HOW THE BRITISH COLUMBIA GOVERNMENT SECURED INDIAN RESERVE LANDS; TRANSACTION DISCUSSED IN THE COMMONS

Frank Oliver Calls Attention of House to Alleged Sale of the Kitalano Indian Reserve, Worth \$7,000,000 for \$250,000.

Member from Edmonton Says B. C. Attorney General Told the Indians They Could Take the Money or Leave It and Hurried the Deal Through

Oliver Contends That the Transaction Partakes of the Nature of a Real Estate Deal and Insists That the Indians Be Protected.

Vancouver, Ont., April 24.—[Edmonton special]—A transaction which Premier Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the death of Sir Richard Scott at the opening of the house this afternoon. Premier Borden said that the deal for the Kitalano Indian Reserve had been made at the public life of Canada a most distinguished figure. For nearly half a century he had unflinchingly played a distinguished part in the life of the country and all who knew him intimately received inspiration from the mental vigor which characterized even his extreme old age.

Oliver inquired if Mr. Borden was acting for the Indian department or was he acting on his own initiative with the authority of the government of British Columbia. It was quite evident that the British Columbia government was not alone in the market for the lands. Mr. Oliver said that the responsibility lay with the Dominion government and to them they must look for the protection of the Indians. If there was to be a change in principle guiding the government, it was right and proper the country should be made aware of it. The provincial government paid full value for the land the government was not doing its duty if it did not care in providing for them for the future.

Mr. Oliver said there had been a very simple case in Victoria where there was a reserve within the limits of the city. The Indians are given parties of the money and the land is partly responsible and the plan of paying them cash had not proved satisfactory. Mr. Oliver said the government was not keeping faith with the Indians or the Dominion government.

LOCAL ARCHITECTS FALL DOWN ON CITY'S PLAN

Only Two Out of Seven Firms Display Working Knowledge of Practical Requirements in New Industrial Building. **Are Calgary architects unpractical?** Out of eight plans submitted to the city by local architects for an industrial building for the housing of small industries likely to locate here this year, only two plans were of any workable character. The other six, which were of the type of building which is a spur line, the plans had been drawn to cover all the land available in an industrial area without any provision for adequate lighting or for the transportation of either raw materials or finished products. The location of elevators in one of two plans was such as to be impracticable in operation, and to cause serious interference with the work of several establishments. Although the dimensions of the building were specified at 100 x 100, there was a difference of 25,000 feet of rentable area between the various plans. The average space for rental was about 47,500 square feet, but one of the plans finally selected by the railways and new industries committee exceeded this by 10,400 square feet.

RIVERSIDE LUMBER COMPANY MAY LOSE SITE IN MANCHESTER

City Threatens to Cancel All Agreements When Work on Factory Buildings Has Not Started Within 30 Days. Unless manufacturers who have been granted sites in Manchester and other city industrial tracts commence the erection of buildings within 30 days after securing the property, the city will cancel the grant. The fact that the city is so short of industrial sites and is endeavoring to secure more for this purpose, makes the suggestion all the more urgent in the opinion of the aldermen that firms should hold sites out of use to the disadvantage of new industries.

CALGARIANS ASTOUNDING AT LOCAL MANUFACTURERS' SCOPE; SHOW A PRONOUNCED SUCCESS

Made-in-Calgary Exhibition, Which Opened in The Horse Show Amphitheatre Yesterday Afternoon, Attracts Great Crowd of Visitors; Three Thousand Attend Evening Exhibit; All Are Surprised at Variety of Calgary-made Products Shown.

Calgary yesterday awoke to find what a large number of things were made right in Calgary itself. The "Made-in-Calgary" exhibition opened in the horse show amphitheatre yesterday afternoon by Mayor Sinnott was nothing less than a revelation of the untapped resources of the city. No one had an idea that so many things were made in Calgary, and the first realization of the fact was accompanied with a sense of surprise, but also with a feeling of pride.

