SABBATH SCHOOL PIC-NIC.—The pic-
nic in connection with the Congrega-
tional Sabbath School of this town, took place

spot that fancy would picture as being

the little folks amused themselves by

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., Police Magistrate

FRIDAY, Aug. 7.—John Barrett, Thos.
Hoban and Robert Cumberland were this
morning charged with disorderly conduct
in Casey's Hotel on Wednesday evening
last. This is one of the cases to which
we referred yesterday, and there was but
little more brought out in the evidence
than the particulars we then gave. Bar-
rett was the only defendant who put in
an appearance, Hoban having gone to
Morrison's restaurant on Sandhill. Bar-
rett not having left the hotel when he
was told to do so, his Worship said was
a complete offence in itself, even if there
had been no choking of the landlord. The
latter was another misdemeanour for
which he might still be held answerable.
Fined \$10 and costs, which he paid. The
same penalty was pronounced against
the other two, and in default of payment
they are to be imprisoned for 30 days.

Patrick Carroll and Michael Conway
were charged with disorderly conduct.—
To this case we also alluded yesterday.
It was the fight which took place in the
yard at the back of the Dominion Saloon.
From the evidence, Carroll appears to
have been very forbearing for a consider-
able time, as he allowed Conway to slap
him once or twice on the face before he
took him down, and asked if he would be
quiet if let up again. Conway said very
emphatically that he would not, and mak-
ing more pugnacious demonstrations,
Carroll gave him a pretty positive pun-
ishment. Indeed the patience of the latter
was quite displeasing to some of the by-
standers, who threatened to "lick" him
if he didn't pitch into Conway. As we
stated yesterday, Mr. Brown attempted to
make peace and procure a constable, but
failed to do either. His Worship said
that he considered Conway the aggressor
but that Carroll had gone further than
was necessary for purposes of self-defence.
He therefore fined the latter \$5 and costs.
The foregoing case was entirely against
him, as the summons on Conway had not
been properly served, and he did not ap-
pear.

Monday next will be a general holiday

John Coulter, a son of Mr. Samuel
Coulter, 7th son of Wellington, had his
arm broken on the 23rd ult.

A huge fire is raging in the township
of Luther. The soil is burned in some
places to the depth of four feet.

Notman, the abolitionist, is making
great efforts for a release. A writ of error
is being argued to-day. The case will be
carried to the Privy Council, England.

An engine on the Northern Rail-
way exploded at Barrie on Wednesday
last, tearing away the freight house and
sending portions of the works two hun-
dred yards into the streets.

It is confidently stated that arrange-
ments have been made for the departure
from England on the 1st of September of
another band of cricketers, who propose
playing several matches in Canada, at
New York and Philadelphia during the
present summer. The promoters have
selected six north and six south men to
form the team, but the names are not at
present known.

SALTING WHEAT.—A correspondent in
the Colonial Farmer recommends the ad-
dition of salt to wheat as soon as it is
threshed, adding half a pound of salt to
a bushel of wheat and mixing them in
the bins. He says that wheat so treated
is better preserved than by the ordinary
method; that it does not lose so much in
weight or volume, that it makes more
and better flour; and that when used for
seed it is not liable to be attacked by
weevil (ry. bridge?). The correspondent
referred to has tested the plan, he tells
us, for eighteen years with unvarying
results.

GLADSTONE SHOT!—The Northern
Whig states that on the 20th July, the
Orangemen of Coalisland, Killyman,
Roughan, and Newmills assembled near
the last named place for the purpose of
burning Mr. Gladstone in effigy. The
effigy of the right hon. gentleman was
first placed on a low wall by these en-
lightened politicians and shot at, after
which it was consigned to the flames
amidst general groaning.

HEAD CENTRE STEPHENS.—James Steph-
ens, Head Centre, Chief Organizer, Chief
Executive, and Chief Architect of the
great Fenian organization has arrived
and is staying in a private boarding house
in this city. About six weeks since he
left Paris, and passing southward, em-
barked in a small vessel from Oporto, and
landing in England crossed over the St.
George's Channel, and made a personal
inspection of the Fenian organization.
Thence he arrived here two days ago,
preserving, as well as on the other side, a
perfect incognito. He sees only those he
especially invites. His health is feeble
and he speaks little respecting Fenian
matters. He looked forward with con-
fidence to a grand organization in this
country that will absorb both the O'Neil
and Savage wings. He threatens to an-
nihilate by exposure of facts some of
those who made too free with his char-
acter in his absence.—N. Y. Star.

