"Breathes there a man, with soul so dead, Who never to himself hath said, "This is my own-my Native Land.""

It is not only in connection with the development of our latent mineral resources that enterprise and vision are required on our part, but also with regard to the natural attractions of the country. Sane game laws stringently enforced, systematic advertising in foreign journals, and an attitude of friendliness and hospitality towards tourists instead of an air of frigidity and suspicion would materially assist in turning to account the sportsman's paradise which we possess.

At present our Game Laws are regarded with the same amount of unconcern as is shown for the Prohibition Act. They are flagrantly violated, and because of the lack of means of enforcing them, have become a farce.

Economy, so it was said, necessitated the cutting down of the amount required for the proper surveillance of our inland waters and shooting grounds, and having thus placed the game at the mercy of the poacher, the economists (?) proceeded to play ducks and drakes with the savings thus effected.

The consequent result has proved even more disastrous. Where formerly great herds of caribou wandered over the barrens, to-day little remains but deep worn trails and bleached skeletons -mute testimony of the destruction wrought by the killer and the mischief effected by irresponsible law makers.
