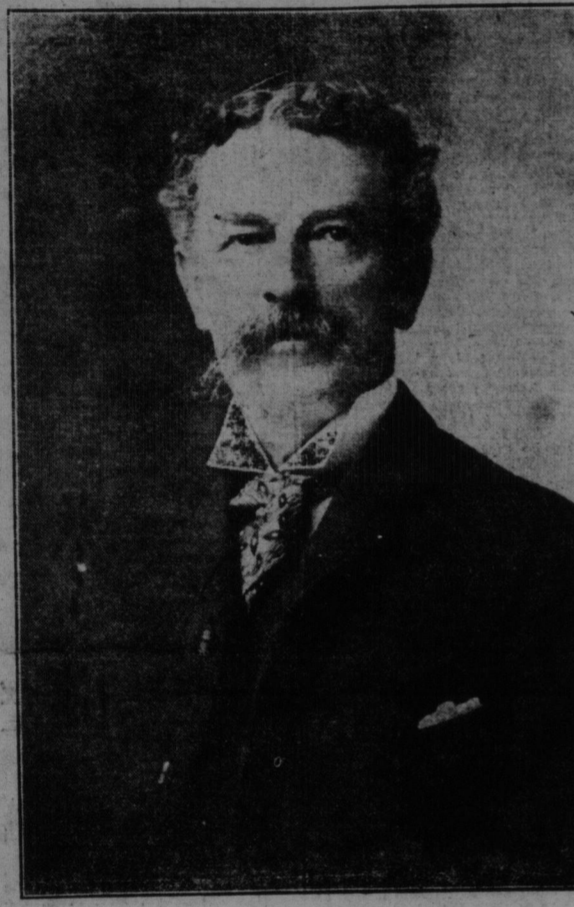

DR. DANIEL RESIGNS HIS SEAT IN HOUSE

Retires from City and County Representation in Favor of Mr. Hazen

St. John's Popular Member, in Letter to His Constituents, Says Office to which Mr. Hazen has Been Called is One of Most Important in the Borden Cabinet.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 16th, 1911.
To the Electors of the City and County of Saint John, Gentlemen.—The result of the recent general election held on the 21st September last, was, as you know, to make a complete change in the government of the country, and Mr. R. L. Borden who had been leader of the opposition for several years past, was called on by the Governor General to form a new ministry. In our system of government it has been usual in the formation of the cabinet to have all parts of the Dominion represented therein and New Brunswick accordingly has always had one of the portfolios assigned to it. Mr. Borden has not departed from this custom and in the undoubted right to the exercise of his prerogative in this respect has called upon the Honorable J. D. Hazen, the Premier of the Province, to enter his cabinet and become Minister of Marine and Fisheries and Minister of the Naval Service. This is one of the most important departments at the disposal of the Prime Minister and if the Naval programme passed by Parliament, is to be carried into effect, it will be in large measure the responsibility of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. I think New Brunswick is to be congratulated on having so important a portfolio assigned to its representative.

Here in the City of St. John a large amount of necessary expenditure has been taking place and much more will be required to place this port in a proper condition to do the increased business which we have every reason to expect will come to it, commensurate with the growth of the country and its transportation facilities, and the question of nationalizing the port will have to receive early attention. Under these circumstances I feel it is a matter of much importance to this port and this constituency that it should be represented by a minister of the Crown if possible.

Mr. Hazen is a resident of the city and his interests are here. He is well and favorably known not only in this province but all over the Dominion, and I am assured that his appointment to his high office carries with it the endorsement of the people of this province. He, however, has no seat in the Parliament of Canada. It is therefore necessary for him to obtain one and under the circumstances I think I am acting in the best interests of all concerned if I place mine at his disposal.

I have therefore retired from the representation of this city and county in his favor.

