

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The M. W. Grand Master delivered the following address:

BRETHREN OF THE GRAND LODGE:

Favored by a superintending Providence we are once more permitted to assemble in Grand Lodge on this the Sixteenth Annual Communication, and the Ninety-fourth year of the existence of Free Masonry in Prince Edward Island, and desire fervently to unite with you in offering up our humble

thanks to him who is Lord over all, the giver of every good and perfect gift, for the many blessings youchsafed unto us during the past year, and pray that our efforts to advance the interests of the Craft in this jurisdiction may be crowned with abundant success.

In compliance with the requirements of our laws, it is my duty to communicate to you a statement of my official acts during the recess of the Grand Lodge, the condition of Masonry in the jurisdiction, and recommend to the Grand Lodge such measures as I may deem expedient and necessary.

Having been informed by the Secretary of True Brothers Lodge, No. 8, of Tryon that for some months that a regular meeting had not been held, in company with R. W. Deputy Grand Master Brother Thompson, on the 9th September last, (having previously notified the Brethren of my intended visit) we visited the said Lodge and received a cordial and fraternal welcome; the attendance was good. Examined the minutes and found them well kept; a good Lodge room and comfortably furnished; finances in a fair condition, but in consequence of the majority of the Members residing in Crapaud and Cape Traverse, some miles distant from the Lodge room, it is very difficult at certain seasons of the year to form a quorum. At my suggestion, R. W. Brother John Muirhead, of Tryon, gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would move a resolution to take up the question of location; but up to the present time the Lodge is still at work in Tryon. After the close of the Lodge the Brethren repaired to the Crawford Hotel and we sat down to an excellent supper; at low twelve, through the kindness of Past Master Strang was driven some seven miles to Cape Traverse and was hospitably entertained at the "Lansdowne."

Brother Mc-Pherson was City Clerk for upwards of seven years and ably performed the duties of the office. Last year he was compelled to resign his position through continued ill health which unfitted him for work. Speaking of his retirement, the Mayor, Past Master Haviland, said, "By his resignation the city has lost the valuable services of an able, diligent and faithful officer." For him we may not and need not pray, but surely as we wave our last farewell we may say, Blessings on thy kind heart, oblivion to thy errors (if errors thou hadst), and grateful, lasting remembrance to thy name."

To the widow and orphans we do commend them to the Divine care and protection of our God who relieveth the fatherless and the widow.

He was interred with Masonic honors.

Brother John Lefurgey of Mount Lebanon Lodge, No. 6, of Summerside, being from his home on a business trip, he died in Boston, his remains were brought home to Summerside and interred with Masonic honors, on the 13th of May last. Brother Lefurgey did not take an active part in the work of the Craft, and was not a member of this Grand Lodge. A good business man and much respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

Permit me, as the President of the General Masonic Relief Association of the U. S. and Canada, to call your personal attention to the many benefits to be derived from affiliation with our Organization.

The results of its work so far have been incalculable and in this Jurisdiction alone, with a membership of twenty thousand and an annual payment of \$200, we have in one year saved three times the amount of the affiliation fee, indeed, in this city, where we formerly expended annually from seven hundred to one thousand dollars in transient relief, we have reduced our expenditure some sixty per cent.

I fraternally ask you to read the enclosed circular and place it before the proper committee of your Grand Lodge, with a view to the affiliation of your jurisdiction with our association.

I hope to have the pleasure, some day, of your personal acquaintance, and would gladly welcome you to our Annual Communication, which will be held in this city next July.

All of which I respectfully ask your attention to, and would suggest that a special Committee be

appointed to report thereon.

Brethren, you are aware that this Grand Lodge was organized on the 24th June, 1875, and that we have no account on the records of the first Lodge chartered in this Province. I think it advisable to do so on this occasion. On the 9th day of October, 1797, Saint John's Lodge, now No. 1 in this jurisdiction, received a charter or warrant from the English Provincial Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia under No. 26, subsequently from the Grand Lodge of England. The then Governor of this Island, General Edmund Fanning, being a charter member; at that time this Province was called Saint John's Island, and in consequence of many mistakes of letters and merchandize addressed to persons in the Island by being carried through mistake to Saint John's, Newfoundland, or Saint John, New Brunswick, or Saint John's on the Labrador Coast, or elsewhere. By Act of Parliament the name was changed to that of Prince Edward Island on the 20th day of November, 1798, and received the Royal allowance Frbruary 1st, 1799. In grateful remembrance of that peculiarly auspicious and happy period when this Island was under the command of Lieutenant General His Royal Highness, Prince Edward Duke of Kent, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces in Nova Scotia, Island Saint John, Cape Breton and Newfoundland, and the father of Her most gracious Majesty the Queen.

We also feel pleased to note the fact that the Prince was a distinguished mason, and took a deep interest in the prosperity of the Craft. Saint John's Lodge is now nearly a century old, is one of our most prosperous Lodges and without a link being missing has come down to the present time, through the Anti-Masonic persecution of 1826 to 1836, when many Lodges on this continent went down. When I had the privilege of being made a mason, now nearly half a century ago, Saint John's Lodge was only recovering from that vile persecution. The total number of affiliated masons then on the Island being some eighteen, and the funds in a low condition. For sixty years (save a few years of the existence of Sussex Lodge) Saint John's Lodge was the only Lodge on the Island, Victoria, No. 2, being organized in 1857.

