It is just a question whether or not the Hominion Govermment shonld have the banks Winding-Up Act mamended so an to retain suflicient assets to redeem all circulation of hank notes.

their presence．Notwlthstanding the vigilance exercised in the large area in front of and surrounding the counter aud railings of the Bank of Montreal，a bold robbery was perpetrated there on Tuesday last．A clerk in a large millinery house，whose duty was to deposit for the firm，went to the bauk about oue o＇clock and laid the closed deposit book containing the endorsed cheques and cash on the small platform of tho wicket as usual．and while waiting for the receiving teller to take it in，was tapped on the shoulder by some one who asked his opinion concerning the genuiueness of a bank note．When the young mau turned again to the wicket，the teller asked him for the deposit． It was not in the book and could not be found．The youth appeared quite dazed at the loss．The amount was about $\$ 3,200$ ，of which nearly $\$ 2,000$ was in cheques to be deposited to the firm＇s credit． These will meroly lead to some little inconvenience，but no loss．The carclessness to which custom leads deposit clerks is often remarked． Deposit books should not be crowded in the wicket，and when laid there should not be lost sight of till safe in the hands of the teller． The method adopted by the bauk some time since of passing the book． from the teller across an inner railing to the ledger－koeper was a step in the right direction，and the stationing of a watchman in viep of the public area，was another no less commendable．The youth bas been dismissed for careleseness．His answers on examination were somo－ what contradictory．A search of his person led to the production of a deposit slip with momoranda extending back to April，and a num－ ber of illuminating cards not ubually found in the pockets of Sunday－ ．school pupils．

E．B．Betts，agent for agricultural implements at Wentworth， N．S．，bas assigned with liabilities of about $\$ 1,200$ ，and assets nominally amounting to one－half that figure．Mr．Betts was unsuccessful before， but had managed to pay off all his nld liabilities．

Tuk new rooms of the Brockville Board of Trade were formally opened last Friday．There was a large attendance of the represent－ ative business men of the town．Addresses were delivered by Presi－ dent Douncy，Jonn F．Wood，M．P．，Mayor Derbyghire，W．H．Com－ stock，John M．Gill，H．F．J．Jackson，George a Dana and Colonel Jackson．

E．Panker \＆Co．，carrying on business at Trehern，Man．，have as－ sigued in trust，owing to the refusnl of an enstern house to fall into
lino in the recently proposed sottlement．It is feared as a conse－ quence that the estate will turn out but poorly．The business wes begun in the spring of＇ 87 by Mrs．Parker under the above atyle．She obtained an extensiou last March，agrecing to pay in monthly instal－ ments without security，the liabilities being at the time $\$ 2,000$ and the estate showing a surplus of $\$ 1,500$ ．－The estate of Moore $\& \mathrm{Co}$ ． of Winuipeg，crockery merchants，recently roforred to，has been sold by the shoriff for 62d cents in the dollar．

Tus business changes in the Province of Quebec for tho week，com－ priso the following；－W．J．JcKenzie for many yearb carrying on a general store at Buckiagham，has boen obliged to mako an assigu－ meut．Mr．McKenzio has been rather over zealous than lacking in due attention to his business．The labilities aro about $\$ 8,000$－－P．I． Jacob in the same line at Chambord，in the Lake St．John district，has succumbed after a career of 2 years in that village．Liabillties about $\$ 2200$ and assets nominally $\$ 2,000$ ．－Octave Bernard，contractor of St ． Hyacinthe，bas assigned to the prothonotary of that district．－Geo． Guay of Yamachiche，recently referred to，has assigned with liabili－ ties of $\$ 4,400$ and assets of about $\$ 2,500$ ．－M．Lebourvenu，carrying on a general store at Eaton，is offering to compromise at 50 cents in the dollar，spread ovor 12 months．Tho liabilitics are roundly $\$ 0,000$ ， and assets nominaily $\$ 1,000$ less．Mr．Lebourvenu is one of the oldest general merchants in the Eastern Tovpnships，aid all through his career of upwards of a quarter of a century has，until now，paid $100^{\circ}$ cents in the dollar．His present troubles aro attributable to the Hereford railway troubles of about a year ago，which prevented his collecting considerable amounts credited to workmen and others on that line．－Montreal haberdashers have evidently been credited with making money，if we may judge by the recent advont of new com－ petitors in the field．Murray $\&$ Wickons are among these．They were formerly with Tooke，and conceived the idea some eighteon months ago of starting on their own account on St．Catherine street west． Findiug it rather londy in that locality they moved down to St．James street last December，but have evidenely not been able to find much． improvement in their new quarters．Both are steady and respectable，＇ but this did not make up for want of capital sufficient to cuable them to wait for the business to grow to a paying proportion．Their as－ signment is anoounced．－Geo．Bishop，a printer and publisher of La－

## THE MAIL ON THE COSTOMS LAW.

Whatever ability and fairness may be manifested on other topics by our contemporary, the Toronto Alail; it is evident from recent utterances that he takes but a partial or prejudiced view of the law for regulating the administration of the tariff. In his issue of the 7th instant, he deals with the subject under thre caption of "The Arbitrary Customs Law," beginning with the recent concession made by the Government under pressure from our leading importers. Now, there is no denying that the duty on the cost of inland transportation was deemed specially obnoxious and oppressive, not only by importers but was looked upon in that light also by the Government, and it was highly probable that repeal would follow before the lapse of another year. The representations made to Great Britain by the German Government, that our law in respect of the duty on the cost of inland freight to the place of direct shipment by which Great Britain and Iroland were exempted, was a violation of the existing treaty ben tween the two countries, compelled the clange proposed by our own Government, and which our merchants were fortunate enough to successfully oppose, a change from which it was fell the present state of the exchequer parmitted no altornative. A consideration of the bright anticipations of the Minister of Finauce furnished probably some warrant for the general sweep ordored in compliance with the request of the delegates.

