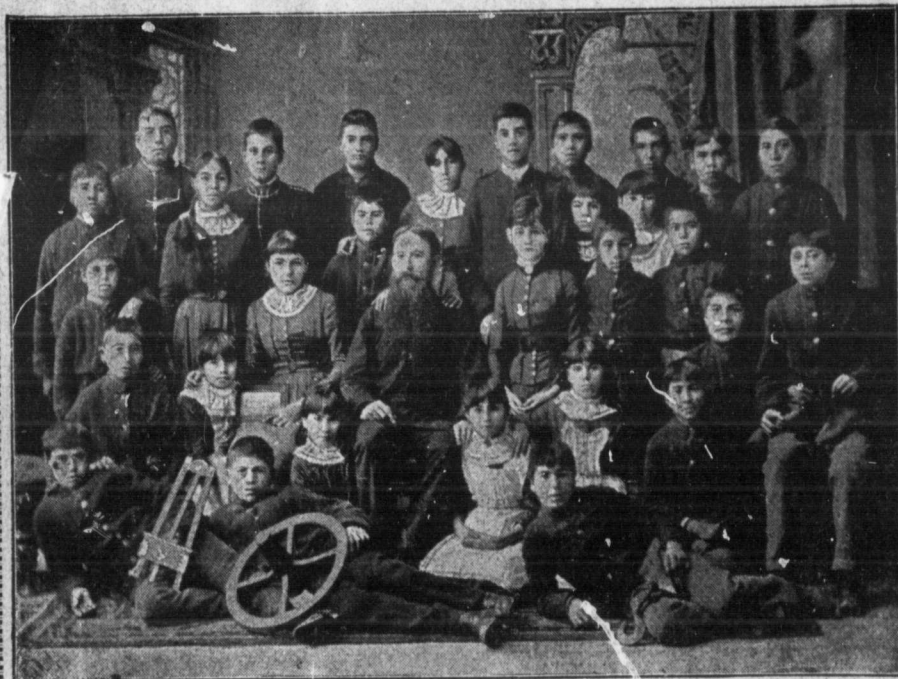

DATES TO REMEMBER.

JULY, 1871—Chief Little Pine, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to Toronto and other places, and addressed the white people, urging that a "Big Teaching Wigwam" might be built for the young Indians belonging to his tribe. This was the beginning of the Shingwauk Home.

SUMMER OF 1872—Chief Buhkwujjenene, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to England to plead the cause of his people. About £800 was collected, and with this sum the first Shingwauk Home was erected.

SEPTEMBER 22ND, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was opened; 15 pupils, boys and girls were present.

SEPTEMBER 28TH, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was burned to the ground, six days after the opening.

JULY 30TH, 1874.—The foundation stone of the new Shingwauk Home was laid by His Excellency, Lord Dufferin, Governor-General of Canada.

OCTOBER, 1874.—Our work was re-commenced with 18 Indian children, boys and girls, who, with their matron and teacher, occupied a frame building temporarily for the winter.

AUGUST 2ND, 1875.—The present Shingwauk Home was publicly opened by their Lordships Bishop Hellmuth and Bishop Fauquier.

AUGUST 19TH, 1879.—The Wawanosh Home was opened for use, with 15 Indian girls.

JULY 23RD, 1881.—The Marquis of Lorne and suite visited the Shingwauk Home.

AUGUST 29TH, 1883.—The Bishop Fauquier Memorial Chapel, in connection with the Indian Homes, was opened.

APRIL 15TH, 1885.—A talk with Chief Buhkwujjenene about the troubles going on in the North-west suggested the idea of establishing several Branch Homes.

AUGUST, 1885.—Mr. Wilson, accompanied by three Shingwauk boys, paid a visit to the North-west, going as far west as Regina.

AUGUST 6TH, 1889.—The Kasota and Washakada Homes, Elkhorn, publicly opened by the Lord Bishop of Rupert's Land.

OCTOBER, 1890.—The Sauketappi Home in course of erection at Medicine Hat, N. W.T.

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OUR INDIAN HOMES.

JUST at the close of this year, 1890, two days only before Christmas day, our good old friend, Chief Augustin Shingwauk, of Garden River, who in the year 1871, accompanied Mr. Wilson to Toronto and other places, and assisted in inaugurating this work among the Indian children, was called away to his rest. He was well on in years, having reached the advanced age of 90, and died trusting in that Saviour who, for nearly 50 years, he had been taught to love and follow. Our teachers and pupils wish to show their gratitude to the old Chief by erecting a monument to his memory, and with that object in view, a subscription list is at the present time making its rounds.

When, in the year 1871, the old Chief left his humble log cabin and, with only \$4 in his pocket, got on board the steamboat without saying anything to anyone, and arriving in Toronto, pleaded the ignorant condition of his people,

and appealed so earnestly that a "big teaching wigwam" might be erected in their midst, he probably little thought how extensive the work would become, even during the remainder of his own lifetime. Not only are there two substantial stone buildings, the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Homes, with accommodation for 100 pupils, in the near vicinity of the old Chief's home, but there are now two more Homes at Elkhorn, Manitoba, 200 miles west of Winnipeg; and also another Institution in course of erection at Medicine Hat, in the very far West; all of them under the one management, and with accommodation, when all is completed and in working order, for about 250 pupils. Thus has Almighty God in His good providence blessed and prospered this work, which began in so humble a way, and which has had from time to time so many difficulties to contend with.