The exhibition is promoted by the Women's Alliance of the Unitarian church, and most of the manufacturers of the city have been invited to exhibit their products. The exhibits which are taken from the exhibition will be devoted to the fund for the erection of the Unitarian church and for various charities in the city.

Calgary also did well to patronize the first venture of the kind in the West. Fully three thousand were present last evening, and all the booths were looked on with interest, and much that was not known before, both as to the possibilities of Calgary and to the various processes of manufacture.

Business was done in the stalls briskly all day long. Various attractions were provided during the afternoon and in the evening. Restaurant booths in which the ladies of the alliance worked faithfully did a big business, while other places of entertainment were well patronized and the band of the 101st regiment and the Citizens' band played music to the accompaniment of an enjoyable program.

Like a Dream Come True. Mayor Sinnott, in opening the exhibition yesterday, expressed the same opinion to him and to the ladies of the exhibition was simply like a dream come true. He had been out of town lately and had had the pleasure of inspecting the exhibition from other parts to come to Calgary. There appeared to be a distinguished list of doers and for that reason those who had come here long ago and had done a big business along the line of manufacture, displayed all the credit and all the support that the people of the city could give.

Court Record Shows No Abatement of Number of Chattel Mortgages Given Implement Companies By Farmers

Despite the statement freely circulated during the recent political campaign that the re-election of the Sifton government would mean that implement and machinery houses throughout the province would not continue in business in Alberta, the Calgary court records of the last few days fail to show any abatement in the number of chattel mortgages given by farmers to the implement companies. This in itself is an indication that far from going out of business the companies are already getting into the work of selling machinery for spring and summer.

During the past few days over 50 chattel mortgages were registered in Calgary. In all of these cases the mortgagors were farmers from every section of the province, while the mortgages were from various implement houses. It is estimated that in the other judicial districts the business will be as large, and in some cases even larger than that in the Calgary court house.

An interesting point in regard to the above is "How many of the farmers against whom mortgages are registered really know that they have given mortgages?" During the election campaign several instances were discovered where the implement companies, under the guise of getting a credit statement from the farmers, had in reality obtained chattel mortgages from them and had registered them without the knowledge of the farmers. In one instance three farmers at Duagh, Alberta, had purchased \$1,178.30 worth of machinery from an implement house, giving lien notes, bearing interest and covering the machinery, for this amount.

A few days later the agent of the company asked the men for a signed "statement of their effects," producing a form for this purpose. This form was filled in by the agent and signed by the farmers, but as the list of their effects was too long to go on one form, another was secured, on which the list was continued. The farmers signed both forms, with the result that some months later they found out that there were two mortgages registered against them, each for \$1,178.30, or \$2,356.60 in all, although they had only received \$1,178.30 worth of machinery, and had given lien notes covering this. The manner in which they found out they were mortgaged was also somewhat dramatic. The appearance of the sheriff on their land and his seizure of their stock to satisfy the claim of another man to whom they owed \$600 and who had become frightened when he saw that they were mortgaged to the machinery company was their first intimation that anything appeared on the records against them, and it was not until they came into Edmonton and searched the records for themselves that they found out what kind of a document had been signed by them.

A lawyer to whom they took their cases stated that this was only one of many instances which had been brought to his attention, and was authority for the statement that hundreds of farmers throughout Alberta were in a similar plight, and were not only mortgaged, but were leaving themselves liable to terms of imprisonment by selling off stock on which there were mortgages, although in reality they did not know that mortgages were registered against them.

It was to offset this that the "Farm Machinery Act" was passed by the government last session, resulting in bitter opposition from the majority of the implement and machinery agents and threats to withdraw from the province.

A careful study of the court records since the elections, however, does not indicate that they have carried their threats into execution, and the list of mortgages given by farmers to machine companies is still as large as ever, it was.

