In 1893 it reached Virginia, and has been recently discovered in Florida and Mary-land. In all probability it exists in other sections. The Department of Agriculture has therefore issued an emergency bulletin, and urges upon all fruit-growers the impor-tance of making immediate examination of their orchards to ascertain whether or not this insect has made its appearance, since very great damage to the fruit growing in-terest may result if the scale is allowed to appead.
