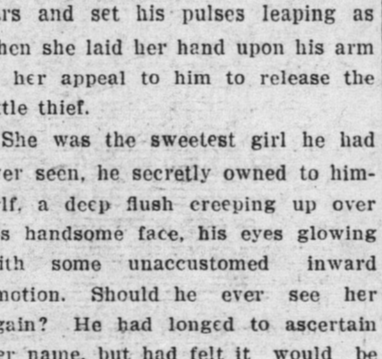

Destruction by Storm.

There are 12 factories near Shoal Bay and each worked from 100 to 200 lobster traps and not a fisherman of the whole number who at the present time has 20 traps in the water. The sea caused by the storm broke up all the lobster traps and the loss is very severe. To make matters worse, the wind veered into the N.E., and drove what traps had not been destroyed, to sea. Lobsters have not been as scarce the past twenty years.

A few weeks ago Mr. Reuben Butler, of Fox Trap, was hurt about the head and body by his horse running away on Weldgrave Street. They fear some mishap has befallen him.

Foot Crushed.

Amputation of the injured toes will be necessary and it will be several weeks before Kelly will be able to resume work.

"I fear, however," he adds, "that the general trend of opinion will be adverse to the policy of the British Admiralty." Capt. Pears, writing in the Berlin Tagblatt, thinks that the statement must call forth astonishment, and points out that the British fleet is three times the strength of the German fleet, that Mr. Churchill has no ground for anxiety, and that there is not the least reason why England should take this measure so suddenly. If Canada had given these ships, they would have remained in Canadian waters, now the ships will remain in home waters, and will directly strengthen the home fleet in the North Sea, and the iron girder which England is forging along the German coasts will be made stronger.

An Unexpected "Moral."

The Scion of Nobility Saw Real Life In Australia.

It is impossible (writes the Bishop of North Queensland in the Cornhill) to resist the temptation of telling a story against my brother bishops in England and myself. Some years ago I found in Sydney a youthful scion of the aristocracy travelling to gain "experience of Australian life" before he entered "the House." I pointed out to him the futility of thinking that he would gain much knowledge going from Government House to Government House, with occasional visits to show stations where the girls would wear Paris frocks and the men would organize polo matches in his honor.

At the same time I invited him to accompany me on a trip I proposed taking to some mining camps in North Queensland. My invitation was accepted with almost indecent haste, and in due course my guest became as disgrimmed and cheerful withal as his companion. I was not surprised when my guest shook my hand warmly at a "way back" railway station, saying that he had learned a good deal. When he was silent for a while, I thought that he felt some glimmering consciousness of what the duty of the House of Lords was towards the brave men and women on England's outposts. But I was not prepared for the remark, made with great earnestness: "Don't you think it would be a good thing for English bishops if they worked in North Queensland for a bit."

If any member of a congregation in a mining camp has anything to say during service, he generally says it cheerfully, during a service at which I was speaking. He was not questioning my general veracity, but the accuracy of my information. A brother bishop, who was preaching somewhat at length, made a misapprehension, the effect of which was somewhat marred by a tired voice, remarking, "Ain't you spinnin' rather a long yarn to-night, Mister?" But then a wearied member of the congregation in the bush has one consolation denied to his more conventional brother in England.

The hospitality, says the bishop, is usually most profuse, especially in the way of cakes, sandwiches, and tea. Sometimes there is fruit, and incidentally some danger of embarrassment is thus caused. The first Bishop of North Queensland used to relate how in one mining camp he received in his hands a huge slice of luscious watermelon—a great delicacy in the bush.

Before ever the segment of the globular fruit had touched his lips the bishop was confronted by the same problem in an aggravated form, which the cherry tart presented to Mr. Tittlebat Tiltmouse. What was he to do with the many large black seeds? The official hostess saw his dilemma, and with a true instinct of politeness whispered in his ear, "Spit them on the floor, my Lord."

She Shoots Man After Six Years' Hunt.

Pittsburg, May 30.—"I'm here to kill you," announced a woman's voice as C. H. Spates, a railroad conductor, was walking home through a lonely field in a sparsely settled district at the east end, and two forms emerged from bushes in front of him.

Spates recognized a woman with whom he had been friendly in Wall, in this country, six years ago. "I've been hunting for you all this time," continued the woman, as she raised the revolver. "Let me at him first," exclaimed her companion, a large man, and the woman lowered the weapon as her companion sprang at Spates. Spates laughed when the woman said she was going to shoot him, and cried: "This is just the time to do the job," and threw off his coat to meet her companion who was bearing down upon him.

