





That Electrical Storm at Quirpon

Appended is an extract from a lette eceived by Wharfinger Crocker at Bowering's premises from Quirpon giving an account of an electrical torm which occurred there on May

"We had a very severe electrical storm on the 7th. The like I never witnessed. It did considerable dam- 34 x 44 4c. each age.
