

## NEW ORGAN TO BE OPENED MONDAY

Imperial Theatre's Latest Attraction Will Probably Revolutionize Program Schedules.

The installation of the Imperial. Theatre's new Wurlitzer unit-organ is proceeding satisfactorily and the date set for its grand opening is Monday next, the 19th. Contrary to original plans the big instrument has had to be enclosed in two chambers, one at either side of the proscenium arch, instead of on one side only.

This was necessitated because a larger type organ was sent than the specifications would accommodate so practically double the installation expense had to be incurred. F. W. Mc-Kibben of New York, a well-known Wurlitzer organist, has been in the city over a week to follow closely the details of installation as Wurlitzer organists are necessarily Wurlitzer mechanicians.

The new organ at the Imperial will somewhat revolutionize program schedules, allowing continuous programs, if necessary, and eliminate intermissions. There is a possibility of introducing what is known as a "supper show" on Saturday, afternoons to convenience 5 o'clock supper folks who have shopping to do and also to give school children a longer matinee. In fact the introduction of the large organ makes the Imperial's capabilities in program arrangements quite elastic.

Workmen are today installing the console or keyboard in the orchestra pit of the auditorium. A new stage setting finished by F. W. Stringer before his departure for California a fortnight ago, will grace the theatre in which Director Jones and his orchestra will be found, as most of the time.



The new British battleship Nelson, which was launched on September 8, and which has been called "the mys-

and which has been called "the mystery ship" because many facts concerning it have not yet been disclosed, is regarded by naval reviewers as the most powerful fighting machine afloat. The British Admiralty has not yet revealed the speed, but it is known that the Nelson carries the heaviest armament ever given a battleship, the main battery mounting nine 16-inch guns.

This is one of two battleships which Great Britain is permitted to build under the terms of the Washington arms treaty, and a duplicate, the Rodney, will be launched next year. Vapan has two new battleships of similar class, each carrying eight 16-then guns. Their speed is twenty-three knots an hour, as compared with twenty-one for the latest American thips of the Maryland class.







T HAS been announced that the University of Chicago is about to establish a course to teach girls the art of making good wives. Praise be, that is a coeducational institution of learning, so that doubtless a similar course in husbandry, so to speak, will be open to the male students.



Heaven knows, they need it, for the average man's idea of being a good the average man's idea of being a good husband is to put a wedding rig on a wordan's linger, dump her down in a house and leave her to thank God that she has the privilege of cooking and sewing, and scrubbing and washing without wages for him, instead of working in an office for a salary for some other man. Every man who feeds and clothes his wife and doesn't beat her pats himself on the back and pins model-husband medals on his breast and feels that he has done his full duty in the holy estate.

It doesn't occur to him that being a meal ticket and a cash register do not fill the measure of a woman's desire in a husband, and that the reason world is because women are so generally fed on the husks of matrimony that they have acquired a spiritual dyspepsia.

INASMUCH as most men either will marry, or are married, and their happiness and prosperity depend upon their making a success of the veuture, it is just as important that they should be taught how to make good husbands as it is that girls should be taught how to make good wives.





Dr. F. R. Taylor Sees Trend is Towards Socialism

Address Given at Law School Opening-Chief Justice and Magistrate Speak.

Deciaring that the trend of modern regislation was more towards socialism and that one of the duties of the awyer was to see that this tendency was kept within proper bounds, Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., gave an address on The Influence of the Lawyer on the Community," last evening at the formal opening of the Saint John Law School.

Sir J. Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice the New Brunswick Supreme Court ad dean of the Law School, presided

of the New Brunswick Supreme Court and dean of the Law School, presided at the opening.

In a short address, he said that the school this year had an enrollment larger than ever before. The attitude of the students would coant much towards the success of the school, he said. They would find the members of the faculty always ready to assist them.

There had been a great change since the day in which he studied law, he said. Then there had been no law schools except at the large colleges and the average student was forced to acquire his learning in the office of some barrister. He thought the old system had had its advantages in the way of the profession and he advised his hearers to apend their spare time in the offices of law yers or in court, listening to the arguments and conduct of cases there.

Dr. Taylor commenced his address by pointing out the two branches of law, common law, which had grown naturally as the result of the needs of community life, and statute law, which wis imposed on the people by the various legislative bodies.

While the former grew to a certain extent, there had been a much greater increase in the quantity of statute law with which a student must be familiar to properly serve his client. In 1877 the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick had contained 1,187 pages.

Education had cost England 11 times
as much this year as it had 25 years
ago. This was a tendency towards
socialism in taking the control of the
children from the parents as far as
their education was concerned. Vocational training, he said, was about
parallel to the old system of apprenticeship, the difference being that the
children were taught in schools instead
of by some master tradesman.

Another tendency in the same direction was in the appointing of various
administrative boards, such as the
Workmen's Compensation Board, the
Public Utilities Board, health boards
and others.

COURT FUNCTIONS LESS.

These bodies were given jurisdiction over affairs that had formerly been settled in the courts. A further step was in the Arbitration Act. He thought that the legislatures should not take the powers away from the courts of the land and put them in the hands of administrative boards. He believed that the administration cost of the Workmen's Compensation Board was greater than that of all the courts in the land. The lawyer should help to keep the trend towards socialistic legislation within bounds.

The lawyer owed a duty to his clients and a duty to his fellow practitioners, he declared. He should act so that his deeds would not cause the reputation of the profession to suffer. His duty to his fellow barristers should preclude his taking advantage of technical mis-

It was the duty of a lawyer, as an ficer of the court, and in the interest justice, which he should always ch, to assist the bench in every way
