SUDDEN DEATH OF

CAMPBELLTON BANKER

E. B. Fairbanks, Manager of the Bank of Commerce Stricken Last Thursday

Last Thursday evening the community was shocked to hear of the sudden death of Mr. E. B. Fairbanks, manager of the Bank of Commerce here. The late gentleman, who was a keen fisher had driven up to Morrisey Rock in the afternoon, and in company with a young lad, entered a canoe, and started poing up the river. Mr. Fairbanks shortly afterwards complained of a pain and asked to be put ashore to rest. He lay down and after some time, when his companion went to investigate, was horrified to find Mr. Fairbanks in a critical condition and speechless. A hurried call was immediately phoned to town and Dr. Pinault responded, but before he arrived the unfortunate gentleman had passed away. Rev. T. F. D. Munn, the minister of St. Andrew's broke the sad news to Mrs. Fairbanks and family, and extended the sympathy of the congregation and the community in their hour of bereavement. The remains were conveyed on Saturday to Oxford, N. S., where interment took place on Sunday, a large number attending the funeral where the deceased was well known, he having married a Miss Oxley of that town. He leaves to mourn his loss his widow and four young children, three boys and a girl, to whom every sympathetic kindness is being shown. Mr. Fairbanks was transferred from Springhill, N. S., a little over a year ago to take charge of the local branch of the Bank of Commerce, and during his short stay, made many friends here, who esteemed him as a most valued friend and upright business man.

BRIDGE INSPECTOR HAS SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Eugene Savage, I.C.R. Bridge Inspector Badly Hurt, when Trolley Jumps Track

Mr. Eugene Savage, I. C. R. Bridge Inspector, met with a very serious accident, near Rogersville, on the North Shore, Tuesday afternoon, when a small gasoline trolley which he was driving jumped the track and hurled him across the right of way, inflicting painful injuries.

The I. C. R. authorities have received but very meagre information but from reports which have reached the press, it is learned that the official's injuries are not likely to prove fatal, although they are of a very painful nature. The story is to the effect that Mr. Savage who has charge of all the track carpenters and bridgemen on the division, and who does much of his travelling on a "speedy," was anxious to reach Rogersville ahead of a freight train which was following him. He therefore put the machine up to a high speed.

On a curve near Rogersville, the train grew too much for the light trolley which climbed the outside rail and took to the woods, throwing Mr. Savage off. He was picked up and carried to a farm house nearby and medical aid was summoned. So far as can be learned, there was no one else on the trolley at the time of the accident.

ELECTRICAL STORM NEAR FREDERICTON

Fredericton, July 22.—During a heavy electrical storm of last evening large barns owned by Edward Brown, of Scotch Lake, were struck by lightning and burned to the ground. The loss is estimated at about \$700, the barns containing several valuable pieces of farm machinery and two or three wagons.

The storm which passed over this city was one of the heaviest of the season. Over an inch of rain fell in three hours.

W. L. T. WELDON DIES
IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Car Stalled on Hill, Ran Back
And Overtaken in The
Ditch

Chatham, N. B., July 18.—The worst and most appalling accident in the history of automobilism on the North Shore, occurred Thursday night, some time after eleven o'clock at a point about ten miles above Nelson on the road to Blackville, when W. L. T. Weldon, a well-known Chatham tailor, was pinned beneath his car, when it overturned in backing down a steep hill, was fatally injured and finally consumed by the flames which broke out immediately and burned car and unfortunate owner.

Of the other three occupants of the car, only one suffered any injuries. Nathan Deskin, of Montreal, who had his foot and head injured, and is now undergoing treatment at the Hotel Dieu. The others, Willie Dick and Herman Flam, escaped unscathed.

The party left town Thursday night early in Mr. Weldon's car. Previous to setting out, Mr. Weldon had some trouble with his brake, and took the car back to his house, but he found that it would take so long to remedy the matter that he decided to take the car as it was and run the risk.

"We'll chance it, boys," was what he said, according to the account that Nathan Deskin, now in the hospital, gave. "If nothing happens, all right; we'll take the risk." They accordingly set out, and when they came to the pumping station, above town, Mr. Weldon got out and secured a brick, with which he fixed one of the brakes, so Deskin says, so as to make it movable. They had traversed their business, and about a quarter to eleven had set out on their return to Chatham. All went well until they came to the steep hill about ten miles out of Nelson, where they had trouble in making the ascent. On the way up this time the car stalled in the middle of the steep ascent and with the brake fastened, it could not be held, but began to descend rapidly.