THE DEATH OF "MILES O'REILLY."—
A dispatch from New York announces
the death of Col. Charles G. Halpine, bet-
ter known to newspaper readers and to
the literary craft as "Miles O'Reilly,"
the name under which most of his poetical
and other contributions to periodical litera-
ture were published. Col. Halpine was
Register of New York at the time of his
death—an office worth from thirty-five to
forty thousand dollars a year, and for
which he was mainly indebted to Fenian
influence in that city. Col. Halpine could
scarcely have been himself a Fenian at
heart. He belonged to a Dublin family
strongly identified with Orangism. He
was a man of liberal education, genial,
kind hearted and witty. His death, we
are sure, will be greatly regretted by his
professional brethren. Col. Halpine's
brother, the Rev. Mr. Halpine, is well
known in the London district, and other
parts of Ontario, as an accomplished clas-
sical teacher.

Canada Rifle Association.

The Council of the Dominion Rifle
Association met in Montreal on Thurs-
day. There was a large attendance of
officers present.

After receiving the report of the Mon-
treal Committee, a large amount of busi-
ness connected with the forthcoming
meeting was taken up and disposed of.
It has been decided that the great Canadian
Wimbledon Commemorative, commencing the
15th of September next. The following
local executive committee was appointed
with power to add to their number to
carry out all the necessary arrange-
ments, viz:—Lieutenant-Colonel Os-
borne Smith, A. A. G. Militia; Lieu-
tenant-Colonel Grant, Royals; T. Mor-
land, Esq., and Lieut.-Colonel Macpherson,
D. A. A. G. Militia. A camp will
be formed at Laprairie during the period
occupied in the competition for the
various prizes. The whole of the ar-
rangements are to be carried out on the
same plan as adopted at the Wimbledon
meeting in England, and will be most
complete in their character, thus afford-
ing volunteers from a distance the oppor-
tunity to avail themselves of accommoda-
tion in camp or barracks, and being sup-
plied with rations at moderate rates. The
rules and regulations adopted by the
Council will be published in the course
of a few days and forwarded to the
various parts of the Province, together with
the list of prizes.

Governor Seymour's Letter.

The letter of Mr. Seymour, accepting
the Democratic nomination for the Presi-
dency, is published. He says he has de-
layed the letter to see what light the
action of Congress would throw upon the
interests of the country. Its act
since the adjournment of the Conven-
tion show an alarm on their part at the
prospect of a change of political power,
thus bringing to light what has been
done with the money drawn from the
people. He criticises at some length the
admission of representatives from the
Southern States to Congress, characteris-
ing it as a new element of discord and
violence, when the country needs peace.
While the chiefs of the late rebellion
submitted to the results of the late war,
others thrown by the agitations of civil
convulsions into positions of honor and
profit, are striving to keep alive the pas-
sions to which they owe their elevation.
Events in Congress since the Convention
show that the Republican party cannot
carry out a wise and peaceful policy;
they had much power and their action
have been so unchecked by any opposi-
tion that they have run into excesses
which have been a source of regret to
many of their own party. The election
of the Democratic ticket would not have
the effect of producing sudden or vio-
lent changes, but would serve as a check
to those extreme measures deplored by
the best men of both parties.

The Irish Land Question.

