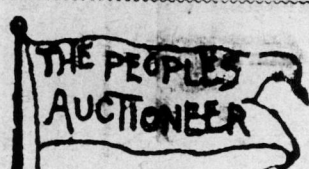

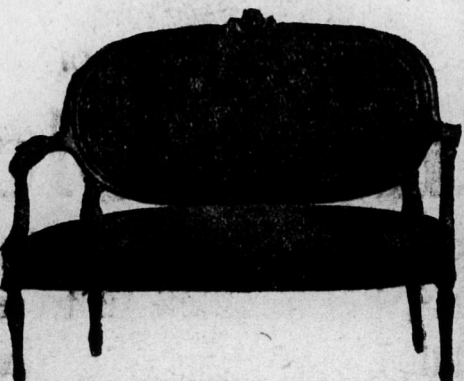

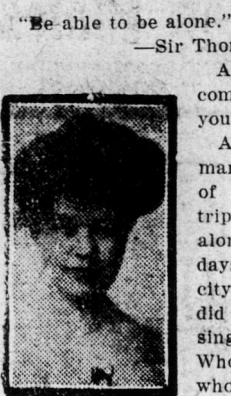

Household Notes.

If silver is to be stored away for some time, pack it with dry flour; it will remain untarnished.

Marvels of London Life.

The immensity of the world's greatest city is strikingly illustrated by the facts and figures published recently in a report on London life issued by the London County Council. It is estimated, for instance, that \$7,000,000 is paid every week in rent, and \$2,100,000 in rates, while for the privilege of keeping about 180,000 dogs in London, pay \$300,000 a year. The rich pay over half a million a year in carriage and motor licenses, while altogether no less than \$5,000,000,000 worth of property belonging to Londoners is insured.

It is remarkable that while fifty years ago only half the people living in London were born in the capital, to-day we are approaching the time when three-quarters of the population of London are natives, the figures being 668 per 1,000. Most people are under the impression, as they notice the new streets of houses springing up in all directions in the Metropolis, that London is growing bigger every day, but, as a matter of fact, last year \$28,000,000 less was spent on house building than in 1902.

There are 750 weddings in London every week, while the weekly average number of inquests is 100. No fewer than 53,000 drunkards are convicted in twelve months, while postmen deliver every day 4,000,000 letters, postcards, circulars and newspapers.

KILLED SEVENTY BIRDS.—Mr. Levi Chafe and his son arrived to-day by the express from Long Harbour Crossing. They killed 70 birds for one week and found them very scarce.

CARIBOU PLENTIFUL.—By the express to-day we learn that hunters who came down from about 30 miles up Grand Lake report caribou very plentiful. They have been seen in herds of 100, 120 and one man counted 129 in one herd.

MORE TURNIP STEALING.—Three more boys were summoned for stealing turnips from the gardens of the Christian Brothers, appeared before Judge Conroy to-day. His Honor lectured the young vandals strongly and released them on reserved sentence.

STEAMERS FOG BOUND.—The S. S. Morwenna, from Montreal via Gulf Ports, and the S. S. Florizel, from Halifax, are now due. The former left Sydney on Tuesday evening at 6 o'clock and should have reached port early this morning but is delayed by fog. The Red Cross boat left Halifax the same day at the same hour. Both steamers should dock this afternoon.

High Treason.

Oh, often, as I dance and sing gambol up and down, I wish this country had a king, with sceptre, throne and crown. A monarch, when he takes his throne, is settled there for life; he lets the campaign graft alone, the whooping and the strife. The stately monarch ne'er appears on platforms here and there, the dust of travel in his ears, and cinders in his hair. He isn't called on to defend his course to unwashed dubs, antagonists he doesn't send to Ananias' Clubs. He doesn't make the welkin throb, but in his throne room sits and learns the fine points of his job, while others throw the fits. Serene, remote, he does his stunt, attends his kingly grand; no noisy grand stand is behind, no bleachers are behind. He doesn't have to promise things he knows he cannot do; he plugs along like other kings, his pledges mighty few. He doesn't have to knuckle down to please this clique or that; he simply wears his derby crown and knows just where he's at. But we, who have a brand new chief elected each four years, are always plunged in noise and grief and rancor to our ears. When business gets to running straight, and quiet falls on men, we dig up some fool candidate, and rip things up again.

New Dreyfus Case.

French Soldier's Punishment to Hide a Crime.

Paris, Sept. 12.—The supposed scandal of the double punishment of an innocent soldier, with the object of hiding a crime three years old, has come to light.

In 1909 a soldier serving a punitive term in an Algerian regiment fell exhausted under his knapsack in the desert heat and said he could not go on. The officer in charge, it is alleged, ordered two sergeants to make him get up and march. Salt was crammed into his mouth, and eventually the man is said to have been left to die.