The last year, as regards our Indian Homes, has been a somewhat eventful one. Early in the spring Mr. Wilson started off on a long tour through the Dioceses of Montreal, Quebec, Fredericton and Nova Scotia, accompanied by two little Indian boys from the Shingwauk—Soney and Zosie. This tour was subsequently extended, so as to embrace a short visit to England. The object was not so much to collect money, as to try and stir up some fresh interest in the work; and the results were fairly successful. Interviews were granted with the committees of the S.P.C., S.P.C.K., C.M.S. and C.C.C.S., while in England, and assistance in most cases promised; and in Canada, an effort was made to induce the B.D.F.M. to take up the Indian work as a specialty. This proposal, though not at first very warmly received, seems likely now, through the good offices of the Bishop of Algoma, to be taken up and acted upon; and we are looking forward to the establishment, before long, of an "Indian Auxiliary," with its local Indian committee in each Missionary Diocese, all working harmoniously together in connection with the B.D.F.M.

The visit to England, although confined to the short space of three weeks, was a busy one and a happy one—every day being taken up with meetings of various kinds, which had kindly been arranged for; and the tour through Canada was equally busy—every day being occupied, and the kindness extended to Mr. Wilson and his two little Indian boys will not soon be forgotten. Another important result of the tour was the inauguration, while in Ottawa, of the "Canadian Indian Research and Aid Society," with the Governor-General as Patron, Sir William Dawson as President, and the Lord Bishop of Ontario, Sir James Grant, Hon. G. W. Allan, and Rev. Professor Bryce as Vice-Presidents, and a goodly array of members.

"Our Forest Children," which was published monthly for 16 months, in the interest of the Homes, has now given place to the "CANADIAN INDIAN," an illustrated monthly journal of 32 pages, published under the Auspices of

the Canadian Indian Research and Aid Society. The journal has been well received, and is already attaining quite a large circulation.

THE ALGOMA HOMES.

The Government gave us \$2,500 in 1889, and \$2,500 in 1890, with which to extend our buildings and strengthen our work at Sault St. Marie; and with

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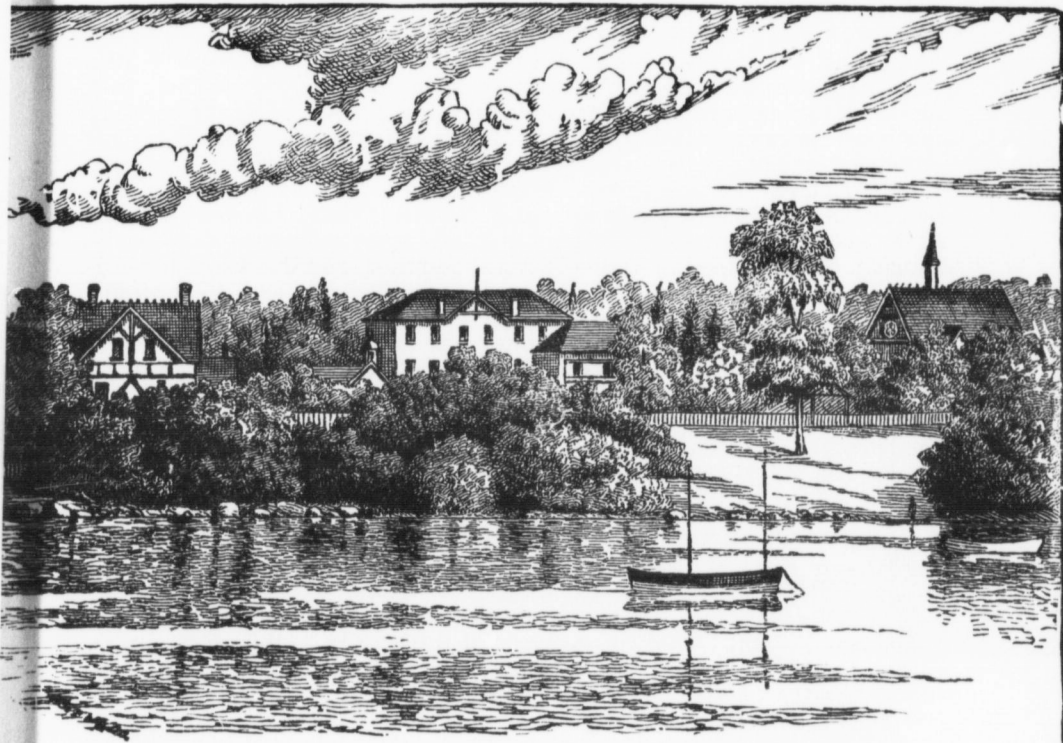
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SHINGWAUK HOME AND CHAPEL, FROM THE RIVER.

these liberal grants we have been enabled, during the past two years, to make a number of improvements—the Shingwauk Home has been enlarged, and has accommodation now for 74 boys; close beside it is the Hospital, with room for 5 or 6 patients; on the other side is the Chapel, built in 1882. The other buildings are the Industrial building, in which various trades are taught; the

factory, with steam engine and machinery, in which flooring, wainscoting, doors, window-sashes, &c., can be made; barns, stables, comfortable cottages for the foreman of the factory and the farmer &c.; also a large frame building called the "Hall," the lower part of which is to be a place for recreation and drill for the boys, and the upper part a large room for meetings, and it will probably be utilized in the summer as a school-room until another building can be provided for that purpose.