I have to thank, and do so most sincerely, the people of this city especially, and more recently of the county as well, for the abundant marks of confidence they have shown in me since I first asked for their suffrage in February, 1904. I appreciate their confidence most highly and its memory will always be with me. I sincerely hope you will join with me in according to Mr. Hazen as the representative of this city and county, that generous recognition you have so freely given to me. In retiring from the representation of this city and county I wish to assure my friends and supporters that my influence will still and always be at their disposal.

Parliament to Be Called November 15

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—Parliament will meet on November 15. That was the decision arrived at by the cabinet in council this afternoon and announced later by Premier Borden.

The session will not be unduly prolonged and after a brief adjournment at Christmas prorogation will be sought by the end of January or the first week in February. These it is learned are the plans of the government.

HANKOW, CHINA, MAY BE SCENE OF GREAT BATTLE DURING NEXT FEW DAYS

Chinese Government is Taking Active Measures To Crush Revolution, and Army is Going To Affected Districts

REBELS IN HANKOW PREPARING TO FIGHT

Twenty-four Army Trains Have Been Started During Last Few Days, and China will Have Very Strong Fighting Force to Match Against Insurgents.

Peking, Oct. 16.—Simultaneously with the acceptance today by Yuan Shi Kai of the post of viceroy of Hu-Peh and Hunan provinces, to which territory he is directed to proceed and immediately re-establish the imperial authority, the Chinese government is showing remarkable activity even in the face of a depleted treasury.

The government seems to realize at last the necessity of crushing the rebellion promptly and is now despatching the army to the scene of the revolt as hastily as preparations can be made.

A few messages are beginning to arrive from the south which for several days previously were entirely cut off from telegraphic communication. But through the lines are open few details of the situation in the affected provinces are filtering in. It is believed however, that a certain measure of order is being maintained at Wu-chang and Hankow. Outside of the foreign concessions in Hankow these two cities are in the hands of the revolutionists and the fact that all the women and children have left or are leaving Hankow indicates that the forces under the insurgent leaders well armed and well ammunitioned from the arsenal's stores are preparing to resist the Chinese army, several divisions of which are either on the road to Hankow or are being rapidly fitted out for the expedition.

The American consul at Hankow, Roger S. Greene, has sent a message to Peking requesting that he be kept informed as to the progress of the army southward and the approach of the troops under the Wang, Yin, and Yin Tchang which are being mobilized at Chumai, in Hunan province, and below within seventy miles of Hankow. Consul Greene's message gives no information as to the activities and preparations of the revolutionaries.

The reinforcement of the American legation guard by a hundred men who are approaching from Manila while no significant danger, is nevertheless indicative of the seriousness of the situation even in Peking. Chinese respect for foreigners, which is often cringing, still continues up to the customary standard. This is due largely to the lesson of 1900 and it is not believed that the legation quarter will be subjected to more than inconveniences, owing to the rise in prices of foodstuffs and possible disorders in the market.

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'NE TEMERE' SCORED BY THE METHODISTS FRENZIED MOB DID DAMAGE IN ITALIAN TOWN

Ecumenical Conference at Toronto Dealt with it Yesterday by Adopting strongly Worded Resolution.

Recurrence of Cholera Riots Results in Very Serious Disorder at Carpineto — Patients Carried Into Street.

MARRIAGE TIE SACRED. TROOPS RESTORE ORDER.

Toronto, Oct. 16.—The first address at the Ecumenical conference today was by Rev. G. J. Tasker, D. D., principal of Handsworth College, Birmingham, on "Improvements of theological colleges," the church, he thought, should strengthen the colleges, putting more money into them.

Rev. Franklin Hamilton, D. D., Chancellor of Washington University, spoke on a "Broader preparation for the ministry." Ministerial supply was the subject dealt in by W. T. Moulton, Headingley College. He noted the death of candidates in all churches, although in his church, the Wesleyan, they have all they need.

The following resolution on Ne Temere was adopted: This conference assembled at Toronto and representing the interests of world-wide Methodism, enters an emphatic protest against the Ne Temere decree issued by the Church of Rome. While holding that the fullest religious liberty should be accorded to all men of all creeds, the conference repudiates the idea that any church should have the power to override the civil law and especially on such a subject as that of marriage on which the welfare of any community depends.