Emile Rousset, a soldier who had seen this incident, accused the officer and sergeants of the crime. Strong efforts were made to secure Rousset's silence, but when he persisted he was thrown into prison, and was kept there for two years in spite of efforts by friends in France. Eventually General Rabier was sent to Morocco to hold an inquiry. He came to the conclusion that the soldier had died a violent death, and ordered the release of Rousset, and the arrest of the lieutenant and the two sergeants.

Last December, two days before their trial was to begin, Rousset was once more arrested on a charge of murdering a comrade and was sentenced by court-martial to twenty years' penal servitude. Thereupon the lieutenants and sergeants were set at liberty.

Now the soldiers who gave evidence against Rousset have admitted that they were committing perjury.

To-day Lieutenant Paul Lacroix, who prepared the case against Rousset, admitted in a letter addressed to an officer belonging to the Constantine court-martial that he had been deceived by the witnesses and was now convinced of Rousset's innocence.—Reuter.

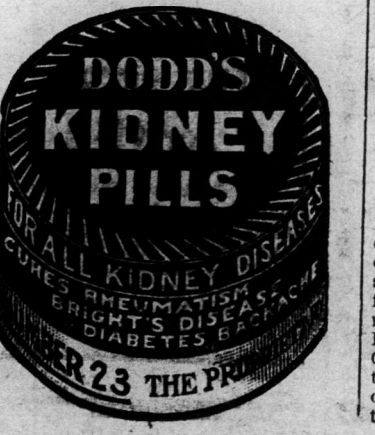

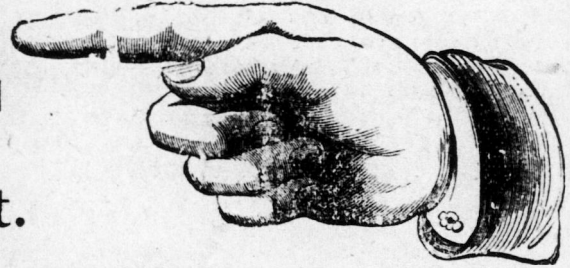

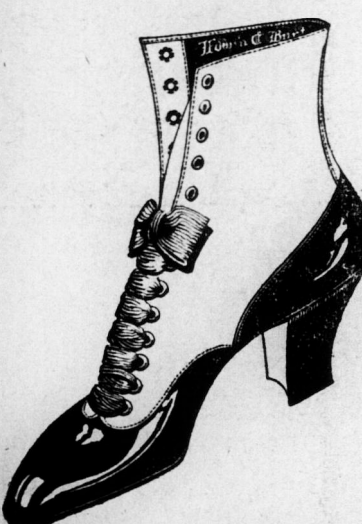

LONDON, Sept. 25. General Hamilton, Commander in Chief of the Mediterranean and Inspector General of the Overseas forces of the Empire, has been invited by the Hon. Sam Hughes to make a Canadian tour for the purpose of military inspection after his Mediterranean command ends in May next. The General in the course of an address before the Birmingham Institute, demanded the military training of all boys. He said that enthusiasts enter boys into the corps, by using the ploy of war as the bait, intending all the time to turn them into plaster saints. He said that he would look things fairly and squarely in the face, and press for compulsory cadet training in all schools, public and private. Let us concentrate on the mission in the estimates of a sum of £380,000 (\$1,900,000) wherewith to begin next spring the military training of 250,000 boys between the ages of twelve and fourteen.

BOSTON, Sept. 25. The Democrats, Republicans and Socialists have lined up for the State Campaign having chosen their party leaders at yesterday's primaries. Governor Foss, who won the preliminary contest over District Attorney G. Pelletier, by a margin of 26,614 votes, will head the Democratic ticket for the third time. Former Speaker Joseph Walker, who defeated Colonel Everett Benton, his opponent in the Republican struggle by 10,092 will lead the Republicans. Robert D. Sawyer was nominated for Governor by the Socialists, but his vote was so small that no record was named.

LONDON, Sept. 25. Canada is to be granted a Cardinal at the next Consistory at Rome in November, according to a correspondent of the Chronicle, in the person of Mgr. Bruchesi, Archbishop of Montreal. The Pope's decision says the correspondent is largely due to the compliments which have reached the Vatican respecting the Archbishop's mastery ability, displayed in the conduct of the Eucharistic Congress in Montreal in the year 1910.

