Prohibition in U. S. A.

ITS EFFECT ON SOCIETY.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—I have not yet seen in any report of the Wesley Church Literary Association's debate on Prohibition as to whether the members decided on the respective merits of the Swedish system and the present Prohibition law. They seem to have evaded the points at issue and decided on something not in the scope of the debate. They ask for a bone-dry law with provision for legitimate medicinal purposes. The omission of sacramental purposes is noteworthy.

What they ask for is the enforcement of a bone-dry law. Now there is no question that the bone-dry laws of the United States are far ahead of ours as regards the power to apply them. The administration of the law is another matter. Sometimes it is actually impossible to enforce a law in which every loophole is effectually closed up. The proprietors of the Cosmopolitan Magazine have instructed a Mr. William G. Shepherd to investigate Prohibition in the United States. The first of a series of articles by that gentleman appears in the December number of the Cosmopolitan. Judging from the article one would say that Mr. Shepherd has leanings towards prohibition, and he minimizes the evils as much as possible and looks forward to the eventual success of Prohibition. The facts stated in his article "Who's Drinking in America?" are startling, to say the least. Our own state of lawlessness is bad enough in all conscience, but we have not yet added murder to the crimes of theft, smuggling and moonshining. Mr. Shepherd asks "Why don't we have Prohibition in the United States?" It is noteworthy how the progress of Prohibition in the United States followed on the same lines as in Newfoundland.

the liquor and do the smuggling themselves. Lives have been lost in these struggles. Having made a thorough investigation, Mr. Shepherd has come to the conclusion that "unless there is shortly a change of sentiment in the United States, Prohibition is done for."

"The United States," he says, "is falling off the water wagon. I have seen this fact disclosed everywhere." In my next letter I shall let him tell the story of the "Gulp" Stream.

Increased Pensions.

CANADIAN SCALE WILL BE ENFORCED.

The Prime Minister yesterday informed a deputation from the G.W.V.A. Executive that the Canadian Scale of Pensions would be enforced here after January 1st, 1922. The Prime Minister was met at his office at noon yesterday by President Higgins and other members of the G.W.V.A. Executive who desired to discuss the claims of the returned men as regards the matter of pensions. Besides the Prime Minister the Hon. S. J. Foote, Dr. Barnes, G. Shea and W. W. Hallyard were present. Hon. Dr. Campbell, Hon. H. J. Brownrigg and Hon. W. F. Coaker being out of town, and the Minister of Justice on business in England. The conference lasted for one hour and a half. President Higgins placing the claims of the Veterans before the Government, and reading resolutions sent in from all parts of the country supporting the Association in their demands. After the discussion the Prime Minister gave the deputation a guarantee that the drop balance would be paid immediately. This balance was left over on June 30th last, and was transferred by the Auditor General to the special revenue. A special Minute of Council had now been passed, and

