VISITING MAYORS IN ST. JOHN TODAY

Distinguished Party Seeing the City, the Harbor and the River Under Guidance of Civic Committee--They Will Proceed to Halifax Tonight.

Mayor Sears and members of the commission council are today entertaining the representatives to the sixth annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities, which opens at Halifax tomorrow.

The distinguished visitors arrived in the city on the Atlantic express this morning from Montreal. They were met at the depot by the mayor and Ald. Lockhart, who escorted them to a special street car provided for their use, by which they were taken to the Dufferin Hotel, where they partook of lunch.

There were not as many in the party as had been expected, some of the delegates finding it impossible to come on this morning's train, and they will probably go direct to Halifax. Those arriving this morning are--

SHORTAGE CLOSE TO \$1,000,000. President and Cashier Made Midnight Trips to the Bank--Attacked From Pupils.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12--State Bank Examiner C. C. Jones today completed his inspection of the affairs of the defunct Milwaukee Avenue State Bank. The examiner was reticent concerning the exact results of his investigations, but intimated that the total shortage discovered is between \$800,000 and \$1,000,000.

SHIPPY today examined more than a dozen of the bank's employees. The bookkeeper was positive that President Stensland's wife was cognizant of the shaky condition of the bank before July 14, the date on which young Stensland says his first suspected irregularities on the part of the president occurred.

NO TROUBLE OVER SEALERS. Japan Will Rely on the Justice of the United States.

LONDON, Aug. 12--The Daily Telegraph's Tokyo correspondent says that, despite alarmist reports, there is no danger of the killing of Japanese seal poachers on St. Paul's Island, Alaska, assumed to be of international gravity. The American ambassador at Tokyo, the correspondent adds, assured Japan that his government will investigate the matter carefully and equitably and said he hoped that Japan would not allow the cordial relations existing between the two countries to be interfered with by so trivial an affair.

SALAY HAS BEEN ADMITTED TO BAIL. The case against Elia Salay, charged with attempting criminal assault on Mrs. Michael Shannon, of Erin street, on the night of August 8th, was resumed in the police court at 11 o'clock this morning and was further postponed until next Friday morning.

THE PRISONER, who appears to be anything but strong, was admitted to bail. He looked pale and wan as he took his seat on the prisoner's bench, his thick black hair forming a striking contrast to his pallid features.

Judge Ritchie remarked that the young man appeared to be ill, and asked him if he was sick. The prisoner answered in the affirmative. "What is the matter with you?" queried his honor. "I don't know," was the reply.

In answer to a question regarding a physician, the young man said he didn't want to see a doctor. His honor remarked that the prisoner looked unwell, but whether from being in jail or not he could not say.

MAN WITH REVOLVER CREATING A PANIC AT CONEY ISLAND

He Shot at Random and Several Persons May Die--- The Thousands Who at First Were Panic Stricken Pursued Him Clamoring That He be Lynched, But He Had Apparently Escaped.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13--While Oceanic Walk in the Bowerly at Coney Island, was still crowded early today, an unidentified man pulled a revolver and fired two shots into the back of a waiter at Snatch's restaurant and then turned the weapon quickly as he could pull the trigger. Four persons were wounded in agony on the board walk when the man fled toward the ocean, threatening any person who would pursue him. The injured, three of whom may die, are--

Thomas Fitzpatrick, 25 years old, of Brooklyn, shot in breast and side, may die. Thomas McDonald, 19 years, Newark, N. J. shot in back, may die. Annie Smith, 20 years, Williamsburg, shot in thigh and leg, serious.

SALVATION ARMY CHANGES. Many changes are to be made in Salvation Army circles, and already the following are to take effect on Thursday, 16th inst. Adjutant Carter is to go from Grace Bay to Halifax, Capt. Brown from Bermuda to Louisbourg, Capt. McGilvery from Bear River to Sydney Mines, Capt. Craw from Sarnough to Canning, N. S., Captain Mettle and McLintock from Sarnough to Bear River, Captains McLellan and Jones from Sarnough to St. Stephen, Lieut. Strachan from St. Stephen to Annapolis, Lieut. Gray from Canning to Sydney, Lieut. McKernan from Moncton to Canning.

Col. and Mrs. Sharpe, after being five and a half years in those provinces, have received orders for farewell here and to go to the upper provinces to take command, with headquarters at London, Ont. Col. and Mrs. Sharpe will conduct farewell meetings on Sunday and Monday, Aug. 20th and 21st.

