to the latter, was read. No action was taken.

Commissioner H. J. Nelly was granted an extension of time to January, 1911, to report on proposed road to Cloud Lake.

I. H. Porter, commissioner on proposed road to Sheffer's Mountain Road in Ward 3 to Masters' Vault Road, whose favorable report at April term was referred back for completion, rendered a substitute report pronouncing the road unnecessary.

Coun. Roscoe moved that this report be not received but that former report be received and adopted and the road established. After some discussion consideration was deferred to April term.

In re new road at Kingston Station from Nelly road eastward, the clerk stated that the report had not been received in time to allow the necessary advertising. Coun. Woodbury moved that the proposed road be rejected, which motion was carried.

Letter read in re Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities, asking that delegates be named to attend the annual meeting to be held in Kentville in September.

Coun. Griffin moved, seconded by Coun. Morse, that a committee be appointed to meet with the Town Council of Kentville, and make arrangements concerning the entertainment of delegates, etc.

Coun. Covert, who had been named as a member of the proposed committee, said that his other duties would not permit him to act; that he saw no advantage in organizations such as referred to; that he had too much government and too many meetings; that a resolution passed the Union it amounts to nothing, there is no way to carry it out. Legislation had better be left to the legislature.

Coun. Parker said that under ordinary circumstances he might agree with Coun. Covert. The present conditions were exceptional. The Union had honored the Council and honored the county, by electing the Warden to the presidency. Respect for ourselves and for our presiding officer required us to express our appreciation of this honor by extending to the visiting members of the Union a cordial welcome to the county.

The resolution passed and Couns. Morse, Donaldson and Griffin were named as members of the proposed committee.

Couns. Hamilton and Parker were then chosen as delegates to represent this Council at the meeting of the Union, with Couns. Griffin and Donaldson as substitutes.

SECOND DAY.
Council met at 10 a. m. on Wednesday 19th. All present.

The reports of Overseers of Poor for the several townships were read and adopted. Overseers were reappointed.

Stewart Trewhin, A. H. Patterson and Roy W. Woodman were appointed Trustees of public cemetery at Grand Pre.

Coun. Griffin moved that the appointment of a Board of Revision and Appeal be dispensed with for the present year. After some discussion the motion was withdrawn it being pointed out that the law only required the appointment of such a board once in three years.

Mr. W. E. Roscoe, solicitor, gave statement of the provisions of the assessment law. The law now in force in this county provides that two assessors annually. These shall assess the property in their respective wards at its full value. The duty of the Board of Revision, the appointment of which is compulsory once in three years, is to equalize the basis of valuation of the different wards.

Council met at 9 a. m. on Thursday.

Mr. W. E. Roscoe reported on behalf of the committee to confer with Town Council of Kentville re the meeting of Union of N. S. Municipalities. The town was willing to do its part. The report was adopted and the committee continued in office to represent this Council on the committee of entertainment.

Coun. Halsey spoke in reference to the dog nuisance, asking Solicitor to give brief statement of laws now on the statute book. Mr. Roscoe read the law authorizing the killing of any dog found worrying sheep; of any dog running at large without a collar with name of owner thereon, or of any dog running at large on a farm where sheep are kept. A by-law was adopted by this Council some years ago authorizing a dog tax, the same to be collected by the collectors of poor and county rates. It had been, in effect, a dead letter.

Coun. Halsey said tax should be three dollars. He then moved that Solicitor be asked to draft the best by-law possible to enforce the laws we have.

Coun. Gaul remarked that sheep were kept in Dalhousie. Dogs were also kept there, but there was no sheep killing in that district.

The Warden named Couns. Halsey, Roscoe and Donaldson as a committee to prepare by-law.

Moved that evening session be held, Lost.

The annual meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade, which should have been held on the third Wednesday of January, has not yet materialized. It is to be hoped that this organization will not be allowed to die for want of support. The Board has in past years been a useful organization and might do even better work if given the support it should have.

We are indebted for the very complete report of the doings of the Municipal Council, which appears on our first page, to our excellent contemporary, the Berwick Register. While occupying considerable space we are sure our readers will appreciate having a full and authentic account of the council's proceedings in a single issue of the paper, which may be preserved for future reference.

The people of Wolfville have decided, we think very wisely, to this year dispense with the worry and expense of an election for mayor and councillors. Tuesday was nomination day and nominations were filed for Mr. T. L. Harvey for mayor, and Prof. Haycock and Messrs. C. R. H. Starr and William Regan for councillors. The retiring councillors did not feel inclined for re-election and the men selected to fill their places are all well qualified to carry on the government of the town.