The Wawanosh Home has of late years become altogether too small for the purposes for which it is needed, having accommodation only for 26 girls, and being at the inconvenient distance of three miles from the other buildings.

Application has been made to the Government this spring for another building grant with which to erect a new Wawanosh Home in closer vicinity to the Shingwauk, and with accommodation for 50 girls. The trades taught during the past year have been carpentering, boot-making, weaving, tailoring and blacksmithing; five or six boys have been taught telegraphing, there being five instruments in operation at the Shingwauk Home, connecting the various buildings; and others have been instructed in farming and gardening. Currants and strawberries have been grown in the garden, sufficient to send to market, besides those required for home use; and milk has been disposed of in the same way at a profitable figure. A large order came from the Government for boots, to supply another Indian Institution, and that kept our shoemaker and his boys busy. Some very excellent cloth has been made on our hand-loom—far superior in texture and strength to anything we can buy at the stores, and with this our boys' winter uniforms have been made.

The boys who work at trades receive a small weekly allowance, varying from 20 cents up to \$1.25. Two-thirds of this always goes into their savings bank account, and the other third they can have, if they wish, in cash. Of the boys who completed their course, and left us this summer: Gilbert, a blacksmith, had \$71.11 in the savings bank; Riley, carpenter, \$42.54; and

Matthew, shoemaker, \$20.98. In each case a printed order for tools was given them, which they could make use of at any store they pleased, and so receive a good set of tools suitable for their trade, equal in value to the amount they had laid by. We are glad to report that our ex-pupil, John A. Maggrah, is making steady and satisfactory progress at St. John's College, Winnipeg, and we hope ere long he will become an earnest and successful missionary among his own people. David Osahgee is reported to be giving every satisfaction in his position as clerk in the Indian Department, Ottawa; he is receiving \$500 a year. Joseph Soney entered Trinity College school, Port Hope, in September last; he seems likely, if anything, to outshine David Osahgee in his success as a student, although in residence for only so short a time and knowing nothing of latin or mathematics when he went, his Christmas examination report gives him 100 per cent. for latin grammar, 98 per cent. for euclid, full marks for algebra, 88 per cent. for geography, and he receives honorable mention for general proficiency. Joseph will, we hope, at a future day occupy some position in which he can be of use to his people—indeed that is our wish as regards all our pupils, and it is gratifying to know that quite a missionary spirit has been stirred up lately among some of our elder boys at the Shingwauk. We try to impress on them that having received the benefits of Christian teaching and education themselves, they should now look upon it as their own work, under God's guidance, to carry the same blessings to their people.

OUR ELKHORN HOMES.

At the present time there are 45 pupils (boys and girls) at our Elkhorn Homes. We have had probably more difficulties to contend with in setting these Elkhorn Homes on foot than we ever had with the Shingwauk or Wawanosh Homes.

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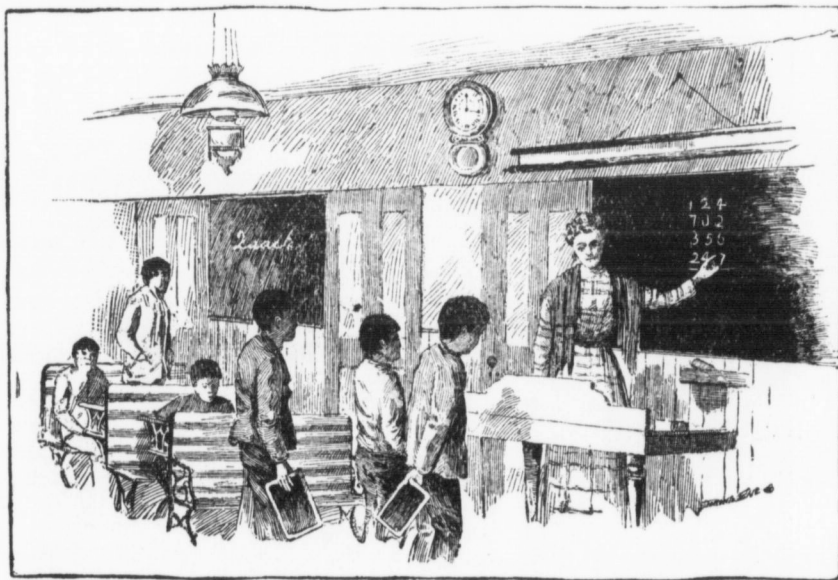


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When the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Homes were started the idea of taking and training the Indian children was comparatively a new one, and we had the field greatly to ourselves.