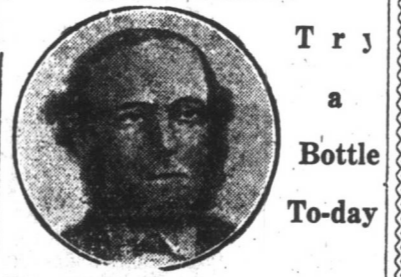

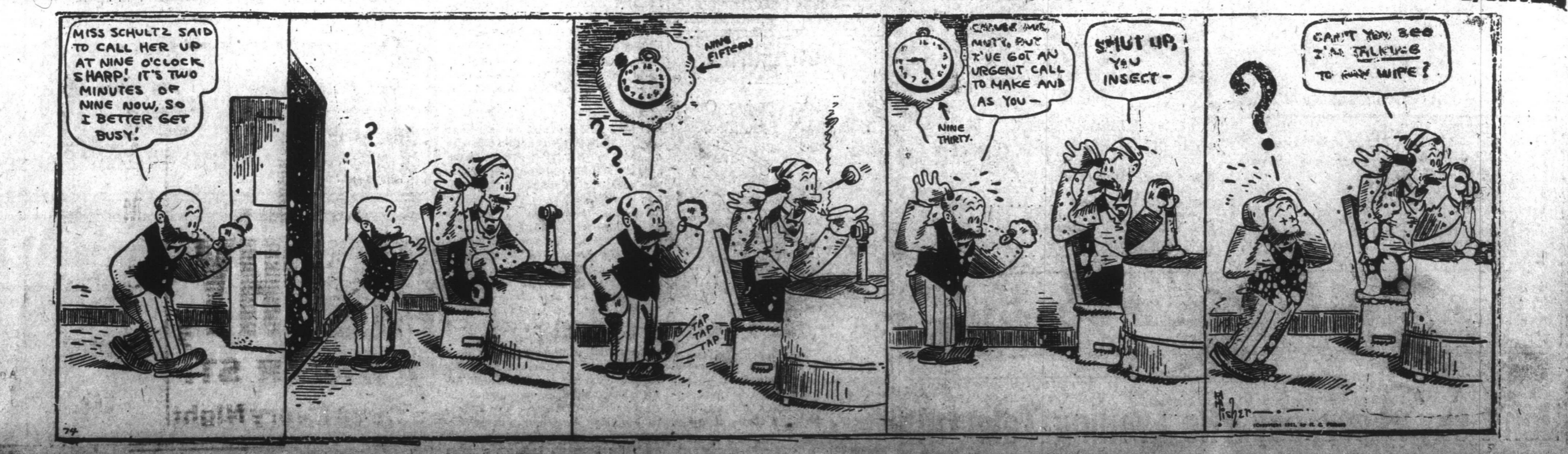
CANADA'S FINANCES.
OTTAWA, Nov. 11.
 The total debt of Canada on October 31st was \$2,329,268,902, a decrease of \$1,408,000 from the preceding month according to a statement issued by the Finance Department. The total revenue to October 31 this year was \$236,066,461, as compared with \$256,576,967 for the same period last year, the decrease being mainly due to a drop in customs revenue. The business profits tax totalled for the period \$11,135,000 as compared with \$26,889,000 last year, but the income tax amounted to \$64,236,500 compared with only \$7,297,000 last year.

CONFLICTING STATEMENTS.
LONDON, Nov. 11.
 The India office has issued a statement that 900 Moplahs have surrendered, but a Calcutta telegram says the rebels are perpetrating excesses near Poona, whither crowds of refugees are hurrying. Wholesale murders and burnings of houses are reported, and troops and police are being rushed to the scene of outrages.

PRIVY COUNCIL JUDGMENT.
LONDON, Nov. 11.
 The Privy Council to-day delivered a judgment holding the Board of Commerce and Combines and fair prices acts of Canada ultra vires. The Board of Commerce ceased to function some time ago and the effect of the Privy Council decision on the Board's rulings, while it existed, remains to be seen. The legality of Boards created was contested by Price Bros., Quebec, when it attempted to fix the price of newspaper in Canada.

Gov't Should Effect Immediate Repairs.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—In common with the rest of our eastern seaboard this district suffered greatly in the recent storm. Practically all the stages and public wharves and miles of roads along the waterfront have been destroyed. Just now it is impossible for the people of Doyle's Cove, James' Cove, Burke's Cove, The Dock, and from the North Side of Colliers to get to the main road and they are cut off completely from the outside world. As these people must get to the woods during the winter for firewood and fence materials and timber to replace the destroyed fishing stages, and it is imperative that the roads be restored before the frost comes, or they will freeze to death.

The nearest supplies to Gasters, which is completely cut off from here, as our people have nothing earned for the winter, and many Labrador fishermen are now home in the same condition, an opportunity is open to the Government to repair the damages and at the same time give much needed employment. Over three miles of road must be built in Colliers alone, while extensive repairs, piling or other protection will have to be done in Conception Harbor, Harbor Main, Gasters, Chapel's Cove, and Holyrood. I strongly urge the Government to have this work done without delay or the conditions of the people in the localities mentioned will be serious. Arrangements should be made to have timbers cut during the winter to replace the public wharves at Maryvale, Colliers, Conception Hr., Avondale, Harbor Main, Bacon Cove, Chapel's Cove and on the Shore. Taken in time any kind of what materials can be secured locally and avoid the purchase of sticks elsewhere, thus giving work to a destitute people.

More Storm News.

DESTRUCTION AT TICKLE COVE.