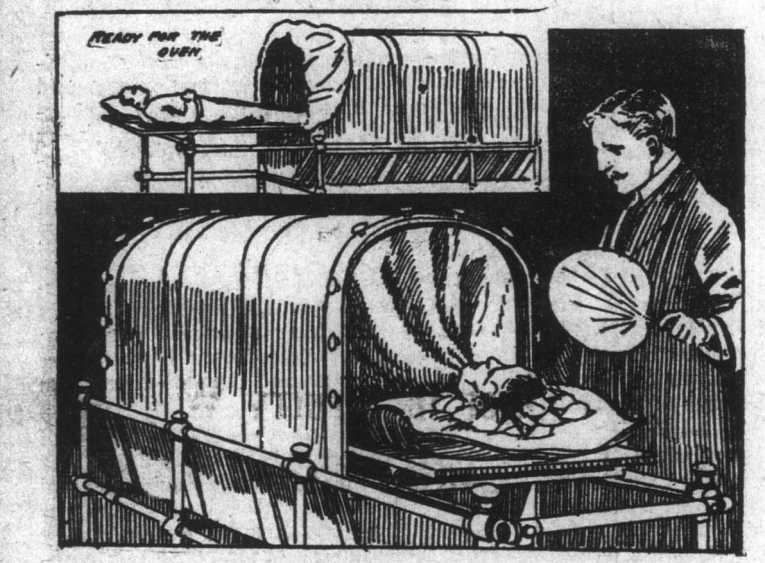

RIVERS AND MURPHY NEXT IN LINE FOR TITLE GO WITH BILLY RITCHIE

Although Ad Wolgast is now eliminated from the ranks of top-notch lightweight and the present title holder, Willie Ritchie, is pleased to name only Joe Rivers, Tommy Murphy and Leach Cross as the three men best qualified to meet him for the championship, there appears to be six men who are really entitled to class themselves as title aspirants. The list includes Freddie Welsh, Joe Rivers, Tommy Murphy, Jack Britton, Joe Mandot, and Bud Anderson. And of this lot Rivers, Murphy, Anderson and possibly Welsh, can be rated in Ritchie's class. Cross and Mandot do not appear to possess the necessary stamina to carry them through a hard twenty-round fight. Welsh is entitled to consideration in view of his championship holdings abroad, while Anderson's decisive victory over Kayo Brown gives him a claim for a match with the ranking lightweight, Britton may not be able to make the poundage demanded by the champion, but that granting that he can do so, the one-two-three of the lightweight class seems to be Ritchie-Rivers-Murphy, with Britton also in line with them.
Murphy's victory over Wolgast was a big surprise to the majority of fight followers, who believed that the six-champion had not prepared himself properly for the first fight, and that he would go on past Saturday and make short work of the New York veteran, who has been hammering away in the lightweight ranks since past thirteen years. Murphy's showing was remarkable, according to press dispatches from the south, and he won by a margin of 10 to 3. It is the uncertainty of the game that provides the fans with so much excitement.

