HORSELESS SUNDAY IN LONDON

For Eight Hours an Experiment Will Be Tried.

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 8.-An experimental horseless Sunday is about to be tried in London, and for eight hours all horse-drawn vehicles will be excluded from the area in the

Westminster district, their places being taken by auto cabs and buses. The cost of diverting horse traffic and providing automobiles to give free transit for those who otherwise would cross the area in horse-drawn vehicles is estimated at about one thousand pounds, which sum is being rais-





PUBLIC POWER NEAR. Nothing more important can be menmoned at present in connection with the hydro-electric power situation as far as the interests of the city are concerned, than the near approach of the delivery of city power. Electric power has been talked about so long that the catizens need not be blamed for failing to realize that it is almost at their doors. Construction is going on at a very rapid rate, and in four months the power will be ready for distribution. Naturally the Toronto Electric Light Co. is taking every precaution that, business prudence dictates in the face of such competition. That the company did not accept a fair offer of expropriation should not be allowed to cloud the issues that remain. The city quite properly refused to be held up to exorbitant charges on the one hand, or inreasonable terms on the other. Now that this stage of negotiation has, been passed, and even before it, the Toronto Electric Light Co. is straining every nerve to secure customers on long term contracts. Every one of these means greater difficulty for the city in establishing its plant and service. But the company has done more and in a number of instances has insisted on the installation of forms of motors which would effectively prevent the use of city power when it comes along, without the additional expense of a new motor.

No fault can be found with the company for pursuing its own interests, unless, as has been reported, these installations and contracts have been secured by misrepresentation. Citizens who use or intend to use electric power would do well to acquaint them: selves with the conditions and terms offered by the city, before committing passengers are numerous and profitthemselves to irremediable engagements elsewhere.
