Seamen's Strike.

We are unacquainted with the general merits or demerits of the International Seamen's Strike which has been heralded for some considerable time, and which has now been declared at the principal ports of Great Britain and a few ports of the continent. So far as the intelligence at hand throws light on the situation, the strike seems confined mainly to Great Britain. Whether this is so or not will be evident within a few days. If it is, it would appear that Great Britain is being made a cesspool of international strike mongers. Colour is lent to this view by the absence of intelligence of the strike in Germany, French and American ports. The absence of news from Hamburg is particularly significant. This feature may be the reason why little enthusiasm is being shown for the strike among the seamen of Great Britain. However, this is largely

conjecture and does not go the merits of the strike. One matter has always been abundantly clear. Seamen have long been workers apart and many of the benefits of social legislation and working class amelioration have been denied them. It is to be hoped wise counsels will prevail, as no people and no nation would suffer more from a universal strike among seamen than the English.

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CONFIRMATION

At the Goules and Petty Harbour. On Sunday last, 11th inst. the beautiful inland settlement at the Goules was enlivened by His Grace Archbishop Howley had informed Rev. F. Tierney, parish priest of Petty Harbour, that he would administer the Sacrament of Confirmation on that day, and notwithstanding that it is the busy season for farmers, getting in the crops and getting their meadows ready, the people gathered and erected two beautiful arches of evergreens decked with flags and banners. The road also for over a mile was decorated with festoons of flags. His Grace seeing that the men were armed with guns, a platoon of 40 of them ready to fire a volley, descended from the carriage and positively forbade the firing of any shot. He spoke of the numerous accidents which recently happened and while thanking the men for their good will he said that if a gun were fired he would leave the place without administering the Confirmation. The children to the number of sixty-five, all nicely dressed, were gathered in the neat and beautiful chapel. Here again His Grace harangued the people at some length. He spoke of the beautiful scenery, the rich and smiling farms, cleared out of the wilderness over a hundred years ago. He bade the young men imitate the example of their grandfathers, the pioneers of agriculture in Newfoundland. He told them to stay at home where they would be much happier than abroad. If they got higher wages abroad they had to pay three times the price for every article of food and clothing. If their grandfathers could have come out here into what was then the wild woods and turn the wilderness into a fertile and fruitful vale and make a comfortable living for themselves, when they had to carry every thing they wanted on their backs over a rough mountain path from St. John's. How much more easy would it be for them now with good roads to St. John's and Petty Harbour, but above all now that the railway was about to pass through their village, the track was already visible, passing not a hundred yards from where he was speaking. Before three months it would be in operation as far as the Goules. Then a new life would be opened up for the people. His Grace predicted a glorious future for this splendid fertile vale and again strongly urged the young men not to go away but to stick to the land as their safest means of securing comfort and plenty for their homes.

His Grace then turned to the children and gave them a few words of instruction and encouragement. He explained to them the meaning and effects of the Sacrament of Confirmation which they were about to receive. It is not a mere rite or ceremony, a mere form of prayer. It is really and veritably one of the Seven Sacraments of Holy Church which confers on their souls the plenitude of the graces and the seven-fold gift of the Holy Ghost. Such has been the teaching of the Catholic Church ever since that first Pentecost Day on which the Holy Ghost descended on the Apostles in Jerusalem.

After the function His Grace and party drove on to Petty Harbour. The drive of four miles is through some of the wildest and most beautiful scenery in Newfoundland, or indeed all North America. It is said by those who know to equal if not indeed to surpass the far-famed Gap of Dunlo in the Reeks of Killarney.

The picturesque little village was all ablaze with colour, every hilltop having its flag-staff and string of flags. The children tastefully attended and bearing banners and motoes in the Archiepiscopal cortege at the entrance to the village and proceeded to the beautiful little Church which tops the neighbouring hill. His Grace here repeated his instruction to the children, not forgetting the warning to the men about firing guns, notwithstanding which a few furtive pops were heard, and a cur of blue smoke rising from behind some huge boulder betrayed the culprit whose enthusiasm outran his sense of obedience.

The Archbishop and party were delighted with the neat and elegant appearance of the Church, School and Presbytery, all of which testified to the great taste and energy of the worthy pastor, Rev. F. Tierney. After the function the Archbishop and party were entertained at dinner with the usual well known hospitality of the Rev. Parish Priest. The pleasure of the drive back to town was somewhat marred by the unpleasantness of the weather which set in in the evening, but all in all the day was one which will not soon be forgotten by the good people. It is sixteen years since Confirmation was administered at the Goules, the children generally going to Petty Harbour for the Sacrament. The total number confirmed was 149.—Cont.

IMPOSING CEREMONY.

Corner Stone of New Wing St. Mary's Church Laid by Lord Bishop Yesterday.