Alabama New Prohibition Law.

The new state-wide Prohibition law adopted for Alabama goes into effect at once. This law prohibits any newspaper in the State from publishing a liquor advertisement. It prohibits any advertisement of liquor being posted on any bill board, or other place in the State. It cuts out the locker and the club and the near-beer stands. It condemns the property where a blind tiger is run, and holds the keeper in damages to the owner. It cuts out the manufacture of near beer and other so-called temperance drinks which are really intoxicants. It provides for the raiding of public places without warrant where liquor is supposed to be sold. It makes the drinking of liquors on trains a misdemeanour. It makes the refusal of witnesses in Court to divulge the names of law-breakers contempt of Court, and it provides, as a penalty for violations, a money fine and not less than six months' imprisonment. It is very drastic, and when we get Prohibition written into the Constitution, then all fights against the unconstitutionality of statutory legislation will be at an end.

RACE TRACK GAMBLING.

A very important bill is before the Federal Parliament which seeks to prohibit gambling upon any race track. A special committee of the House was appointed to enquire into the whole question as many prominent members of parliament contended that the thoroughbred was a necessity in Canada in order to improve our carriage and saddle breeds of horses and that the quality of thoroughbreds could only be ascertained by racing them and that racing could only be conducted where pool selling, book making and other forms of gambling were permitted.

Not even the strong advocates of the continuance of the horse-racing game in Canada are prepared to deny that there is evil in the gambling connected with it. What they maintain, and maintain stoutly, is that the racing game is necessary for the betterment of breeding in horses, and that without the betting accompaniment it would not be possible to maintain sufficient interest in the racing game to keep it going on a profitable basis. Which brings the whole question down to a very simple proposition. It is justifiable to tolerate an evil for the sake of the good that is expected from the innocent enterprise which, without that accompanying evil, would cease to be a possibility?

This doctrine of tolerating an evil for the sake of some fancied good that its presence is supposed to accomplish, is by no means new. We find it worked in our cities by civic authorities in connection with the maintenance of places of easy virtue, the presence of which is supposed, in some mysterious way, to make living safer for women who are morally clean and have a desire to remain so. But, after all, it is very doubtful if it is wise for any government, municipal or otherwise, to countenance known evils in any form for any cause, no matter how plausible or deserving the argument in its favor may appear to be, provided it is at all possible to overcome it.

And in this the government must necessarily be guided, to a great extent, by the attitude of the people whom it represents. Not all people are agreed as to what constitutes evil, and therein comes the difficulty. It would be easy enough, for instance, for the government to pass a law prohibiting the sale or importation of liquor, but such a law would be worse than useless if the people were not disposed to honor it. For which reason it is better that in cases where there is so much uncertainty as to the preponderating will of the people, the government should confine its efforts to the restricting of what it believes to be a necessary and justifiable restriction, endeavor to minimize its force.

Whether we care to admit it or not, there is a good deal of truth in the statement recently made, that the love of gambling is inherent in a large proportion of our population, and that if men are prohibited from gambling in one direction they will gamble in another. It may also be just as well to admit that gambling, as we have it in Canada, an incorporated race track, is possibly the least objectionable form of racing gambling. And if the government does not find it possible to prohibit the evil absolutely, it is surely not too much to expect that it will decide to limit it to the incorporated tracks, making war to the death upon the pool-rooms, and also making sure that there are no more incorporated tracks permitted in the country than are absolutely necessary for that very necessary purpose, 'the improvement of the breed.'

Belcher's Farmers' Almanac.

Belcher's Farmers' Almanac for 1910, issued by McAlpine Publishing Co., Ltd., Halifax, comes to us with all information expected in an almanac—and just a little more. Its bright looking cover is a fair index of its contents, which are terse, crisp, and accurate. Besides the important items of the calendar, the movements of the sun, moon and stars, and the four eclipses of the year—the fullest information of tidal movements at various points in the provinces, and the latest additions and changes pertaining to the lighthouse service along the whole coast line—there is an astonishing fund of data invaluable to the seafarer, the farmer, the merchant, and to all business and professional men.

A serious disaster occurred on the C. P. Railway, west of Sudbury, Ont., Jan. 21, when a part of the passenger train left the track, a passenger and dining car plunging into the Spanish River, many being drowned, while others in the second class car were burned to death. A number were rescued from the submerged passenger car by the bravery of conductor Reynolds who broke his way out through a window, came to the surface where the ice was broken, and although bruised and bleeding, helped several out to safety. Up to Monday 35 bodies had been recovered, and more victims are in the wreck. It is thought that the water is fifty feet deep near the steel bridge where the cars plunged into the river, some of the bodies may have been carried by the swift tide under the ice, and will never be recovered. Cause of accident not known.