The conference is further of the opinion that the promulgation of the Ne Temere decree "is an outrage on the elementary rights of citizenship, and therefore calls upon the representatives of the various Methodist churches represented in this conference to take steps to prevent both its proclamation and acceptance of this decree in the countries from whence it came.

The conference is strongly opposed to the opinion that marriage ceremony performed by any person properly authorized to do so by the state should be invalid, irrespective of the religious affiliations of the parties concerned.

This was passed by a unanimous standing vote.

The first Sunday of February, 1912, is the day on which it is recommended that the Ecumenical message be read in Methodist pulpits all over the world. The conference also made a recommendation upon the subjects of divorce, deprecating and condemning the crime of easy and unjustifiable divorce, and recommending that the day of breaking the marriage bonds.

FLEMMING CABINET SWORN IN OFFICE

James A. Murray, M.P.P., of Sussex, Enters Ministry Without Portfolio

Premier Fleming Becomes Surveyor General -- Hon. Mr. Grimmer Succeeds Mr. Hazen as Attorney General, and Hon. H. F. McLeod is Promoted to be Provincial Secretary.

Fredericton, Oct. 16.—New Brunswick has a new government, the members of Premier Fleming's administration having been sworn in this afternoon at the executive council chamber.

The making of a cabinet always attracts much interest and attention and today politicians from different parts of the province were gathered here and all interests were well satisfied with the selections made by Hon. J. K. Fleming.

The new Premier assumes the office of surveyor general, succeeding Hon. W. H. Grimmer, who becomes attorney general in succession to Hon. J. D. Hazen, who was called to the federal government as Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Hon. H. F. McLeod has been promoted from the position of solicitor general to become provincial secretary, the office of solicitor general not being filled for the present.

The only member of the new government who was not a member of the former administration is Hon. James A. Murray, of Kings county, and his selection gives general satisfaction and is felt to add considerable strength to the administration. In the legislature Mr. Murray, who is a practical business man and a resident of Sussex, has made a fine impression in the three sessions he has been a member of the house and his friends all over New Brunswick will learn with pleasure of his promotion.

MEDIATION OUTLOOK IS NOT SO GOOD COL. HUGHES TAKES HOLD IN EARNEST

Italy and Turkey are both Stiffening and Are Not Favorable to Concessions to Stop War.

New Minister of Militia Plans Council of Officers to Bring Militia Forces Thoroughly Up to Date.

Berlin, Oct. 16.—The outlook for a successful intervention to bring to an end the Turco-Italian war is becoming less favorable, according to a semi-official statement today. Italy has yielded to public opinion at home and is no longer willing to concede Turkish sovereignty over Tripoli, while on the other hand Turkey is unwilling to surrender Tripoli unconditionally, because of the internal dangers that would be involved by such yielding on the part of the government.

Accordingly, diplomats here see no chance for mediation at present or until the attitude of the Turkish chamber of deputies is ascertained. It is impossible for other powers to negotiate definitely with Constantinople in the absence of a settled government here, and the report that Emperor William has summoned the Italian ambassador, Signor Pansat to his majesty's hunting lodge near Eberswalde, Prussia, for a conference on the political situation, proves to have been incorrect. The ambassador did have an extended conference with the German foreign minister, Herr Von Kiderlen-Waechter. Today the emperor detained Chancellor Von Holweg at his hunting lodge in order that they might discuss the Turco-Italian situation.

MUCH MYSTERY ABOUT DEATH OF WILLIAM RYDER

Attorney General Grimmer Has Authorized a Full Investigation Into the Strange Case at Jordan Mountain.

SUICIDE IDEA SCOUTED.