The full tale of the disastrous storm which began on October 28th, has not yet been told, and Tickle Cove is the latest place to report its ravages. The storm began there on Friday, October 28th, and the wind, blowing with hurricane force, threw up seas of such tremendous proportions, that within a short while the whole waterfront had been swept clean. Stages containing fish and salt, fishing gear, motor boats and shaves were torn from their foundation and swept away to the upper section of the settlement. The wharf, shop and store of Richard White were totally destroyed with all their contents, and the codfish factory, formerly owned by Avery and Kelly, was also washed away, together with a first-class "giant" steam engine and all the manufacturing material. Two stores which had been standing over 80 years, the codfish factory and fishing establishment of C. W. Jones, the fishing property of Archibald Skiffington, John Lane, and other trap owners, all went in the general destruction. The bridge spanning the harbour, some of the principal roads, and many gardens were swept away before the force of the seas. The people of the cove are suffering severely as a result of the havoc caused by the storm at a time when they were already in a bad way.

A gold boom which caused a number of cases of "gold fever" and a special meeting of the Nova Scotia Public Utility Board, called to hear an application for a special workman's rate on the Cape Breton Electric Railway, collapsed when the respective chief boomer and chief petitioner were adjudged insane by physicians and ordered committed to the Nova Scotia Hospital at Dartmouth. Angus J. Morrison claimed he had kept knowledge of a gold strike at Frenchvale, near North Sydney, secret since 1909, in order that the lease on the land then existing might expire and enable him to file his own claim. He stated that he had received a large offer from a New York syndicate. Veteran prospectors had declared that Frenchvale could produce nothing but imaginary gold. I. W. Gladwin, of Glace Bay, chief petitioner in the case was also adjudged insane.

Borrowed Motor Car.

MOTOR ACT REQUIRES AMENDMENT.

In the Magistrate's Court this morning Judge Morris declared that the Motor Car Act should be amended to give the police power to prosecute, and the Judge power to fine all who steal cars or borrow them without the owner's permission. This suggestion was inspired by a case which came up for hearing to-day when a youth was charged with driving without a license and he, with another, was charged with loose and disorderly conduct. Mr. Richard Volney stated that he left his car outside Cochrane Street Church on Sunday night and when he came out of church, it had gone. It was found later in a damaged condition and the "borrower" apologized and offered to make good the damage. Witness did not want to prosecute. Mr. Ayre for the defendants, admitted the charge of driving without a license but claimed that in taking and using the car without permission of the owner, the defendants were not disorderly. Inspector General Hutchings declared that it did not matter whether Volney wanted to prosecute or not. The police had been troubled a lot lately in connection with stolen cars and a stop had to be put to it. One of the accused had had four similar complaints lodged against him. His Honor in fining the first prisoner \$30 and dismissing the charge of loose and disorderly conduct, made the statement given above in connection with the Motor Car Act.