The lauguage of our contemporary is not characterized by that calm dispassionate choice which accompanies a tolerable knowledge of the subject. "Absurd tax" is a term which he would scarcely employ were he acquainted with the difficulties

surrounding a proper appraisement of articles of import from inland points along the unavigable rivers of Central Europe. It is well known that since the enactment by which goods shipped from the United Kingdom were free of such tax, the manufacturers on the Continent were enabled largely to evade it by selling their goods through agents at English ports as cheap as though purchased direct at the factories. The future invoices will be free of this, and it remains to be seen what effect it may have upon the rovenue. "Oppression * $\quad * \quad *$ forged for their [the merchants] discomfiture" is another of those terms as applied to the laws enacted for an equitable distribution of the burdens for revenue purposes, which one is grieved at finding in the columns of one of our leading dailies. We believe we are warranted in saying that no honest merchant in Canada looks upon the Customs laws in such a light. It would be interesting to have our contemporary's views as to the best methods of raising a revenue. 'This is no mere party question. Whatever the party in power-whoever has beld the reins of Government in the past, whether honest Alexander Mackenzie or diplomatic Sir John Macdonald-whether Hon. Isaac Burpee or Hon. Mackenzie Bowell holds the portfolio of Customs, the tariff is a stern fact, an unpalatable and disagreeable neecestity as the only method except direct taxation for obtaining the ways and means for carrying on the business of the country, one which few public men liave yet found it possible to direot and retain their popularity.

As to the next charge made by the sfail that the importer is "kept perpetually in the dark" as to the appraised value of his goods, and that he is allowed to pay the ad valorem duty if the invoice is higher, but fined if they are 15 per cont. or more helow, we have to ask whether tbis has hitherto been the practice. We have positive knowledge that the oflicers of the Customs have volunteored information in some cases where invoices were in excess; and there are few, if any, importers who have to complain of an arbitrary enforcement of the provisions of the law in respect of penalties, or without the fullest investigation. It is rarely, except in the case of a first importation that merchants or manufacturers are wanting in a full knowledge of the cost of the goods at the place of manufacture or in the home market; and in such a case, or when in ignorance or forgetfulness of the provisions of the law, persons import articles for personal use or consumption, due consideration is taken of the cir-cumstances-of the intent-however diflicult to ascertain-and where no frad has been contemplated, the clause fixing a penalty is never, as such, enforced. The methods of the mostarbitrary government in Europe would hardly call for the langunge employed by our contemporary-when he says that the modifcation introduced some time ago in the Act in order to press less severely upon suspects and by which the importer could "amend the entry" if the undervaluation did not exceed a certain per-centage--that the provision of the Amended Entry Clause "was " a palpable attempt at robbery-based on the theory that mer"cantile men had no rights that the Government need respect, "and that the Customs Officers were at liberty to play ducks and "drakes with any man's property." Importers who read this tirade in the Mail must have smiled to themselves or wondered if any honest man had been treated in a manner to call for such lauguage.

The comparison made by our contemporary with the practically free-trade syatem in England calls for no remarks. It is impossible to enforce laws framed for the punishment of offenders without an occasional error. We have recently an instauce in one of the middle counties of England, where two men convicted of a crime under a fair trint had completed nine yoarg'
penal servitude for a crime neither had committed, nad which the real criminal confessed on his death-bed. The Government has awarded both men a sum. of money. as the only amends it could make. The oflicers of the Customs in Canada have as yet made no such serious mistakes. A few cases that might have led to injustice wers checked in time.

The reference to the moiety system by our contemporary is an evidence that he has not given due attention to the working of the Act in the United States.* The experience of some of the highest oflicers of the United States Government, including the collectors and deputies at the principal ports of entry and' of leading manufacturers, all goes to show that since the partial repeal in 1874, undervaluation has increased at the large cities, and that merchants cannot import silks and other goods because of the system of agents of Luropean munufacturers stationed in New York. Secretary Manning (in 1885) says in effect that the Customs officer deprived of hisjust moiety will and must avoid personal risk. "The experiment of detect"ing frauds without moieties has been tried and found wanting, " and in the absence of a proper equivalent to the seizing oflicer "and with a high tariff in operation, smuggling and frauds upon "the revenue will be encouraged and run riot. * * * More"over, he is under heavy bonds for the faithful collection of the "revenue. Will any man in that oflice take the great responsi"bility of making seizures without a fair and equitable compen"sation? No. And it would be unreasouable and contrary to "the laws of nature to expect it." Deputy Collector Williams of New York contributed the following opinion to the epectal report issued in 1885 by Secretary Manning:
"l believe that undervaluations of invoices grealy increased since the repeal of the Moiety Law. Although the law was denounced and mado to appear as very unpopular, it is nevertheless true that it was beneficial to the best interests of the Govornment, and it afforded the honest importer appreciable protection against the dibhonest practice of swindling imporlers. The sentiment against the law was stirred up and formulated by men inimical to the interests of the business mon of the country. The practical elfect of the repeal of the law has been to drive honest American importing louses out of the trade, so that to-day the vast bulk of the importing business is in the hands of foreign agents who lave no respect for our revenue laws, and are mercenary to the last degree. I beliove it is this class of men who are most guilty of corrupting oflicers in the revenue service. Congress should restore the law to the Statute-
book," book."

Anyone who takes the trouble to read the businese signs along the principal wholesale and commission streets of New York will be struck with the predominance of names indicative of central or eastern European origin, and will rocall the remarks of Collector Williams concerning "foreign agents." The remarks of Special Agent Power in the same report fite the Nfails' comments as to the seizure of books \&c. to prove cases of fratudulent undervaluation:
"Under the old law an officer could make an unexpected descent on a suapected importer and having power to examine all books and papers, could discover fraud if any existed. While the power conferred by the law was arbitrary and liable to abuse, the honest merchant had nothing to apprehend from its operation. The repeal of the Moiety Law removed all incentive de."

