Prospects for a Big Crop Were Never Better and Increased Accrue.

Topoka, Kan., March 27.—Reports from the Kansas farmers indicate that when the farmers harvest this year's winter wheat crop that the state will have one of the largest crops on record.

Reports from twenty-five of the thirty "million bushel" counties in the great wheat belt show that the crop came through a most favorable winter in excellent condition, and the ground is in good condition, and there is plenty of moisture; that the prospects are favorable for a large yield.

The reports from the twenty-five counties can be taken as indicative of the general condition of the wheat crop over the state. There are counties which did not get in the "million bushel" class in the record-breaking harvest of 1901 when the thirty counties in the Kansas wheat belt produced 71,000,000 bushels, or 73 per cent of the total wheat yield of the state, which are likely to score a yield of seven figures this year, which will place them in the million bushel list.

To the record of the year's yield will be added the spring wheat, in 1902, but 46,282 acres were sown.

Of the most of the counties of the wheat belt the average sown in 1902 and as the hard winter caused about a million acres of the 6,254,747 to be plowed under in the spring of 1902, this year's acreage that will yield a harvest will be much greater than that of last year.

This season no fields are being plowed under and while the percentage of the crop is being plowed under is slightly more or less than the acreage sown in the fall of 1901 the acreage to be harvested this year will likely be at least 20 per cent greater than that of 1902.

SIR WILLIAM'S STATESMANSHIP. Editor World: Hon. Sir William Mulock in his longford oration of March 2, 1903, asked why should the farmer be loaded with a high tariff, "be obliged to pay a heavy price for his produce in order to pay much more than reasonable value for the articles which he has to buy?"

The first is, there should be no tariff on any imports that cannot be produced in the country. The minister of finance, however, is lacking in both industrial and financial wisdom. The second is, that as the tariff development of the country is in the hands of the people of the nation, wages should not be paid to the farmers to do what the government can do themselves, and just in proportion as either the farmers and others of the rural population are able to do these things, they should be able to do them.

Industrial History. The industrial history of Canada and the United States, Great Britain, Germany, France and other countries, is that the natural force of high tariff is to promote industrial development, and at the same time, to reduce the cost of manufactured goods to every citizen.

The tariff makes home manufacturing uncertain and precarious, and leads to higher prices to the consumer. Sir William Mulock's assertion that the Canadian manufacturers are robbers, that they rob the farmers and cause them "to tax upon an hour a day longer," is a poetic description to "cut their throats" and "take their lives."

It is only incidentally a Toronto affair, it is chiefly provincial, but to a large extent it is Dominion. The small federal grant that has been obtained is only an atom in the expenditure that has made a Dominion Exhibition in this city possible. It will be a national exhibition, of which the country may justly feel proud. It will confer immense practical benefits and from a commercial standpoint it will be an important national influence.

SOLD NEWSPAPERS ON SUNDAY.

Charles A. Campbell Appeals—Why Practice is Objectionable.

Before Judge Morgan yesterday, Charles A. Campbell, proprietor of the Grand Union Hotel, appealed to quash the conviction registered against him for selling newspapers to guests in his hotel on Sunday, Jan. 26, for which he was fined \$5 and costs.

Mr. Robinson appeared for Campbell and argued that under the Lord's Day Act it was not a crime to have sold the papers. Then, too, the indictment against him was in error, as he was charged with being both principal and accessory, whereas the papers had been sold by an employee of the hotel. Newspapers, it was argued, were a necessity to guests, and it behooved the hotel proprietors to see that their wants were supplied. Judgment was reserved.

It is something of a mystery to the general public as to just how the sanctity of the Lord's Day is violated by the sale of newspapers and stamps at hotels, either to guests or to anyone else. J. C. Coop, treasurer of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, was asked by The World where the objection could be found. He said:

"My chief objection is that if one party is allowed to sell, why not all? If this is allowed, why should not the bank be open from which to draw the money required to buy the stamps? I think that allowing these things to be sold is the thin end of the wedge and would eventually in the total disregard of the divinely ordered moral law, six days of that labor, I wish to go any further as I consider that argument to be quite sufficient."