Yesterday was a red letter day on the South Side and one that will be long remembered by the parishioners of St. Mary's. The occasion was the laying of the corner stone of the new addition to the Church by His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland. A large gathering assembled, and the weather was pleasant. At 3 o'clock His Lordship and clergy in procession entered the platform near to the place where the stone was to be laid. The ceremony then began. The Rector, conducted the opening service which consisted of an appropriate prayer and the singing of the Hymn "We Love the Place O Lord." A silver trowel was then handed the Bishop. The stone was then put in its place the Lord Bishop using the trowel. His Lordship then addressed the assemblage and warmly complimented the parishioners of St. Mary's on the completion of their beautiful Church. It was a pleasing thing to find that more accommodation is needed in our churches, indicating as it did growth and stability. It afforded him great pleasure to officiate at such functions and his one wish is that more churches should be erected in our parishes. It is a good thing to ask the blessing of God upon this work. Unless our efforts are undertaken and carried on with help from on High we cannot hope for good results. He would always remember this occasion and would treasure the trowel as a valuable souvenir of the laying of the corner stone at St. Mary's. The stone itself which was prepared by Mr. J. McIntyre, of this city, and is a tree gift from him, bears the following inscription: Church of St. Mary the Virgin. This stone was laid by His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland, in commemoration of the 52nd anniversary of the consecration of the Church, and the Coronation of King George the V.

On the end of the stone is inscribed the names of

HENRY UPHILL, Rector.
P. F. LEMESSURIER, G. W. ELLIS, Church Wardens.

Beneath it was deposited a box containing current copies of the realim, a copy of each of the city papers, and a list of the 1,650 parishioners of St. Mary's. Rev. G. H. Bolt next addressed the people and gave some touching reminiscences about St. Mary's Church. He recognized that amongst the clergymen there he occupied a unique position. He had been baptized and confirmed in St. Mary's Church and also received his first communion there. He was a pupil in its Sunday School and afterwards a teacher. He had been married there and had preached his first sermon within its walls, and also celebrated there Holy Communion for the first time. He was the first regular Curate of the Church as well as its first elected Rector. Rev. Mr. Bolt then went on to describe the history of St. Mary's from 1857 when the late Bishop Field first proposed to build a Church on the South Side. A third of the site had been reserved as free and the plan worked admirably. St. Mary's parishioners had always been to the front in the work of missions and proved that the most generous people will become in time the most pious. He concluded by expressing that the blessing of God would descend on the congregation. The collection was then taken up which amounted to the handsome sum of \$330.00. The Hymn "The Church's one Foundation" having been rendered by the congregation. The full order of the service was as follows:—

The Order of Service.
All things being ready, the Bishop said: Our help is in the Name of the Lord; Who hath made heaven and earth. O Lord, hear our prayer: And let our cry go unto Thee: Blessed be the Name of the Lord; From this time forth for evermore. HYMN.—
We love the place, O God, etc. And after that these Prayers followed, the Bishop first announcing with a loud voice:

The Lord be with you; And with thy spirit. Let us pray. Lord have mercy upon us. Christ have mercy upon us. Lord, have mercy upon us. Our Father, &c.

O Almighty Lord God, Whom the heavens and earth contain, yet Who disdainest not to dwell with Thy Church here on earth; Mercifully grant that all evil may depart from this place which we are about to dedicate to Thy Most Holy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord Who ever liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, World without end. Amen.

Then the Bishop, laying his hand upon the Foundation Stone, said: "Almighty and everlasting God, mercifully be pleased to bless this stone which we are about to place for a foundation in the Name and strength of Him Who is the tried and precious stone; and grant that all they who shall be the furtherance of this work shall have faithfully offered to Thee, through His substance may ever be preserved both in body and soul, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Bishop—Behold, I lay in Zion a chief corner stone, elect, precious; and he that believeth in Him shall not be confounded. The stone which the builders refused is become the head stone of the corner. This is the Lord's doing; And it is marvellous in our eyes. Other foundation can no man lay than that which is laid; Which is Jesus Christ. Praise ye the Lord; The Lord's name be praised. Then the time being prepared, and all things ready, the Bishop being assisted by the Architect and the Builder, placed the stone.

In the faith of Jesus Christ, we place this foundation stone in the Name of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Ghost. Amen. Here let true faith, the fear of God and brotherly love ever remain; this place is consecrated to prayer and to the praises of the Most Holy Name of the Same our Lord Jesus Christ. Who liveth and reigneth with the Father and the Holy Ghost, now and ever. Amen.

The Church's one foundation, &c. The Lord be with you; And with thy spirit. Let us pray. O God, Who art the shield and defence of Thy people, be ever at hand we beseech Thee, to protect and succour the builders of this house; that the work which, through Thy mercy has been begun, may by their labour be brought to a happy end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. O God, Who hast built the living Temple of Thy Church upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief Corner-stone; grant unto the work of Thine hands continual increase of glory and spiritual strength, and daily make Thy people more meet for the eternal tabernacle of Thy rest in the heavens; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prevent, O Lord, &c. Benediction and Doxology. The whole ceremony was most inspiring and will long be remembered by all who witnessed it. The C. L. B. She was the daughter of Mr. James Hayes, of St. George's, and is the first nurse of this institution who has been buried in the cemetery. 

SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this was suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes, only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we had, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.