METHODIST MINISTERS. On Archery at a Sunday School Picnic a Species of Gambling? The Methodist ministers met this morning in the parlors of Centenary church, Rev. Dr. Wilson presiding. After routine business had been discussed, there was an interesting discussion on games at Sunday school picnics. The majority of those present taking the view that certain pastimes, such as archery, should be abolished, as they had the appearance of gambling. Others thought that there was no harm in paying for the fun of shooting or the awarding of a prize.

THE PARTY WILL PUT A TICKET IN THE FIELD THIS FALL. BOSTON, Aug. 12--After several hours' debate, the annual conference of the Socialist Clubs of Massachusetts, in session here today, voted to recommend a slate ticket to the convention of the party to be held this fall.

HOLY GHOSTS ON THEIR TRAVELS. BOSTON, Aug. 12--The Barkentine Rebecca Crowell, the vessel of the Holy Ghost and U. S. Society of Shiloh, Me., which has been at anchor in the outer harbor for the past two days, sailed today for parts unknown. The utmost secrecy is being observed in connection with the departure of the vessel, and the exact destination has been maintained. As she did not have foreign clearing papers, it is presumed that her sailing will be coastwise.

REPORTED FOR FIGHTING. Brussels street was the scene of two fist encounters on Saturday evening last. The first occurred between 5 and 6 o'clock, when Jeremiah Kennedy and Matthew Garnett attempted to settle a grievance of a year's standing over some mason work. Explanations were useless and more vigorous measures were resorted to. The second fight was pulled off an hour later between two young men named McDonald and Warren Breen. The police did not see either fight but all have been reported at police headquarters.

THE TELEPHONE WAR. T. H. Estabrooks, president of the Central Telephone Co., and F. E. Blackhall of Campbellton, one of the directors of the company, who has been in the city for a few days, went to Moncton this morning.

The case of Tom Brady, Daniel Ombay, John Ombay and William Fairweather, who were reported for fighting on the corner of British and Germain streets at 11 o'clock yesterday, came up in the police court this morning. Ombay, Ombay and Fairweather were in court and pleaded not guilty. Brady was not present.

THE SON MAKES RESTITUTION. SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 13--(Special)--The remains of Horace D. Mayhew, who committed suicide at Mira yesterday, by cutting his throat with a razor, are to be interred at Sydney and not forwarded to England as was at first expected. The funeral takes place on Wednesday. In consequence of this sad tragedy, Mr. Mayhew's father, who is a well-to-do man, has withdrawn his interest in the Droughton Colliery, of which his son was manager, and unless some other capitalist is interested in the mine will be abandoned. The young man killed himself while temporarily insane.

ACCIDENT AT WESTFIELD. Carson Flood, the young son of G. Herbert Flood, of this city, met with a painful accident at Westfield this morning. He was in company with some other lads, playing with a revolver when it was accidentally discharged and the bullet struck through the hand of the young man. HERE'S A SENSATION. Stensland's wife was not driving last Friday night with two young ladies and was met by Edward Hogan, who conducts a livery stable on Waterloo street. Mr. Hogan unholstered the horse and left Stensland's wife and two young ladies sitting in the carriage.

POISONED BY ICE CREAM. TORONTO JUNCTION, Aug. 12--(Special)--Two children of George Holby are dead of poisonous poisoning, caused by ice cream. The children, Vera May, four years and Allison Charlbell, aged two years, ate ice cream on Friday night. The oldest died yesterday morning, and the younger last night. A number of doctors were called in, but no relief was obtained for the suffering infants.

IN RUSSIA. ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 13--The first session of the Duma, whose motto is "labor and liberty," was convoked today. Last night three policemen were murdered in St. Petersburg, one in Moscow and three in Kazan. Four constitutional democrats have been deflected by government supporters in the Zemtsov elections. The general situation is more favorable for the government.

ITALY MAY SEND US DESIRABLE SETTLERS

As a Result of Milan Exhibition Italian Government has Sent Special Officer to Report on Suitability of Canada for Settlers of Agricultural Class.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 13--(Special)--Reports from the Canadian Exhibition Commission at Milan are that the Canadian display is attracting a large measure of attention and is daily visited by considerable numbers of people, although the heavy attendance at the exhibition will not begin until the month of September.

One of the results of the exhibits has been to induce the emigration department of the Italian government to send a special officer to look over the display, interview the Canadian representatives, and report on the suitability of Canada as a residence for Italians of the agricultural class. The emigration official who made the enquiry, Mr. Droboski, spent some five months in Canada in 1901, going from the Atlantic to the Pacific. He spent several days in the Canadian pavilion and will, it is understood, report that the Canadian West is a highly desirable place of settlement for Italians of the farming class, whose circumstances compel them to emigrate.