Mr. Weldon must have given the wheel a turn in the hope of making the car stop, because Mr. Deskin says they had not gone half a dozen yards when the car turned turtle. He thinks that the other two jumped, but he himself could not get wholly clear. He says that Mr. Weldon was struggling to get clear, but was caught by the steering and other apparatus and when Mr. Deskin finally crawled out of the wreck which he said probably took him about two minutes he saw that Mr. Weldon was pinned in the driver's seat, weak from pain and undoubted injuries. Fire had broken out as the gasoline supply pipe had been torn open and Mr. Weldon could only faintly gasp, "Put out the fire, boys."

They attempted to do with branches and dust, and also to list the car and free Mr. Weldon, but they could not budge the heavy machine. In spite of their efforts, the fire gained and as they realized the desperate condition of the unfortunate man beneath the car they almost lost their reason. They fought and struggled with the flames and the dead weight of the car, but all in vain and the precious minutes in which rescue might be effected were passing with awful rapidity.

Finally Messrs. Dick and Flam went in one direction for help and Mr. Deskin in another. The latter succeeded in arousing a farmer and they all began to haul up the car, but it was impossible.

As Deskin recalled the terrible scenes, the poor man gasping for his last breath amid what had become a veritable inferno, supplicating for help, their own total helplessness and impotence in the terrible fifteen minutes that elapsed from the time the accident happened until all hope of rescue was at an end, he broke down into uncontrollable sobs, his frame shook and quivered and he seemed to cry almost in agony. "Oh, God, what did we do! we could not lift it and the flames drove us back. Oh, it was horrible, horrible."

Controlling himself with an effort, Deskin resumed his story, but little more light could be thrown on the matter. He said that he stayed by the car for about twenty minutes until it was merely a matter of time when all would be ashes. He had lost his hat and some kind hearted resident gave him one, and he was driven finally to the railway and came into town on the Maritime yesterday morning. He went to the Albert House and from there he was compelled to go to the hospital.

The hill where the accident happened is on the farther side of the Barnaby River along the road that teams and automobiles must now take in order to get across the river. The bridge at the mouth has been down for many months, and a three mile drive inland is necessary to get across the upper bridge. While making this detour Thursday night over this road, which is in bad condition and contains a large double hill, the accident happened.

A remarkable fact was that while going on the up trip the car had stopped on the counterpart of the same hill and had backed down several yards until it struck a tree which stopped and held it upright. Had the brake been in working condition, possibly the accident might have been avoided.

The terrible accident has cast a deep gloom over the community as Mr. Weldon was well known and progressive citizen. He took much interest in civic and provincial politics, and conducted a large clothing and tailoring business here. Mr. Weldon is survived by his wife, and five children, one of whom, Lorne, is at Sussex with the cadets.

HELPFUL HOUSEHOLD HINTS

(Prepared Especially For Our Paper.)

With fresh fruits a number of pleasing drinks and cold desserts may be made, and when the system craves something cooling during this very hot weather, someone of the healthful delicious drinks and dishes here given may be just what is needed.

—RASPBERRY CUP—

Dissolve five ounces of tartaric acid in two quarts of water and pour over twelve pounds of ripe berries. After twenty four hours, strain and add one pound and a half of sugar. This is a good recipe for long keeping.

—RAISIN WINE—

Put three pounds of raisins chopped and seeded, one pound of sugar, and six quarts of cold water in a stone crock back of the stove, let stand three or four days—skim often—filter through linen, then bottle. Add to each bottle a little stick cinnamon, lemon peel and a few cloves. Cork well and keep in the cellar for two weeks before using.

—GINGER BEER—

Two ounces of root ginger, crushed one ounce of cream of tartar, one lemon sliced, four cups of sugar. Put all in a stone crock and pour over six quarts of boiling water, when almost cold put in one cup of yeast or one yeast cake dissolved. Cover with a cloth and let stand until the following day—Strain bottle and cork tightly. Use in three days, keep in cold place, this will last three weeks.

—CAFE FRAPPE—

Make clear strong coffee—sweeten to taste—pour into freezing can and chill thoroughly. Serve in tall glasses with a spoonful of whipped cream on top of each.