The Mail's reference to the Ayer case is an unfortunate one. In this respect we cannot do better than quote from the recent speech of the Hon. Mackeazie Bowell before the Eouse of Commons on the occasion of the abortive resolution to amend the Customs Act. The Minister of Castoms has taken advantage of the opporiunity given by the resolution to enterinto a thorough elucidation of the workings of the Act, and which in view the meagre reports in the newspapers we are glad to see has been reproduced in pamphlet form, making in all about 63 pages :
"My hon. friend from Chateauguay (Mr. Holton) in defence of that portion of his resolution which provides for the carrying of every case into court, says that the Minister of Customs doos not seem to have much confidence in the courts. Well, if I were to speak frankly I would say that, judging from my pasi experience, my hon. friend is nol far wrong. It may be presumption on my part to say that cases which have gune before the courts have not been decided in accordance with, what Ibelieve to be, Customs law or Customs usages. My hon. friend referred to the Grinnell case and to the Ayer case, and he might have gone a little furtber and referred to the Bertin case lately tried in Montreal. The Grinnell case was one which came within the meaning of that section of the Act which provides that parts of

machinery brought into this country shall be valued for duty relatively to the value of the whole article when imported. We all know why that clause was placed on the Statute-books. If a completed article bore a rate duty of 30 or 35 per cent., the practice was to bring it in piecemeal and put it together in Canada; and in order to prevent that kind of fraud the law was so framed as to make them pay duty on the parts of an article relatively to the value they hore to the whole article. The Grimnell parties objected to the ruling of the Department. It was taken to the Wxehequer Court, and fudge Gwyne, who is certainly as eminent as the Chief Jnstice himself, gave a decision in favor of the Gusioms Department, and in giving that judgment he went a wreat deal further than the Customs Department ever thourht. of poing, hecause he not only dechared that the Customs oflicials wore correct in imposing the daty in the manner I have pointed out, hut that they would have been jusified had they added the Royalty which is paid in the United States, and then impored a daty on the foll value of the articile, though it had to the pat topether when it camo into this country. The practice of the Department has been this: When an article is brought into the ismutry in dillerent parts, we dedut the expense necessary to pit it togelher and complete it in this conntry, and charge the duly on ine residue. Mr Justice Grymme decided that we need not even have gone that far, but that we would have been justilied in collecting a duty on the fitl value of the article as if it had been complete when it came into the comtry. The Ayer atae wat on all fours with the Grimnell case. The Ayers had heten in the habit of importing their patont medicines in bulk, ass in barrols, puncheons, or casks, and then botholing it, and ath in harrels, puncheons, or casks, and then botaling it, and ats we had done in the Grimnell case. Chief Justice Ritchie took at vory strong view in opposition to the decision of the Jepartment, and delivered the judgmont which my hon. friend read 10 -day, and which, I am bound to say, to my mind was not cpeditahle to a judge occupying his position.- [Mr Jones (Halifax). Order.]-Mr. Boweli. it may be in order to defend a judgment, and to read to the House a condemnation of oflicials by a judge, as the hon. gentleman opposite has done, and to de nounces such ollicials as every thing that is wrong and villainons; but it is apparently out of order, in the opinion of the member for Halifax (Mr. Jones) to question that condemnatien, particnlarly if it comes from so ominent a gentlemon as a judge on the bonch. But i say to my hon. friond who called me to order, that if he had beon in the witness hox, us I was, and the judge had provented him from telling the whole story, as I was prevented, he would feel procisely as 1 do in reference to that matter. It may bo the rules of court to stop a wituess from tolling the whole truth; but I question very much whether it is either moral, or correct, or equitable."

The Mertin (Montreal) case alluded to in these pages at tha time, concernod some consignments of a cheap class of wines from lirance, the invoices of which were so prepared that after deducting the various expenses of commission, freight, leakage, insurante, de, the amount remaining to the consigner in Hordeanx was between one and two cents per gallon! the magistrato dizmissed the case-each party to pay their own costs, and this in face of the clearest ovidence from the invoices, lotter-books and individuals. 'The Government has taken the case to Aproal. The hail sayg "the law must be changed." By all means suy we; and if our contemporary who, is, wo foar, "agin the government" for good or ill, will devote a little of his time to the preparation of a better Customs Aet the comutry will have occasion long to bless his memory while he himsolf will have the comforting conscionsness of having conforred a lasting benofit upon the poople.

## 'ILIE BANK SIATEMENTS.

The general statement of the chartered banks for the month of April is to hand somewhat earlier than its predecessor. The naual seasomable reduction in circulation continnes, being if million loss than in March. Dominion Government deposits have incroasod about $\frac{1}{4}$ million and Provincial Government deposits $\$ 220,000$. Provincial deposits after notice are less by $\$ 360$,000. P'ublic doposits on demand are groater by nearly $\frac{a}{4}$ million, and after notice greater by $\$ 620,000$, an evidence of hesitation to mako investments as well as of balauces of lines of discount. The amome due banks or agencies in U.K. is greater hy $81,700,000$, but his is more than offset by the amount due from the same sonrcos. The available assets are less than in Mareh by nearly 2 millions. In Government debentures there is an increase of $\$ 050,000$, of $\$ 600,000$ in lonns to the Dominion Govormment, which has probably some relation to the increase of deposits from the bane source. Foreigu securities have inuroased about $\$ 600,000$. LJoans to "other corporations" have inereased nearly a quarter of a million, and other discounts to the public something noar half a million. The rapid and steady ineroase in discounts, ats already pointed out in our review of the Statomenta for March, would seom to call for attention on the part of our bankera amil boarde of direction. Although directora'

Jiabilities are less by $\$ 170,000$ than in March, the total of discounts under the three heads has reached the enormous figure of $\$ 178,825,000$, or $\$ 515,000$ more than in March, over 5 millions more than in February, or more than 7 millions of an increase since the 1st January last. This is brisk work, and it behooves our prudent financial guides to see that the sail being carried is not likely to prove too large for the ship. Everything points to a bountiful barvest; but our climate is subject to sudden changes; a drouth in July would destroy it all; it were therefore well that we risk nol too mush, but so arrange matters that we be not taken unawares whatever letide. The full statement will bo fouml elsewhere; the subjoined table will be nseful for pmrposes of further comparison:-

TERMINAL FACILITIES.
The necessity for enlarged and improved terminal facilities has recently been brought under the notice of the Board of Trade by the representatives of the smaller lines and transient vessels trading to this port. 'Thoir petition contains an attack upon the four leading lines of steamships which make their terminus here, and which have succeeded in obtaining all the central wharfage accommodation.