Within recent years the idea of training the Indian children has "taken hold," not only with our own church, but also with other denominations, and also with the Government, so that it is really no exaggeration to say that Homes for Indian children are, at the present time, springing up in every direction; some under Church of England Auspices, some under the Presbyterians, and some under the Methodists, and others supported entirely by the Government. We indeed rejoice at this, and can but regard it as one of the greatest and most important fruits of our long labors. Still it has made it a

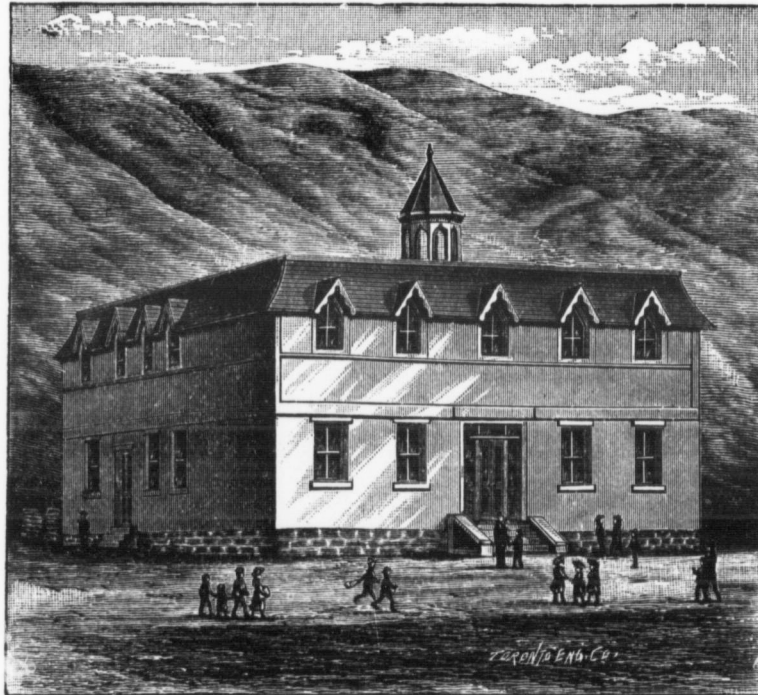


OUR ELKHORN SCHOOL-ROOM.

little hard for us at Elkhorn. When we started the Elkhorn Schools we thought it would be the only one in the district; but very soon the Rupert's Land School sprang up at Winnipeg, enlisting, naturally, the sympathy and support of all the Manitoba clergy; and a Presbyterian Institution has also been started 40 miles to the north of us, at Birtle. Were the Indians willing and anxious to send their children to us there would be comparatively little difficulty; but, as it is, it is generally the most difficult thing to persuade these heathen blanket Indians to give up their children to go to school; and when we have got them, there is no telling how soon the parents may come and take them away again. The result of this has been that hitherto our Elkhorn work (as compared with our Algoma Homes) has been of rather a fluctuating character, and it has also been over and above the Government grants, very poorly supported. At one time in the summer we were \$1,200 in debt; and at the present time are about \$700 behind. We are greatly indebted to the *Womens' Auxiliary*, Montreal, for having stood by us in our difficulties; without their help we could scarcely have kept the Homes open. Some of our friends have at times been a little inclined to find fault with us for receiving the children of Christian parents into our Algoma Homes; but we do not find them any more ready to help the Elkhorn Homes where the children are, for the most part, heathen when they come to us. Our best friends are those who just help us all they can, and believe that we are really trying to do a work for God as well as we can among these poor neglected Indians.

OUR WESTERN HOMES.

The accompanying cut will show to what extent our Western Homes have advanced. They are intended to be two in number—one is to be called the "Sauketappi Home," which is the name by which the Blackfeet Indians call themselves, and means "prairie people," and the other, perhaps, the "Sahamis Home," which is the Blackfeet name for Medicine Hat. The building we have already erected will cost \$4000 when completed. We have spent \$2000, which was all that we had on hand after paying for the land, and now want to raise \$1400 more, which, with a promised grant of \$500 from the S.P.C.K., and \$100 still in our treasury, will enable us to complete it. The Rev. J. Davenport, of St. John, N.B., very kindly promised us \$50 last

summer, if nineteen others would join, so as to make up \$1000 for the Medicine Hat Homes. This liberal offer, we regret to say, has not yet been responded to, and so the work is for the present at a stand-still. For the other Medicine Hat buildings we have strong hopes that the Government will make a liberal grant, and, when once the buildings are ready, we doubt not but that the Government will aid us in supporting the pupils. But, as with our other Homes, so with this new Home at Medicine Hat, we have to appeal to the Church in Canada, and to Christian friends in England to aid us in carrying on the work. We expect soon, if God will, to have three Homes for Indian boys and three Homes for Indian girls, covering a district of 1500 miles from east to west, all in active operation, and with an attendance of from 250 to 300 pupils. Is it too much to ask, that in view of this great work looming up before us, at least *fifty more Sunday Schools* will volunteer the support each of an Indian pupil at \$50 per annum? And to aid us in meeting the general expenses of this great work, and especially in providing clothing, we would appeal to the various branches of the *Women's Auxiliary* in Canada, and to *Ladies' Working Parties* in England. We trust also that this scheme for an "Indian Auxiliary" in connection with the B.D.F.M., may ere long be carried into effect, and that through that source an annual grant in aid may be received to assist us in carrying on the work.

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The only English Society at present contributing annually to our funds is the Col. C.C.S. That Society has most kindly kept up its assistance to the Shingwauk Home ever since the first inauguration of our work, and during the past year has made a further grant of £40 per annum to our Elkhorn Homes. The S.P.C.K. gave £50 to our chapel when building, and, as already noticed, has promised £100 to the Medicine Hat building, besides sending us a grant of books, maps, etc. The S.P.G. will, we hope, see its way to make an annual grant towards the support of our Homes, and the C.M.S. may help us indirectly by placing students, recommended by their missionaries, under our care to be educated.