—PINEAPPLE NECTAR—

Pare a good ripe pineapple and grate on a coarse grater. Add to each pint of pulp, half a pint of water—press through a sieve, and to every quart, add a pound of sugar boiled to a syrup with a cupful of water—when cool add the whipped white of an egg—beat thoroughly for a few minutes and place on ice, until time to serve.

A DELICIOUS FROZEN PUDDING

Make a custard of the yolks of four eggs, two tablespoonsful of sugar and one pint of cream, when cool, add one dozen macaroons crumbled fine, flavor all with vanilla, freeze, but not stiff. Place a layer of the mixture in a mould, on top of this a layer of strawberries, then a layer of mixture, then one of berries and so on until mould is full, pack in ice for three or four hours before serving.

—ANGEL PARFAIT—

Place over the fire in a saucepan half a cup of water and half a cup of sugar stir until sugar dissolves then boil without stirring until it spins a thread. In the meantime beat until stiff and dry the whites of three eggs and add to them slowly the hot syrup after it has been taken from the fire for about half a minute, beat well and flavor with vanilla, when cold stir in gently a pint of cream well whipped and drained, put into mould and pack at once in ice and salt for about four hours. This is a simple and very dainty frozen dessert.

Paris, July 16.—How two military aeroplanes destroyed with bombs the inaccessible mountain stronghold of the Riata tribesmen in the Taza region of Morocco, is described in despatches which have been received here. The tribesmen's retreat had been located and General Gouraud sent out the two aeroplanes. The attacking parties carried four bombs each. They speedily discovered the hiding places and dropped the bombs with such precision that the camp was destroyed, many tribesmen being killed. The aviators then made maps showing the position of the fastness, which enabled General Gouraud to round up the natives who had escaped death by the bombs.

The inclusion or exclusion of areas like the entire county of Tyrone or the northern portion of Fermanagh will form a great stumbling-block to any successful negotiations.

IMMIGRATION RULES
TO BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

Ottawa, July 20.—A circular has just been issued by the Department of Immigration, declaring its intention henceforth not only to warn all but agricultural laborers and domestics against coming to the Dominion, but also to reject them if they fall under any of the restrictive clauses of the immigration regulations. The fact that a man who comes under the category has a promise of employment will not save him from rejection as formerly. In such a case the department takes the view that if he secured such a position he does so by taking a job which might otherwise have been filled by one of Canada's own unemployed, among whom every trade and occupation is already represented.

The department is becoming alarmed at the applications for deportation which it is daily receiving from points where the unemployed are plentiful.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER TO VISIT PROVINCE

Plans Being Made For Liberal Convention at Moncton in August

Liberals in New Brunswick will be glad to know that at this most interesting time in the political history of the province, that Sir Wilfrid Laurier the great Liberal chief, will in all probability pay a visit to New Brunswick and deliver two addresses at central points. It is expected that the Liberal leader will spend the last week of August in the Maritime Provinces and deliver two addresses in each, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia before leaving on his projected tour of the west.

E. Mr. McDonald, M. P., for Pictou, one of the fighting Liberals in the House of Commons was in St. John this week, and met between trains F. B. Carvell, M. P. for Carleton, and E. S. Carter, Liberal organizer. Mr. McDonald brought the good news that Sir Wilfrid was planning to spend the last week in August just before leaving on his Western trip, in the Maritime Provinces. Two meetings, one of these in Moncton, are to be arranged in New Brunswick and the same in Nova Scotia, with places and dates to be announced later.

On his western trip Sir Wilfrid is to be accompanied by Mr. Carvell, Hon. McKenzie King and Hugh Guthrie, M. P. for South Wellington.

ATTORNEY GENERAL WILL INVESTIGATE

Complaint is Made That Three Englishmen Arrested at Dalhousie Unfairly Treated

A matter has been brought to the attention of the provincial immigration authorities here, which has been described as an outrage, in the arrest at Dalhousie, of three recently arrived English immigrants for non-payment of taxes. It seems that during the latter part of May, in response to advertisements of the kind sent out by the superintendent, a letter was received by Mr. Gilchrist from John E. Dean, of the Inch Arran Hotel, Dalhousie, asking that some of the immigrants then being brought out from England by the provincial government, be assigned to him.

Mr. Gilchrist immediately got in touch with a party of immigrants who had just arrived at Quebec by the Empress of Ireland, with the result that three of the men of the party went directly from Quebec to Dalhousie and went to work at Inch Arran.