To our mind the natural position of the harbor, with its wharfage extending in almost one straight line along the river front, is the real cause of the difficulty. Outside vessels should be encouraged, as they form a very valuable adjunct to the trade of the port and enable business to be done with the smaller ports, but the lines with their regular service are certainly entitled to great consideration. One gentleman, at least, who signed the memorial would not have done so if he had known it contained an attack upon the lines, as he is of opinion, as many others must be, that the liners have not too much accomodation, and they frequently have to berth their vessels outside of their allotted wharves for want of room. For many years past it has been the same story, all ships coming here with general merchandise attempting to crowd into the upper harbor to save the heavy cartage expenses on cargo from the lower wharves. It has been well said, however, that all vessels coming here cannot expect to discharge under the shadow of the Custom House, until, at loast, the accommodation between the long wharf and Windmill Point has been vastly increased. This seems to be an immediate necessity, much more important in fact than the extension of
wharves for miles down the river, which work appenrs to be absorbing the sole attention of the Harbor Board.

In declaring that the present accommodation of the harbor is quite inadequate for the general business of the port, the memorialists are at one with the President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who has had excellent opportunities of judging und is able to form some idea of the possibilities of the future. 'Ihe greatly increased facilities of the Grand Irunk and Canadian Pacitic will naturally direct more traffic to this point. A move of probably great importance has been the purchase by the C.P.R. of a controlling interest in the Duluth, South Shore \& Allantic with the ultimate object of building a road from Duluth to Winnipeg. It is said that the Grand 'Irunk contemplated this deal which would have given it a shorl cut to Mauitoba through United States territory. The Canadian Pacific is also said to have formed an alliance with the Manitoba road and the Burlington system, which will give it connections at Chicago equal to those recently obtained by the Northern Pacific. As to the Graud Irunk it is now alleged that it will penetrate the NorthWest with the aid of the Northern Pacific, and will thus:have a aystem extending from Portland and Lacoma on the Pacific to Montreal and Portland, Me., in the east. With all these schemes in progress and the advantages likely to arise from the completion of the Sault route, it is important that Montreal should de in a position to handle with expedition the traflic which points in this direction. According to the best authorities the port is bv no means in a condition to deal successfully with any consider able sugmentation of business. The petition of the general shipping interest speaks for itself:-

## To the Council of the Bcard of Trade:-

Genthemen,-Understanding that a committee of members has had the various schemes of harbor improvement under consideration for some time, we the undersigned, representing varions shipping lines and transient vessels, desire to urge on the Council the vast importmace of some prompt and vigorous measures to secure some efficient plan of harbor improvement and extension being set about without delay.

The present wharfage accommodation of the harbor of Montreal is quite inadequate for the general business of the port. From the entrance of the canal down to the long wharf (which is at present the only wharf accommodation for vessels of general cargo), is occupied hy the Allan, Dominion, Reford and Beaver Company lines. If an outside vessol with a general cargo arrives, not consigned to either of those lines, where can she be berthed, save and except at Windmill Point or bowowhere near Hochelaga?

Those gentlemen who represent the shipping interest on the committee of the Board of Trade are managers of diferent lines above specified, and naturally, for their own interest, think there is not much need of any increase of shipping accommodation. They are satisfied with what they have got, and do not see the necessity of any ontside steamers here, or to rum in competition with thom.

What is wanted is more wharfage accommodation in front of the cily; and, having this, the shipping interest, the city of Montreal and the genc ral trade of the country will reap the benefit.

There are others besides the four companies above mentioned, and several firms who have veseels consigned to them with general cargoes who require as much consideration for their vessels with general cargoes, as the following signatures will show:-Anderson, McKenaie \& Co., Furness Line, J W. Anderbon, Millar \& Co., Chas. G. Davies is Co, Qillespie, Pattersou \& Co., John Hope \& Co., W. 'T. Benson \& Co., "Sifin Bros, Hudon, Hebert \& Co, Henry Dobell \& Co., J. G. Sidey, L. Bohr \& Co., McLean, Kennedy \& Oo. (McLean Line), J. \& R. Mčea, David Browning \& Co., David Straus, W. E. Boyd, Wm. Muir \& Son, Andrew Baile, F. Robertson, W. MoNally \&'Co., and Alexander Bromneer.

It may be stated that for over forty years endless schemes have been propounded and plans prepared for the improvement and enlargement of the harbor proper, and few projects have commanded such universal interest oven beyond expert enginearing and shipping circles. We now learn that the joint inundation and harbor committee, representing the government, the port commissioners, the hoard of trade; the city council, ship, steamboat and barge owners and the endless other interests involved, having investigated and deliberated at great length have presented a report which will be given to the public in a few days. It can scarcely be unanimous on every point as the committee comprises men who have formed decided views, but the main features of the report should present some general plan which with slight concessions should meet the requirements of the case. The facilities of the port in recent years have suffered from the lax administration of the by-laws relating to merchandise unloaded on the wharves which have been allowed to lie there far beyond the allotted time. The reform promised in this direction should be rigidly kept in view.

It is understood the report recommends the adoption of plan No. 0, prepared by Messrs. Kennedy and St. George, with a fow elight alterations. The main feature of this plan are the widen-
ing of Commissioners and Common streets to 75 feet minimum east of St. Peter streat, by encroaching on harbour property and to the aame width west of McGill street by private property. Between St. Peter atreet and McGill streat there will be no change on account of the limited wharf accommodation. 'The wharves are proposed to be raised to the present Commissioner streel lovel. Flood protection is to be secured by a parapet wall will openings. The cost of this stheme is cotimated at $\$ 2,527,594$, anm of this the city's portion would be $\$ 708,428$, the Harbor Commissioners paying the balance.

## the underwriters' association.

Now that the Fire Underwriters Association has macificed one of their members to Nemesis, it might be well to take a further survey afield for the purpose of ascertaining whether the capricious goddess thinks she has reason to be suificiently appeased. It is not concealed by some who think aloud that there are yet other misdeeds calling for atonement, though prolablys nol within the ken of a large majority of the members. It is to be hoped that the esample may prove of salutary eflect and that it may not turn out to have been injudicious or too hastily applied. The association has borne with patient endurance time and again attacks from within and without, and refrained with characteristic wisdom from any action that might threaten its own existence, to the evident benefit of waker or less popular companies, and has brought the system as noar perfection as anything of human conception can be; but it can never ignore the fact that its very existence depends upon a complete union of its parts, and that any severance from its ranks may threaten the whole structure. It is well to consider what is implied by the term "scotched, but not billed." The eflorts of the most sagacious members among the asbociation have heretofore been directed towards guarding the body from possible danger, while gradually adding to its usefulnese, and have doubtless secured a hearty c-speration from the present experienced heads of the rocovered members. Yet, if ever there was need of wise counsels within, it is perhaps when attention has been direced to what. may happen "while the lump holds out to burn."