LONDON, Sept. 25. A telegram to the Chronicle from Milan says that Pope Pius is pressing his campaign against Modernism in the Church, with renewed vigor, his latest move being the summary banishment from Italy of the famous scholar Padre Giovanni Jameria of Genoa, who enjoys the reputation of being the most cultured pulpit orator in the country. PEKING, Sept. 25. Troops encamped outside the gates of Wu Chang, capital of the Province of Hu Pew, mutined and attacked the city. The Lords of the Road.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,—In the latest and particular tangle in which Mr. Collishaw's motor figures, his straightforward account in the News shows that the fault was not on his side. But when he generalises on the grievances of motorists he is apt to find few outside themselves who agree with him.

The grievances are altogether on the other side and the courts cannot be too strict with these Lords of the Road who run out and west in incarnated in mechanical energy and in speed, is above the law. Of course, of course it is not the motor that is dangerous. It is the motorist; it is the reckless horse and cart, the child that obstructs it.

The roads are for the motorist and we petty men on foot must creep about by paths as best we can, content if we can find a retreat where we are neither smothered with petrol-laden dust nor awakened at midnight and later by the howl of the syren as some lord of the lanes homeward, certainly we should bar the children indoors; they might spoil the car if they were in the way; and how the dogs must annoy the pretty little boys dressed in white who guide the cars!

Oh it is wonderful how the motor has weaned us from old-fashioned ideas; there was a time when in the late evening one liked to linger on the roads laden with the scent of the country and the wild flowers; but the wretched sentimental dawdling is at an end, the roses are covered with dust, the trees are white and killed by gasoline, the air is redolent with oil, the night is made hideous with the childish calls and one is blinded by the glare of two great eyes that are eloquent of the monster they hide.

Seriously, though, I think that the motorist arrogantly overstep the privilege of the road and forget that the pedestrian has as much right to any part of it as they have. They speed altogether too fast and have compelled parents to keep their children in by the fear of accidents, the number of which I believe has only been kept down by a kindly Providence. They should be made slow down very perceptibly in turning in a corner; it is certain death for any child standing round a corner at present.

Motors spoil our country roads, they leave a path of dust and germs, and it is strange that those who ride in them do not notice how they themselves have developed hard, unpleasant expressions that do not speak of minds at rest.

Hold Zimmerman for Seven Deaths in Poison Case.

Montreal, "Star," Sept. 17th.—A coroner's jury to-day held George Zimmerman, 40 St. Urbain Street, criminally responsible for the death of a number of the foreign workmen who expired about the middle of August, after drinking wood-alcohol in a camp at St. Lambert. In all twelve foreigners met their death in this fashion, but after an hour's deliberation, the jury found that there was only evidence for concluding that seven of the deceased had met their death from poisoning. In the other five cases the symptoms were not conclusive.

Kost Bolahura, 11 St. Urbain St., who had already been provisionally acquitted on a charge of manslaughter gave a general denial to questions suggesting that he had ever had alcohol in his house, or that he had sold any liquor to the deceased workmen. He knew the dead men by sight only, but had never had any dealings with them. Occasionally a few fellow-countrymen, with their wives, would spend an hour or two at his home, but there was never any drinking, and he never had any liquor in the house. He had never seen any person to buy whiskey at 40 St. Urbain street, when he himself had none.

Dr. St. George who had analysed the intestines of the deceased, stated that traces of wood-alcohol had been in the viscera of two of them. The entrails of the other men had been in too great a state of decomposition to permit of wood-alcohol being definitely discovered, but the symptoms in each case were identically the same.

Mrs. Bolahura, wife of Kost Bolahura, denied ever having heard anything about the men taking part in a debauch about the middle of August.

Before George Zimmerman, 40 St. Urbain street, commenced to give his evidence, Coroner McMahon warned him that he was not required to answer any questions which might lead to his being held liable for the cause of the death of the workmen.

Zimmerman also flatly denied ever having had any whiskey in his house, or having sold any. He was working and received a living wage, he stated, and had no need to peddle liquor.

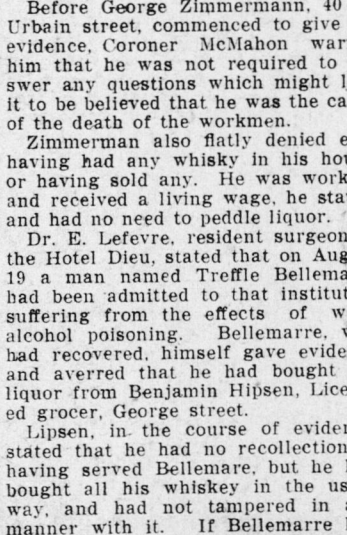

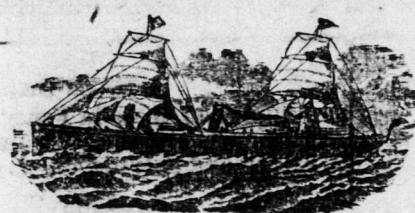
