

### The Farmer's Corner. Value of Manure.

The extravagance of farmers is one The extravagance of farmers is one of the crying sins of the age. Cold SPRING barns cause an extra consumption of fodder from 25 to 50 per cent., all of which could be saved by having wellprotected, comfortable barns. The upland soil is starved, while piles of barnyard manure lie exposed through the winter months to frost and rain, utterly destroying its fertilizing qualities. A late number of the Maine Farmer referred to the value of

liquid excrement as follows: 'Chemical analysis shows that the excrements (solid and liquid) from a a single year yield 252 pounds of potash, 133 pounds of nitrogen and 34 pounds of phosphoric acid. Of the above the urine contains about 70 pounds of potash and 58 pounds of nitrogen. Farmers who have sheep, (and all ought to have them,) should watch them closely at this season of the year, Disease may spread very rap-If they appear to have a cold in the head or a cough, lose no time in giving them a coat of tar. Salt frequently, mixing a little rosin with the salt. This is good for them sick or well. Ewes raising lambs, need pure water; as a general thing the dew is sufficient for sheep, but when nursing it is not, and they will likely become diseased if they have not a supply. TO KEEP MILK FOR SIX MONTHS. -Cork in bottles and place these in a pan of cold water, which is then to be raised gradually to the boiling point. Then take out the bottles and allow them to cool before setting them in a cool place. If it is ever necessary or desirable to keep milk so long, the plan may be worth try-

To CLEAN ORNAMENTS .- To clean gold ornaments, dissolve a little sal ammoniac in spirits of wine and wash the gold in it; or try the following method; Mix some jeweler's rouge with a little salad oil and with a toothbrush rub the ornament till perfectly clean. Then wash it in warm soap and water with a clean brush and dry it with wash-leather.

To WASH BLANKETS. - Have plenty of warm water, in which you have previously melted, say, a quarter of a pound of white soap, free from rosin, stirring well until it is a lather; add to this one teacupful of magical mixture, stir again, put in your blankets and turn them around in it for ten minutes, keeping the boiler on the range, but do not allow it to boil; take them out in clear water and rub them, rinse them in a water slightly blued, wring and snap and shake them until the water is out of them, then let them get perfectly dry and press them under damp muslin. 