There is doubtless a great work before us—a work which, with God's blessing, may become of unspeakable benefit to the future generations of our Indian population, as well as being indirectly a benefit to the country at large. We trust that the Canadian Church will see the matter in this light, and that our friends both in England and in Canada will do all they can to help us in carrying out our plans.

SUNDAY SCHOOL HELP.

We would just explain simply what this means. It means that a Sunday School undertakes to raise \$75 per annum (\$1.50 each Sunday) for the support of an Indian pupil in one of our Schools. This \$75 pays the actual cost of one child's board and clothing. The Government grant, which is only for a limited number of pupils, goes towards all the other expenses, such as salaries, fuel, repairs, etc. Our accounts for the last few years show that with the Government grant and Sunday School contributions together, our funds have been insufficient to maintain our work, so that, for the present, we do not see our way to alter our standard. To Sunday Schools unable to raise \$75, but willing to contribute \$50, we are prepared also to allot an Indian child for support, the \$50 paying for board, but not clothing. And to Sunday Schools unable to pay so much as this, we can give "half a child" at \$37.50 or \$25 per annum. To every Sunday School so supporting either the whole or the half of an Indian child in one of our Homes, we send a quarterly communication, giving the marks gained by the child at the last examination, report as to its progress, and when sufficiently advanced to do so, a letter from the child to its supporters. There are several Sunday Schools in the country that have been supporting Indian children in our Homes for the past eighteen years, and still do not tire of the good work.

Any Sunday Schools willing to help us in this way should communicate at once with Rev. E. F. Wilson, Shingwauk Home, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, stating what they are prepared to do, and whether it is a boy or girl, or a half boy or girl that they wish for. Others who want to help us and yet will not bind themselves to an annual contribution may do a good work by having a special collection for the new "Sauketappi Home" at Medicine Hat. We have a number of odd copies of "*Our Forest Children*" left which we will send free to any Sunday Schools disposed to assist in our work.

LEFT DURING THE YEAR.

1. *Albert Sahguy*, Ojibway, from Walpole Island, aged 19; a communicant; completed his course satisfactory at the Shingwauk Home; passed the High School entrance examination last July; at present at his home; will shortly teach an Indian school.

2. *William Riley*—aged 19, Ojibway, from Walpole Island; a communicant; completed his five years at Shingwauk; became a good carpenter; on leaving, received an "order for tools" for \$42.54, that being the amount of his earnings in our Savings Bank.

3. *Matthew Sampson*—aged 18, Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island; a communicant; completed his time at the Shingwauk; had become a good shoemaker; received "order for tools" for \$20.98, having that amount in the Savings Bank.

4. *Leslie Rodd*—aged 15, Ojibway, from Sarnia; had completed his five years at Shingwauk and learned a little boot-making, but was a slow boy, and made poor progress.

5. *Charles Naudee*—aged 16, Ojibway, from Walpole Island; a communicant; completed his five years at Shingwauk; showed no aptitude for a trade, so was employed on the farm.

6. *Charles Johnson*—aged 15, Ojibway, from Walpole Island; completed his five years at the Shingwauk; showed no aptitude for a trade, so was employed on the farm.

7. *Wilson Knaggs*—aged 15, Ojibway, from Walpole Island; completed his five years at the Shingwauk; showed no aptitude for a trade, so was employed on the farm.

8. *Frank Maggrah*—aged 15, Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island; brother of No. 48; a very ambitious boy, and made fair progress; was taught shoemaking, and took away with him "order for tools," for \$10; completed his five years at Shingwauk.

9. *Wesley Campau*—aged 12, obliged to leave on account of scrofulous sores and general ill-health.

10. *Alexander Assince*—aged 16, Ojibway; obliged to leave on account of sore eyes and ill-health.

11. *Caroline Waukay*—aged 17, Ojibway, from Cape Croker; a communicant; became consumptive last spring, and died at the Wawanosh Home, June 9th, 1890—buried in Shingwauk cemetery.

12. *Eliza J. Walker*—aged 17, Ojibway, of Parry Island; left on account of ill-health.

13. *Sarah Pearce*—aged 18, Mohawk; went out to service.

14. *Albert Naudee*—aged 15, Ojibway, from Walpole Island; completed his five years at the Shingwauk; learned a little shoe-making in his last year.

15. *William Maggrah*—aged 14, Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island; completed his five years at the Shingwauk, but made very poor progress, both at school and work.

16. *Paul Kahpenah*—aged 15, Ojibway, from Serpent River; a communicant; showed no aptitude for trade, so employed in general work; time up next spring, so will not return.

17. *Edward Waukay*—aged 11, Ojibway, of Cape Croker; brother of No. 11; died, of tuberculosis, June 3rd, within a few days of his sister, and buried in Shingwauk cemetery; both were orphans.

18. *Eva Esquiman*—aged 16, Ojibway; obliged to leave on account of ill-health.

19. *Philamine Sampson*—aged 17, Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island; was three years at Wawanosh; went out to service.

20. *Jamieson Adams*—aged 12, Ojibway, from Sarnia; ran away; caught, and brought back, and then sent home.

