## RECIPTS FOR DYING.

**†** All apparatus used in dyeing, such as kettles, pans, &c., should be perfectly clean and free from rust. All articles to be Dyed should be well scoured, and thoroughly cleansed from all dirt and grease.

All articles should be dipped into warm water before putting into any Dye. This precaution ensures the Dye equally, and prevents their becoming streaked.

Always use water sufficient to cover the goods well. —Soft water is to be preferred.

**SCARLET RED.**—Take soft water sufficient to cover the cloth or yarn you wish to color, bring it to a boiling heat in a copper kettle, then add one ounce and a half of cream of tartar for every pound of cloth; now boil a minute or two, and then add two ounces of powdered lac, and three ounces of madder compound (the lac and compound must be previously mixed in a glass or earthen bowl) boil five minutes; now wet the yarn in warm water and wring it and put it in the dye; boil the whole nearly an hour; take the cloth or yarn out, and rinse it in clean cold water.

**STOCKING YARN OR WOOL, TO COLOR.**—Between a Blue and Purple. For 5 lbs. Wool—Bichromate of Potash 1 ounce; Alum 2 ounces; dissolve them and bring the water to a boil, putting in the wool and boiling one hour; then throw away the dye and make another dye with Logwood Chips 1 lb. or extract of Logwood 2½ oz., and boil one hour. This also works very prettily on silk.

**N. B.**—Whenever you make a dye with Logwood Chips either boil the Chips ½ hour and pour off the dye, or tie up the Chips in a bag and boil with the wool or goods. To take 2½ ounces of the Extract in place of 1 lb. of the Chips, is less trouble, and generally the better plan. In the above recipe, the more Logwood that is used the darker will be the shade.

**SILVER DRAB.**—For 5 lbs. goods—Alum and Logwood of each half an ounce; boil well together, then dip the goods 1 hour; if not dark enough add, in equal quantities, Alder and Logwood to suit.

**GREEN.**—On Wool or Silk with Oxe Bark.—Make a strong Yellow Dye of Yellow Oak and Hickory Bark, in equal quantities, add Indigo Compound ¼ fluid ounce at a time, until you get the shade of color desired.

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**MADDER RED.**—Take one pound of madder for every two pounds of yarn, or cloth, soak the madder in a brass or copper kettle one night in warm water, enough to cover the yarn you wish to color; next morning put in two ounces of madder compound for every pound of madder you have soaked, then wet your yarn or cloth in clean water and wring it out; afterwards put it in the dye; now put the kettle on the fire and bring it slowly to a scalding heat, which will take half an hour; keep it at this heat about half an hour, if a light red is wanted, and longer if a dark one, the color depending upon the time it remains in the dye. When the color is made, rinse the cloth immediately in cold water, and it will then be finished.

**PINK.**—For 3 lbs. goods—Alum 3 ounces; boil and dip the goods 1 hour; then add to the Dye Cream Tartar 4 ounces; Cochineal, well pulverized, 1 oz.; boil well and dip the goods while boiling, until the color suits.

**LAC RED.**—For 5 lbs. goods—Argol 10 ounces; boil a few minutes; then mix fine Ground Lac 1 lb., with Muriate of Tin  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lb., and let them stand 2 or 3 hours; add half of the mixture to the Argol Dye, and dip  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour, then a 1d the balance and dip again 1 hour; keep the Dye at a boiling heat until the last  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour when the Dye may be cooled off.

**SCARLET WITH COCHINEAL.**—For Yarn or Cloth—For 1 lb. goods—Cream of Tartar, ounce; Cochineal, well pulverized,  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce; Muriate of Tin  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ounces; boil up the dye and enter the goods; work them briskly for ten or fifteen minutes, after which boil  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours, stirring the goods slowly while boiling; wash in clear water and dry in the shade.

**SLATE.**—On woollen or Cotton, with Beech Bark—Boil the bark in an iron kettle, skim out the chips after it has boiled sufficiently. If you wish it very dark, add more Copperas. This is excellent for stockings, and then add Copperas to set the Dye.

**WINE COLOR.**—For 5 lbs. goods—Camwood 2 lbs.; boil 15 minutes, and dip the goods  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour; boil again and dip  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour, then darken with Blue Vitriol  $1\frac{1}{2}$  ounces; if not dark enough add Copperas  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce.
