MANITOBA REMEDIAL BILL

Will Be Brought Down on Monday or Tuesday Next.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE GIVES NOTICE

The Only Reliable Forecast of the Much-Talked-of and Long-Delayed Measure Was That Printed in the World—What the Provisions of the Proposed Bill Are—No Semblance of Coercion—The Law, When in Force, Will Not Disturb Materially the Existing State of Affairs as Regards Education in Manitoba—The Practical Provisions—How the Vote Sized Up.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—In the Senate this afternoon, Sir Mackenzie Bowell introduced the Remedial Bill which would be brought down either on Monday or Tuesday of next week, and to-night Mr. Dickey, in his capacity as Minister of Justice, gives notice of the measure which is to be introduced, "The Remedial Act (Manitoba)."

There have been many attempts to forecast the scope of the measure, but the only reliable one which has hitherto appeared is that published in the World at several days ago. Your correspondent is now in a position to indicate to a somewhat fuller degree the nature of the proposed bill which is soon to become law. In drafting the Privy Council has been careful to avoid anything calculated to stir up animosity on the part of the people, whether it partakes of a religious character or assumes the broader and higher ground of non-interference with provincial authority.

Forecast of the Bill.
Starting out with the recognition of the principle that the Catholics of Manitoba have a just grievance which any reasonably minded man, even although he may be the advocate of one common school system for Canada, must admit, and which should be remedied—the bill proposes to restore to the Catholics of Manitoba their educational rights by permitting them to establish separate schools. At the same time in no manner or form will the bill be found to encroach upon the cherished principle of provincial autonomy or contain any provision bearing the semblance of coercion. The measure assumes that the Provincial Government will accept the law once it is passed, hence an alternative course is not supplied. Should, however, the provincial authorities fail to give effect to the provisions of the bill, it is obvious that subsequent legislation will be required.

What it Means.
It is gratifying to learn that the law when it goes into effect is not likely to disturb in any material extent the existing state of affairs as regards education in Manitoba. West of the Red River, according to the statistics in the possession of the Government, not more than 10 or 12 Catholic schools exist, and no separate schools are to be created, and in no case will the boundaries of the school districts be co-terminous with those of public schools. To Winnipeg and St. Boniface and to a few scattered settlements on the east bank of the Red River, the measure will principally apply.

The measure will rectify in the preamble the reasons which have induced the Dominion Parliament to pass legislation of this character and will declare it expedient to do so. The title of the bill is, as already stated, "The Remedial Act (Manitoba)."

Provincial Authorities.
The provincial authorities are authorized to appoint a Catholic Board of Education for the province, consisting of not more than nine persons, who must be Roman Catholics, three of whom shall be annually elected by the people. This board will be charged with many duties, chief among which are the control and management of separate schools; the selection of text books; the issuing of teachers' certificates; but it is specifically enjoined on the board that the text books must be equal to those used in the public schools, and that the teachers themselves are not to be inferior in attainments to those who have passed through the provincial normal schools and are employed in the public schools.

A.S.S. Superintendent.
A superintendent of separate schools is to be appointed by the provincial authorities, who will have the general supervision and direction of the Catholic schools. Failing action on the part of the province, this superintendent will be appointed by the Dominion.

Separate School Districts.
Separate school districts may be created on the petition of ten heads of families who are Catholics and who pledge themselves to a certain amount of financial support to the school each year. Where a municipality fails to organize a Catholic school district, power will devolve on the Board of Education.

In the event of the Municipal Council failing to collect the separate school taxes, power is given to the Catholic Board of Education.
Taxation Not Compulsory.
No Roman Catholic will be taxed for the support of a separate school if he objects to the taxation, and if he desires his taxes to go to the public schools, but his responsibility to pay Catholic school taxes will remain until the day of declaration of his desire to support the public schools.

