MODES OF PRESERVING GRAPES IN THEIR ORIGINAL STATE.

1. Take sound, ripe grapes, in baskets boxes from three to six inches deep, set in a cool place to sweat, for one or two days, then line the baskets with paper and place in layers of grapes (removing all unsound ones), then a layer of paper and so on until basket is filled, appropriate then cover closely with paper and keep in a dry place with temperature as near 35 or 40 degrees fah. as possible. Grapes thus put up will keep sound and fresh from two to six months. Even temperature is desirable. 2. Take grapes, set by to sweat as in

No. 1, then take sand and wash until water, runs off clear, dry thoroughly in sun or oven, line box or basket with paper, then a layer of grapes (each bunch wrapped in manills paper) then layer sand and so proceed until filled. Broken or unsound fruit never to be used. This process has kept the grape fresh to the

Take under ripe grapes. mash. boil three minutes, scrain through flannel To every lb. of juice add one lb. bag. sugar, let come to boil, skim, boil one minute and run into moulds.

ripened add one box jelatine), boil five minutes, strain, add one lb. fruit juice, also one teaspoon each cinnamon, clove and allspice, boil five minutes, strain into moulds.

GRAPE CATSUP OR SAUCE.

Take one quart grape juice, one tea cup sugar, one small teaspoon salt, one large heaping tablespoon ground cinnamon, one tablespoon even full ground allspice, one large teaspoon full ground health cloves, boil slowly for 20 minutes and seal it for future use. Will keep for a long time open. Can be thinned with vinegar to suit tasts when used. Very

CANNED GRAPES.

Take ripe grapes, separate skins from pulp, boil pulp three minutes, strain through leno or cheese cloth to take out seeds, add skins after boiling them twenty minutes, add ‡ to ½ pound sugar (to suit taste) to 1 pound fruit, let dissolve, then boil 1 minute-not longer-as boil ing too long destroys the aroina.

In preserving the juice or canning grapes, avoid boiling beyond the specified time, as further boiling carries off the flavor and aroma of the juice, also ehanges and destroys the chemical and food

When she became evoning star last December her whole illuminated disk (like the full moon) was turned toward the earth, and, being at her greatest dis-tance from us, her diameter was only 10". She has ever since been travel-ling toward us, and increasing in size and bril-lianey. At the same time she has been turn-ing less and less of her illuminated disk towards us, massing through all the phases of the moon from full to new. Until the 15th the impressing size of the pisnet's disk has more than counterbalanced the lessening por-tion which is illuminated, and as every ob-server must have noticed the fair evening star has grown more brilliantly beautiful. After the 13th the illuminated crescent rapidly di-minishes until it becomes exceedingly thin.


From The Norfolk Virginian, July 23. The southern-bound mail train on the Sca-board and Roanoke Railroad came near kill-