## SILK MANUFACTURERS MEET.

The Silk Association of America ate their sixteenth ammal dinner in New York on the 141 h instant, Mr. Frank W. Cheney presiding. There was a large attendance of members. Jhe toasts and responses on the occasion were nalually confined to subjecis connected with the manufacture in which the Association is most deeply interested, and it is not surprising that there was a general consensus of opinion as to the necessity of maintaining the high protective tariff under which the industry has arisen and prospered. Mr. Ammidown of the 'lariff Associntion stated in the course of his remarks that 12 to 95 per cent. of all the agricultural products grown in the United Slates is consumed in the country, and not more than 5 to 8 per cent. exported. This he adduced to prove that the Unitod States within themselves were a series of nations, as it were, all eujoying the blessinge of federation and international free trade, and a home market not equalled by any country in the world. Referring to the fact that the manufacturers have raw silk free of duty, with the best machinery at command, he said they have not yet been able to export silk goode at a profit, showing the fallacy of the argument that with free raw materials, they could cope with the older manufacturers of Europe. With free cotlon they had not been able to export more than 1 per cent. of the $\$ 250,000,000$ a anual prodnct in that line. England is still able to buy the raw material, spin and weave it and sell it back to them in spite of the tariff.

## PRESIDENT VAN HORNE BEFORE THE SENATE COMMITTEE

The evidence recently given by President Van Horno before the United States Senate Oommittee on inter-state commerce was crowded out at the time. As the Journaí of Comsmaces is generally preserved for reference in government, banking, insurance and other offices, wo need not apologize for occasionally placing on record matter worthy of preservation some time after the occasion to which it owes ita rite. The frank explanations given by so sagacious a railway manager as the Preaident of the Camadian Pacific Rallway, though given orally, are well worthy of study and of being plyced upon record. The following copy is furnished by the Ner York Times of the 10th furt:-
loour railroad presidents apperared before the Interstate Oommerce Cominittee of tho United States Senate yesterday. President Van Horne of the Canadian Pacific made a favorabla impression and heemed entiruly willing th give all the information wanted ty the committce. More than once fo the sorsion the committec was informed that the elimination of Canadiun railronds from the railroad problum would greatly benefit Amorican roads, although the wiping cut of the Cunudian rouls, the committee was assured, would bave no effect on freight rates. The two bits of information did not seen to jlbe, but the comtnitteo made no comments on the cireumetance.

## wiat mu, van horese said.

W. C. Van Horne, president of the Chandian Pacific; succeeded Mr. loberia, of the Pomsylvania, as a witneas. He said the main line extonded from Quebec to Vanconver. Auother lino extended from Montreal to London, and would be extended to the Detroit river. A leated line would axteal across Baine and connect with the New Brunawick system. 'I'he real eastern terminus was at Matawamkeag. 'lie hyntem extended to st. John and Falifax. There was a branch from Sudhury Junction to Siult Ste. Marie. 'Thu only lines in the United states were in Maine and from the St. Lawrence to Newport, Vt. The roads connectung Duluth and Minncapolis with the "Soo" road were not owned by the Canadian Pacifis, but the latter's friends control il. The bridge over the "Soo" was owned by the Camadian l'ucific half, Duluth, South Shore \& Athatie a quarter, and "Soo" road a guarter. Mr. Van Horne could not bu indaced to say the Canmdian l'acific controlled the bridge or tho two roads which own half of it. Each road was a separate corporation. Sir Georgo Stephen, Sir Donald Smith, tud the witness were directors of the Duluth and The Canadime Pacific.
tha c. l. nis tharfic.
Thie chiof traflic of the Canadian Pucitic was Cunadian to the extent of 80 per cent. This included cotton goods business from Canada to Ohina. Vay littlo purely American business passed the Detroit frontier. Bantern business reached Boston ly the South Eastern and Buston and Lowell and by the Buston and Concord. The road had home traffic from tho Latht to San Francisco, Seattlu and Puget Sound points, and vicu vera The Canadian Pacific obtained, exclusive of conal, only a very inconsideralile portion of its tonuage from the United Stater. Much of it was Jumbur. The American roada compoted on traffic from Ontario to Manitoba. Tho Camadiau Pacific got a passenger differontinl on Pachic const businese. He thought it was $\$ 5$ for second-clase and $\$ 10$ for first-class pussengers. The road did little fruight business with Sun Fraucisco. It obluined a differential, he thought, on that business. 'The patsenger diffurential his road got on parsengers from Sim Francisco and Portland.

## a hatory of the hoad.

Mr. Van llome was anked to give a history of the rond. Ho gave much tentimony produced on Weduenday by Jumes J. Hill. The (Govermment turned over to a privato compuay 771 miles of completed remal, ho maid, when the public so demanded, as work under the (iovernment was slow and expensives. The subsidios of $\$ 25,000,000$ and $25,000,000$ neres of had were given for construting only a part of the rond. It horrowed $\$ 35,000,000$ from the Government and paid it back in $\$ 26,000,000$ in cashl and $7,000,000$ acres of land. The road was opened for trafic in 187 C . Mr. Vam Horne satid the bit of road which cost the Govermment $\$ 35,000,000$ and was turned ovar to the company was worth nothing as a bit of property. Just as advantagoous a piece could be buill for $\$ 22,000,000$. The item of capital stock, $\$ 40,000,000$, is correct. It was originally $\$ 100,000,000$. It was to pay 11 dividoud of 3 per cont. Tho company borrowed $\$ 28,880,000$ from the Government at 4 per cent., giviug all it had as security. That was in 1884. Afterward it borrowed $\$ 5,000,000$ moro. It claimed power to mortgage property by decreasing stock from $\$ 100,000,000$ to $\$ \$ 0,000,000$. It redaced its land grant by giving the Goveroment about $7,000,000$ acres in liou of $\$ 10,000,000$, and also paid the Governmeat $\$ 25,000,000$. 'Lhe hand grant bonds have been cancelled by proceads of land sales, all but $\$ 0,000,000$. The Government was paid by land grant sales and procceds of sale of $\$ 35,000,000$ of bouds to the public. Thoy sold for 944 to 94 . The company had had a monopoly of tailroud building in the Northwest. It was proposed if the dovernmont would guarantee inturest in $\$ 16,000,000$ of bonds for fifty years to cancol the monopoly. This was done, Those boads, it pur cents, sold for 93 . Tho subsidy ou the line from Montreal to Matanwimkeng, whilu will be opened next month, amounts to $\$ 186$, 000 a year. Payment began last year.