In cases where Roman Catholics predominate in any school district and Protestant children have to attend these schools, provision is made for due regard to the wishes of parents in the matter of allowing those children to remain away from Catholic religious exercises.
Inspectors of separate schools may be appointed, and in the event of any school district, the provincial grant may be withdrawn.
There is no provision in the bill for striking provincial grants taken for granted that a provincial grant will be made to the Catholic schools as to the other schools.

The Bill Will Pass.
The people of Ontario may well make up their minds sooner or later that the Dominion Parliament will carry in the House of Commons a bill, majority ranging between 20 and 30, which will give effect to the bill. The Government majority in a full House is 44, possibly 30 or 31.

The Verral conspiracy case came up again in yesterday's Police Court and, after some 20 adjournments the Crown was ready to go on, but it was arranged that the case should stand for a week.

On the report of Dr. Richardson, Mary O'Parrell, the old lady who was arrested on the charge of stealing from Sutcliffe's, was discharged.

Another charge of breach of the H. O. Act was proved against Joseph Maroney, and he will be sentenced on Monday.

On a similar charge, Alice Dale was fined \$20 and costs.

The Magistrate believed the story of Bertender Bates, who was charged with the murder of William Porter at the Black Bull Hotel, and ordered him to go on suspended sentence.

Thomas Nebery was fined a horse, Thomas Albert McGill and John Thackray were each sentenced to the central jail for months for theft of two sheets from McCallie Penill, 82 Elm-street.

Harold Marks, charged with stealing copper from Booth and Son, was remanded till Tuesday.

NEWS FROM A SISTER CITY

ERECITION OF THE FORESTERS' TEMPLE IS ENDORSED

By the Order in Hamilton After the Supreme Chief Forester's Personal Exhortation.

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 7.—Dr. Oronhyatecha, Supreme Chief Forester of the Independent Order of Foresters, addressed a largely attended meeting of Foresters in the city last night, his object being to pour oil upon the troubled waters, and the brilliant eloquence of the Supreme Chief was not expended idly, for before his left a resolution of thanks was passed to him.

He justified his course in the management of the Order, and in reference to the purchase of the Foresters' temple in Toronto, he said it was in the interest of the Order that suitable quarters should be built.

His estimate of the building was \$35,000, but the Supreme Court had searched for it at \$25,000. The property was purchased in the name of the Chief Forester's private secretary, and had been given to the Order for 20 years.

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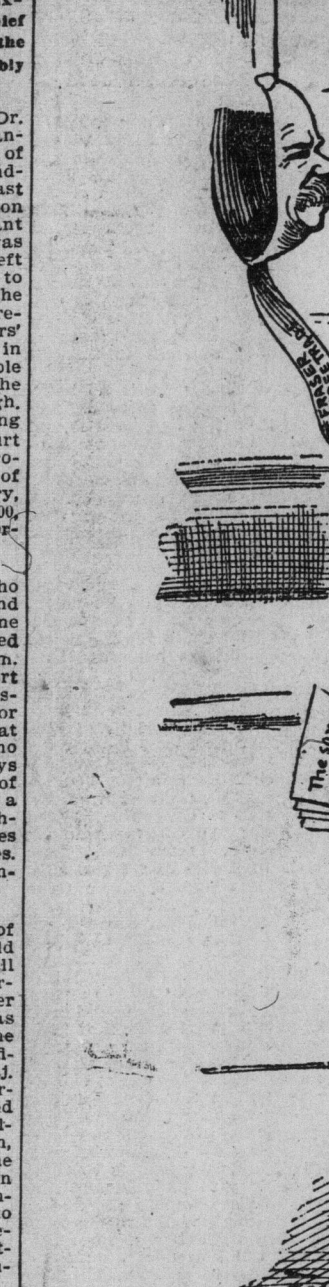

REFUTES THE CHARGE.

Mr. Charles Tupper Did Not Ask Support From Any Priest or Clergyman in Cape Breton.