21. *Eli Adams*—aged 10, brother of 20; ran away, and sent home.

22. *Albert Kabayah*—aged 16; had nearly completed his time at Shingwauk; sent home on account of ill-health.

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23. *Isaac David*—aged 15, Ojibway ; a dull, heavy boy ; sent home for ill-conduct.

24. *Charles Gilbert*—aged 21, Ojibway, from Lac Seul ; a boy " who liked to work " ; completed his time at the Shingwauk ; became an excellent blacksmith, and understood driving an engine ; took away with him an " order for tools, for \$71.11 ; will probably get government employment at one of the Indian Agencies.

25. *Julia Kabayah*—aged 17, Ojibway, from Sarnia ; completed her time at Wawanosh, and returned home.

26. *Jane Sturgeon*—aged 14, Ojibway ; obliged to leave on account of scrofulous sores and general ill-health.

27. *Phoebe Kiyoshk*—aged 15, Ojibway ; obliged to leave on account of ill-health.

28. *Catherine Monague*—aged 18, Ojibway ; completed her time at Wawanosh, and went to her home.

29. *Nancy Petahnuhquud*—aged 19, Ojibway ; three years at Wawanosh ; went out to service.

30. *John Kahpenah*—aged 13, Ojibway, from Serpent River ; was dull at learning, and generally in poor health, so sent home.

31. *George Isaac*—aged 13 ; was a bad boy, and expelled.

32. *Asa Peters*—aged 10, Ojibway, from Walpole Island ; was only one year at the Shingwauk ; taken home and died, of tuberculosis, May 6th, 1890 ; buried in Shingwauk cemetery.

33. *Josephine Sampson*—aged 14, Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island ; became consumptive last spring, and died at the Wawanosh Home, May 23rd, 1890 ; buried in Shingwauk cemetery.

34. *Bella Naudee*—aged 11, Ojibway ; became very thin and delicate, so sent home.

35. *George Red-ears*—aged 11, Cree, from Moose Mountains ; was two years at the Elkhorn School ; went home sick in the fall, and has since died. Was supported by Trinity Sunday School, St John, N. B. (in addition to No. 70).

36. *Agnes Thomson*—aged 9, Assiniboine half-breed, from Indian Head ; was a dear little girl, much loved by her teacher, but her mother pined for her, and took her away in the summer.

37. *Archie Thomson*—aged 8—brother of the above, and taken away at the same time.

38. *Henry Travers*—aged 17, Cree, from St. Peters ; went off with surveying party during the holidays.

39. *Robert Bear*—aged 11, Cree, from St. Peter's Reserve ; was at Elkhorn ; has not returned since the holidays.

40. *Alfred Bear*—aged 13, Cree, from St. Peter's Reserve ; died of tuberculosis, after a long illness, during which he was carefully tended at the Kasota Home, Elkhorn.

41. *George Macpherson*—aged 11, Cree, from St. Peter's Reserve ; mother unwilling to let him come back after the holidays.

42. *Andrew Macpherson*—aged 10 Cree, from St. Peter's Reserve ; mother unwilling to send him back.

43. *Jeremiah West*—aged 15, Cree, from St. Peter's Reserve ; was at Elkhorn : father cannot spare him.

44. *Ouriel Memis*—aged 10, Ojibway, from Spanish River ; was at the Wawanosh Home, but grandmother took away.

45. *Josette Tewine*—aged 13, Ojibway, from Spanish River ; was at the Wawanosh Home, but grandmother took away.

46. *Elizabeth Wasi*—aged 22, Sioux ; was at Elkhorn, but left to go out to work.