Judge Called to Decide Debate Between Christian Scientists and Anglicans

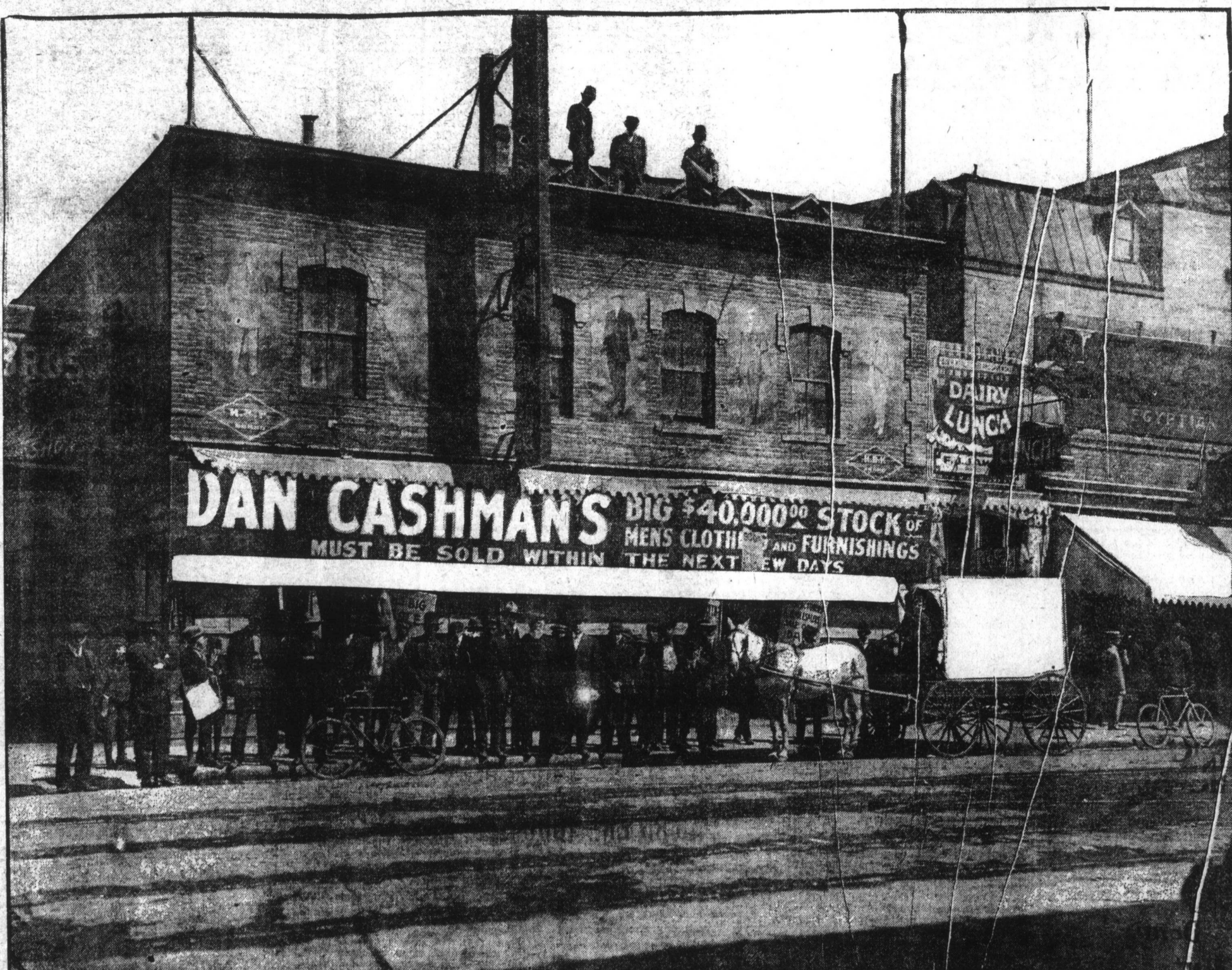

The hall last evening in possession of the keys of the church and managers of the hall, devout followers of the Anglican persuasion. The case was then placed in court, and the Christian Scientists claimed the keys of the hall should be handed over and the hall placed in their possession for last evening. This was done by order of the judge.

Exponent of Christian Science Lectures On Faith to Large Calgary Audience

"The liberation or redemption of man," said he, "implies that he is enabled to pass through the door of hope into enlightenment and spiritual understanding. If through enlightened faith the things hoped for become substantial, and the joy that was vain becomes present experience."

Christian Science unfolds causation. Where men have inherited their religious beliefs there is found opinionative, theoretical Christianity, but the basis of happiness in this life is practical and individuality earned Christianity independent of tradition, having for its keynote demonstration and spiritual understanding. Christian Science teaches men through reason and revelation. Reason replaces opinion since it leads back to ways to cause. Revelation replaces dogma, because it always brings "light." When man walks in light, understanding the law which governs him and obeying it, he is at peace.

