"PICKING UP" BUSINESS ON "THE DUMPS" IN ST. JOHN.

Many People Have Profit if Not Pleasure in Delving for Finds—City Benefited by Acquisition of New Building Lots.

What becomes of the hundreds of tons of material which is annually thrown in the ash barrel in St. John? It is safe to say very few of our readers know. They may have a vague idea that it is taken to the dumps but, in most cases their information extends no further. Where the dumps are, what they are, their origin and extent, are matters with which most of us have but a superficial acquaintance. Usually a mention of the dump brings up visions of an accumulation of festering, decayed fruit, rotten and decayed meats, old clothes, scraps of paper and other refuse matter, a dull, musty, fetid odour assails the nostrils and with a shudder and a bored expression the subject is summarily dismissed. Yet the St. John dumps, dirty in themselves, are in their way, agents of cleanliness. They have a part in the work of city cleaning and a more important part it is, for the dumps are a ready receptacle for any matter which you may regard as useless. When your ash bin is filled, you send a teamster to empty it. The material is loaded in his cart, off to the dump, that's the end of it you think. But no, in most cases the journey to the dump is but the prelude to another career, brief but often useful, and it is not by any means beyond possibility that the waste matter you send there today comes back to you later in different guise. The dumps of St. John, or at least, those most used, are situated at the Back Shore—the east end of the city, and extend from the foot of Broad street up to the foot of Leinster street in length and from the end of these streets to the railroad track at Courtenay bay—a space from 600 to 800 yards long and varying in width from 80 to fully 150 yards. Another smaller dump is near the east end of Union street and there are one or more in the North End. These are, however, but small in comparison with the one first named and while the North End dumps are still used to some extent most of the city's refuse finds its way to the Back shore.

proclaimed a public dump. If this policy at the time appeared unwise its wisdom was proven as the years rolled on for, by the gradual filling in of this space, the city has gained quite a lot of land, much of which is now built upon. In fact the south end of Crown street, and the eastern end of Leinster, Princess, Orange and Mecklenburg streets are practically made land and in a few more years it is probable that Crown street will be extended to Queen street at least, and this still more territory will be gained. Previous to the time of setting aside the section described as a public dump much material was deposited at the east end of Union street and thereabouts, but this was soon filled and the dump was accordingly extended as stated. So far as known, the regulations governing the dumps are very simple and "more honored in the breach than the observance." While nothing of a dangerous nature, such as explosives, poisons, drugs, etc., is supposed to be dumped there, and while hot tanks are also deposited, yet the teamster hauling is generally left to his own sweet will and can deposit pretty much what he likes. Consequently a sour of the dumps will reveal some curious things as it is estimated that at least five tons of refuse find their way to the dump daily, or roughly 1,500 tons per year. If this was all allowed to remain there unattended the space would soon be filled, but it is just here that the "dump pickers" come on the scene. The dump pickers, as they are termed in the vernacular of the district, "dump rats," are in the main residents of the Back Shore and it is no exaggeration to say that many of them live on what they procure from the dump. Of course there are the usual stories told about big finds, in one instance a dump picker several years ago is said to have found a valuable pearl while poking in a pile of oyster shells from an up town restaurant. Another has found a well filled pocketbook, still others pieces of jewelry and so on. Stories of this nature abound and their redeeming feature is that the reader can exercise the right to doubt them. To a resident of any large American city St. John's dump system would appear peculiar as the privilege of dump land is a valuable franchise and an appreciable city asset from which no small sum is annually realized both by the franchise holder and the city. St. John, however, has not yet reached that stage and probably all persons concerned are very well contented to allow things to remain as they are.

OTTAWA MINISTER'S VIEW. Inspiration from Tory Press, and What it Led To. Ottawa, Nov. 10.—(Special)—Rev. S. G. Bland, of the east end Methodist church, who occasionally preaches sensational sermons, at the morning service today described Britain in the last century for men and said that it was a shame that Canada would not at once send the colony of Newfoundland to South Africa. Mr. Bland has been reading the Conservative newspapers on the question of a third contingent.

Arrests for Drunkenness. Arrests for drunkenness in 129 cities of the United States are said to aggregate 312,000 during the last fiscal year. It is a pity that there is no uniformity of action or of police law, whereby study and improvement of conditions might be secured. In prohibition Portland, Me., the arrests numbered 424, or 8 to every 1,000 population. In Toledo, Ohio, with its 947 licensed saloons, there were 387 arrests, or 3 to every 1,000 inhabitants. In New York there were 13, in Philadelphia 34 arrests to every 1,000. There seems to be a thousand doctors each with a different diagnosis and treatment of the horrible disease.—American Medicine. WAS DUE TO RATS. Outbreak of Plague at Glasgow Traced to Rodents—Declared Not Infectious. Glasgow, Nov. 8.—It is believed now that the outbreak of the bubonic plague was undoubtedly due to rats. Several which were caught in the Central Station Hotel, from which several persons suffering with the disease were recently removed, were found to be suffering from the disease. The medical authorities declare that the plague is not infectious, and is contracted by inoculation, such as by the bite of an insect.