A desperate fight followed. Watching her chance the woman fired. The bullet pierced his right arm. He is in the Pittsburg Hospital. The man and woman fled as Spates fell, evidently supposing he was killed. They have not been captured. Spates says the woman is Lillian O'Brien and that she had been living in Columbus, Ohio. He did not recognize the man with her.

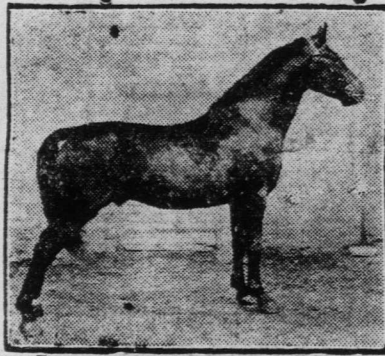

Madame Recamier

By H. L. BANN.



Madame Recamier was a celebrated French beauty specialist who flourished during the reign of Napoleon Bonaparte and died at the age of 75 years without having contracted a solitary wrinkle. In order that she might not run out of initials, her parents named her Jeanne Françoise Julie Adelaide Bernard, with the result that her visiting cards was like the pedigree of a 32nd degree Mason.

At the age of fifteen years, Mrs. Recamier was married to a French banker, in order to lift a mortgage from the family cook stove. After having attended to this, her husband disappears from the pages of history, leaving behind him a large thick income and very little else. He was subject to fits of melancholy, owing to being obliged to open a saloon in his house and seeing his wife surrounded by members of the French nobility in knee pants and white silk stockings. As he was not what you would call a literary bird, he would go up stairs and play solitaire while his wife ran the saloon. He had a sad life.

From all accounts, Madame Recamier put in most of her time at the photograph gallery, sitting for full length portraits in a kimono and a bewitching smile. She evidently had this smile copyrighted, for it appears in all of her pictures. It is said that between keeping up the saloon and paying for his wife's photographs, Mr. Recamier had a hard time making ends meet.

Madame Recamier is best known, perhaps, as the composer of a skin food and complexion renovator which she used with so much success that when she was sixty years of age she was proposed to by every stranger who visited her saloon. One time the Emperor Napoleon saw her complexion just after it had been re-varnished and invited her to become a member of his court, and on her refusal he banished her from the country and revoked the license of her saloon. She opened up again, however, after the administration changed hands, and for years did a flourishing business in belle lettres, original poetry and other intoxicating fluids.

That Electrical Storm at Quirpon

Appended is an extract from a letter received by Wharfinger Crocker at Bowring's premises from Quirpon, giving an account of an electrical storm which occurred there on May 7th:—

"We had a very severe electrical storm on the 7th. The like I never witnessed. It did considerable damage. The lightning entered Clarke's house and tore the boots off Mrs. Clarke's feet and burnt them considerably. It broke the settees on which herself and son were sitting and threw the beds out on the floor. It also broke a lot of crockeryware and killed a dog outright. It tore out one end of the Church of England building and broke all windows. The door was badly battered, and the seats thrown in a heap on one side. The carpet and drapery of the vestry was cut in shreds, but the building did not take fire. The shock destroyed Mrs. Taylor's store, but did no other damage. The ground shook as if an earthquake was in action. I never want to see any more lightning like it. I was on the roof of my store at the time but the lightning drove me off. The air was nothing but a quivering mass of electricity. You could hear a hissing sound before the thunder would break. It must have been very near the earth. The Clarke family had a very narrow escape, as the ground around their house and the church is torn up in ruts where the lightning struck. Although it was calm as could be, yet pieces of the church were hurled one hundred yards away."

The date referred to, May 7th, was the warmest day we have had this season.

The Daily News says this morning that merchants in Conception Bay find it difficult to get men to prosecute the fishery and that they offer high wages. In view of this would it not be well to ask Mr. Cashin to send along some of the "cullage" fishermen which he has on the Southern Shore. Lightning at Quirpon

Destroys Church and Causes Other Damages.

We have frequently heard of strange freaks of lightning, but news of one of the most peculiar reaches us from Quirpon. Notwithstanding the low temperature, about the middle of May a terrific electrical disturbance passed over Quirpon, causing considerable destruction. The east end of the Anglican Church was demolished, fragments of the building being scattered a distance of over three hundred yards. A woman, who was asleep on a couch at her home, had the slippers torn from her feet, and her feet badly burnt by the lightning. She was rendered unconscious for quite a while but has since fully recovered from the effects. In another house the legs were broken from underneath a bed on which a man and his wife were sleeping. The lightning passed through the building, doing considerable damage, but left the occupants unharmed. A dog was cut in twain, large ditches were cut in the earth right to the sea, and other damage wrought by the storm. It was an anxious time for the residents of Quirpon, and so vivid was the lightning that some of them feared the end of the world had come.—Western Star, June 4.