Semator Ouflom-'Tho total of subsidies, grants, and aids by the Govermanent to tha Canadian Pacific amonnts, ncoording to our figures, 10 $\$ 316,361,677$.

Mr. Vinn Horne-Wu do not make it that. According to our digures wo receivel from the Government 714 miles of completed rond. It was not worlh to the Company more than $\$ 10,000,000$, for it would have taken " different routo. It recoived $\$ 35,000,000$ and $18,000,000$ ateres of lawd. The reat the company paid back. The torminils given to the company on the Pacific were practicnily worth nothing.

## the phomfo ooast stmambis.

Senator Oullom-Your report for 1886 btates you received a considerable share of transcontinental trafic, most of it at remunerative rates.

Mr. Van Horne-We got a good deal of passenger traffic, but very little froight. The tea trado was good the first year, and is sufficient to keep rmaning a line of steamets of 27,000 tons between Hong Kong, Yukohnuand Yanconver. Wo bave an arrangoment by which The Imperial Government is to furuish a subsidy for a fast line between those point, but the contract has not been sigued. Wo get 10 or 12 pur cent of the transcontinental trade-abont 10 per cent. That fur codet the abiatic trale. The fast line of slemmers roferred to are
to make $17 \frac{1}{2}$ knots. They are to bo fitted to act as war cruisers if needed for such a purpose. The subsidy is to be $£ 60,000$ per annum. It will be about evenly divided between the railroad and the steamers. We hope to be able to taku passengers from London to Yokohama in twenty-one or twenty-two days. The time now through the Suez Canal is thisty-eight or thirty-nine days. Across the Oontinent the time is now about twenty-eight or thity days-six davs for the Atlantic Ocean, six days for across the Continent, and sixteen days for the trip from Vancouver to Yokohama. The Pacific Railway was built to make money for its shareholders, and for no other purpose under the sum.

## mohe interbsting statistics.

Sumator Cullom asked if before the Dominion Government permilted the Manitoba Government to build a conuection from Winnipeg to join the Hill system the Ganadian Pacific did not compel it to pay a bonus to the latter. - Mr. Van Horne said the Dominion simply guaranteed the interest on $\$ 15,000,000$ of $3 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent bonds. Mr. Van Horne was asked the total cost of the Canadian Pacific. Exclusive of the cost of 714 miles given to it by the Government, it cost, he said, $\$ 153,000,000$. The actual cash money on the road, exclusive of the 714 miles, was $\$ 120,000000$, of which $\$ 85,000,000$ was private capital. He was asked to tell the earnings of the road. The gross receipts last ycar were, he said, $\$ 13,195,535$. Tae net earnings were $\$ 3,870,774$. These figures included the earnings of the lake steamers. The earnings per ton per mile last year were l 2-100 cents. There was little difference in the rates of through and local freights. The road had carried two or threo consignments at less than cost from the Pacific coast on account of a tax inficted by the Northern Pacific.

## a war and a peade.

The road acted with full understanding with the other travecoutinental lines. The latter had an association. The road conformed to the provisions of the Interstate law, whether the goods were carried from an American to a Canadian point, or from un american point to an American point. For about two weeks, during a war, the Canadian Pacific carried goods to the far Northwest. Not an agent was sent south of the international boundary until the agreement was broken by Americau lines. Thon the Canadian Pacific hurled a stone through the French plate-glass windows of its neigbbors, and made matters as hot as possible until they all came together again and shook hands. Now they worked in-peace.
a mival to thr boez oanal.
Mr. Van Horno had nover considered the American lines their real competitors for Asiatic trade. The chiof competition was by the Suen Camal route. The Ganadian Pacific never expected to compete with the Suen Canal in enrying Eaglish teas, which come from Chinu. So far as Great Britain was concerued, the road relied upon its passenger traffic. The line of steamers that ran batween 'Frisco and Vancouver was an American line, and had been running before the Canadian Pacific was built. The Dominion paid it a subsidy for carrying the mails.

Seuntor Gorman-What do you mean by observing the Interstate Commerce Law?

Mr. Van Horne-We carry froight from American points io A morican points, from Americin to Canadian points, and Canadian to American points, according to the law Every agent is uuder instructions to this effe. .t. We publish onr rates. We are liable to punishment for infraction. We have no higher intermediate rate than from States to States' points. We did not voluntarily observe the long and short haul clause within Canadian territory, but counsel informed us that, according to the law, we were compelled to do so.

## AHLE TO HOLD ITS OWS.

Senator Gorman asked o be provided with lists of directors, copy of leases and other details of all roads controlled or owned in the United States by the Canadian Pacific. Mr. Van Horne promised to furnish them. Life also stated that all the subsidies were granted to the road that rau from Lalse Nipissing to the Pacific const. The Northeru Pacifi, an ensier line to construct, got $46,000,000$ acres of lund. No bubsidy was given to the Cavadian Yacific for roads that competed with American roads. There was not a day in the year; Mr. Vau Horne said, when the Canadian Pacific could not be operated. Not an hour had been lost last year. The snow sheds wero really cedar tumnels. Thoy cost as much as $\$ 300,000$ a mile. Seven or eight of them cost $\$ 4,000,000$. There were 5,291 miles in the rond: It was a shorter rond from New York to Vancouver than any of the Ohicago ronds to Puget Sound. All things considered, he thought the Canadian Pacific was able to hold its own. Committee and witness were on very good terms beforo Mr Van Horne fiaished his testimony and gave place to un Amorican railroader.
othen teatimons.
Presidont Smith, of the Chamber of Commerce, was the first witnese of the day. He stated that last year one firm shipped $\$ 2,000,000$ worth of cotton to the Orient by way of the Canadian Pacific road and by English steamers. Of this Oriental trade he thought the Canadian road carriod last year about 90 per cent Mr. Smith thought that some consideration was given by the rond to secure this trade. The Canadian roads, he said, are constantly increasing the amount of their traffic between Now England and Chicago, to the detriment of American roads. The foreign ronds, he held, should be put on equal footing with our own. Then we can fairly compote with the Oanadian lines.
J. H. Heinck, chairman of the committee on Interstato Commerco of the Now York Produce Exchnage, said that during certain montlus of the jear the Eric Oanal acts as a regulator to the railroade. If it was not for this the Canadian roads would do the regulating. If the Canadian roada were shut out of the coantry it would bring a great additional amount of trada to New York and Philadelphia, but the rest of the country would suffer. But thio Oanadian roads ahould be under the sañe conlitions as the A miorican roads.