Prohibition in P. E. Island.

The Charlottetown Guardian, in a recent article dealing with the results of the prohibitory law, which now governs the whole Province, says: "The law has proved to be most beneficial in this city. In the old days, with 2000 less people, we kept sixteen policemen. Now we have but six—one on duty at the police station at night, another there by day, and only two patrolmen on duty by day and two by night about the city. "All the evils predicted to result from Prohibition have failed to materialize. It was said prohibition would only lead to more drunkenness; that we should have no decent hotels, that it would injure trade and so on. We have reduced the arrests for drunkenness to one-fourth of our former total; what they were under license; trade is better and larger, payments more prompt, we have better hotels, better streets and sidewalks, better fire and light service than ever before. "Doubters have been convinced and former opponents converted to prohibition. The law has the support of all the better element of the people and of the clergy, Protestant and Catholic alike. "It has made good! No political party and no man of either party among our thirty members of the Legislature has in seven years past, or will now, propose to repeal it. "Year after year it has been strengthened by amendments proposed by the temperance people. The inspector in this city was appointed on the recommendation of the Temperance Alliance. The liquor interest has almost ceased to be a political factor in the city or province. "Some liquor is imported, for the province has not the power to prohibit the importation. Tourists, travelers and sailors bring it in here, and at Summerside, and the small outports. Some dishonest druggists and doctors gave trouble for a time, but convictions and exposures have checked this. "Many a poor drunkard has lived to bless the prohibitory law, while wives and children bless it too. The temperance people unanimously declared it to be the best weapon yet placed in their hands with which to fight the liquor trade."

The Gadfly.

Mr. W. F. Parker has been good enough to sneer at what he is polite enough to term one of our paroxysms of exuberant religiosity. We do not imagine that anyone will ever accuse him of either a paroxysm of religiosity or any other kind of religiosity, which in his mind seems to be a misnomer. The scale used by a gadfly in a classification of the mental calibre of Professor Matthews might possibly be of the same quality as that used by Mr. W. F. Parker in classifying Dr. E. more Harris as the pursuer in this heresy hunt. If our judgment was harsh we are extremely sorry; that it was formed as in complacent ignorance of the facts we absolutely deny. The high cock-a-doodle air with which Mr. W. F. Parker informs us that the ecclesiastical scribbler carries with it an unfortunate tendency to speak without book is certainly refreshing though not very complimentary.

Upon information we consider quite as authentic as W. F. Parker's book we are informed that the professor referred to tonight among other things that the bible only contained the word of God, but is not the word of God; that only its religious content is infallible but otherwise it has many mistakes; that the life of Christ was not a fulfilment of predictions in the Old Testament, its Messianic note was merely realized in our Lord; that the first eleven chapters of Genesis folk lore full of contradictions; that Dr. Hopper's purpose was to give us a sadder and better bible; not the faculty of Andover regularly at the time prescribed take an oath of allegiance to certain evangelical principles and then go to their classrooms and proceed to contradict everything they had sworn to teach and defend? As we said the professor was trained in a school of men who can so juggle with words that they can say what they please and crawl out through the hole of being misunderstood. We do not believe that the Ontario Baptists seriously think of retaining this man's services. We take it for granted that there is a tacit understanding that he shall resign as soon as another opening is found. In the meantime the heaven of unbelief is being inserted in the hearts of the coming ministry.

We have in mind an institution of learning called a university, for the educating among other professions of Baptist ministers, who turned down one of the cleverest clergymen in that denomination purely because it was alleged that his theological views were hardly of the orthodox kind though it was not theology he would have been required to teach. Subsequently they were not so high-criminating and in this respect have laid themselves open to the charge of inconsistency and fallibility.

We are just as anxious to give the facts when once the subject was opened as our infallible and super-critical critic and any lordly attitude on his part of possessing the only known fountain of truth is properly resented. We are not afraid of our views touching these teachers, professors if you prefer, the whole trend and tendency of whose teaching is to discredit the bible and heap ridicule and contempt upon those who believe and proclaim the old truths. The miracles, the virgin birth, the literal resurrection of our Lord are tossed overboard with sublime assurance. Some of these dreadfully wise men have had toboggan slides through the front end of some foreign university. In the language of the street they will wind up with a bump.

Conductor Addy Nichols, of the D. A. R., had his leg severely injured at Yarmouth on Saturday, 13th, inst.
