A Silly Proposal

Reports at present current are not necessary to give a coloring of the statements that the dominant party intends tinking with its school Aok. During the recent campaign one of the men high in the councils of the government made such an immoral speech as to excite a general indignation on the part of the other members of the cabinet. Besides his advocacy of the change, we have the Premier, whose editor is also a supporter of the government, openly discussing upon the matter, and advocating the abolition of the supplementary clause among his other hobbies on retirement. Present appearances seem to justify the assertion that it is part of the policy of our rulers to make an onslaught during the coming session upon the educational system of the Province. Possibly the majority has given birth to the opinion that they have received an everlasting mandate from the people, and are at perfect liberty to override as will their well understood wishes. The present school law gives the best of satisfaction; and we fear that tampering with it—especially along the lines proposed by certain members of the government—will not conduce to the advancement of education. If the government is really sincere in the carrying out of the cheereering policy outlined by the Premier, great savings can be effected without undermining the branch of the public service. Enhancement is undoubtedly in order for the good of the Province, and the sooner it is inaugurated the better. A start made within the precincts of the Provincial Building would not cause serious results to the country. The government offices are now overstocked with officials, yet no mention of curtailment is made in that quarter. Many of these offices were created to close the mouths of hungry supporters, and are altogether unnecessary. The assertion is no idle one. Facts amply uphold it. If retrenchment, begin in the proper quarter. Clip the official list, and pay less attention to the wants of private individuals. Interference with our schools will meet with determined opposition. An almost similar change to that now proposed proved abortive years ago, and so, we imagine, will this.

A Question of Patronage.
A CORRESPONDENT OF THE EXAMINER, writing over the nono de plume of "Gladstone," discusses the question of patronage, as doled out by the local government. The question is one that has time and again engaged the attention of the thoughtful and fairminded, not only with regard to the local, but also the Dominion government. Though the theme may be somewhat old, it is one which might often be referred to, with perhaps, better results. The disparity of patronage which "Gladstone's" figures reveal—and they by no means show the true state of affairs—may well prompt the reader to ask "Why is it that the Catholics of Prince Edward Island do not receive a fair share of the patronage at the disposal of the Local Government?" The way in which they are handpicked in this, as well as in all other quarters, intensifies the truth of the statement that they are the under dog in the fight. It is certainly a striking anomaly that one half our population—people who are as loyal and dutiful citizens as any to be found in the land—should merit such treatment. No fair-minded person will for a moment assert that Catholics receive their just due in the matter of which "Gladstone's" complaint. To have the matter remedied should be the desire of every lover of his fair play. "Gladstone's" figures, incomplete as they are, forcibly show the injustice of his contention. With but scant verbiage they would of themselves make an eloquent plea. When several important offices held by both Protestants and Catholics have been omitted from the list, their incorporation would not serve to equalize matters. New Brunswick Session.

A gang of scoundrels who live in King and Queen's Counties, New Brunswick, have for over a year past been cheating St. John and Fredericton merchants. The sharpers belong mostly to a place called Bellefleur Creek. The operations of this "gang" dates from January 1893, when W. H. Bell, a piano and sewing machine agent of St. John had a call from a man named Ferris of Bellefleur Creek, Grand Lake, who wanted to purchase an organ on the instalment plan. The organ, which was one of the best, was accordingly sent; but when the time for the first payment matured, no money was forthcoming.

Mr. Bell's agent visited the place and found that Ferris had disposed of the organ to another of whom Mr. Bell could find nothing about. Since then the same person has had many calls from persons calling from the same district, but he found through enquiry that they were of the same class. Mr. Bell has no hesitation in saying that the swindling is being carried on by one "gang" who dispose of their spoils to one Crandall who acts as an agent or receiver of spoils.

Mr. William Crawford, another piano and sewing machine agent, owes the victim of a valuable machine to the wits of this organization. While Mr. Hugh Crawford has been worked for two weeks in the same way.

A Protestant carriage builder was a costly carriage was purchased on the instalment plan from him and when no money was forthcoming, he ven-

ured there to reclaim his article, but was glad to get clear with his life, as he was set upon by the band who were armed with bay forks and feroce poles.

Probably the last and final trick at swindling was practiced on the firm of O Flood & Son, on September 21st, when Samuel R. Barnett of Bellefleur Creek, walked into their store and began an investigation of their pianos finally selecting a \$300 article which he wanted, and agreed to pay for it on the instalment plan. Mr. Flood, who attended the man, thought it strange that there was a demand for such costly articles from so remote a part of the country. The suspiciousness of the transaction was not allayed, however, when on the same day another man named Henderson of the same place called and incidentally or casually mentioned Barnett's name, saying he is good for any amount. The price was set and the time for the first payment set; it was four months, making it fall due on Jan. 21st. On that day, as no word was received by the firm from Barnett he was written to, but failed to reply.

The firm then sent a messenger to Bellefleur Creek and sought an interview with Barnett, who told him in tones of defiance that he had immediately after securing the piano sold it to Crandall. The representative of Flood & Son was told that he had disposed of the piano to a third party and so the game went on. Last week Mr. Flood & Son went to Hampton where they avore out a warrant for Barnett's arrest for theft. The warrant was placed in Sheriff Spronk's hands and Barnett lodged in jail where he awaits trial. The operations referred to above are not the only ones these schemers have been engaged in. Mr. A. T. Duffin, another large piano dealer reports the loss of a valuable instrument within the past year through the same swindle operations engaged in and to the same cliques or parties.

"Paul Jones," the famous \$5,000 "globe trotter" left the quarters of the Boston Free Club last Wednesday night to cover the first instalment of the \$5,000 race to be travelled during the ensuing twelve months. Twenty-four hours after his start from the Press Club, he had earned \$116 of the \$5,000 which he must have to cover the cost of his voyage. One hundred dollars of this sum he banked for the emergencies he expects will occur during his novel accomplishment, and the remainder he took for immediate expenses. A group of newspaper men saw him off and wished him bon voyage. Before leaving the railway station Jones told the scribbles present that he expected to make fully three-quarters of the \$5,000 on this side of the water. He has no definite plans as to how he will earn the cash, but will use any honest means to gain it. Some idea of his method of gathering in the few dollars which may be gleaned from his second day's work. He carried a few letters for advertisement autographs to admirers at twenty-five cents a piece and let his blanket stop for an advertisement for a consideration of \$8 per week for advertisement. He earned his supper and the first night's accommodation, and picked up a little on the side by submitting to introductions to a miscellaneous crowd of five cents per introduction.