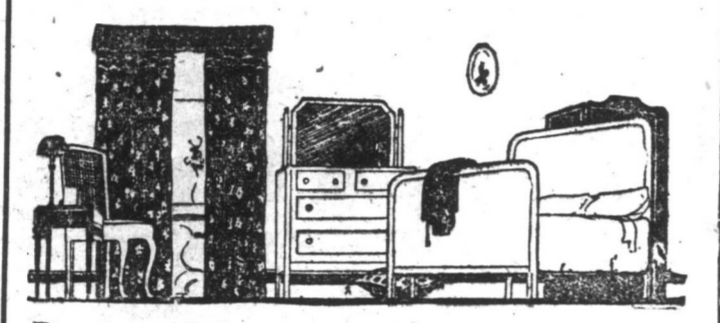

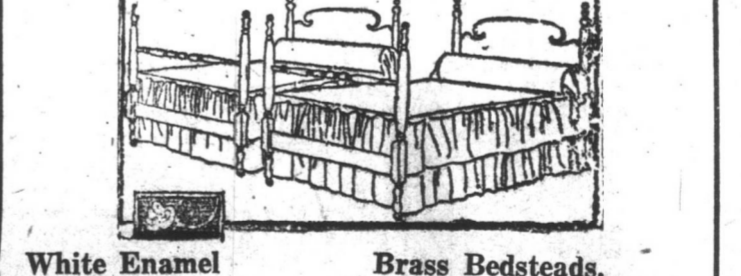

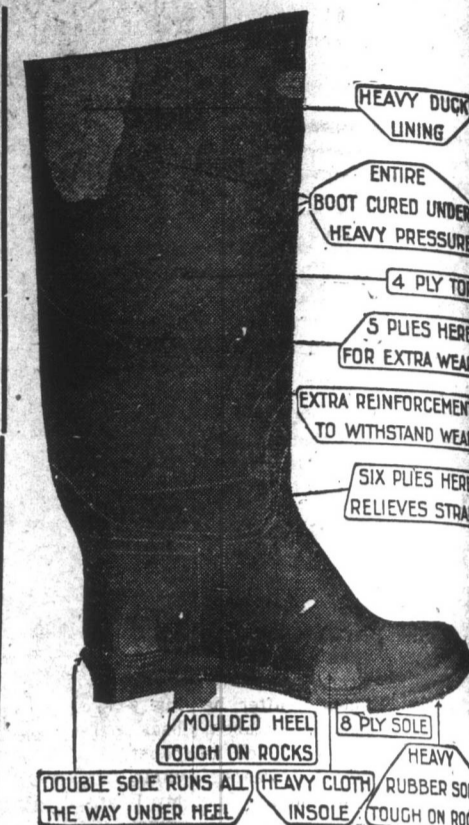

A Soldier's Protest.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir, I crave the use of your columns to add my protest to the many appearing lately against the apparent callousness displayed by the Executive Government in their treatment of returned men and their dependents.

When men were required to enable Newfoundland to add her quota to the Empire's forces, glowing pen pictures were painted by every scribe (and phrase) in the Colony, orators were let loose throughout the land, and propaganda of every conceivable nature was used by those in authority to get men, and still more men, that "Ye Ancient Colony" would not be behind the other parts of the Empire.

The greater portion of those who went did so with the firm conviction that in the event of their returning so incapacitated as to render them unfit to earn a livelihood, the State would not see them paupers. All those who were left behind acclaimed it a solemn duty to provide for the dependents of those who crossed the Great Divide. The spirit of the populace remains the same, but what a change in the custodians of the public funds. During the war the absence of approximately 10,000 men left the services of those remaining at home at a premium, with the result that the minimum wage paid to those "taking a man's place" was \$120.00 per month. The "buck private" (the man who placed Newfoundland on the map) received \$33.00 per month. The rations were hardly as good as those issued at home, and as he had to supplement his issue from his meagre funds to satisfy his fastidious taste, naturally he could not put aside anything for a rainy day.

Many men returned home so disabled as to render them unfit for any

work whatsoever. A grateful Government decided that \$40.00 per month would supply their needs.

After a few years baggling on the part of the G.W.V.A., this pittance was raised to \$50.00; meanwhile the neighboring dominion decided that the minimum sum necessary to keep body and soul together was \$900.00 per year, this was just previous to the general election of 1919. The Prime Minister, as the mouthpiece of the present Government, stated in his manifesto that in the event of his party being returned at the polls he would immediately take steps to have the Newfoundland scale of pensions raised to the Canadian in its entirety. How that pledge was kept, is well known to all "Vets." After a dozen meetings between the Executives of the G.W.V.A. and the Government, the latter was forced to pay a bounty of 10 pc. (\$55.00 per month, total disability) on the pensions of 1920. The Government stated that the amount necessary to pay this bonus would be \$128,000. The amount actually paid was \$15,000. The figures were evidently falsified to hoodwink the G.W.V.A. After much agitation of the Government the blame must be getting a Parliamentary Commission appointed to go into the whole pension scheme. This Committee reported as follows:

1.—Immediate payment of a bonus to all pensioners for the year 1920.
2.—A 20 pc. increase, January 1st, 1921 to June 30th, 1921.
3.—Adoption of Canadian Scale of pensions and allowances from July 1st, 1921.

This report was submitted to the House during the last Session. Through the camouflage of the Prime Minister (being the responsible head of the Government the blame must rest upon him) the Bill was amended to read (without the knowledge of most members) "That the drop balance of approximately \$15,000 of the

Board of Pensions Commissioner on 1920-1921 account be applied to bonuses and increases in pensions.