No one should deny that the cures of disease wrought by Jesus exhibited causation, and so were scientific. There was power which was efficient to produce these results of healing. This power existed then at the standpoint of causation. Christian Science declares that all the power which then existed does now exist at the standpoint of causation, and by effects already made manifest, it is proving the same.

Causation is an invisible, but effects show its nature. The healing wrought by Jesus is a kind of blessing, that men glorify God the unseen cause. Today men are beholding results which can come only from a source divine and loving, and are becoming acquainted with the true God through the healing of the sick through Christian Science is accomplished by the law and potency understood by Jesus, and it is his test and sign that those healed by his ministry find their glorified with love for God, and the inner gladness is reflected in universal kindness.

How Shall Man Have Access to God? Christian Science introduces a man into the companionship of the noble and upright men of all times. In the earliest times the promise came to Abraham that he should bring blessing to the nations through the seed of Isaac, the most high God, the possessor of heaven and earth. Abraham said, "The other gods," but when he came to understand how man may be taught, guided and helped by the unseen presence, he established the record of God, and through his experience blessed all believers with the knowledge that God answers prayer, and that his will is done. He illustrated the purpose of love to create truth in good. Mrs. Eddy says. (Science and Health, 6: 573.)

If we follow the growing conception of the goodness of God as brought out in the experiences of the patriarchs and in the lives of the prophets, of Elijah and Elisha, of Isaiah and Daniel, we find all the same truth, and the same power of healing. The same of the apostles were acts of healing. There we learn of healing from one Scriptures their value as revelation of God to man would be diminished inconceivably. 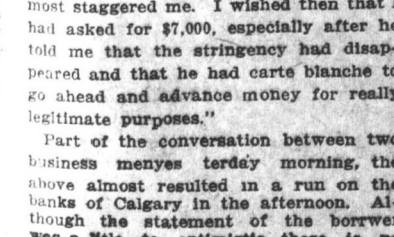
Money Getting Easier Say Borrowers, Have Taken Embargo Off of the West

"Money is loosening up. This morning I went into the bank I got a loan and the rapidly with which the bank manager acceded to my request almost staggered me. I wished then that I had asked for \$7,000, especially after he told me that the stringency had disappeared and that he had carte blanche to go ahead and advance money for really legitimate purposes."

Part of the conversation between two business men yesterday morning, the above almost resulted in a run on the banks of Calgary in the afternoon. Although the statement of the borrower was a little optimistic, there is no doubt but that the money has loosened up considerably in the past few days, and according to officials of the R. G. Dun and Bradstreet companies, the money stringency is not nearly as bad now as it was a few weeks ago.

Bank managers, however, are still inclined to be cautious, and advances are only being made where the banks are well secured, and outside real estate, or real estate of any kind, is not in great demand as security.

The cessation of the Balkan hostilities and the moving of the grain boats with full cargoes of wheat are two of the reasons given for the loosening up of the money market, and generally speaking a more optimistic outlook will be noticeable in the next few weeks.

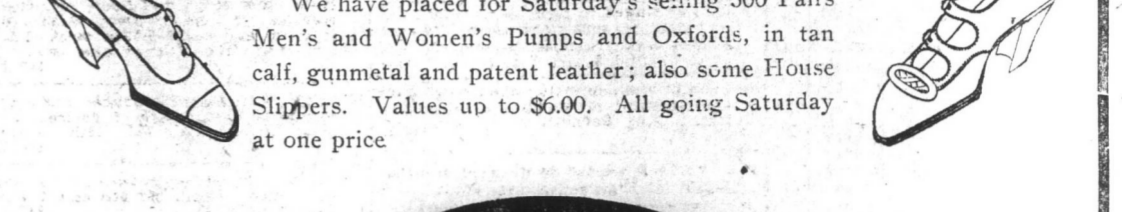