I am also pleased to note that among the distinguishable features of the Craft in this jurisdiction, is the disposition in the brotherhood to reduce its beautiful precepts to practice. None of these have higher claims than of visiting the sick, sympathizing with and aiding those upon whom disease has laid its heavy hand; and as funds are often required, it is to be regretted that we are not in a position to set apart annually a sum for charitable purposes. Cannot something be done in this direction? Would it not be advisable to appoint a committee to report on this subject at our next annual communication?

There is another subject that should engage the attention of this Grand Lodge. I allude to non-affiliated Masons. Some action should be taken with the view of inducing them to return to their first love; it should be distinctly understood that no brother has a right to the charities or privileges of the Craft, who withdraws from the Fraternity, and does not in any way contribute to its support when he has the ability to do so.

Grand Master No. 14. The of the interest manifested in Freemasonry and their zeal in it when I inform them that the Worshipful Master and Tyler drove over ten miles to fill their offices. This is one of the Lodges possessed of an active membership and much is to be expected from it.

June 14th 1 visited Zetland Lodge, No. 7. M. W. Past Grand Master Neil McKelvie was present as representative of the Grand Lodge. The meeting was small. This Lodge, like all Lodges in the country, is under the disadvantage of its members being scattered, and many of them living at a distance. At the time of my visitation the principal officers were absent. The Lodge was opened by W. M. Champion, assisted by Brother Dyer and others. The books were examined by Brother McKelvie and were satisfactory, as well as the working of the Lodge by their pro tem officers.

I visited St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 13, at their communication in June. The work done was creditable to the officers. The average attendance is small. A number of the Brethren reside in Murray Harbor where I believe there is sufficient material for a new Lodge.

June 17th, I visited Orient Lodge, No. 11. This is one of the best worked Lodges under this jurisdiction; the work I witnessed would do credit to any city Lodge.

I paid no official visit to King Hiram or Mount Lebanon Lodges, but have been present with them a number of times during the year. I witnessed the conferring of degress and their manner of conducting Lodge business which was entirely satisfactory. A number of fine young men have been recently admitted and are valuable members of these Lodges.

I was present with the Brethren of True Brother's Lodge, No. 8, at their regular meeting in June, and find a marked improvement in the work and attendance. A motion has been made, having in view the removal of the Lodge to Cape Traverse and organizing a new one at Crapaud. I have every confidence in the wisdom of this movement as there are some twenty masons in and around Victoria. Some little friction has arisen in consequence of the proposed change which I feel sure can be allayed, and two good Lodges opened where there is at present only one, by the attendance at their meeting in July or August of a large representation of officers of the Grand Lodge.

I regret being unable to visit St. John's, Victoria, Alexandra, St. George's and Mount Zion Lodges. I am delighted to hear through your representatives to these Lodges the very satisfoctory reports from them; such reports were to be expected from these staunch old pioneer Lodges in Freemasonry.

I entirely agree with the Deputy Grand Master when he says that he is more than ever of the opinion that the official visits give an impetus to our Lodges and are calculated to cement the bonds of brotherly love. I believe that visitations by the Grand Master, accompanied by some of his officers, are a necessity to the existance of some of our Lodges, and that no Brother should accept office who cannot give some time to the work.

In conclusion I ask the members of Subordinate Lodges who have treated me so courteously to accept my thanks, and I trust that the very important office of Grand Lecturer for the coming year will be given to some brother who has more knowledge of Freemasonry and more time to attend to its somewhat difficult yet pleasant duties.

DECISIONS RENDERED BY GRAND MASTER.

Physical Qualification.—There is nothing in the constitution or landmarks for disqualifying a hunchback from being initiated into Masonry, provided he could comply with all the ceremonies of the initiated in the several degrees.—(Proceedings, May, 1877).

LODGE BUSINESS.—It is not competent for a Subordinate Lodge at an emergent meeting to enter on any other business than that specified on the summons.—(Proceedings, 1887).

Restoration.—A brother who has been indefinitely suspended, can be restored to membership by a majority vote of the Lodge at any regular communication, notice having been given at a previous regular communication, that a motion to that effect would be made.—(Proceedings, 1880).

Masonic Burial.—The friends of a brother who died while under suspension for non-payment of dues, cannot by paying his dues, entitle him to Masonic burial.—(Proceedings, 1880).

MOTIONS.—A brother who gives notice of motion to amend the Constitution cannot delegate another brother to move in the matter in his absence.—(Proceedings, 1880).

Demits cannot be granted to Entered Apprentices and Fellow Crafts, 1885.

Lodge working U. D. cannot affiliate brethren, 1885.

DEMIT.—A vote of the Lodge is the demit, the paper the evidence thereof.

ALTERATION OF THE CONSTITUTION.—Section 14 of the By-Laws as amended to read:

The Officers of a Subordinate Lodge shall be installed on the 27th day of December, or as soon thereafter as practicable, but not later than the Regular Communication in January.