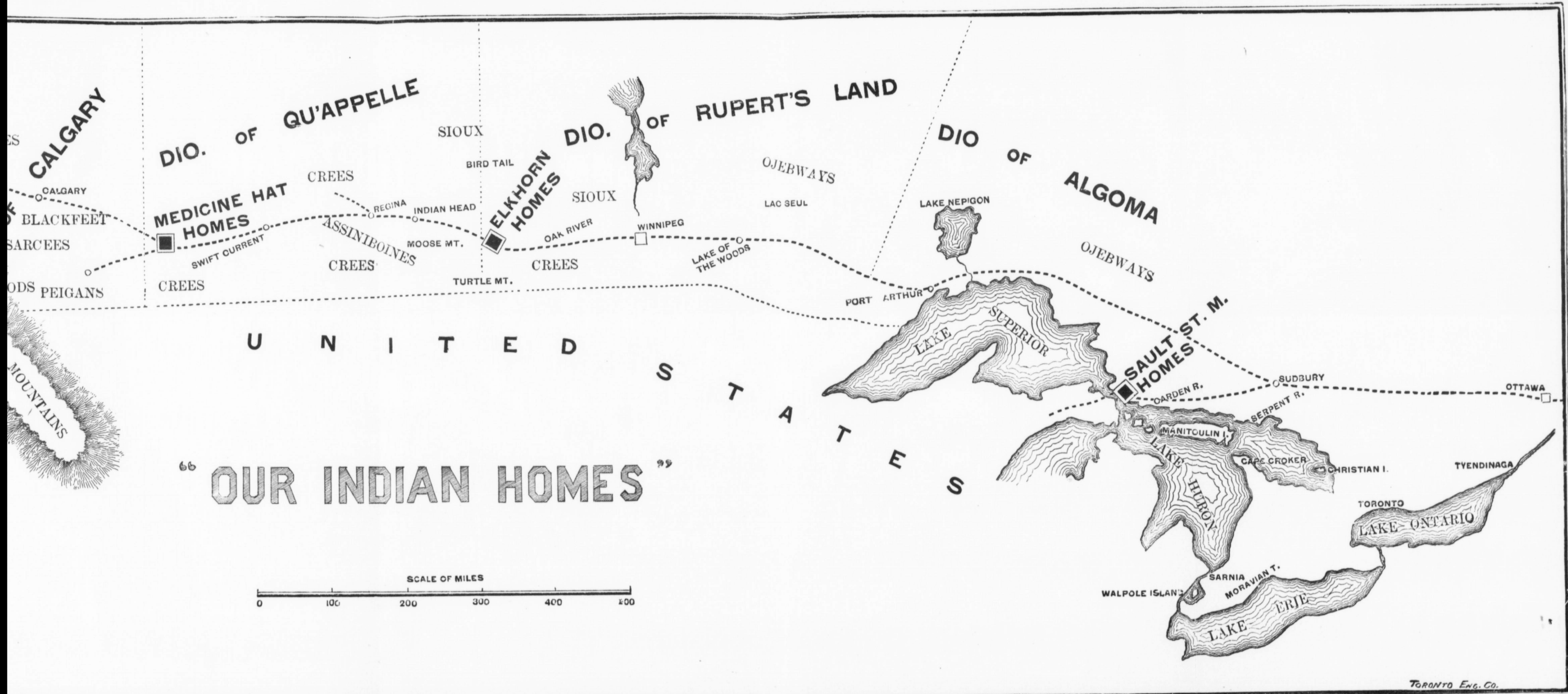

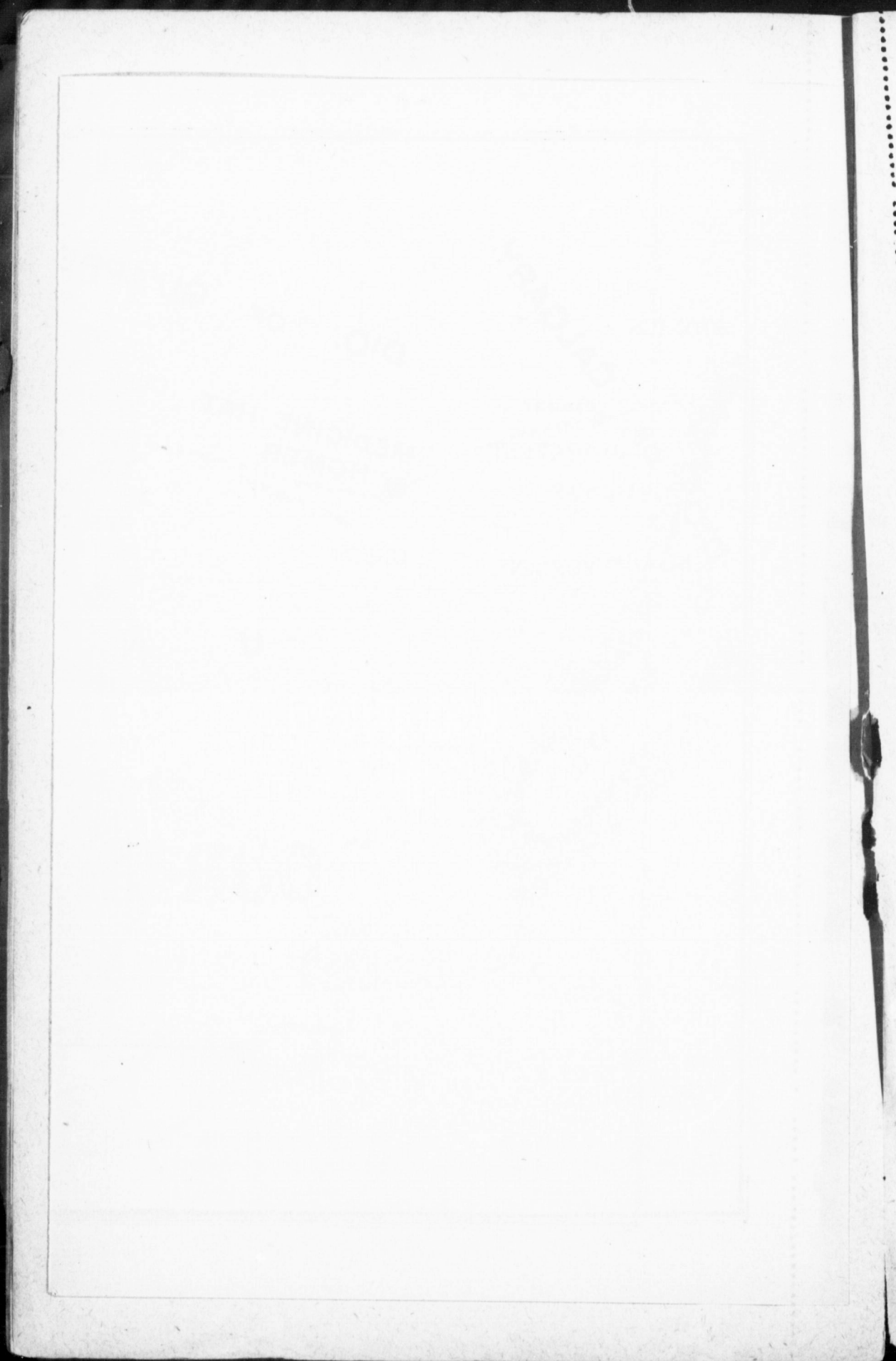

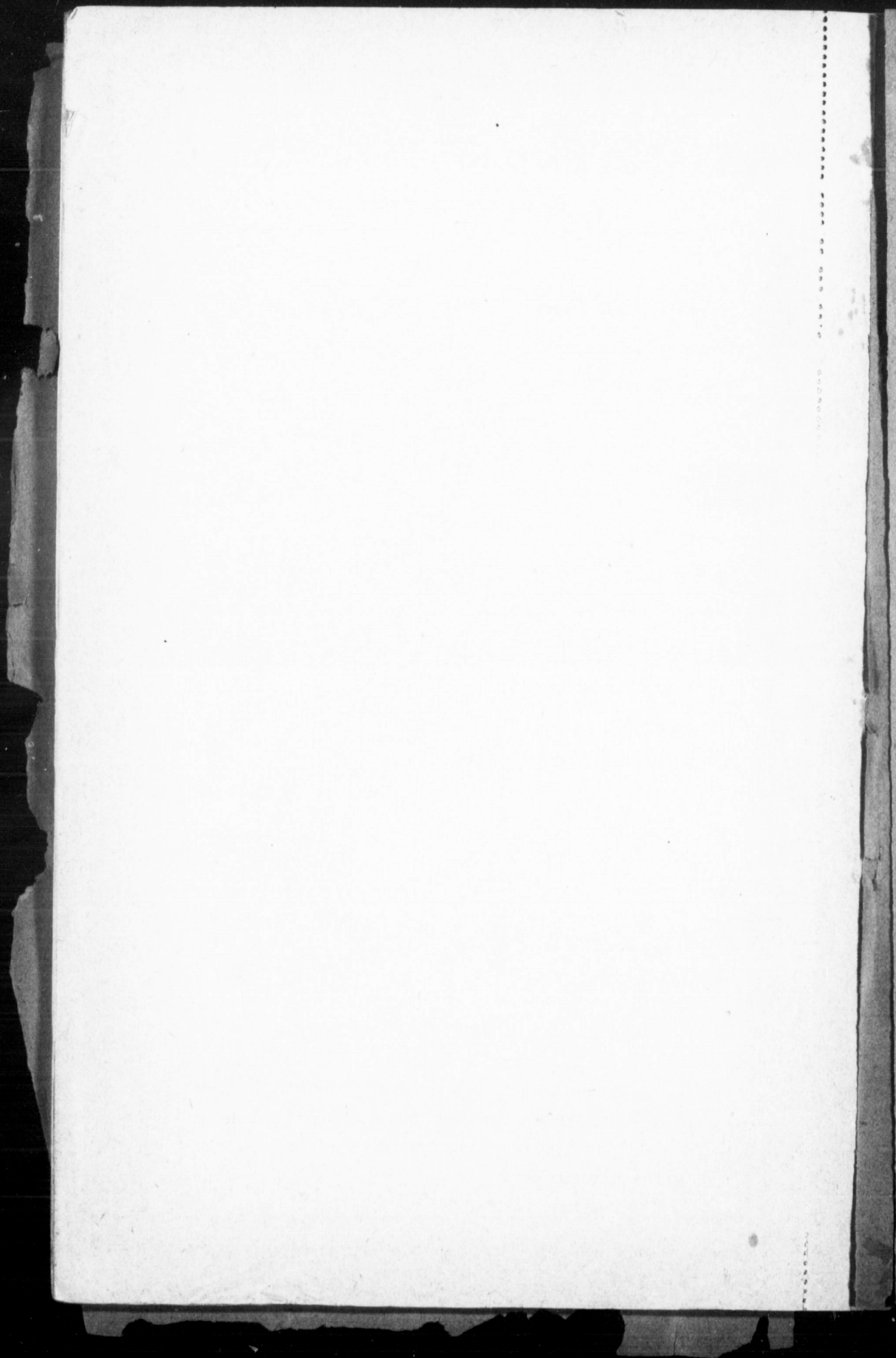

FORM OF BEQUEST.
TO THE
LAKE SUPERIOR MISSION,
AND ITS
HOMES FOR INDIAN CHILDREN.

I GIVE and bequeath unto the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the Lake Superior Mission, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the sum of.....; to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, exclusively out of such part of my personal estate not hereby specially disposed of, as I may by law bequeath to charitable purposes; and I hereby lawfully charge such part of my estate, with the said sum upon trust, to be applied toward the general purposes of the said mission and its various Homes, for the Christian training and civilization of Indian children; and the receipt of the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the said mission, shall be a sufficient discharge for the said Legacy. (And I direct that the duty upon the said Legacy be paid by my executor out of the said fund).

The will or codicil giving the bequest must be signed by the testator in the presence of two witnesses, who must subscribe their names in his presence and in the presence of each other.

NOTE—This testament must have been executed one year previous to death of Testator, to give it effect over Mortmain Acts.