Sussex, Oct. 16.—Word reached here tonight that Attorney General Grimmer had authorized an investigation into the death of William Ryder, whose body was found under such suspicious circumstances last Friday in the woods near Jordan Mountain. The unfortunate man was buried on Sunday at Newton but if necessary the body will be exhumed so that the examination may be thorough.

Hon. J. A. Murray, who will reach here tomorrow has the necessary legal order which he will hand at once to Chief of Police McLeod.

The fatal weakness in the suicide theory as it is viewed here is that there were three wounds in the body all in the neighborhood of the heart and another on the forehead which render the man incapable of further action. The rifle which was the cause of death was an old fashioned Snider rifle and not a repeating arm, so that Ryder would have been compelled to extract two shells from the breach before he could load three times before accomplishing his purpose. As near as can be ascertained the theory of those who think Ryder shot himself is that the first bullet went clear through the body. The man fell to the ground and after bleeding some time he crawled to the edge of a deep step and sinking to the ground again sent the other two shots into his own body.

The shot which Ryder was wearing previous to his death has been spoken of before. As a matter of fact there were two shots, an inside one and an outside one. Both these garments were lying apart from the body. The outside one had been considerably hurried by the flash of the powder showing at all events that the man was shot at close range. The inside one was but little damaged.

Ryder left home to go to Hampton Tuesday to attend the court. He returned to Sussex that night but it is said his wife who was at the station refused to drive him home on the ground that he was late and he had to walk miles to White's Mountain. On Wednesday he left home about 11 o'clock in the forenoon to go hunting. That afternoon the neighbors say they heard a shot followed after an interval by two others in rapid succession.

On Wednesday night Mrs. Ryder and her children left home and went visiting to a neighbor's and stayed the evening, which those who know her say was contrary to her usual habits. On Thursday she drove to Louville, a few miles away, to see some of her friends. While there she said her husband was missing, and late in the afternoon all went back to Mr. McDermott's White's Mountain. It was too late then when they got there to do anything, but early on Friday morning Mr. McDermott and some others went in the direction in which the shots had been heard and found the body. As soon as Chief of Police McLeod receives the order from the Attorney General tomorrow he will begin a searching investigation into the circumstances surrounding the tragedy. Besides his wife Ryder is survived by two daughters.

SIR W. M. ATKEN IS IN MONTREAL

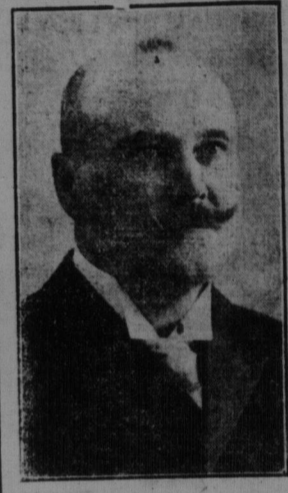
He Denies that He Has Any Intention of Resigning English Seat to Enter Canadian Politics.

There has been various rumors lately to the effect that Sir Max Atken intends to give up politics in England and enter the field of federal politics in Canada. When questioned regarding these rumors today, he said:

It is absurd—perfectly absurd. I have no intention of doing anything of the kind. Sir Max was enthusiastic over the result of the recent election.

While this was going on some of the local authorities managed to send a message to Rome and troops were hurriedly sent from the capital.

Lieut-Governor Tweedie arrived in the city by I. C. R. express from Chatham this morning and was driven to the Queen Hotel. A few minutes later Premier Fleming arrived by C. P. R. from his home at Harland and went to the Barker House. Before noon arrangements were made for Hon. Mr. Fleming to stay upon his return to the Queen Hotel at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon and the Premier then submitted his cabinet slate to his Honor for approval and it was arranged that the members of the new government would be sworn in at 3 o'clock.

Promptly at that hour Premier Fleming and the members of his cabinet assembled at the executive council chamber where the oaths of office were administered to them by the Governor.