"2. That the present scale of pensions be applied to Newfoundland from the 1st day of January, 1922"; and did not go to the Upper Chamber (as all money bills should) thus dying a natural death instead of becoming law. The House closed and the Prime Minister proceeded to Washington. The G.W.V.A. learned that the Colonial Secretary and the Auditor General could not issue the necessary authority to make payment. Meanwhile hundreds of returned men are out of employment. Some are actually starving; others are barely existing and many widowed mothers and wives are in dire straits.

Veterans, are we going to stand for treatment of this kind from a Government most of whose members were ostriches during the war? Knowing you as I do, I can hear that spontaneous shout, "No!"

To the Executive of the G.W.V.A. I would say, "in the matter of Pensions and unemployment you have the backing of all the Vets in any plans that you may deem it necessary to take to bring this question to a head."

Yesterday, at 11 o'clock a silence of two minutes was observed in commemoration of our glorious dead. At noon the G.W.V.A. was in session with the Executive Government. The Prime Minister and colleagues oppressed the silence with the chosen representatives of those who came back. The Prime Minister, in I presume, a rapid thinker. Let him go back to all that has transpired since August 4th, 1914, and picture what these men have suffered to enable him to be the first citizen in a self-governing Dominion instead of an obscure individual in a dependency of the German empire, and let him pay the price by giving the necessary authority to have the Canadian Scale become effective January 1st, 1922, then, and only then, will we know he is sincere.

British Representatives

AT WASHINGTON CONFERENCE. (Associated Press Mail Service.)

David Lloyd George, Prime Minister of England, chief of the British delegates to the Washington Conference on the Limitation of Armaments, has been at the head of the British Government for more than five years. He is 58 years old and, in politics, a Liberal. When Lloyd George entered the House of Commons as a member from Carnarvon some 30 years ago, he was a country lawyer in Llanystradwy, in North Wales. He occupied an unpretentious niche as a legislator for 18 years until, in 1908, Premier Asquith made him a member of his cabinet. Up to the beginning of the war, Tories denounced him as "the evil genius of England," recalling his great budget "battle" of 1909 when he scotched his country into a huge munition factory, raised an army of 5,500,000 soldiers and 5,000,000 war workers, provided for the building of 4,000,000 tons of shipping, transformed big estates into subsistence farms and enforced conscription. During the war and since he has been a potent and active member of the Supreme War Council. The war over, Lloyd George was one of the "Big Four" at the Paris Peace Conference. In 1923-24, when the Irish demands for independence became formidable, the little Welshman was the spokesman for King George in the negotiations with the Sinn Féin leaders.

Mr. Robert L. Borden, former premier of Canada, one of the representatives of the League of Nations, is 67 years old. He was born in Nova Scotia, became a school teacher in New Jersey and was at the head of the Canadian Government from 1911 until 1920. Sir Robert was a colonial delegate to the Paris Peace Conference. He was strongly in favor of the League of Nations and, in an address in London, shortly after the armistice, said that "America and England together could maintain the peace of the world." George Foster Pearce, senator and member of the Australian Parliament, has been a union labor organizer, president of the Trade Union Congress and Minister of Defence for Australia. He signed the peace treaty with Austria. Sir John William Salmon was formerly Solicitor General of New Zealand and now is a judge of the Supreme Court of that Dominion. He is 59 years old and is reputed to have one of the most astute legal minds in the Antipodes. SRINAVASA SASTRI is a noted Hindu lawyer who appeared before the League of Nations Assembly at Geneva last September and presented the claims of India. He also represented his country before the Committee on Imperial Defense in London in October. South Africa will be represented by the "Big Four" of the British Empire: Naval, military and air advisers in the British delegation include the senior British naval expert Admiral Earl Beatty, Commander of the Grand Fleet; Lord Curzon, who was in command of British army operations in Italy the last year of the war; Colonel Thomas C. R. Hadden, the British air marshal, and Sir Maurice Hankey, Secretary of the Cabinet since 1919. Others in the official personnel will include naval and military attaches, consular and diplomatic officers, clerks and stenographers.

Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

WHICH WAS THE LAZIER!