Fined \$20 and Costs.—Before Magistrate Denison yesterday morning, eight of the young men who were arrested in Rea's billiard room early on Thursday morning were tried and convicted of frequenting a common gaming house. Important Clauses Not Given Out During Speech of Secretary Wyndham Wednesday.

ARRAERS IN RENT COLLECTABLE

Complex Features of the Measure Which Will Have to be Harmonized.

London, March 27.—The text of the Irish land purchase bill, which was introduced in the House of Commons by the Irish Secretary, Mr. Wyndham, Wednesday last, was given out today. It occupies thirty-nine pages of a parliamentary paper and bristles with technicalities. The full wording reveals many important features which were not mentioned in Mr. Wyndham's speech when the bill was introduced. All arrears of rent due at the time of the purchase of land are recoverable by the Land Commission and not the arrears for a year only, as previously cabled.

The Land Commission, however, are given power in special cases to remit part, or all, of the arrears. The Commission are not permitted to purchase estates which are not mainly agricultural or pastoral. Thus, Kilmory is exempt from the bill. In cases of untenanted estates purchased by the Commission, they are empowered to execute the necessary works of improvement, which tremendously enlarges the scope of the Commission's expenditure. The Commission is empowered to declare sub-tenants to be tenants of any holding occupied by them which will vary benefit hundreds.

Fishing, sporting and mineral rights, which are among the most controversial, will be vested in the Commission when an estate is purchased and can be disposed of as the Commission sees fit. The Commission are also empowered to determine boundary and other disputes between the proprietors of holdings under the bill. The Commission has the first claim to purchase bankrupt estates and to acquire tenants or use portions of them for the reclamation of evicted tenants. The latter point is regarded as being one of the most vital features of the bill.

SGT. MACMAHON INSTRUCTED HIM

How Soldier and Ambitions, No Better Non-Com, Ever Lived, Says He.

MacMahon was drill instructor for the 22nd at that time, and he put the embryo general thru the gait step in the awkward squad four hours daily in the morning and two at night. Mr. MacDonal was very quick to learn, and picked up his drill with such rapidity that he was in the first squad of recruits, and he was singled out from his fellows to instruct the last squad. He was one of the first "dismissed drill," and this awkward squad was his first "command." He exhibited a great desire to become the master of everything pertaining to his profession. His Scotch nature showed itself in his love for delving in books for treasures. He bought the Mutiny Act, the Queen's Regulations, and every new drill book as it came out. He quickly became the master of them. He was not a theoretical soldier only; he was practical, able to read between the lines, and "as good a drill as ever took a battalion." He was keenly ambitious. This was shown by his action in taking the commission instead of the Victoria Cross. He was not afraid of entering into competition with the nobility for military honors.

His Great Military Knowledge.

"He was a great man for argument," said the sergeant, picking up a large diary. "He would argue that that book was an ink pot, and prove it. He made you angry sometimes. He spoke with authority. He knew everything, and knew that he knew more than others."

Model Soldier When Young.

He was a plucky fellow and foremost in everything. His commission made him even more so. He would always give good advice to the recruits and caution them from vice. He would never gamble, but he played billiards for pleasure and was very fond of the game. He did not drink. He might take a glass of ale occasionally, but that was his limit.

Better Non-Com, Never Lived.

"He was a good non-commissioned officer," said MacMahon. "A sergeant kept his accounts as straight as the straight-edge. I don't know whether he spoiled him, but a non-commissioned man he never had a crime against him."

The following is a reminiscent sketch by Sergeant MacMahon, whom Dame Fortune passed over and gave to a company ordered to march on Kabul.

We were then stationed at All Khell, five days' first days' from Kabul City. Our first day's march was to Caratag, where we reached the night.

"The general was in the front of a hill running parallel to the road, and at once saw that the party had been attacked by the enemy. He immediately ordered the 100 Afghans, who had waited in any bush. He at once formed his company into fighting order, and, leading them, beat the enemy off, thus being instru-

Personal Reminiscences.

"The late General Hector MacDonal joined the service companies of the 22nd Highlanders, then stationed at Jullundur, Punjab, East India, in December, 1871. When dismissed 'recruits' drill he was appointed lance-corporal, and in two years was promoted to sergeant. Previous to the Afghan war he was made color-sergeant of No. 3 Company, under Captain S. White, now General George Stewart White, famous as the defender of Ladysmith.