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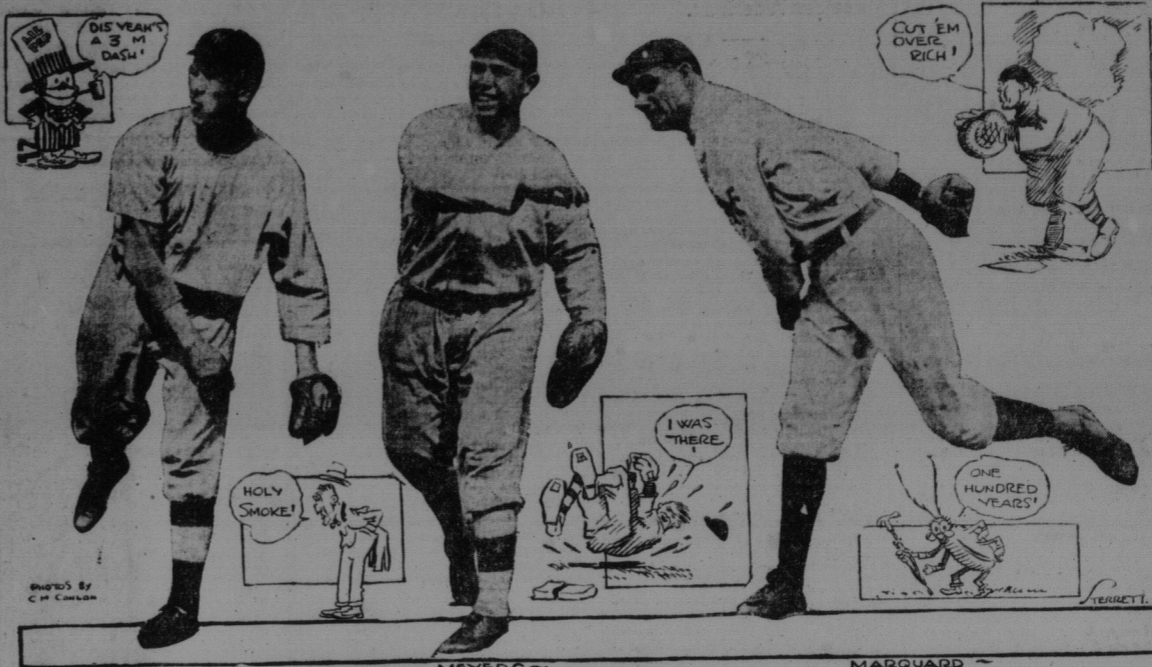

A. O. H. WON FIRST GAME OF LEAGUE

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 16.—When John Franklin Baker, third baseman of the Athletics, had touched up Eddie Collins ahead of him today, he put the Philadelphia Athletics on an even footing with the New York Giants and the two teams will now go to New York for the third game tomorrow in the series for the world's baseball honor.

It was seen how well the southpaw was working they cheered him on. The man on the New York team who received the heartiest welcome was Catcher Meyers. His superb work caught the crowd and he was given a hand each time he stepped up to the plate.

The game began a few minutes after two o'clock with New York at the bat. The first ball pitched by Plank was a strike and the crowd cheered. The next was also a strike and the ball went to the catcher, Devore, back to the bench. Capt. Doyle sent a fly to Lord which the catcher lost, slipping on the soft ground as he started after the ball. Snodgrass was tipped on the shirt front by one of Plank's spots, and went to first. He was left there as Murray flied to Collins.

Neither team was given much opportunity to show their speed on the bases. Neither team had a stolen base. Merkle, who was on first in the seventh inning, made a fake attempt to go down and took too much of a lead off the bag. Plank turned instantly and by a lightning throw to Davis, caught the New York base man by a yard.

A Joyful Crowd. The crowd that saw the first of the world's championship games here was six hundred short of the attendance at the first game for the world's title played here with Chicago last year. It was a joyful throng, however, and cheered from the moment the teams came on the field until Collins tossed out Murray in the ninth inning.

The Athletics went out in order in the third inning, Lord striking out, Oldring flogging to Meyers, and Collins flying to Devore.
