THE KING'S HEAD SHOULD BE ON EVERY DOLLAR.

The currency, or money of the country is that which passes current as a medium of exchange. We cannot conceive of a civilized country without a currency, and every nation of antiquity coined metals for use as money.

The bank, on the other hand, is quite a modern institution. The word itself is derived from the Italian word for "bench," the money changers occupying a bench in the market place. The money changer grew into the pawn broker, and the pawn broker into our present day banker. Today the bank is defined as "an institution for receiving and lending money."

In Canada the banks to some extent have assumed the governmental function of issuing currency; their notes are not legal tender, but they circulate freely, and as we shall see almost exclusively.

Years ago this was a poor country. with little or no money in circulation, it was perhaps necessary then to permit the banks to issue currency. Today the country is rich enough to is-






