"Sappers" Are Engineers.

Brief History of the Oldest Regular Arm of the British Service.

Duties are Many and Various.

Royal Engineers are Everywhere in the Modern Battlefield.

Now that the formation of an Engineer Corps at Universities has become a matter of more than mere words, it may prove of some interest to those intending to join the corps to read the following brief description of the duties of the corps, their formation, duty and work. The Royal Engineers claim to be the oldest regular arm of the British service. Raised in the middle ages, they were for long the only permanent troops in the King's service, and their duties consisted in building new fortresses, improving existing ones and planning their destruction if necessary—when built, together with road making and assistance in sieges.

Ordnance Corps.

With the introduction of gunpowder, however, came a great change, and in the earlier days of artillery the "Ordnance Corps" as the engineers were then called, performed as well as their ordinary duties, those of the artillery engineer, the repairer of guns, and the maker of gunpowder. Not until early in the last century was any distinction made between these two branches, and towards the end of that century we first find the artillery existing as a separate unit.

Royal Engineers.

About the same time the name of "Royal Engineers" was adopted, to last to the present day. At present the corps consists of about 10,000 officers and 7000 of other ranks; the proportion of officers, it being noticed, is unusually large. The regimental establishment is as follows: (1) Field troops, which are subdivided into (a) a bridging battalion, (b) a telegraph battalion, (c) several field companies, (d) a mounted detachment to accompany a cavalry division, (e) a balloon company, (f) a field depot, (g) a railway battalion, (h) several sapper companies, (i) several survey companies, (j) a training company at Chatham, (k) the Indian corps, (l) the submarine mining battalion. To attempt to describe the work of each in detail would, it fear, take too much space, so I must confine myself to a very brief and general description.

Their Many Duties.

If I say that their duties consist in everything, from being chief adviser to the general officer in command of an army corps, to being a sapper, I shall not be far wrong. Each of the various duties requires special training and equipment. When an army is in the field there are roads to be prepared to allow of the passage of artillery and of the transport wagons; bridges to be replaced if destroyed; telegraphs constructed to allow communication between the main body and its advanced and rear guards, and its headquarters; and the abandonment of ground to be surveyed, defensive works of various types, with their communications and obstacles to check the enemy erected; perhaps even railways to be constructed in the most important campaign in the Sudan, these and many other duties fall to the lot of an engineer.

REV. DR. MILLIGAN ON JOB.

Old St. Andrew's Popular Pastor Preaches a Vigorous Discourse. The large attendance which each Sabbath evening overtaxes the seating capacity of Old St. Andrew's is an indication of the intelligence of the adherents of that church. Rev. Dr. Milligan, in a much greater degree than the average preacher, understands human life and the practical application of Scripture truths to it, and he always gives his people strong food fit for grown-up thinking men and women. In his Sunday night discourses the doctor is at present taking up the Book of Job. Basing his remarks last evening on the third chapter of that work, he sought to show the futility of the materialistic view of man's existence. Suffering, he held, did not always come to man as a punishment for sin, but on the contrary pain was frequently sent as a divine instruction. In the eyes of Job's contemporaries worldly prosperity and success constituted a proof of a man's righteousness and God's favor. Job, he struck, dashed state of mind, lifted up his voice and cried out that the day of his birth might be accused if fate or the force of circumstances, and not right, were the controlling power in the universe. Dr. Milligan spoke of the privileges of the Christian life, and of the advantages of the spiritual rather than the materialistic significance of life.

U. S. Mail Service to Valdes.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 20.—Advices from Dawson report that United States mail Carrier Holcomb has arrived at Eagle from Valdes, completing the first winter trip as carrier of Government mail from the seat of the Yukon, a distance of 430 miles. Holcomb said he
