

No piling will be placed alongside the outer 1200 foot section of the pipe, as it is believed that it will be in water sufficiently deep to prevent any damage occurring . The intake recommended by the engineer is about one thousand feet longer than that planned by the board of experts.

It is generally a choice between a lot of medio-crities and a lot of objectionables, with the result that some man is put into office thru the manipulations of party machines and not at all according to the popular wish One thing should be very clearly understood about the Cambridge charter. It is absolutely on square. We have nothing to do with politicians, machines or any private nterests. Cambridge has no room for bosses, caucuses or machines. We believe in the people, and we want them to have full power in directing their affairs. Under this charter the people will be in control



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by nis father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-smpt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must roside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