Halifax, N.S., Feb. 7.—In reply to the charge that his election in Cape Breton was secured by Roman Catholic clerical influence, in his remarks in reply to the Antigonish address, Sir Charles Tupper said that he had never asked for assistance from any priest or clergyman of Cape Breton open and above board, without striking below the belt.

James Rush Ritter, a wealthy Philadelphian, died at the Kensington Hotel on Thursday evening under somewhat peculiar circumstances.

On Monday morning he arrived at the hotel with his valet, a young man named R. P. Wright, and registered as A. H. James of Boston. He took rooms for himself and his companion, but did not take his meals at the hotel.

On Wednesday night he complained of feeling unwell, and said he had pain in his head, but would not allow his valet to call a physician. On Thursday morning he instructed Wright to telephone for his physician in Philadelphia.

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MYSTERIOUS DEATH.

WARDNER JAMES HEALEY WILL EVIDENTLY ATTEMPT TO SHOW THAT HE HAD TO KILL JOHN CORRIGAN.

Self-defence will evidently be the plea of James Healey, who is charged with murdering John Corrigan on Wednesday night. From the evidence already taken at the inquest it is apparent the defence will try to prove that Corrigan, armed with a revolver, forcibly entered Healey's apartments.

At the adjourned inquest last night Healey testified that he was in his room for police while he was on his beat, and on going to the house in which the tragedy occurred, he found Healey with a revolver in his possession. He summoned Policeman Allison, who arrested Healey, and succeeded in taking the revolver from him. Mr. Healey, Healey's lawyer, submitted Oler to a rather severe cross-examination.

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GRAND TRUNK SHAKE UP.

MR. W. WAINWRIGHT'S POSITION HAS BEEN ABOLISHED.

But This Well-Known Official Has Been Provided for if He Desires to Remain in the Service of the Company—Mr. Wainwright's Position Has Been Abolished.

Montreal, Feb. 7.—The Grand Trunk Railway will soon be turned upside down. The position of assistant general manager, so long occupied by Mr. William Wainwright, has been abolished.

The friends of that popular official will be glad to hear, however, that he has been invited by Mr. Hays, the general manager, to continue in the service of the company for as long as he so faithfully served. The official notice states that Mr. Wainwright's future position will soon be defined, and consequently the future of the new general manager, who since in New York in connection with the Freight Lines Association, it is quite likely that Mr. Hays realizes that if any legislation were required in the interests of the Grand Trunk, either in Quebec or Ottawa, Mr. Wainwright would be determined to do anything like as good service as Mr. Wainwright, although the statement may not be deemed to be a very happy one.

Mr. Wainwright, mechanical superintendent will soon retire, as well as Mr. Wainwright, who has been connected with Mr. Wainwright's office.

This morning Mr. Hays and Mr. McGowan, president of the Grand Trunk, private car vicerey, for a tour of inspection up west, and will probably go as far as Detroit. Mr. Hays took the coal tenders with him, and will wire back his decision to-night or tomorrow.

Later—"All bids rejected," was the dispatch sent back by General Manager Hays this evening to the coal owners, and consequently the bids left in droves to their respective homes by the night trains. It is, of course, not known when the Grand Trunk coal matter will be again taken up, but it is surmised that Mr. Hays was under the impression that he had made a combine in the way of prices.

Montreal Politics.
There was a public demonstration to-day at the St. Lawrence Hall, when arrangements were made for a demonstration to-morrow evening at the Windsor Hotel. Mr. Hays took Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. George A. Drummond, and Mr. Laurier.

Mr. Laurier has written a letter to Mr. Paquet, expressing regret that Mr. Laurier could not have so vigorously attacked the clergy following the election in Charlevoix.

Recommendations from the Canadian Press Association.
The Canadian Press Association concluded its session in the city yesterday afternoon.

Mr. R. Holmes, Clinton, was elected secretary, and the list of officers for the ensuing year was being completed.

