PRO REGE, LEGE, ET GIBERE.

His Majesty's packet Rinaldo, brought the January Mail in 28 days from Falmouth to Halifax, by which means we have been supplied with English advices to the 8th of said month. The agitated state of Continental Europe continues to be a subject of momentous and fearful interest.—The other topics of great excitement, are the trial, conviction, and condemnation, to perpetual imprisonment, of the Ex-Ministers of Charles X. Ignorance and folly almost incredible, seem to have marked their career, which in the opinion of some moralists, would in a certain degree acquit them of responsibility. Severe as the sentence is, we are glad that there has been no shedding of blood on the occasion, and that the appalling period has passed over without any violent explosion. The new king must have made painful sacrifices to adapt himself to the occasion; and it is distressing to think that France is in such a state as to require nearly 100,000 armed men to preserve the peace of its capital, and to render it necessary for the Sovereign to perambulate the city in the midnight hour, to appease by his personal supplications, the frenzied spirit of his subjects.—LAFAYETTE has resigned the command of the National Guards, being no doubt fearful of future evil, and anticipating any thing but a bed of roses in a kingdom which cannot but be regarded as still in a state of the most morbid political existence.
