Altho the Unionists did not expect to oust Mr. Churchill from that generally regarded safe seat, their most sanguine prediction being that Sir George Baxter, their candidate, had "a good sporting chance," still they have the satis-faction of rising from fourth to second place in the pool as compared with 1906, and of reducing the Liberal majority from 5411 to 2709.

An advertiser must realize that there is a vast difference between musing people and comvincing them. It does not pay to be "smart" at the line rate of the average first-class daily. I suppose that I could draw the attention of everybody on the street by painting half of my face red and donning a suit of motley. I might have a sincere purpose in wishing to attract the crowd, but I would be deluding myself if I mistook the nature of their attention.

The new advertiser is especially prone to misjudge between amusing and convincing copy. A humorous picture may catch the eyes of every reader, but it won't pay as well as an illustration of some piece of merchandise which will strike the eye of every buyer! Merchants secure varying results from the same advertising space. The publisher delivers to each the same quality of readers, but the advertiser who plants flippancy in the minds of the community won't attain the benefit that is secured by the merchant who imprints clinching arguments there.

Always remember that the advertising sections of newspapers are no different than farming lands. And it is as preposterous to hold the publisher responsible for the outcome of unintelligent copy as it would be unjust to blame the soil for bad seed and poor culture. Every advertiser gets exactly the same number of readers from a publisher and the same readers-after that it's up to him-the results fluctuate in accordance with the intelligence and the pulling power of the copy which is



Presbyterian Synod in British Columbia Wouldn't Accept Too Stringent Resolution.

VANCOUVER, May 9 .- (Special.)-A resolution aimed at the authorities responsible for the administration of justice in British Columbia, charging them with maladministration in terms so strong that the resolution had to be withdrawn and a statement by Rev. J Y. Rochester of Winnipeg, that British Columbia was the only province in the Dominion that was not enforcing the Lord's Day Act, were features of the Presbyterian Synod to-day.

"Your attorney-general's responsibility does not amount to the power to veto, as seems to be the position at present," said Mr. Rochester. "The act merely gives him power to withhold his consent to certain prosecutions,

and then only when there is cause. "British Columbia was," he added, "the only province which permitted the printing and sale of Sunday newspa-pers." It was pointed out by several delegates that the fault lay largely with the church and people, and that during the whole of last session there had been whole of last session there had been no deputation or formal request made to the local government or the legislature for the enforcement of the act.

"There is no justification whatever for its non-enforcement," said Rev.