On Saturday last right in the busiest part of the day, the tax collector of the town of Dalhousie appeared at Inch Arran with constables and had all three of the recently arrived Englishmen arrested for the non-payment of their taxes. As the men themselves had but recently arrived from England and still owed their passage money, they were in no position to pay.

Mr. Dean immediately offered to put up a deposit for the men, but the tax collector and his assistants would not hear of it, and the three men were hustled off and lodged in the Dalhousie jail.

Mr. Dean immediately got in touch with the provincial immigration authorities here by telephone and laid the matter before them. Yesterday Mr. Gilchrist communicated the facts of the case to the attorney general, who will take up the matter without delay.

Mr. Gilchrist claimed that newly arrived immigrants are not liable for taxes for six months after they arrive, and there is no reason whatever for the attitude of the Dalhousie authorities. It is the policy of the immigration authorities to look after their newly arrived emigrants, not only on their arrival but after they have located in the province. This is the first case of the kind that has been brought to their attention, and after his talk with the attorney general, Mr. Gilchrist said that he thought it would be the last.

REV. R. H. STAVERT HONORED.
Rev. R. H. Stavert, of Harcourt, Kent county, field secretary for the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, has returned from Newport, R. I., where he was in attendance at the annual convention of the National Division of the Sons of Temperance. Rev. Mr. Stavert was elected Most Worshipful Patriarch of the National Division. He is the youngest man ever honored with election to that office.

CARNIVAL OF GRAFT NOW DISCLOSED

Hon. H. F. McLeod, the Next Collector.—J. S. Scott Paid \$1,500

Mr. J. S. Scott, one of the Valley Railway sub-contractors, testified to the payment to Hon. H. F. McLeod of \$1,500 for his influence in securing the contract at the session of the Royal Commission investigating the Dugal charges this morning. The Crown Land charges have been adjourned, and the Valley Railway investigation will be completed before argument is heard in the other case. Hon. H. F. McLeod, who is charged with receiving money from contractors, participated in the proceedings by taking a part in the argument. There was a lengthy dispute between opposing counsel regarding the powers of the Commission to investigate the dealings with the sub-contractors whose dealings had been with other contractors and not with the government. The argument lasted for upwards of an hour, and on its conclusion the Commission decided to admit the evidence. The witness told of making arrangements to pay Hon. H. F. McLeod \$1,500 for his assistance in securing a contract, and swore that on Mr. McLeod's instructions he forwarded it by express on June 26 to Mr. Massie, then manager of the Bank of Montreal, whom he had previously instructed to give it to Mr. McLeod. Mr. Massie had since died, but witness had been told by Mr. McLeod that he had received the money. He believed that he would not have secured the contract without making the payment. Mr. Scott's evidence was not completed this morning, but as the cross-examination was deferred at Mr. Carter's request, the evidence of Mr. C. Fred Chestnut was heard.

MEMBER OF LEGISLATURE DISCUSSES REVELATIONS

Suggests Early Caucus of Colleagues to Deal With Situation

The St. John Globe says:—Everywhere on the street there is discussion of the premier's testimony in the Crown Land investigation and speculation as to the future. Political friends of the Government, astounded at the revelations, declare there must be an immediate reorganization. Political opponents, equally surprised, are hoping the charges they foresee as imminent will again give them control of the province. Everyone is stunned by the disclosures, and the good men of both parties say what the Globe has been saying from the first, that there must be an entirely new deal with reference to the crown lands, fair alike to the lumbermen and the people. Talking over the situation this morning a member of the legislature said there was a feeling among those of his colleagues whom he had seen, that at as early a date as the Government could convene, supporters in the legislature should be called together to discuss the situation. The Government supporters were, he felt, as anxious as everyone else for clean government, and would insist on action that would convince all in the province of their honesty of purpose. The member did not care to predict any line of action for the caucus of Government supporters, but declared his belief that they would insist on a change of leadership. Hon. Mr. Fleming's admission of his knowledge of what was going on made it impossible for the party to continue to support him. As no other member of the Government has been connected with the scandal and as the premier has admitted he kept knowledge of the fund from colleagues it should be easy for all to rally to the support of Hon. Mr. Clarke or whoever is chosen to lead the Government.