When Mr. Bright repeats his scheme
for regenerating both the race and the
island by the artificial production of peas-
ant proprietors, he is attempting what
is impossible, what has no ground in
justice, or in the sentiment of equality,
or in the public interest, and what can
lead only to ruin and disappointment.
It is due to Mr. Bright himself that he
should not sully a great career and dis-
credit the principles of Liberal legisla-
tion by following an illusion that can
lead to nothing but harm. No doubt a
peasant proprietorship, or a large class
of "statesmen," as they exist still in
some parts of England, would be better,
politically and socially, than a reign of
absentee land owners and the rest of the
existing arrangement of land tenure.
But the peasant proprietor or small land
owners must be of spontaneous growth
and must arise out of encouraging cir-
cumstances. When these classes appear,
they will either keep them sound, or
develop them into something better. But
where they do not exist, and are planted
by force of law, no law will ever be able
to sustain them against the power of nature.
Mr. Bright flickers the bright expecta-
tion before his hearers at Limerick; but,
so far as we know, scarcely hints at the
inevitable, and we fear, unquerable
difficulties. It would be impossible to
obtain proprietors of this sort without
great cost to the British public, great risk
of further cost, and great interference
with the existing arrangements and trans-
actions of property. It would be impos-
sible to prevent absolute sales, vicious
lettings and submortalities, perhaps a
return to the old state of things, perhaps
even worse. Mr. Bright may be ready
to justify, on special grounds, the de-
parture from the laws of Free Trade, for
such it would certainly be. He would
not be able, on any grounds whatever, to
justify the inequality of a boon which if it
is worth anything, hundreds of thousands
of English and Scotch laborers would
equally desire and have an equal right to.
—Times.

ARMING EXPRESS CARS.

The exercise of the principle of lynch law in sections
of the United States has had the effect
of driving a number of suspicious characters
to this country. A number of well known
parties have lately made their appearance
in this city, but we are glad to say that
their actions are being closely watched
and that efficacious steps are being taken
to prevent any depredations being com-
mitted. The banks have assumed a state
of vigilance, and we understand that the
Canadian Express Companies now send
an armed guard with each car to protect
money and valuables while in their
charge. An unsuccessful attempt was
made a few days ago to rob the express
office at Sherbrooke is no doubt traceable
to these individuals, and the late robbery
at Morse & Co's, brokers, in this city, was
probably the work of similar characters.
—Globe.

Great Fire Raging at Collingwood

TORONTO, Aug. 7th.—Daily Telegraph
special says a terrific fire is now raging
at Collingwood. The woods at the back
of the town for a mile are one mass of red
flame. Danger to the town very great,
and it is feared that some portion of it
will be destroyed. The inhabitants with
fire engines are out, but are of no avail.
The fire was raging furiously at 1 o'clock.

Jeff Davis in Liverpool—Queen Victoria in Cherbourg—and a Domestic Fracas brewing in Spain.

(BY ATLANTIC CABLE.)
Liverpool, Aug. 6.—Jeff Davis arrived
here by the steamer last night. Paris
despatches from various parts of Spain
represent that the whole country is in a
state of disquiet; the utmost efforts of the
government are required to prevent an
outbreak.
Paris, Aug. 6.—Queen Victoria landed
at Cherbourg yesterday, and reached this
city last evening. She was received by
the Empress Eugenie and proceeded to the
Tuilleries. The Queen will leave to-
night for Switzerland.
Madrid, Aug. 6.—The Spanish govern-
ment has declined to assume the Protec-
torate of St. Domingo, which was proffered
by one of the political parties in that
Republic.

American Despatches.

Atlantic, Ga., Aug. 6.—In the election
of State Officers to-day by the Legislature
the entire Republican ticket was chosen.
Louisville, Ky., Aug. 7.—Returns from
the interior counties come in slowly; the
indications are now that Gov. Stevenson's
majority will reach fully 80,000.
New York, Aug. 7.—Herald's City of
Mexico special of 31st ult. says Horatio
Dominiquez had pronounced against the
Government in the State of Vera Cruz,
and had seized some villages along the
railroad. Hostilities were going on in the
State of Puebla, but in Queretaro the in-
surgents had been compelled to submit.
The vomito was severe in Vera Cruz.
New York, Aug. 7.—There were four
cases of cholera in this city yesterday.—
The Sun's special says that requests for
troops, similar to that made by Governor
Warmouth of Louisiana, will shortly be
made, it is said, by the Governors of sev-
eral other Southern States. No action
will be taken in the premises until the
whole matter can be laid before a full
Cabinet meeting. Paris from South

THE CANADA LIFE ASSURANCE COMPANY.

The Hamilton Times says: The
Canada Life Assurance Company held its
annual meeting in this city yesterday,
when the Directors submitted their yearly
report. The document submitted shows
the affairs of the institution to be in a
most flourishing condition. 447 Assur-
ance Policies were issued during the
year, amounting to \$567,894, giving an
additional annual premium of \$18,883.63.
The number of assurances declined was
sixty-two, amounting to \$82,900. No action
was taken in the premises until the
whole matter can be laid before a full
Cabinet meeting. Paris from South

NOVA SCOTIA AS A SUMMER RESORT.