Immigration work in Italy is forbidden to the officials of other countries, but the Italian government recognizes that a measure of emigration is an economic necessity and directs it as far as possible in the interests of the Italian. It has stopped emigration to Brazil, because of the conditions in that country, but it desires as free to go elsewhere. Northern Italians of the farming class are Italian going settlers, and have hitherto been coming almost entirely to Chile and Argentina.

FROM DOCTOR TO GENERAL. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 13--It is stated that the sultan passed a good night, and that his condition this morning is somewhat improved. His majesty's reluctance to submit to treatment has hitherto complicated the situation, but one of the palace doctors has induced him to allow the employment of a simple appliance which gave immediate relief. The doctor, in recognition of his services, has been promoted to the rank of general.

ONE MORE UNFORTUNATE. A rumor was current in the town this morning that a well-known teacher in the employ of the owner of a grocery store connected with the corner of Douglas avenue and Main street, had left town and gone to Boston, being responsible for the condition of a girl who is now at the Salvation Army Rescue Home on St. James street.

THE WRONG MAN. That the authorities sometimes light on the wrong man was demonstrated at the police court this morning when a man named Kennedy appeared to give evidence against a certain John Silver, whom the accused was using abusive language to him several days ago. Kennedy took his place in the witness stand, but when John Silver came up, Kennedy found he had the wrong John Silver before the court.

THE LABOR CAMPAIGN

The labor candidate in St. Mary's Division, Montreal, is in favor of restraining alien immigration, abolishing the senate, electing judges instead of appointing them, introducing state insurance, and making some other radical changes.

Discussing the entry of labor unions into politics the Montreal Witness welcomes the movement, but not because it expects to see the labor programme carried out.

The presence of many labor leaders in potential force in the British Parliament is rapidly bringing their movement to its bearings, and revealing to the unions what they may legitimately ask and what they seem, when looked at from only one side, to be altogether in the interests of the workingman, may not turn out to his benefit.

The warm wave has apparently passed, but there is still great need of rain in most parts of the province. The crops are suffering, and the pastures in great need of moisture.

The act of Mr. Lawrence Garey, who by his courage and coolness rescued two persons from imminent danger in the reversing falls, is worthy of public recognition.

The log of the river steamers would be almost as interesting as the log of the Ladbaw. But the river craft are said to have had a profitable season.

Another grand duke has narrowly escaped from the assassin. Life in Russia continues to be almost as exciting as at Coney Island.

EXPECTS HEAVY TRAFFIC

That the United States railways anticipate a very heavy traffic this fall as a result of the large crops and the general industrial and commercial activity is indicated by the following letter, which The New York News Bureau says has been addressed by an executive officer of an important railroad system to the heads of the various departments.

"After canvassing the prospective business situation most thoroughly, I am convinced that the business of our respective lines for the remainder of the year will average from 15 to 21 per cent. more than for the same period in 1905. This is the result of our rapidly improved ore, coal and iron traffic, improvements in the growing grain crops and the general business conditions. Hence, I suggest that every terminal yard interchange facilities, and that locomotives and cars controlled and owned by our respective roads be made available for handling and moving this vast traffic at the earliest possible moment, as I believe we will experience as great a congestion of traffic and shortage of equipment by Oct. 15 as ever before, this notwithstanding the largely increased equipment during the current year. This letter is written for the purpose of enabling you to understand prospective business conditions, and I hope nothing will be left undone to provide and care for the largely increased business that must of necessity be on us this fall."

BRITON SUICIDES

Halifax, Aug. 11.—Horace Dickson Mayhew committed suicide this morning at Mira (C. B.) while suffering from temporary mental aberration. The victim of the tragedy was aged thirty-two, unmarried and was a son of good families, of Broughton Hall, Lancashire England. The details of the tragedy as far as can be ascertained are as follows: Young Mayhew and James Hargenson, the manager of the mines at Broughton, were stopping for a few days at the house of Timothy Spencer, a few miles from the mouth of the Mira River. At 7 o'clock this morning Mr. Spencer was awakened by a noise and going into Mr. Mayhew's room, whence it emanated, found the unfortunate young man in bed with his neck and face covered with blood. A coroner's jury returned a verdict of suicide while temporarily insane. Young Mayhew had been suffering for some time from insomnia superinduced by rheumatic gout, and this is set down as the cause of his aberration. He was apparently in excellent health and spirits on Saturday. He was a young man of good looks and well liked by the employers of the Broughton colliery, where he represented the interests of his father, the president of the Cape Breton Coal, Iron & Railway Company, who is now in England. The body was brought to Sydney last night and will be kept until orders are received from England regarding its disposal.