An important discussion of the final session occurred over the abuse of fake sheets, a mail privilege, and the use of the word "editorial" in this connection.

The Canadian Press Association decided to recommend to the Government that every newspaper should be required to register, just as they are in Britain and the United States, and that a paper shall be entitled to register only if it is supplied with a license.

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I. O. F. THE EXECUTIVE SUSAINED LAST NIGHT

At the meeting and the Bill Read before the Dominion Parliament was approved of by a vote of 10 to 1.

Last night-Shakespeare Hall parlor was filled with an audience of representatives. Foresters, called together by those opposed to the passing of the bill now before the Dominion Parliament.

After a prolonged pause, Bro. G.G.S. Lindsey, Solicitor for Bro. Simpson, who has entered an action against the Executive, took the floor.

His charges, in brief, were: Lack of economy in the management of the Order; the large and as yet unliquidated expenses incurred in opening up new territory in the United States and Great Britain.

Dealing with the diversion of the interest of the Reserve fund to management expenses, he said that possession was given by the Supreme Court at its meeting in Chicago in 1893, and this consent was reaffirmed by the session of the Executive in London, August, 1895.

Before taking a seat Dr. Oronhyatka asked if Bro. Lindsey, who took the floor, was the same executive in undertaking to build a Foresters' Headquarters, was of the same opinion as when last spring he had been giving the same explanation to the Executive.

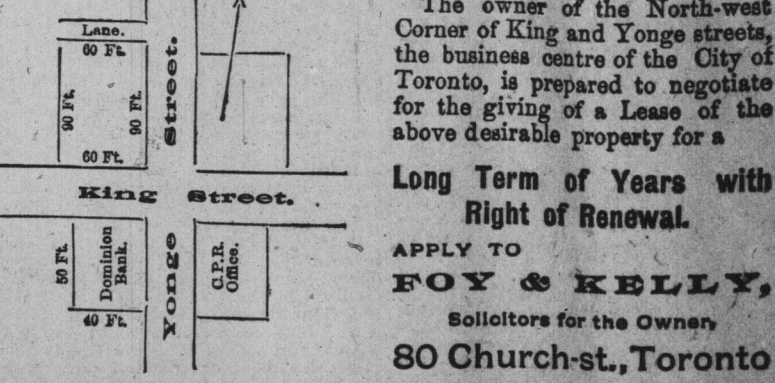

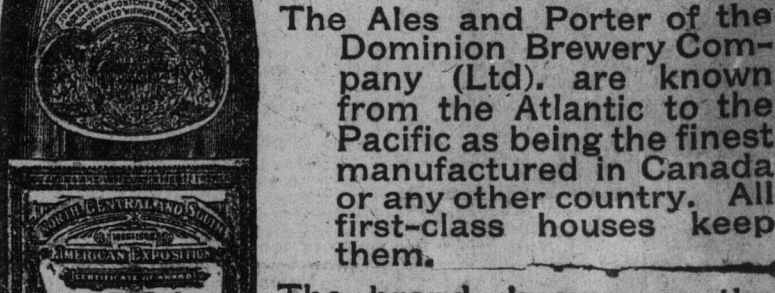

COUNTY COUNCIL CONCLUDING

The County Assessed for \$20,000,000. The Assessed Valuation. At yesterday morning's session of the County Council, Mr. Evans made a statement that the county was compelled to pay only one-fifth of the original \$40,000,000 appropriated for the new County House of Commons.

The following High School grants were made: Weston \$385.28, Markham \$538.38, Richmond Hill, Aurora and Newmarket \$350.00, etc.

The auditors report showed the liabilities of the county to be \$52,468.03, and the assets \$23,473.00.

The Equalization Committee reported in the afternoon that there was a decrease in the assessed valuation, as compared with last year, of \$704,000 in the townships and of \$231,805 in the towns and villages.

The standing committee of the county property recommended that the lessors of tollgate No. 1, Kingston-road, be relieved of the gates.
