REGULAR MEETING BOARD OF HEALTH

The regular meeting of the North'ld Sub-District Board of Health was held in the Chatham Town Hall Wednesday afternoon. Dr. Desmond of Newcastle, Dis. trict Medical Health Officer presided. With the exception of Fred Richard of Rogersville a full board was present.

It was reported that the county is fairly free from contagious diseases. At present there are two cases of Diphtheria at Renous, a case of scarlet fever at Millbank and one at Chatham. The latter however is convalescent.

Complaints of the unsanitary conditions at the Chatham C.N.R. station were brought in by two members of the board. Three other stations in the county were reported as unsanitary. Steps wiil be taken at once to remedy these conditions.

HIGHEST DEATH RATE

Manitoba had the highest birth ate of the Canadian Provinces in 921, as shown by a Blue Book covering vital statistics for that year, compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics

The figures cover only eight Provinces, however, Quebec not being included. Manitoba's birth rate in 1921 was 30.3 per thousand

Infant deaths showed a notable decrease in 1921 as compared with 1900. For 1924 the rate was 88.1 for each thousand births, while while the year before it was 100.1. The highest rate in 1921 was 113.3 per thousand in New Brunswick, the rate of infant deaths in that Province in 1920 having been 134.9 per thousand

Nova Scotia had the highest death rate from tuberculosis, while cancer caused the highest percentage of deaths in British Columbia. Saskatchewan had the lowest death rate from tuberculosis, while New Brunswick had the least number of deaths from cancer, in proportion to population. Cancer of the stomach and though this form of the disease women. On the whole, however, more women than men died of cancer during 1921.

British Columbia had the lowest death rate for babies, namely 56.5 for each thousand born in 1921 and 60.8 in 1920.

British Unemployment Relief

The British minister of labor Sir Montague Barlow, stated that there were 1,251,600 workers unemployed in Great Britain last ure to provide work for the unemployed. Apparently the equiv alent of 250 million dollars will be appropriated for this purpose.

> It is no remedy for unemployment to spend public money on schemes for still more production, unless there is also something done to increase the purchasing power of the people as consumers.

Of course the wages and salarjes that are distributed to the workers, from the sums that are appropriated for unemployment relief work, do give a temporary stimulus to purchasing power, but such methods of relieving unemployment differ very little in effect from the stimulus of the hyperdermic injection.

The British government has apparently decided that there is less risk in employing such a method to stimulate industry than in going through another winter of the deflation policy, which has been completely discredited in the last three years.



A dispatch from London states that a number of cattle from the Prince of Wales' ranch was included in a large consignment of Canadian cattle which reached Cardiff recently. There appeared to be a keen demand for the consignment and 150 head were despatched to Norfolk farmers by special train.

Members of the Bread and Cake Bakers' Association of Canada, at the closing session of their Toronto convention, pledged subscriptions totalling \$10,000 towards the launching of a permanent institute of baking, in connection with the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. It is expected that the school will be opened early in 1924.

Canadian Pacific Railway figures how remarkable increases in the contains a well written article under the caption of, "Newspaper History."

After reading the following: "We believe that the only newspapers in these Maritime Provinces having a continuous existence for Canadian Pacific Railway figures show remarkable increases in the shipment of grain for the ten week days preceding and including October 18th, this year, as compared with 1922. During the ten days there were loaded for ahipment over the whole system a total of 16,195 cars, at the rate of 2,850,000 bushels a day, in comparison with 12,000 cars at 1,753,000 bushels a day last year.

A system of education by mail for those who live in remote rural districts out of reach of rural schools Baker, Minister of Education for Alberta, to ge into effect this month. The working plan has already been drawn up to run through the winter to the end of the school year. It is expected that from 20 to 40 lessons will be given in the case of each applicant for the service.

Of 526 girls brought to Saskatchewan from the British Isles from 1920 to June 15, 1923, only six have returned overseas, and of the sum of \$45,411.55 advanced to the girls the sum of \$42,980.98 had been repaid up to June 15th, 400 having repaid their loan in full and the balance of 126 paying all but the sum of \$2,430.57. 

The little village of Hope, situated on the Fraser River about one hundred miles from the coast, is the starting point for all mountaineers wishing to reach the interior of British Columbia by the trail route. Through this pass too, under innumerable snow sheds and tunnels the Kettle Valley Railway goes to Princeton and the interior. In the centre is an opening for the Nicolum river, to the right is the Silver Creek draw and beyond it the snow-capped peaks of the Cascade range.

The way lies through Sylvan glades, past rushing waterfalls and over rustic bridges, the old dry "cribbing" of which is as firm as the day when it was laid.

The first feeding ground for horses is at 12 Mile Lake—otherwise known as Divide Lake at an altitude of 2300 feet. This lake is the head waters of the Nicolum river. Here there is a beautiful hay meadow owned by a trapper and prospector who is patiently awaiting the day when the transprovincial road will give him a means of transporting his wealth, in the shape of hay, to outside points.


