GERMANY DOESN'T LIKE TALK OF DISARMAMENT

But Has Been Waiting for Months to Send Delegates to Peace Conference.

Berlin, Jan. 9.—The German government was ready months ago to send delegates to the second peace conference at The Hague, but no hint came from St. Petersburg regarding its date. As Germany has never taken the initiative in peace conference matters there is a feeling that if an enquiry is to be made of Emperor Nicholas concerning the probable date of the meeting it ought to come from some other government, the United States, for instance, which made the first move in this matter, or Great Britain, whose premier takes a deep interest in the conference.

AN ENGINEER'S HEROISM.

Driven From Locomotive by Explosion, Riska Life to Stop Train. Boone, Iowa, Jan. 9.—After running for several miles at high speed with an engine out of control, by the blowing out of a "stud" in its boiler, the Chicago and Northwestern fast mail train No. 10 was barely saved from destruction near here last night by the heroism of Engineer Louis Shull, who was driven from his cab by the scalding vapors and boiling waters. Realizing that he could not reach the throttle, he climbed over the tender to the express car and hammered on the door. The express messenger, fearing robbers, refused his advance, but the engineer, who had already opened the door, he aimed two revolvers at Shull's head. The engineer, bleeding and exhausted, dragged himself into the car and with his remaining strength pulled the rope connecting the air brakes, stopping the train.

STATUE TO THE POPE.

20 Feet High and Erected at Cost of \$12,000 by Cardinals. Rome, Jan. 9.—In the presence of Tadolin, the sculptor, the statue of the late Pope Leo XIII., which is 20 feet high, to-day was raised above the door leading to the sacristy of the Church of St. John Lateran, to the left of the altar. It is expected that the monument, which will cost \$12,000, will be paid for among the cardinals created by Pope Leo, who were alive when the late pontiff died.

WAS ONCE A QUEEN.

Death of the Widow of King George V. of Hanover. Gmunden, Upper Austria, Jan. 9.—The Princess Mary of Saxe-Altenburg, former queen of Hanover, who has been suffering for some time past from lung trouble, died at 10 o'clock this morning, which was performed Jan. 6, died to-day. She was the widow of King George V. of Hanover, who was dethroned in 1866, when the kingdom was annexed by Prussia because the Hanoverians took the Austrian side in the war with Prussia.
