



Both would be eligible to membership in this church.

Several of them are separated by ery slight doctrinal differences. Why not one large, well supported church

where each may believe his own way but all worship together?

My ideal church has one or more large church buildings, according to the size and needs of the community. The buildings are the most beautiful in the city. The sermons are preached by great and good men from all professions as well as by the

regular ministers.

That the convenience of all may be suited there is a service every hour or two all day Sunday. In order to suit all tastes-the taste that likes a simple, intellectual service, and the taste that likes an elaborate sensual service, with music and incense and choir boys and candles, there are all these kind of services at different

Since there is plenty of money there can always be plenty of the most beautiful music and the most talented men of the age can be asked to come and give their beautiful thoughts to the congregations.

The church will be opened during the week both for services and for social and philanthropic work. The 'need of a world of men" will be the business of the church, as well as the worship of God.

Train Fell Eighty Feet.

Engine and Nine Cars Leave Track Near Folleigh Mountain - The Brakeman and Fireman Crushed to Death-Driver Dies After Being Removed From the Wreck.

Truro, N.S., Feb. 28.-Three I. C R employees lost their lives as a result of the wreck of a special freight rain at Hill's Siding, near Folleigh take, early this morning. James O. Davidson, brakeman, and driver Danel McLeod were crushed to death, ind fireman John McIsaac died after being taken from the wreck. The rain was made up of 20 cars, and

as boound north. The bodies of Driver McLeod Brakeman Davidson and Fireman Mcsaac were brought to Truro at 6.30 this morning. McLeod died after beng removed from his engine by Conductor Harry Baker and Brakeman

Yeomans. Baker's story is that the train was proceeding at a fairly slow rate of speed, the cars heavy with coal and steel rails. His van and several cars remained on the track; a number of other cars had left the rails, but did not go over the bank. The engine and nine cars plunged down to a point gighty-five feet below the level of the track, and were lost

In The Midnight Darkness.

He sent his brakesman to Folleigh o notify Truro and hurried down the bank. The broken cars and their contents were piled on the engine and tender. After a search he discovered Driver McLeod and assisted him, but ie was too badly injured to bring to the van. He could not find the fireman nor the rear brakeman who had changed with the forward brakeman at Folleigh Lake. He could get no answer from the missing men, so he gave his attention to making Mc-Leod as comfortable as he could. At three o'clock assistance came from Folleigh, and later the auxiliary and the doctors came from Truro. When the latter arrived McLeod was beyond liope. The entire party then searched for the missing men, and found them after a great deal of hard work.

Crushed and Mutilated. The bodies were removed as quick y as possible. An inquest will be held this afternoon at the undertak-

er's rooms McLeod belonged to Salmon River near Truro; he leaves a wife and five River, Colchester, being one of the well known family of James W. Da vidson, Fish Warden of the county; he leaves a wife and seven children. McIsaac's father and mother live at Foundry Hill, Truro. The young man was 24 years of age, and was known by man of his intimates as "Speaker John" from his habit of taking part in public discussions. His talent in that line is said to have been remark-





The new chamber would be a small one having no Veto power on financial bills: but where a a deadlock of the chambers under any legislation, the two houses would sit and vote together. The committee of ten engineer ing this big strike say at least 75,000 organized workers as well as many unorganized sympathisers of the street car men have already ceased to work. Promptly at midnight Union orchestras playing at the leading hotels and cafes picked up their instruments and started for their homes. Union cab drivers and chauffeurs also abandoned their posts, and the electric cab and auto service was badly crippled. The drivers of both taxicab services in the city are mem bers of a Union and refused to take out their machines after the strike had gone into effect. The committee of ten remained in session at headquaters all night receiving reports from the various local unions. The leader refused to comment on the report that the police officials would prevent the demonstration planned for to-morrow afternoon in Independence Square. Rioting to-night was particularly severe in the Northeastern District, and it is thought to be a forerunner of serious trouble to morrow when thousands of idle me will throng the streets. While the labor leaders are receiving support from their fellow workmen in all parts of the country, many associations of employers have sent letters mending the stand taken by them and asking them to stand firm in their determination not to submit to the strikers' demands.



This is a very fine work. The formation, paper, type, illustrations and

get up is a triumph of the printer's art. The story of our great depend ency so admirably told should be very interesting to all Newfoundlanders. Only those who have gone through the mill can understand all the labour and anxiety and hard grinding toil involved in the production of such a work as Gosling's Labrador. There is an admirable description of the French occupation of the Peninsula, Cartright, and his journal will be absolutely new to most readers. It is a most interesting human document The author's personality is unique. Its frank, outspoken immorality, whilst suitable for the eighteenth century and the time of Tom Jones, is hardly fit for ears polite in our days, and Mr. Gosling has very wisely dited the journal very severely. The author has dedicated the book to his wife, and all who know her social charm, her literary ability, and her great public spirit, will recognize that t is most appropriate. The first part of the book is devoted to the fifteenth century and the questions of discovery before and after that momentous period. It is not very clearly stated. but it seems to me that Mr. Gosling agrees with my views that the meetin skin boats limits the position of Vinland. Eskimos are not known south of Newfoundland. From Labador they often crossed over to our island for short trips. In North America Newfoundland was their limit. There are three important questions concerning North America. The discovery Mr. Gosling rightly gives the credit to John Cabot. He is somewhat dubious at first about the continued possession and trade of the English to Newfoundland, but with a final quotation from the British Ambassador at the Treaty of Utrecht he confirms my view of the subject. As to the landfall, he considers it was somewhere on the East Coast in the neighborhood of Bonavista or Trinity. Every one I think will admit that Bonavista, or Good Sight, is a very natural name for landfall, and this name appears, as Mr. Gosling admits. on very early maps. Bonavista was the landfall of both Cortereal and Cartier. It is marked as the landfall of Cabot on a French and English map, showing that in this early period it was universally recognized as John Cabot's landfall. All this is strong enough, but there is much more convincing evidence. The great geographer, Sir Clements Markham, old the writer that the name Keels or Keels Strand, in the neighborhood of Cape Bonavista, was the clearest vidence of the landfall. After a ong voyage the old ships would have to be hauled up and cleaned, and this was the name always given to the careening cove. John Cabot hoisted the Royal Ensign and took possession in the name of the King. The next good harbor to Cape Bonavista is King's Cove. In the old foreign maps t is called "The Royal Port." It was on St. John the Baptist's Day that our Colony was discovered. 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
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