John J. Kernan said the remedy againat Cnaadian competition is not in pooling. Our local traffic is so much better than that of the Canadians that our roads can live where a foreign road wonld starve. The Canadian roads make up losses on through trafic by high local rates,

The Committee adjourned until July 5th, when they will meet in Boston.

Economy in Oits -The competition among oilmen and the cutting of prices havo led to various cheapening processes of manufacture, to such an extent that a thorough knowledge of lubricating oils is something to which no man can lay claim and keep anywhere near the truth. The general demand for cheap oils has elicited the following comment from the Nalional Car and Locomotive Builder of New York: "A number of years ago a certain man took the contract to furnish oil, waste and brasses for all of the coal cars on a trunk line. He believed that the best was the cheapest. In all his purchases, therefore, he bought only the best of supplies. He attended to the business in person, and throughout the whole time of the duration of his contract not a train was dolayed by a hot box, while the standard train hauled by the locomotives in the service rose from 14 to 19 cars. Unfortunately for the railroad company, he made money out of the job, and the purchasing agent found it out. This wily offial therefore persuaded the railroad authorities that what man had done man could do, and that the company could purchase its own supplies and save the profits of the contractor. So when the contract expired it was not renewed, and the era of cheap oils and waste once more set in. As a result, in less than three months, or as soon as the old oil had all worked out of the boxes, the longth of traia hauled dropped from 19 'to 14 cars, and the cost of oil aud waste had risen above the figare paid to the contractor. Here was a case of a direct loss to the company of over 26 por cent. in the hauling power of their locomotives, due entirely to a difference in the grade of oil used. The reader will readily understand that this will componsato for a vastly greater difference in price. In each case the engine was doing all the work of which it was capable, therefore the consumption of coal remained the same. Wages of engineer, fremen and trainmen were the same. Hence the company lost 26 per cent. in crew wages, and the increased cost of oil, but the purchasing agent had the satisfaction of knowing that he was paying the bottom prices for supplies. It can hardly be asked whether it paid the company to disregard such a purely theoretical matter as the co-efficient of friction of the oil it was using."

A Netf Process With Flax Tibre--The U. S. Economid of New York publishes the following letter from an American travelling in Ireland, which should bear some interest for our Ontario flax growers: "There is nothing in-the climate or soil conflicting with the assertion that just as good fiax and linen may be produced in every State in the American Union as in any country. Gurmany now spins and weaves the tinest linen, and she has no essentially differing climate from America. There is every reason why the American farmers should produce a million acres of tiax for both seed and fibre over and abovo What is now produced, which would give $12,000,000$ to $15,000,000$ bushels of seed, worth as many millions of dollare, and $2,500,000$ tons of flax straw, worth $\$ 50,000000$, and from which 500,000 tonis of flax fibre would be obtained, worth $\$ 100,000,000$. Once established, American invention would soon build up an industry to consume this raw material. Further than this I have to say that I believe an entire revolution in flax and linon for the whole world is at hand, and most assuredly awaiting the operations of the next few montles to demonstrate this in America. I have discovered a process by which the flax straw is handied, and its fibre recopared in a length of time of but five minutes, from the dry natural straw to the perfect fibre, doing away with all water or dew retting and the labor of scutching, and producing a fibre as soft and fine as raw silk, saving the great expense of bleaching, while the fibre is much stronger and the yield much greater than by the old processes of dew and water retting. I have demonstrated the practicability of this invention, made the fibre from American, Irish and Belgium flax straw, had it spun and woven, and there is an exhiblt of the American product at the Paris exhibition, placed there by Mr. Dodge, of the Department of Agriculture at Washington last January. I onclose you a small sample of the fibre as produced in five minutes by the new process from the flax straw taken in its natural condition, and no injurious chemicals are used, nothing more so than an emulsion of linseed ofl." The sample enclosed was examined with much interest by Prof. Willetts, A ssistant-Secrotary of Agriculture, who, in his earlier days, had backled flax, and it was so satisfactory that he informed the sender that tho subject of his letter would be earnestly considered by the dopartment.

Tre Duty on Samlogs. The statistice given in the article on tho "Export Duly on Saiv-loge," which appeared in our fasue of the 19th
ult, have, as well as the article itself, provoked no little discussion among our American exchanges. It may be well to state here that the figures given in respect of the import of logs from Mnine to New Brunswick are merely a rough estimate. Along the Upper St John, loge would appaar to be moved to and fro according to the location of the mills with more or less disregard of international laws, and of these movements there is little or no statistical knowledge availablo. The logs are floated across to mills on either side, according to convenience, and the product is probably all or nearly all of which any record is kept. The other statistics in the article are compiled from the tables of Trade and Navigation. Our contemporaries, all, save one, approach the subject in a calm and dignified manner. The Northositern Lumberman, of Chicago, which we supposed to be the organ of the large lumber interests in that city, has no argument for or against the recommendation, except what may be contained in the phrase, " eating crow," a dish in which our contemporary would seem to pose as a connoisseur. The subject was treated exhaustively in our article, and we regret that it met with no better support in Parliamont. Probably our people fancy they have had crowing enough.

