**PATHOLOGY OF CONSUMPTION.**  
T. EYDER, WILLIAM EVANS,—"If the maxim be true, that "the knowledge of a disease is half its cure," how greatly is it to be deplored that the knowledge of those prevalent diseases which annually destroy thousands of human beings, is not more generally diffused. How lamentable is it that so few of the human family possess any information upon a subject in which all of others, they are so vitally interested. It will probably be an

To convey this knowledge more extensively than has yet been attempted by any other practitioner, and to direct the attention of the people to those few and simple remedies by which many of the most prevalent diseases may be averted, is the object of the present publication. Evans in this and other pathological sciences which he will publish, upon the authority of the highest medical writers of the age, his instruction will necessarily be brief, but accuracy will be undeniable.

**CONSUMPTION.**—Of this disease, in one form or others of its forms, four thousand persons die annually in New York within the last seven years; this is proved by the city bills of mortality; and its victims throughout the country, have been in almost the same proportion to the population. partial Consumption, the cough is frequent and violent, with a copious expectoration, which sometimes, but not frequently, streaked with blood. It is often attended with a change in the voice, and in Appetite. This variety is usually the result of a erofulous tain in the system generally, which when thus seated in the lungs, can seldom be arrested in its fatal progress, unless met with a variety of phlegmy Consumption, begins with the following common symptoms, by removing which, it may certainly be cured. The patient is sensible of an unusual languor, breathes with less than his usual freedom, and consequently with more frequent expirations, and is induced by the same to hasten himself by making a deeper respiration than is usual, which is attended with a sigh. When he does this he usually feels an uneasiness across the chest; and if these symptoms increase, they are attended with more than ordinary perspiration at night, and a constant cough, which is attended with a discharge for exertion and affected with mucus or blood, or both, and is attended with a sense of headache. He coughs occasionally with complaining of the inconvenience, but if

gradually becoming debilitated, and experiencing an aggravation of all the above symptoms. This is the worst stage of the disease, and in general the only being the only step at which there is any reasonable hope of being cured. Mr. Evans will not go on to describe the truly melancholy and dreadful symptoms by which this stage is characterized. To do so would be to offend the feelings of the sick. St. John, Dec. 1, 1833.

The day was clear and bright, as it generally is after a heavy gale and severe storm. The annual mounds, when my friend and myself strolled forth to view, the devastation this one had made. It was a rough place where we were in, and whither we sought refuge from the fury of the impending storm, two days previous to its occurring. We returned to dine at the comfortable inn, and then strolled out to view the surrounding country. "I," then took his gun in his hand, and about two o'clock, we started on our way. We had walked about four miles to the shore nearly opposite to the spot where the wreck of a fish brig was lying; here he struck on the first of the gale, parted into

the fields, when our attention was arrested by the appearance of two young girls, who stood leaning over a low stone wall, and peering in silence upon the wrecked vessel. On hearing them, they turned away from the scene they had been contemplating, and fixed their attention upon us; the younger seemed to be about nine years old, the latter appeared to have numbered sixteen summers. It was well lighted below, and the silent stars above appeared as spectators looking down upon the curious scene. Several groups of persons were scattered over the ground, familiarly and easily conversing together. Suddenly a flock of birds appeared above us — fire, Titson, cried a stranger, "fire!"

Tilton, with others rushed instinctively to the door, but I maintained my place, and on looking toward the west end of the Court, I beheld an altar before which stood the very female who had first attracted my attention. **SOCR KNOT.**—The manner of preparing this article of food, is not as generally known as its value entitles it to be, and with a desire to extend it to the benefit of your sirs, I have written this for publication in your paper.

In the fall, after we have had two or three freezing nights, collect as many solid heads of cabbage as you wish to preserve, salt (say fifty for a family of six persons), to all the green and imperfect leaves, each head being twice through the heart, cut the stalk out. A cabbage knife should be procured on which the cabbage should be cut fine, and a strong claxar or other metal, previously well soaked and cleaned in hand, the bottom of which to be laid

When extra portions of the cabbage are required, a portion of the barrel is fastened to a hoop, and the barrel is filled to a heaped bushel with the latter, and then gradually packed in the barrel by gently stamping with a suitable wooden rammer. When the barrel is nearly full, it should be placed in a cool dry cellar, on boards, the bottom secured from pressing out; a barrel head or pieces of boards laid on the top of the cabbage, and a heavy weight laid on them. In a week or ten days the pickle should cover the cabbage, or a weak brine must be prepared and poured over when fermentation will commence; and from this time to the end of the season, once a week, the froth should be skimmed off, and the boards, weight, and sides of the barrel cleanly washed. At the end of two weeks it will be fit to cook; and as much of its savory and salutary quality depends on this, it

as warning up what was left the first day as no injury to it; put it in a tin boiler with a piece of fat pork; and, if I have it a spoonful or two of mutton or other dripping, as just sufficient water to boil it nearly dry over a smart fire in three hours. Baked potatoes should always be eaten along with sour kroust, as also a little fat, cooked in this manner, to make a meal. The potatoes are better boiled in a separate vessel, but they can be boiled with the kroust; though very apt to get heavy. Sour kroust should be all used before the approach of warm weather, as the quantity of salt here recommended is too small to preserve it. When it is intended to be used on ship board in a warmer climate, more salt is necessary, and in that case it should be rinsed or soaked in fresh water before cooking.
