London, June 9-(Canadian Press Cable)-In a speech at Belfast Saturday, Lord Carson, one of the leaders in the Ulster opposition to Free State dominance in Ireland, said he had been told there were to be a number of different appointments from the far ends of the British Colonies to try to settle what was called the Irish boundary question. It was a remarkable situation and one which he regretted. ATTORNEY GENERAL'S ACTION IN SUNDAY CASES NOT INVITATION TO DO BUSINESS

Text of Hon. Mr. Byrne's Letter to St. John Chief of Police.

A letter from Hon. J. P. Byrne, Attorney General of New Brunswick in which he refused to consent to prosecution in 14 cases of alleged violation of the Lord's Day Act in St. John on Sunday, May 25, was received by Chief of Police Smith on Saturday at noon, about an hour after the Chief was in conversation with the Attorney General over the long distance telephone. The letter was mailed from Bathurst on June 2 but the Chief said this morning that it did not reach him until Saturday.

While withholding his consent to prosecute in the cases reported Hon. Mr. Byrne says that it is not to be taken that his action is an invitation for the carrying on of general business on Sunday for gain. He expressed the opinion that in the cases reported it had not been shown that the people affected had shown an inclination to keep "open shop" although they might be considered giolators of the letter, if not of the spirit, of the act.

The text of the Attorney General's letter is as follows:—
"Your letter dated the 28th day of May with reference to complaints made to the Mayor and commissioners of violations of the Lord's Day Act is at hand. It is noted you instructed your constables to investigate the above complaints and in consequence thereof report the following list of violations on Sunday, May 25, 1924 and ask for leave to commence prosecutions. 





Canadians and U. S. Members Will Mingle Where Forefathers Fought.

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 9. -

The disaster brought home to the Americans the need for disciplined troops. General Winfield Scott was put in command. Lundy's Lane, fought July 25, 1814, was a more evenly contested battle and threw glory on both the American and Canadian armies."

The golden jubilee of the society, Mr. Hunter said, will further the entente cordiale between Canada and America. Hon. Curtis D. Wilbur, secretary of the navy of the U. S., and Premier G. Howard Ferguson of Ontario will be the principal speakers. The celebration will last four days, concluding on June 22 with a memorial service in Toronto, the headquarters of the order.





Ball Problems By Billy Evans

QUESTIONS.

ANSWERS.

1. The fence that surrounds a ball park always marks the end of playing territory. When the batsman knocked the ball over the fence, and it struck the sign back of the fence, the batsman was entitled to a home run. No consideration should be given to the fact that the ball came back on the field through a hole in the fence. Once it passed outside of playing territory all action on that ball ceased. In either of the cases cited the batsman was entitled to a home run.

2. If with less than two strikes, the batsman dodges a wild pitch and his bat comes into contact with the ball, a foul ball resulting, it is a strike. If it goes fair it is a fair ball and the ball is in play. In all cases whatever happens is legal. ANSWERS.



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