Down Goes the Cost of Living.

New Plan to Eliminate the Middleman—"Pepper and Salt Company" Starts in Washington.

Washington, May 28.—A sharp cut in the high cost of living through the elimination of the middleman and the direct delivery of farm products to the consumer is the aim of the "pepper and salt company" in which many prominent people are said to be interested, among them Gifford Pinchot, former Chief Forester, and P. V. De Graw, former assistant Postmaster-General. The "company" to-day applied to the commissioners of the district for space in the municipal markets in which to receive and disburse wares to its stockholders. The plan as announced is to cater to 10,000 families in the beginning, who will be sold vegetables and other farm products at a price slightly above cost. The customers will be supplied through three hundred of the best housekeepers in selected localities, who, in return for their services in this particular, will receive their food supplies free and in addition be paid a nominal salary each week. The "company" feels with the elimination of the middle man and the comparatively low cost of reaching the consumers it will be enabled to pay the producer better prices than he would otherwise secure. It is proposed to inaugurate the new plan the middle of June.

Atlantic and Pacific Exchange Fish. Dipping one hand into the Atlantic and the other into the Pacific Ocean to transfer food fish, the United States Government, it was announced to-day, proposes to undertake practical measures to cut down the high cost of living. Lobsters from the Atlantic will be shipped across the Continent to Pacific waters in the hope that they may multiply, while salmon will be taken from the waters of the Pacific and cultivated in the waters of the rock-bound coast of New England. The interchange will be under the direction of the Bureau of Fisheries. Several carloads of breeding fish will be shipped to Washington, Oregon and California points each season and placed in waters to be selected for their suitability. The bureau announced that the transplanting will not be dropped before the experiment is tried long enough to establish a flourishing colony or to demonstrate the futility of the scheme. These Pacific salmon are expected to replace the salmon native to New England, which practically have disappeared from the streams and waters of the East.

EPSOM, June 6.
The Oaks results were: 1st, Jest; 2nd, Depeche; 3rd, Aida.

LONDON, June 6.
Hevelock Wilson has decided to contest Wandsworth, vacated by Sir Henry Kimber, in the interests of the Independent Labor Party.

LONDON, June 6.
The Duchess of Connaught continues to make excellent progress, and may remove to Bagshot Park, in a week. She is now able to receive visitors.

STETTIN, June 6.
A battle between police and strikers, in which 70 were severely wounded, was fought last night in the suburbs of Franderf, as a sequel to the killing of a striker by a non-striker.

LONDON, June 6.
Mrs. Cornwallis-West's divorce suit against her husband will be proceeded with. West has entered an answer, but the trial date has not been fixed. Mrs. West is Lord Randolph Churchill's widow, and Winston Churchill's mother.

HONG KONG, June 6.
The French steamer Robert Lebeaudy, engaged in the West River trade, was attacked by pirates who secured \$80,000. A passenger on the steamer was killed, and the engineer with several of the crew were wounded in the fight with the robbers.

PARIS, June 6.
The Women's International Congress this afternoon, passed a resolution declaring that the suffrage should be given to women, but beginning gradually with the municipal vote, by the exercise of which they could prove their capacity to receive the wider franchise.

MILAN, June 6.
Cardinal Tuto, who is one of the famous triumvirate which promoted the Vatican campaign against Modernism, has gone raving mad. The doctors despair of his recovery. The Cardinal insinuates he has succeeded to the Papal Throne, and has given orders for the extermination of all Roman Catholic Liberal thinkers by the application of mediaeval penalties.

LONDON, June 6.
The suffragettes almost succeeded to-day in interrupting the deliberations of the Peace Conference by organizing a demonstration outside St. James' Palace to protest against the Government, supposing that it was able to secure peace abroad while unable to maintain peace at home. The crowd pulled the women from the wagons. Three of them were arrested.

TOKIO, June 6.
The Japanese land ownership legislation continues to be the paramount topic of conversation among all classes. Several meetings of protest have been arranged. The Minister of Agriculture and Commerce says that Japan is desirous of participating in the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco, but owing to the feeling over the California Land Question, the Government will wait, in order to determine public sentiment before completing its plans.

