COURTENAY BAY similar to the French system, where a patrolling foreman takes care of from five to ten miles of road.

This is a welcome if somewhat delayed admission. The Standard is also sure that "there can be no question in the mind of any well-informed citizen of St. John that the government will provide adequate terminal facilities for the Grand Trunk Pacific, and that there will be no unnecessary delay in doing it."

This also is a cheering statement, and since President Hayes said a couple of years ago that the work could not be begun too quickly the Standard will doubtless press for an immediate start.

But there is something more than the Grand Trunk terminals. There are the breakwater, the dry dock and ship repair plant. Regarding these the Standard is altogether indefinite. It states that some enquiry is necessary, and also some legislation, but it does not give any assurance that when this is done these great works will be pushed to completion.

Here is the situation: When the new government assumed power it found tenders for the construction of all these Courtenay Bay works. Had the old government been returned to power, the contract would have been awarded. Parliament itself had approved of the initial expenditure.

It may be hoped that when the government has looked into the matter it will perceive the justice of St. John's claims, and provide not only the G. T. P. terminal facilities but the breakwater, dry dock and ship-repair plant. Any other result would be a grave injustice to this port.

The new government at Ottawa is pledged to give assistance in providing the provinces with a better system of highways. The policy to be pursued has not been stated, and may not yet have been fully considered.

"In New York state a very comprehensive method of road improvement has been adopted. That state began the movement in 1899, and has spent money freely in an effort to secure better roads."

Under the system adopted in New York state every mile of highway outside the incorporated villages and cities is under the direct charge of the State Highway Commission.

ALD. WIGMORE ASKS FOR INVESTIGATION OF THE POLICE COURT Brought up in Council But Held For New Business

A Busy Session of the Aldermen - Power Report Goes Over to Special Meeting - Franklin Baker Company to Get Lease

At the monthly meeting of the Common Council on Monday afternoon, Ald. Wigmore introduced a motion asking, in view of complaints by lawyers and others, for a complete investigation into the conduct of the police court but, at the time, his motion was ruled out of order. Consideration of the report on the Hydro-Electric Company's application was deferred until a special meeting next Monday. The report on the slaughter houses and all communications were also left over for the adjourned meeting.

On the report of the Board of Works being taken up, on motion of Ald. Potts, the sections recommending the renewal of the lease of the tracks at Sand Point to the C. P. R. and the report on the complaint of the school trustees regarding the street railway tracks in Wentworth street, were referred back.

The board reported they had accepted the lowest tender for supplies in constructing a sprinkler system for No. 4 warehouse, the following were submitted: T. McAvity & Sons Ltd., \$1,282.81; Canadian Fairbanks Ltd., \$1,200.18; James Robertson Co., Ltd., \$1,257.62; G. & E. Blake, \$1,700.

Ald. Elkin explained that the plant would be constructed by the City Engineer and that the cost would not be more than \$5,000. The section was adopted. Objection was taken to recommendation of the treasury board to increase the insurance on the Governor Carleton to \$40,000, and also to one of the companies with which the insurance was to be placed. Ald. Hayes said he would publish the list and the section carried.

The section of the safety board's report recommending a survey of the city's Lancaster lands, was referred back, so that all the city's property should be included in the survey. The section recommending the sale of city lands to certain lease holders was adopted with the exception of the lots occupied by Mrs. Elizabeth Rhea, James Heady and W. F. Barnhill.

Ald. C. T. Jones objected to the auctioneer's bill of \$47 for the sale of Lancaster lands, but it was explained that on the director's estimate this tender was the lowest.

Ald. Wigmore offered his motion regarding the investigation of the police court, but it was held over for new business.

On motion of Ald. Smith it was decided to credit all money from the sale of city lands to the sinking fund. The Carleton Corner Band was given the use of a room in the Carleton city hall for their fair for \$10.

A letter from The Franklin Baker Co. of Philadelphia, in reply to the council's inquiries, was read, stating that the company has clear assets of \$200,000, that they intended to start in St. John with an expenditure of \$20,000, employing ten or fifteen hands with a weekly payroll of about \$300. The lease was granted for seven years.

A motion to refer back the section of the water report recommending that the city cancel A. R. C. Clark's contract for the Marsh Bridge abutment, and for the deposit of \$1,000, was adopted.

The extension of the water service to John Lindsay's house in Spar Cove road was authorized. Mayor Frank said that nothing was being done to extend the service out Millidgeville Road or Douglas avenue, and the chairman said that tenders had been called, but no bids were received.

In dealing with the report of the ferry committee, the chairman of the board of the Union Foundry was taken up. The rental fixed was \$90 a year, and the limit placed on the foundation value at the expiration of the lease was \$4,000. The lease was granted for fourteen years.

The report of the special committee on the application of the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Co. was presented by Ald. Kierstead. There was some discussion on the provision for a fifty-year franchise, and finally the report was deferred until a special meeting next Monday evening. Ald. Smith moved to have D. H. Nease reappointed a school trustee, but a motion to adjourn was carried instead.

PROF. CALLAHAN ROBINSON MEETS WITH SUDDEN DEATH

Washington, Nov. 7. - Prof. Callahan Robinson, dead of the school of the Catholic University of America was stricken with apoplexy last night at his home here, and died almost immediately. He was 77 years old, and formerly dean of the law department of Yale.

THEIR INTO BEDROOM; STEALS \$50

Daring Robbery During Last Night in the Home of John Carrier in Carleton

One of the most daring robberies that has been reported to the West Side police for some time, was perpetrated in the home of John Carrier in Watson street, Carleton, when a thief entered his home and got away with \$50 in cash. Both Mr. Carrier and his wife were asleep at the time and were not awakened by the intruder.

Mr. Carrier retired early last evening and before going to bed put \$50 in his trousers pocket, intending to pay a bill on the East Side this morning. When he awoke this morning his trousers were lying on the floor and the money was gone. He made an investigation and found that during the night someone had effected an entrance by prying open a window on the ground floor and sneaking up stairs to the room where he slept.

The burglar, it is believed, must have been well acquainted with the house, for the interior was dark at the time. He must have made no noise whatever. The West Side police were notified this morning and are working on the case. Mr. Carrier is employed at the box factory in South Bay.

SOME ONE TRYING TO GET INTO HIS HOUSE AT NIGHT.

Geo. Wright Pursues and Says Abram Fredericks in the Man—Latter Denies and Case is Being Tried

To do this it has been necessary to make a change in the freight schedule, the Cassandra taking the place of a freight boat, the Indrani, that was to have sailed on that date.

This will make three Donaldson passenger steamers sailing from here for Christmas and New Year—the Athenia on December 2 and the Saturnia on December 9, for the Christmas holidays, and the Cassandra for New Year's.

The first steamer of the winterport season, the Athenia, will leave Glasgow for St. John on Saturday next and she is scheduled to arrive on the 24th.
