Wichita Falls, Texas, May 9.—Former Deputy Sheriff Bud Ballew, noted for numerous gun fights during his career as a law officer and wounded on one or two occasions, was shot and killed when the blice visited Domino Parlor, where a sturbance had been reported. gun on his left side. I beat him to it and shot." Ardmore, Okla., May 9.—Bud Ballew was a deputy sheriff here under Buck Garrett, ousted from office last winter on charges of lax law enforcement. Ballew was one of the men wounded last Feb. 20 in a gun fight at the court house in which five men were wounded. Ballew had a reputation for his ability to handle a "six gun." He was deputy sheriff here during some of the most ex-citing periods of Ardmore's history. When three men were killed near Wilson, Økla., last December apparently as the result of an organized raid by men in with bootlegging, Ballew aided in arrest-ing several of the alleged slayers.
