WAS WELTER ASSISTED IN MURDER. ING HENDERSHOTT?

etective Murray Brings the Bloodstained Leaves to Toronto for Analysis by Prof. Ellis—The Officer Will Not Accept a Confession from Welter-Hendershott aud the Dead Horse.

Chief of Provincial Detectives J. W. Murray returned yesterday morning from St. Thomas, where he has been engaged on the Middlemarch murder case, The officer brought with him the bloodstained leaves found in the woods, and left them with Prof. Ellis for analysis.

Detective Murray, when spoken to re-Detective Murray, when spoken to respecting the desire of Welter to confess, stated emphatically that he wanted no confessions, that he was satisfied he could convict the perpetrators, although there is a great deal of work still remaining to be done on the case.

With the arrest of John Hendershott and W. D. Welter all parties implicated in the murder may not have been arrested. It is quite possible that still another party may be taken into custody, on a charge of being a principal in the affair.

The men who brought the blood from the dead horse in the adjoining field and sprinkled it in the vicinity of the other bloodstains may also be proceeded against, although they claim they did it merely out of curiosity, and with a view of seeing if the bloodstains bore any resemblance.

It is a singular fact, not yet mentioned, that the dead horse in the adjoining field was placed there by John Hendershott, and the idea has become general that the murder of his nephew was contemplated even then, and the horse was placed there in order to explain if possible the presence of bloodstains, should any be found.

The veteran detective seems to be ending up the year with his old-time vigor. Following the Chattelle case, he convicted Kahoe, the Chatham firebug, sentenced a few days ago to five years imprisonment, and Walter Irwin, the bank burglar, sentenced to five years, of the latter's conviction The Clarksburg Reflector says: "The conviction of Irwin is due to the untiring and astute labors of Detective Murray."

Mr. Murray will return to St. Thomas to-morrow to prepare the evidence for the inquest on Thursday.



Wilson first said his home was in Montpelier, but later claimed to belong in Montreal. He told the Marshal he was a lawyer and a lobbyist. When asked by the court if he was ever arrested before he said he had been arrested on charges of defrauding people in horse trades. It seems that in Austria the marriage of children under fourteen is not legitimate, but up to the age of twenty-four the consent of father or guardian has to be obtained. In Russia, the bridegroom may not be younger than eighteen, nor the bride younger than eighteen, nor the bride younger than sixteen and persons over eighty are prohibited from marrying at all, while no person is permitted to contract a fourth marriage. The farther north we go the later becomes the marriageable age, till in Sweden and Norway the law is that a man cannot marry until he is twenty-one and the women until she is eighteen. In America, it is extremely difficult even to outline the marriage laws, as there are forty-seven sovereign States, each claiming exclusive control States. each claiming exclusive control over the matter of the marriage of its citizens. Hence it comes that in Montana and Washington twenty-one is the tana and Washington twenty-one is the earliest marrying age for man and eighteen for woman, while in New Jersey and Connecticut the ages are respectively fourteen and twelve. All that a schoolboy in Washington has to do in order to wed a schoolgirl friend is to induce her to lay aside the skipping-rope for a while and fly with him across the border to a more complaisant state. "In the matter of charges and fees there is a delightful lack of unanimity among civilized nations. In Sweden and Norway, for example, time and place are quite optional, weddings in church being of exceptional eccurrence. and you are not bound to give the officiating clergyman any fee whatever. In Switzerland, the only fee is one to cover expense of the publication of the marriage in a local newspaper, and registration, and you can be married at any hour you please. In Greece, a registration, and you can be married at any hour you please. In Greece, a bishop's license costs four drachmas (sixty cents), and the registration five drachmas (one dollar). In Belgium

drachmas (one dollar). In Belgium they make a little charge for a 'marriage pamphlet' presented to the parties, and for stamps, but even these are dispensed with if the parties make a declaration of poverty.

As to the cost of divorce, the cheapest and simplest kind in the States costs \$100, in Germany it varies from \$12 to \$250. 