From Mount Forest and vicinity come accounts no lebs ancouraging concerning the agriculturnl outlook. The town of Mount Forest is thriving and its prospects have not been so bright for soveral years. The assessors return for the current year, just completed, shows a gratifying increase both in material prosperity and in population. The large cabinet factory of Mr. Zoellner is working at full capacity with about 70 hands. The iron foundry recently purchased by $A$. Filshie is again in full blast in addition to the established iron machine shops of Messrs. Snow \& Blackwood. A new factory, the first of the lind in the Dominion, is almost ready to begin operations. It is known as the Ontario Leather Matting Company for the manufacture of leather mats for doors of private dwellings and for public places, and also for the manufacture of leather belting of a new design made on the same principle as the mats. This factory starts with about 20 hands. In the town there are also 3 fi yur milla, an oatmeal mill, a pot barley mill, a woollon mill, a baw mill and 3 planing mills. "We are," says our correspondent, "supplied with modern convoniences such as the telephone, two telegraph systems, tho Grand Truak and C.P.R. Ryilwaya, electric light, excellent public and high schools, and last, but not least, all religious denominations are woll to the front, there being no less than six fiue brick churches representing the Ohurch of England, Presbyterian, Methodist, Roman Catholic, Baptist and Beformed Episcopal, as a set off to 7 hotels.

Kbir up Yodr Ingorange.-The recommendation contained in the communication of Senator Sanford in last week's issue receives practical endorsement from an item of nows from a correspondent in Bruce county. Robert Douglas, a well-to-do steam tanner of Tceswater was imprudent enough to allow his insurance to expire, and in proof, as it were, of the trath of the saying that nothing is so likely to happen as the unexpected, was shortly afterward burnt down. He was obliged in consequence to call a meeting of his creditors who considerately agreed to accept 25 cents in the dollar, payable in twelve months, socured. The tannery is being rebuilt and will shortly be in operation.The waterworks at Teeswater-to be oporated by a stationary steam-engine-are being pressed forward. The contractors in tunnoling through the rock a few days ago employed a rather heavy blast which kept the glaziers busy for some time repairing damages. The furniture factory is flling orders for Manitoba and the North-west. The fields promise an abundant yield of grain.

Mandfacturing in New Towns.-A large number of cities and towns throughout the country are now making efforts to add to their industries and population by securing now lines of trade and manufacture looking for locations. As an inducement to new business, towns have been led to offer not only exemption from taration, but in some cases the citizens have furnished buildings and put in capital. It must be admitted, however, that fow such enterprises have proved successful. It seems that simple exemption from tnxation for a term of years is ahout all that the average town can afford to offer as an induceneut for new enterprises. The firms accepting such an uffer are more likely to possess the elements of success. 'To use a somewhat slaugy but expressive phrase, the woods are full of enterprising men ready and willing to angage in new pryjects if they can do so with very little at stake, leaving the responsibility on other shonlders. This class of mon and firms are strongly attracted by the offer of a bouns. A manufaturer in solecting a location should consider other things as well as the inducement held out to him. He may have overy natural facility at hand, good power and shipping facilities, but the markets that control the goods have to be considered and the advantages to bo gained by being located within the circle of competing firms. One
great inducement for manufacturers to locate in amall towns is foend in the fact that the further one gets from the great centres of trade, the less liable bie is to be affected by labor troubles. The employes of a manufacturing concern in a small town are generally permanent residents, and being such are apt to fully consider any step that may lead to loss of work.-Am Mfr. and Iron World.

Tue Chicago Evening Journal says:-The probability is that before the close of President Harrison's term we shall bo privileged to send a letter from any post office in the United States for the small sum of 1 cent. The Republican party is committed to cheap postage. Thus far reduction of postage has been mot with an increase of patronage to warrant each cheapening of the rate, and allowing, too, an increase in weight. Luckily there is no competitive or cur-throat business in our postal affairs. The idea is the greatest good to the greatest number, and in the distribution of mail matter the postal service should never bo more than self-sustaining as to receipts and expenditures. When there is essurance of a large surplus of receipts from year to year, a letter stamp should cost only half a cent, and a coin should be issued to buy it

A Game Tait Tho Gan Pliy At.-The people who propose that the United States Government shall collect a duty upon all Canadian railway cars passing the rough this country do not seem to refiect that thisis a foolish sort of came which two can play at. The present Government of Canada is quite as Protectionist in spirit as our own, and would not leesitate to make reprisals should a tariff warfare like this be begun. In the close geographical relations of the United States and Canada perfect commercial freedom is the only sensible rule. In a tariff war both would be losers, but the great loss would inevitably fall upon the country with the largest commercial and manufacturing interests. The people who want a tariff conflict between the United States and Canada must have motives of interest that are hostile to the true interests of both countries.-Philadelphia Record.

amount of business is being done．We noticed not only busy packing rooms but a fair sprinkling of buyers．Travellers out on the road find no difficulty in the placing of special lines of woollens for early delivery and fall dating．The retailers，wo are told，have had a busy week since our last issue，not only in the city proper but in the outlying districts， sales 80 far this month being considerably in excess of last year．Remittances are still more or less complained about，yet one of the larger wholesalers told us that his cash re－ ceipts for the month of Nay wers quite equal to last years＇．Our enquires as regards domes－ tic manufactures confirm what we have pre－ dicted months ago that any chango in prices is upward．The advance in the cost of raw material，both wool and cotton，is the reasion why，now given．A very quiet demand for staple cottons is reported at New York． Bleached goods are still being booked for fall dellvery at 104 c by certain makors，and good orders are reported received．Brown sheet－ ings are very firm but quiet，three yards sheet－ ings being in moderato request at the advance noted yesterday．Colored cottons close the week without improving on the previous daya＇experience，only a hand－to－mouth in－ quiry being exparionced for ticks，deims， cottonadcs，sc．Corset jeans and satines are steady but quict，a fulr trade buing reported in white goods，crochet quilts and damasks． In the same city，print cloths are vory firm in price，with a moderate business reported． Quotations stand at 37e for 64x64R spot and near deliveries and at 37.160 for $56 \times 60 \mathrm{~g}$ ．At Fall River the business for the week ending May 18，was as follows：Production， 180,000 pieces；ealer， 184,000 pieces，and stock on band， 8,000 pieces－an increase in stock since last weckly，returns of 1,000 pieces．The above falus comprised 37,000 pieces $64 \times 648$ ， and 147，000 pieces＂irregular counts．＂Sales at Providence for the week were 30,000 pieces， leaving the stock on hand in that market 56，－ 000 pieces．