OTTAWA, June 6.
Premier Borden, in reply to Sir Wilfred Laurier, stated this afternoon that Canada would pay for the three new Dreadnoughts to be laid down by Winston Churchill, saying that before they were completed the Canadian Government would have a majority in the Senate. Legislation would be brought down to buy the ships and place them at the disposal of the Admiralty. A warm debate followed, in which Laurier challenged Borden to go to the country on the Naval question.

Nickel's Great Show.

The programme given at the Nickel Theatre yesterday was a good one comprising as it did historical and educational subjects as well as comedy. The Gaumont Graphic was full of interest. "When the Kings were the Law" is a story of the oldest times; "Views of Calcutta" gives one a good idea of life in that great city of the East; "Winning a Widow" is a bright Kalem comedy which pleased everybody. Miss Gardner was heard in "Somebody Else is Getting It," which was warmly applauded while Miss Gurin rendered a love song very prettily. The entire programme will be repeated this evening.

FIRST BASEBALL GAME.—The first League Baseball match for the season will probably come off next Wednesday afternoon, the half holiday, on Stancombe's Field, Freshwater Road. The competing teams will be the Wanderers and Red Lions.

At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Council Board was held yesterday afternoon. Defective drain in Shaw's Lane, complained of by J. S. Ayre, will be attended to. Harvey & Co. asked for water pipe from Forest Road to Factory Lane. Will be installed immediately. Complaint of a filthy gully on Barter's Hill, was received from J. Cochrane. Engineer will act. M. Quigley, Hoytestown, was given leave to repair house. Mr. Norman must submit plans before being able to start building dwelling. J. C. Oke, Forest Road, and J. Emberley, Wood Street, were given permission to repair house. J. Parsons asked to use garage lately owned by Mr. Drayton. Referred to Engineer. Some Council employees complained of being stopped payment for Empire Day. Councillors Ryan and Mullaly moved that the men be paid and for the King's Birthday as well. J. W. Morris, of the R. N. Co., wrote saying that owing to unforeseen circumstances, the sprinkling car was unable to go over the belt line at present and that in two weeks time the line will be in proper working order. Some criticism followed. R. Hopkins claimed \$1,758.60 amount due him since Water Street tunnel was constructed in 1888. Council does not entertain claim, as all records were burnt in fire of 1892. The Mayor reported that he had a conversation with the Inspector General of Police as to motor speeding. The latter suggested that motor vehicles should not be allowed to be used on Sunday from the C. E. Orphanage on Military Road to the White House on LeMarchant Road. The Mayor was not in favor of such a restriction. He thought that to lessen speed would be a better idea. The Solicitor reported that the Council had power to close any street from vehicular traffic, if necessary. Councillor Mullaly endorsed the suggestion of the Chief of Police. Councillor Ryan supported the observations of the Mayor. Councillor Conker spoke along similar lines. Councillor Mullaly moved that the use of private horses be from 8.30 to 9 a.m., and from 1.15 to 1.45 p.m. There was no seconder. The installation of lights on Boncloddy Street and Maat's Lane were recommended by the Lighting Committee. Councillor Mullaly presented a petition from residents of the North Battery, for a light. Some cross-firing then took place between Councillors Myrick and Mullaly, and the latter's motion was referred to the Board of Works. Solicitor Gibbs submitted proposed change of regulations for cab drivers. The meeting closed at 6 p.m.

Newfoundlander Visits Homeland.

After an absence of 25 years from the city and country, Capt. D. G. Butler, of the Butler Freighting Co. of Victoria, B.C., arrived here by the Bruce express yesterday. He is the guest of Mr. Ed. LeMessurier, Gower Street, and will later visit his native place, Port de Grave. Capt. Butler has made good since leaving here and is now part owner of the steamer Grainer, a new boat worth \$20,000, used for carrying grain on the Pacific. He was fur sealing as first officer of the lost s.s. Pioneer, and ran up and down the Yukon to Dawson for three years as chief officer and part owner of a steamboat during the Klondyke gold fever. Capt. Butler intends remaining here till after the Regatta and hopes to see all his old friends.

Plucky Act.

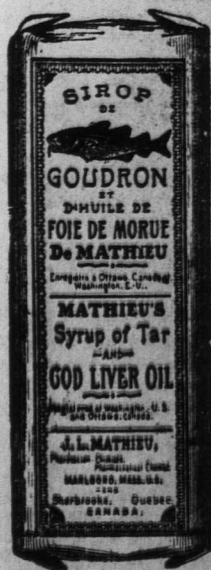
