Gladstone's Defeat.

HOW IT WAS BROUGHT ABOUT.

London, July 8.- In the Commons Friday atternoon, during the debate on the report of the Repression Bill, Gladstone said the Government had taken measures unknown to Parliament to operate against secret societies. The report on the Repression bill was finished at 1 p. m. Trevelyan moved the third reading which was carried, Collings, Cowen, Labouchere and Storey being the only dissentients