Which of the two men whom I am about to describe to you do you call the lazier? We were sitting on the porch one day and the first of the two joined us. He is an old friend and private. The other man came in one evening when I was out. When I came back I found him sitting reading his paper on an extremely uncomfortable chair. If I do say it as should, my living room has an unusually

large proportion of comfortable chairs, so I said, "For goodness sake, what are you sitting in that chair for? It is the most uncomfortable chair in the room."

"Oh, well," he said, "it is the only chair that happened to be near the light so I sat down in it."

Now which of these two was the lazier man?

One Kind of Laziness Takes the Path of Least Resistance.

My answer is this. You might, if you chose to use the word that way, call them both lazy but the difference in the two kinds of laziness is the difference between black and white.

The second man's laziness was the laziness that keeps a man from ever getting anywhere, the laziness that accepts whatever is easiest to accept rather than get something better by a little effort.

The first man's laziness is the kind that will not accept discomfort or any other inconvenience if it is possible to avoid it by taking thought or taking pains.

The Other Kind of Laziness Makes the World Progress.

It is this kind of laziness which invents short cuts and better tools. It is this kind of laziness which makes the savage start to use the stone implement.

A few centuries later it expressed itself by substituting metal for stone. In short, it is this kind of laziness which stands behind all material progress.

I didn't tell the man who made himself comfortable that I thought all this because, like most men, he is contented enough already. I wonder if he will recognize himself.

The Evil-Eye.

According to the Talmudic legend, the Angel Gabriel had to wash the fire which he brought over from hell to the earth by rinsing it thrice in deep-sea ocean. That process not being an easy one, many souls come back to us which are but imperfectly cleansed, and have not been purified to the quick. There is the "evil-eye," mentioned in the Athar-Veda, and in Virgil, Horace, Tibullus, Theocritus, and many others—an eye where, under brows which meet, flares with a red flame a drop of the hellish fire that consumes and devours, while the heavenly fire illumines and brightens. That impure light is never so potent as when it shines from or upon an unwashed face. Eyes of witches and demons are red, says the folk-lore; the more hellish the spirit, the more inflamed are the orbits. This evil-eye casts a peculiar look, they say—a darting glance which stings unawares, a hungry leer which leaves a feeling of uneasiness. Nervous people thus looked at complain, or said to complain, of weariness and drowsiness, of headache and general lack of energy. They are reported to have been "vampirized." "The spark of hell" acts on men as a hot, scorching wind acts on leaves, which it scarcely moves, while it dries their substance and destroys their vitality.

NECROMANCY.

De Paiva narrates that at Mascate there are such secreters that they eat the inside of any body only by fixing their eyes upon him. In the country of Sennar and Fasokil they have rivals not less powerful, who, by a mere look of their evil-eye (Alin el hassid), stop the blood in the heart and the arteries of their enemy, delicate his entrails, unsettle his intellect. We learn from Grohmann that it is necessary to shut the eyes of those who are expiring, for if it were not done, the dead man would use his eyes to look at the living, especially at his friends and kindred, and would draw them after him. Wutke reports that any body who has not the power of the evil-eye can acquire it by searching in a cemetery until he finds some plank of a coffin which has a branch hole in it. That hole, through which the deceased was on the look-out, may be used as an eyeglass, and whoever is thus started at sickness or comes to misfortune; and disease may be brought on the people simply by glancing at them through a chink, or with eyes askew.

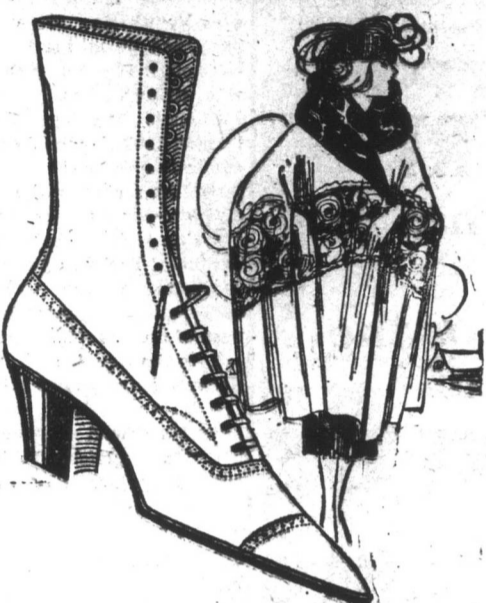
WOMAN MORE DANGEROUS.

