Zarish Jotes.

As will be seen from the above table, there will be no "Three Hours' Service" in St. George's this year. Morning prayer will be at 10.30 as usual, so that those who are desirous will be able to attend the Three Hours' Service elsewhere. The Provost of Trinity College will give the Meditations at St. Stephen's.

The Wardens have made up the accounts for the year, and a most unsatisfactory account it is. The congregation's indebtedness is largely increased. For though the congregation of the past year is larger than that of the previous year, the offertory is less by \$10 per Sunday.

Lent is always an extremely busy time for the Clergy, there are so many special services, the Confirmation classes begin, and this year the unprecedented number of sick cases have given the Rector more to do than can possibly be accomplished in the twelve hours of the day. The Confirmation classes began on February 22nd, and on May 11th the Bishop will hold a Confirmation in the Church.

On Thursday, 17th February, a Quiet Day for the Clergy was held in St. George's Church, being conducted by the Lord Bishop of Huron.

A lecture on Eastern Manners and Customs was given on Monday, February 21st, by a Syrian gentleman, who is at present living in Toronto.

He is anxious to read for Holy Orders and afterwards to go out as a Missionary to the Mohammedans.

The year's work seems to have gained in every respect during the season, the numbers to have kept up and the amount of work done truly remarkable. A number of bales for different missions have been sent away and most gratefully acknowledged by the clergymen's wives. These bales contain not only clothing and the necessaries of life, but at Christmas time, toys, candy, and all sorts of delightful surprises, are despatched to the lonely mission station, where their arrival is hailed with the greatest excitement. The money contributions of the Branch show an increase over last year, and, as will be seen by the Treasurer's report, all the pledges have been met, with a little to spare.
