

War on Hudson Bay.

WAS ONCE THE SCENE OF A NAVAL BATTLE.

During the Reign of William and Mary Canada's Inland Sea Was the Theatre of a Desperate Struggle for Supremacy Between the English and the French-Britain Lost Three Ships in Conflict.

The leader of the French force sent to Hudson Bay was Iberville,

after whom is named one of the counties of the Province of Quebec. In 1694 he compelled Port Nelson-Fort Nelson, it was then called—to surrender after a bombardment of three weeks. Two years later an English fleet recaptured the fort, at the same time securing a vast quantity of furs. Then both England and France prepared for conflict, that, it was expected, would finally settle the question of supremacy in Hndson Bay.

Each country sent out a fleet, that from England consisting of four of the company's ships—the Hampshire, the Hudson Bay, the only forty hours in advance of the ships of the French fleet being much impeded by the ice. The French ships really followed in the wake of the English.

Having entered the Bay, where here was more open water, Iberin slipping by the English ships unknown to them, and reached the mouth of the Nelson River, within sight of the fort. The garrison was greatly surprised, for it had been hoped that the English ships would fleet would prevent the French ships passing throught the Strait. 