BE PREPARED

In view of the fact that the Provincial elections cannot long be deferred after the revelations of graft disclosed by the Dugal investigation, in which Premier Fleming has been concerned, the Liberals throughout the province should see that their districts are thoroughly organized.

The disclosure have been such that no doubt a large percentage of the electorate will cease to vote Conservative, but that party will make a last desperate effort to retain power.

True the "sinews of War," the great graft fund, will not be available, but there are other sources from which election funds can be levied, and no doubt there will be a fair sized amount to fight the next election.

With proper organization, this country will send two Liberals to the next legislature.

The party leaders should meet and decide upon holding a convention of those in favor of clean government at an early date, so that every polling district can be properly organized and preparations made for the coming battle.

With reference to the Dominion elections an exchange says:—
"The chief organ of the Liberal party in Canada, the Toronto Globe, does not accept the positive statement of Postmaster General Pelletier that there will be no general election in the Dominion this year. Other minister and party organs have made intimations of the same kind, but the Toronto Globe have such grave reasons for the matter that it advises Liberals to watch political developments very closely and put candidates into the field for the Commons at the earliest possible moment." The Globe's view is that it is not at all improbable that the Borden government will go to the country in the fall, and its reasons for coming to this conclusion are frankly stated: "Ever since Sir Robert and his colleagues came to power on the understanding that they were elected

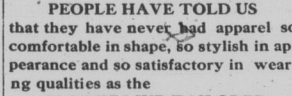

The past week has brought before the public some very interesting particulars in regard to the matters being investigated by the Dugal Commission.

Mr. E. R. Teed, the man who received the greater part of the fund collected from the lumbermen, went on the stand and said that Premier Fleming asked him to take charge of the fund. He said further that the missing Mr. Berry had collected other amounts which he had refused to take from him. On being questioned in regard to what he did with the money, Mr. Teed said that he had loaned some of it to Premier Fleming's lumber company, that he had bought some stocks from the Premier with more of it, and that more still had been invested in different other stocks. On following the matter up, it was brought out that Mr. Fleming had returned his loan, and that all the stocks had been disposed of since the enquiry began, so that now the fund so far as Mr. Teed had charge of it, was practically intact. So much for Mr. Teed.

Mr. Fleming's testimony was even more interesting. He admitted that he knew that a campaign fund was being raised, and that he named Mr. Teed to look after it. He knew that Mr. Berry had collected some of the money although he had expressly forbidden him to have anything to do with it. He had not reprimanded Mr. Berry, nor could he yet see anything dishonorable in the transaction, for he said it was not for himself, but for the party. On being asked if he would send a telegram asking Mr. Berry to come back to testify before the Commission, he emphatically refused to do so.

Mr. Fleming steadily persisted in his contention that as far as he knew the lumbermen had contributed voluntarily to the campaign fund, that it did not effect his decision in regard to the prices placed on the leases, and that there was absolutely no idea of extortion.

Mr. Fleming may be perfectly sincere in his views in regard to this matter; he may have believed and he may still believe that his connection with this campaign fund was not compromising, but it is very doubtful if there is another person in the whole country who at the present moment agrees with him. Most people will be of the opinion that the Premier of the province should have no direct connection with campaign funds, particularly when the fund is being raised just when an important arrangement is being made

SPRUCE BUD MOTH DOING MUCH DAMAGE

Experts From the Department Will be in the Province to Control Pest

Destructive caterpillars of various kinds have been particularly numerous this year and among the worst of them has been one affecting the spruce. From Chatham to Tracadie the ravages of this insect are apparent all along the highway; and Mr. R. A. Stowball in an endeavour to get light on the operations of this destructive insect and learn if possible of any parasite that would kill it off, wrote to the department of agriculture at Fredericton describing the insect and sending under separate cover specimens of the branches and the insects or caterpillars on them.

Mr. Daggett, who is secretary to the department, replied as follows and his letter is of interest:

Dear Sir:—I have yours of the 15th instant. The spruce twigs have not yet arrived, but, as I am to be away from the office for several days after today, I have decided to answer, presuming that these are the Spruce Bud Moth, which is giving so much trouble in the province at the present time. Large areas are affected.

This moth makes its nest in the end of the twig, lays its eggs, and the young caterpillars hatch there. It does not affect the tree, except in stopping that year's growth. This, of course, is serious, and would be much more so were it not for the fact that a parasite has developed which in many localities is destroying the caterpillars. It is so widely spread and of such a nature that at present we know of no means to control it. In some sections the parasite has very largely wiped it out.