—A lesson is to be learned by strangers
as well as Nova Scotians from the ac-
counts of the intense heat which come to
us from all parts of the continent. In
Canada and the United States the ther-
mometer has ranged from 98 to 107 in
the shade. Hundreds of deaths have
occurred from sunstroke—man and beast
are alike prostrated—all labor has become
a burden—factories and other works
have suspended, because work cannot be
carried on with safety or comfort to the
workmen. This is no overdrawn picture
but a true statement of facts. And all
the while we Nova Scotians have had
splendid weather. It is true we have had
a few warm days, but compared with
those of our neighbors, they are cool and
comfortable. Our warm days, too, are
always followed by delightfully cool and
pleasant evenings. We have not heard

THE NOVA SCOTIA DIFFICULTY.

The visit of our Cabinet Ministers to Halifax does not appear to have been productive of much good, and so far nothing in the way of reconciliation has been effected. A government paper says: "We have nothing to offer Canada but scorn and detestation. We will not be Confederated. We will have Repeal." A convention of the Antis is now in session, as well as the Local Government. It is evident from the protracted sittings of the Convention that the questions under discussion are very grave, and many Unionists are confident that some members of the caucus would accept the situation if they dared. The tone of the Antis, especially of local members from rural districts, continues very violent, and the wildest measures are freely threatened.

After the adjournment of the Convention the repeal committee organized by choosing Hon. Joseph Howe chairman, and resumed business in the new province building, over which the Nova Scotia flag floated in honor of the occasion. It is believed in Ministerial circles that if only the Dominion members were to be dealt with conciliation could be had; but no one has much hope of conciliating the local members.

Mr. Howe's Letter.

From the Toronto Daily Telegraph we clip the full text of Mr. Howe's letter which has made so much talk in Nova Scotia and throughout the Dominion. Whatever we may think of Joe's recent course in regard to the Union, all must admit that there is about his last letter a manly ring which does the great Nova Scotian infinite credit.

FAIRFIELD, NEAR HALIFAX,
30th July, 1868.

To the Editor of the Morning Chronicle, Halifax.

SIR,—The papers inform us that Sir John A. Macdonald and his lady and perhaps Mr. Cartier are coming down to N. Scotia on a visit, and the editor of an evening paper speaks for them, should they come, discourteous treatment, if not rougher handling. I regret to see this spirit manifested in any quarter. Where actual war rages, flags of truce are respected, and the soldiers in the field exchange courtesies across their lines, which lend the grace of civility to the sternest conflicts. Roderick Dhu shared his plaid and his heather couch with Fitz-James, though ready and anxious to cross swords with him in the morning. We have taught the public men of Canada and England within the last two years that the people of Nova Scotia are men, and not cravens. Let us show them now that we are gentlemen and not ruffians. One rude word, one act of discourtesy, would disgrace us all, and bring such discredit on our cause as to make it hopeless hereafter. Nineteen Nova Scotians traversed the Canadas last fall, and sojourned for forty days in the capital of the Dominion. Though the great majority of them were known to be hostile to the fundamental law under which the Legislature was convened, and not very friendly to the Government, though I and others denounced the act and the policy of the majority, on all suitable occasions, yet from the time we entered Canada till we came out of it, we received from all classes of the people hospitality and courteous treatment. I passed through the crowded corridors of the House of Commons with my hot words ringing in the ears of the people I met, but they never offered me insult, and at three o'clock in the morning I often went to my lodgings alone, as little apprehensive of obstruction or offence as I would have been in the streets of Halifax. Let us hear no more, then, of different treatment of Canadians, high or low, in any part of the province. If we have lost our constitution let us preserve our manners. The Secretary of State and the Imperial Parliament have thrown upon the Canadas the responsibility of action in the great controversy which, at the present moment, perplexes us all. It would appear that its leaders have promptly responded, and will come here to discuss with the Nova Scotians such remedial measures as they may have to propose. We are bound to give them a fair hearing and courteous treatment. Is our case so bad that we are afraid to discuss it on our own soil with the leading men of Canada? Are we so strong that we can afford to outrage the public sentiment of the whole world by reckless disregard of all the usages of civilized diplomacy? I think not, and hasten to say that I should deeply regret if any indiscretion were to sulky a course which has hitherto been conducted with dignity and temper, which has challenged the respect even of those to whom we have stood opposed. I am quite sure that on reflection the writer to whose article I refer, and whose views it is possible I may have misapprehended, will concur in the opinions which I consider it a public duty thus frankly to express. AUSTRIA AND ROME.—The breach between these two powers, formerly so intimate and friendly, seems to be growing more serious every day. Last letters from Vienna, published in the French papers, state that the question of the sale of the property of clergy forms the subject of meetings of the Austrian cabinet. M. Beust has proposed the measure to the emperor as one of urgent necessity under present circumstances. It is expected that that proposition will bring out from the court of Rome new and solemn remonstrances. The Bishops continue to publish orders commanding the clergy to have in the registry of births a separate column for the inscription of children of parents married under the civil law; and who, therefore, will form a class distinct from legitimate children, without yet being designated openly as illegitimate. The Austrian government, in order to put an end to such a degrading distinction, has withdrawn from the Catholic clergy the keeping of the registers of births throughout the empire.