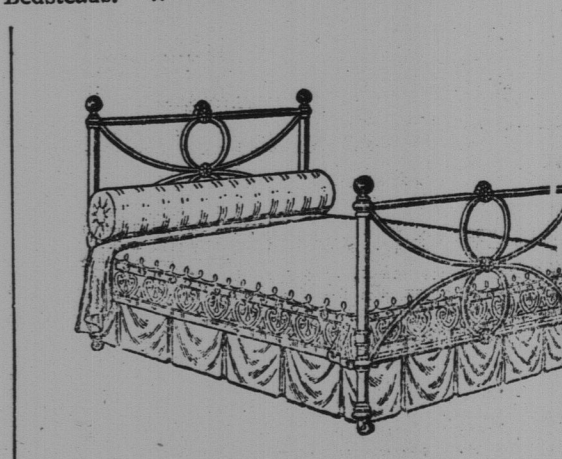
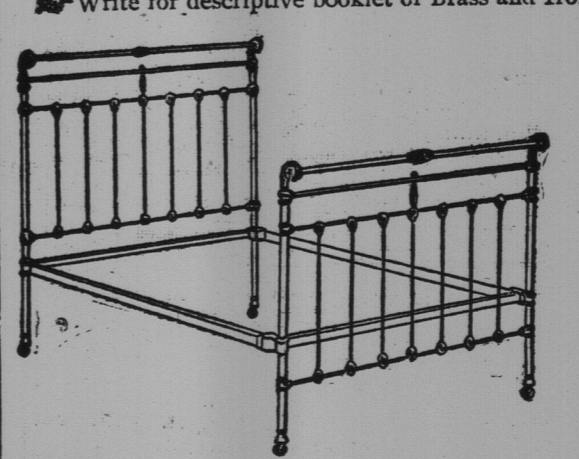
INTERESTING NEW YORK NEWS LETTER.

TO EXPEL INVADERS FROM CAPE COLONY. Lord Kitchener and Cape Town Premier Arrange a Plan. London, Nov. 11.—In a letter dated Oct. 23 the Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Lord Kitchener and Sir John Gordon Sprigg (the Cape Town premier) have arranged a scheme for the expulsion of the invaders from Cape Colony. A joint commission of imperial and colonial military conferences has been sitting here for some days past to draft a scheme. It is understood that this provides for the colony taking a large share in the future of the campaign and contributing largely to its cost. Apparently a levy of 100,000 men, or more, is to be raised in the colony to fill the vacancy in the dominion home, caused by the death of Hon. N. Clarke Wallace."

THE LURCHER SHOAL WHERE LIGHTSHIP WILL BE PLI. Description of Navigation Obstacle Which Has Been Discussed Recently by Board of Trade--Opinion to Protection Appliance. The Lurcher Shoals, which were a prominent topic at the board of trade meeting recently, are regarded by mariners as one of the awkward obstacles to navigation along the coast of Nova Scotia. There have been, however, few, if any wrecks there for, as a general rule, navigators give the shoals a wide berth. Captain George Basset, of the government steamer Lansdowne, who is very familiar with all the lights, buoys and alarms along the coast of the maritime provinces, was seen yesterday regarding the Lurcher Shoals. He is of the opinion that the placing of a light-ship to mark this dangerous part, as was announced in The Telegraph yesterday, will supply something that has long been needed although the shoals have for years been marked by an automatic buoy pointed red and black horizontally. The Lurcher lies west-northwest, 15 miles from Yarmouth Cape and from Brier Island southwest by the Nova Scotia coast. The shoals trends northeast and southwest in a line of three and a half miles. The shoals has only one and a half miles of water. The shoals is a very narrow shoal, the water is very shallow over it at low tide. The shoal is a mile west of the shoal in 13 f of water. The latitude and longitude of the shoal are: Lat. 45° 30' 43.05 E. The distance from P. Island to the Lurcher is 80 miles, direct course between the two points would be taken. From Partridge Island Lurcher lies south and west. The shoals on the Lurcher show the bottom to be sand and rock. Captain Basset thinks it would be much easier placing a ship to mark the place, as it would be a most difficult spot for the erect a lightship.

LARGE SALE OF TIMBER LANDS. New Boston, N. H., firm Secure 5,500 Acres. New Boston, N. H., Nov. 9.—Read Brothers, of New Boston, well-known lumber dealers, have purchased 5,500 acres of timber land in the towns of Windham and Stratton, in Southern Vermont, which is estimated to contain 50,000,000 feet of spruce and cherry birch. The purchase price was \$22,000. The tract purchased is situated between the Bennington & Rutland Railroad on the one hand and the Central Vermont on the other, and is down grade about six miles from each. Read Brothers will work this timber land with a force of 250 men, 100 pairs of horses and four steam mills this winter, and will ship the lumber mostly to the New York market.

SCHOONER FLORIDA ABANDONED BY CREW. Was in Sinking Condition Steamer Hove in Sight. Portland, Me., Nov. 10.—The steamer Star, which runs between Portland and York, while on her way to this port rescued, 20 miles northeast of Cape Cod three men composing the crew schooner Florida, of Rockport, which is a sinking vessel. Capt. Geo. J. of the Florida, reports that while on duty at 11 o'clock Saturday night in New York, the schooner was loaded with a waterlogged condition in a few hours.