Our field men are watching this pest very carefully. We are to have two experts in the province in August, who are to tour the province; one of them is one of the most famous entomologists in the world. If anything can be done to control this by artificial means he will advise us.

If when your twigs come to hand we find it different we will be pleased to advise you, but from your description I think I am right in calling it the Spruce Bud Moth.

Toronto Globe's Comments on New Brunswick Graft Charges

Toronto, Ont., July 18.—The Globe says regarding the New Brunswick graft charges:

"When the Premier of a province makes such admissions in the witness box as Premier Fleming of New Brunswick made on Thursday there can be but one end to the story. After the royal commission report New Brunswick will have to choose a new political head. Mr. Fleming is entirely too simple and unsuspicious to deal with the sort of people who are to be found around the lobbies of legislatures.

"There seems to be a feeling in some quarters in New Brunswick that the Premier was only pretending that the fund was a political one, whereas the whole transaction was one of personal graft. In support of this view, it is alleged that even his own colleagues in the government knew nothing of the existence of the money or, of the means, by which it had been secured. It is probable that this does an injustice to Mr. Fleming and that his object was merely to accumulate without attracting public attention money to promote the interests of the Conservative party in New Brunswick by such human devices are known to election workers. His passion for secrecy has proven fatal to his reputation. The royal commission may not find him guilty of extortion but it assuredly will render such a decision as will make his retention of the Premiership or of any place in the public service impossible. Large subscriptions for political purposes are nothing new in Canada history but they must not be levied at the point of a pistol."

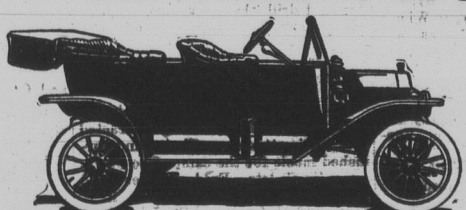

Toronto Globe's Comments on New Brunswick Graft Charges

Toronto, Ont., July 18:—The Globe says regarding the New Brunswick graft charges:

"When the Premier of a province makes such admissions in the witness box as Premier Fleming of New Brunswick made on Thursday there can be but one end to the story. After the royal commission report New Brunswick will have to choose a new political head. Mr. Fleming is entirely too simple and unassuming to deal with the sort of people who are to be found around the lobbies of legislatures.

"There seems to be a feeling in some quarters in New Brunswick that the Premier was merely to accumulate without attracting public attention money to promote the interests of the Conservative party in New Brunswick by such human devices as known to election workers. His passion for secrecy has proven fatal to his reputation. The simple and unassuming find him guilty of extortion but it assuredly will render such a decision as will make his retention of the Premiership or of any place in the public service impossible. Large subscriptions for political purposes are nothing new in Canada history but they must not be levied at the point of a pistol."

DISASTROUS FIRE IN QUEBEC VILLAGE

Nearly Twenty Houses Destroyed at Val Brilliant.—I. C. R. Trains Held Up

Quebec, July 18.—Between fifteen and twenty houses were destroyed by fire yesterday in the flourishing village of Val Brilliant, in the Valley of the Matapedia. The blaze started in a butter factory about 11 o'clock yesterday morning and fanned by a strong wind, spread rapidly. The burned buildings include stores and dwellings, and the Intercolonial Railway tank was also burned. The total damage probably amounts to \$100,000. While it was going on, the Intercolonial trains were held up, owing to the extreme heat and the fact that debris was falling on the track. Telephone and telegraph communication is interrupted.

JUDGE McLATCHY DISPOSES OF TWO CRIMINAL CASES

The July session of the County Court opened in the Court House last Tuesday, and the Grand Jury brought in true bills against the prisoners charged with criminal offences.

Michael Casey, charged with stealing a bicycle from Martin Melanson, pleaded guilty, and was sentenced by the Court to two months in the County Jail. The Police Magistrate and the Crown Prosecutor had both spoken to the Judge in regard to the previous good character of the accused, and His Honor referred to this in giving a light sentence.

Wm. Watson pleaded not guilty to the charges of stealing a watch and a pair of pants. He was found guilty on both accounts, and was given 4 years and 6 months in the penitentiary. This is the second time this young man has been sentenced for misdemeanors of the same sort, and the Judge was therefore quite severe with him.