Convention at Portland.

The International Commercial Convention assembled at Portland on Tuesday last. Over two hundred delegates, chiefly from the New England States, were in attendance. Canada was but meagrely represented. The chief topic discussed after the opening of the convention was all communication with the West. A special despatch to the Daily Telegraph says many speeches and arguments were made in favor of a new line connecting Portland with the far west—by the shortest possible route. The feeling appeared to be that a new line should be made to the Suspension Bridge, entirely through the United States. Such a route would prove very injurious to the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Railway and to the Grand Trunk. The feeling of the meeting towards Canada was highly pleasing and satisfactory. Kind and encouraging sentiments were expressed as to mutual good will, and a general reciprocity in trade, which is intended to include manufactures. There is a very general and strong reference made to the subject of annexation. Mr. Derby, of Boston, said, "Canada has got to take us or we them before many years." The following are the officers of the convention: Mr. Medrill, Gov. of Iowa, President; Messrs. E. H. Derby, Boston, Stephen Tobin, Mayor of Halifax, W. Workman, Mayor of Montreal, A. D. Macdonald, Charlottetown, Hon. A. Fisher, Fredericton, Thomas Gibbs, Oshawa, J. W. Taylor, St. Pauls (Minn.), H. J. Blow, St. Louis, and J. H. Arnold, Chicago, Vice Presidents. The representatives from the British Provinces held caucus and agreed not to vote upon the resolutions, as they chiefly referred to projects foreign to their Dominion, upon which they considered it unjust to vote.

ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY MILLION THROWN AWAY.—The famous French musket, Chassepot, is found to be defective when compared with the newly invented Wilson rifle. It is said that the French Government has decided to give up the first weapon and to replace it with the latter, a change which will involve an expenditure of 180 millions of francs. We think if the one-hundredth part of these sums, yearly squandered under the pretext of eternally preparing for peace, were spent upon public schools and the improvement of agriculture, the people of France would sooner acquire the rank she is ambitious of occupying in Europe.

A FRENCH REVOLUTIONARY MANIFESTO.—The Paris Pays publishes a paper purporting to be the production of the "Central Committee of Action of the Revolutionary Commune of Paris," addressed to their "citizen brothers" in words of strong condemnation of Napoleon's rule, political, financial and military, and ending with the cry, "Down with the Emperor!" The document has been extensively circulated in London. By mail we have Paris journals which deny its authenticity in the most positive terms, and pronounce it a sheer fabrication. The facts, to real or fabricated, has, however, been made known very widely, and its issue reads to us as if somewhat in the spirit of the rioter who cried to the crowd, "Don't nail man's ears to the pump," being well assured that they would resort to that means of torture as soon as it was made known to them. It is dangerous to play with French revolution, particularly in the "dog days."

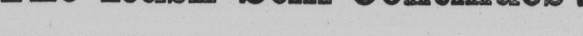

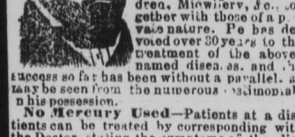

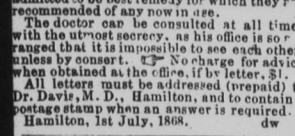
