This is a suave lotion, very whitening, softening and cleansing. Take the shaving cream and dissolve in rose water by heat-ing in a custard kettle. Beat the almonds in a mortar, and, by degrees, work in the soap and water. Strain, through muslin and return to the mortar. Stir constantly, working in gradually the alcohol, in which the oils have already been dispoived.





Citric acid (lemon, 3 drams: hot water, 11 ounces; borax, 2 drams; hot water, 11 ounces; borax, 2 drams; red rose petals, 1 ounce; glycerine, 1 ounce. Dissolve the acid and borax in the water; infuse the petals for an hour; strain through a jelly bag; after twenty-four hours, decant the clear portion and add the glycerine. Ap-ply as often as agreeable. nose.