Not all who have the evil-eye—the "it-it-e," say the Scotch—are sorcerers; but all wizards and accursed ghosts have the evil-eye. And as witches are not all ugly and old bags, so likewise all evil-eyes are not sore or blood-shot; some are beautiful, and may even belong to good and holy people, who exert their untoward power unconsciously. In Albania even fathers were not allowed to see their sons before the seventh day, for fear that, much against their will as it would be, they might throw an evil influence upon them. When people are eating, especially when delicate morsels are served, they may swallow poison unawares—poison conveyed by the hungry and greedy looks which are glaring at the viands. Hence the custom, still extant in so many countries, for well-to-do folk, and most of all for dignitaries, to eat alone. It is advisable not to eat in the presence of a woman, say the Zingalis, for the evil-eye, if cast by a woman, is far more dangerous than if cast by a man. The poor ignorant Sardinians have a saying amongst themselves, "Die vi guardi d'occhio di letterati!"—(May the Lord preserve you from being looked at by a man of letters!)—for the ailments which they inflict are much worse than those in-

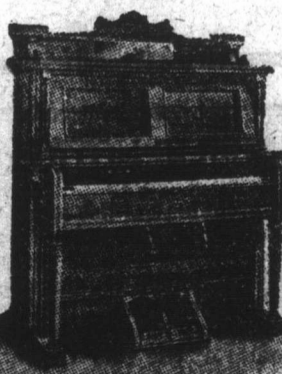

Physical Development.

And its Bearing on Health and Strength.

GYMNASTIC EXERCISES.

The Vaulting Bar--This bar, particularly valuable in promoting the development of the lower limbs, is a smooth, straight, round piece of ash, two and a quarter inches in diameter, except at the ends, where (unless age formed to rise up and down the grooves in the standards. The standards should be seven feet high, placed with holes three inches apart, fitted with iron pins for bar to rest on. This bar can be raised or lowered to suit the size and capacity of the pupil.

Parallel Bars--Everyone knows the simple construction of the parallel bars which give rise to a variety of movements, bringing into play chiefly the muscles of the trunk and arms. These movements may be divided into three series. The first consists of travelling along the bars with the hands backward and forward. The second comprises movements of oscillation between the bars. The third is made by combinations of the other two.

The Trapeze--This simple gymnastic apparatus affords an immense variety of healthful exercises, increasing the capacity of the trunk and upper limbs. Here are three favorite positions: First, grasp the bar firmly with the hands, at a distance apart sufficiently to let the body pass between them, the backs of the hands upwards, and the fingers and thumbs meeting, bend the legs forward, at the same time lowering the body until the arms are fully extended; second, lift the feet upward, the arms remaining straight, until the feet are as high as the bar; bend the arms and elevate the body until the waist is on a level with the bar; passing the lower limbs over bar, the body following; third, lower the body, completing the circle, and slowly descend until the feet reach the ground.

Here are three more simple but very effective exercises: (1) Commence with both hands on a single bar, arms straight. Now bring both arms in front of the body till they cross each other, and when you feel the fore-arms touching, press them firmly together in order that the pectoral muscles may be as firmly contracted as possible, return and when arms reach the sides expand the chest fully. Contract and repeat. Muscles exercised--Pectorals.

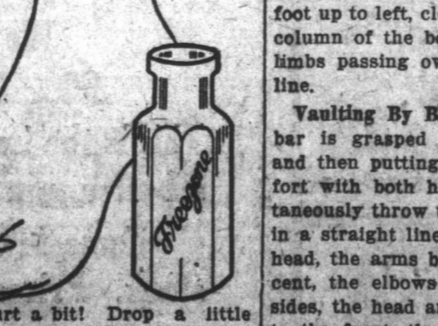
(2) Alternate movements, bring right arm across as left returns to side, twist head round to benefit neck, turning same in opposite direction to movement of arm as it crosses body each time.

(3) Hold hands behind back as high up as possible. Arms bent. Left hand holding right wrist. Now press down with the right hand and away, from the body, the left hand resisting, and the upper part of right arm resting against the side of the body, so that as much leverage as possible may be obtained. Return and repeat. Muscles exercised--Triceps. Repeat with left arm.
