STILL CONFIDENT.

New York Central Men Hopeful of Success.

Vice-President Webb Things the Company Will Win the Fight—Heavy
Losses Caused by the Chicago
Switchmen's Strike.

New York, Aug. 26.—Edward Cassidy and Peter Brennan, striking New York Central Railroad employes who assaulted two freight-handlers in the employ of the company recently, were convicted of the offense to-day and sent to prison for three exercises.

Thoy, N. Y., Aug. 26.—John Melino, a freight conductor running between Troy and East Albany, fired three shots from a revolver at a crowd of strikers near the iron works this afternoon. No one was hart, but the affair caused intense excitement. Melino was arrested. He claimed that one of the strikers stoned him.

WHAT MR. WEBB SAYS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Vice-President Webb when told last night that the Supreme Council of the United Order of Railway Employes had declared against a strike, said that was the only wise course to take. The entire trouble was local in character and had nothing to do with the organization of labor. Whether the Knights will take further steps will make but little difference. There are few Knights in the employ of the New York Central.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Vice-President Webb this morning said everything along the unite line of the road was in good condition as during any day preceding the strike. Five hundred and forty cars were exchanged with the Boston and Albany road alone. He reiterated what he had said before relative to the company having any feeling against labor organizations. Superintendant Voorhees stated that the Knights of Labor, in case they forced a strike, could not do the Central any harm, though with the connecting lines they might cause inconvenience.

General Manager Chappelle, of the Alton road, says none of the strikers will be resemployed. The foreman whose discharge caused the trouble was promoted from switchman, but proved incompetent. His successor formerly had the position, but went into the service of another road. The company, says Mr. Chappelle, is willing to promote men from the ranks, but will not put incompetent men where they do not belong. It is said the Switchmen's Union has informed the strikers that they have a just griswage. promote men iron the rains, blue will not put incompetent men where they do not belong. The switchmen say they object to the new foreman because he is tyrannical. The difficulty has cost those directly interested not far from \$500,000. THE NEW YORK BRICK TIE-UP.
NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—The brick tie-up to-day is as perfect as it can be. It is probable that about 1,000,000 bricks now under contract will be received to day, and these will be the last shipments until the boycott of the Knights of Labor against the Verplanck factory is raised. The effect of the tie-up will be felt about Friday, and if the boycott is persisted in by the Knights, nearly 100,000 men will be thrown out of employment. The boliermakers and range manufacturers are already feeling the effects of the tie-up, which will extend to all trades depending even incidentally upon bricks to continue their work.

DETERMINED TO STAND FIRM.
ALBANY, Aug. 27.—It was expected that a large number of striking Knights would return to work in the yards and shops at West Albany this morning. Very few, however, returned to work and the men who witnessed this defection in their ranks were made more determined than ever to stand firm. The company is moving about half of its usual daily amount of freight, and the blockade cannot be said to be effectually raised as yet.

Mr. Bissell said: "The company's situation improves more and more as each day passes by."

Supt. Hammond, of the Delaware and Hudson, says the full force of 30 yardmen at Schenectady are still out. The situation in yards at Albany remains unchanged. Only two of the strikers have returned to work so far. The Prince of Wales at Homburg.

Homburge, Aug. 25.—His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales is leading a very quiet and regular life here. He gets up early in the morning, and at 7 o'clock walks to the Elizabeth Springs, where he meets the Duke of Cambridge and the Duke of Teck, and where a large, curious crowd always gathers to stare at him. He drinks two or three glasses of the waters and stays sometimes to listen to the band. Then he returns home to breakfast and reads the newspapers till 10 o'clock, when he takes his bath. After this he works till 1 o'clock reading French works on strategy and Bluebooks, when he lunches, usually taking this meal at the Park Hotel, or sometimes on the terrace of the Kurhausse. Afterward he drives to the mountains or takes tea on the balcony of the hotel. At 7 he dines with about half a dozen guests on the terrace, while the band plays in the Kurgarten Pavilion. About 9 the Prince and his guests visit the Kurgarten Concert and return about 11, seldom going to bed later than midnight. He looks very well indeed, and everybody is enchanted with his simplicity and kindness. Before going to bed he usually takes one or two glasses of apollinaris water, with lemon juice in it.

England in Central Africa. London, Aug. 25.—A new compar be known as the Central Africa Com LONDON, Aug. 25.—A new company, to be known as the Central Africa Company, has been organized and has received a charter from the Government. Its purpose is the exploration of the country north of the Zambesi, in the Nyassa region, and as far north as Lake Tanganyika. Its territory is bounded on the east by the German and Portuguese possessions, and on the west by the Congo State. It embraces all the region south of Lake Tanganyika, which

was assigned to Great Britain under the recent Anglo-German agreement. The African Lakes Company has been developing a part of this country for several years. There are now four large English companies in Africa, and they all have remarkable privileges in the way of administration and government similar to those which the East India Company exercised. These companies are the Royal Niger Company, which controls an enormous territory along the Niger and its Benul branch as far as Lake Tchad; the Imperial East Africa Company, which has the region between the Indian Ocean, Victoria Nyanza and the Upper Nile; the South African Company, which is operating in Matabeleland, Mashonaland and the territory north as far as the Zambesi; and the company that has just been formed.

London, Aug. 27.—The question of the hour is who will be appointed to fill the place in the College of Cardinals made vacant by the death of John Henry Newman. The eyes of all Catholics in England are anxiously directed to Rome; but not only these, for so great is the regard for the dead Cardinal that most people of other religious denominations are waiting with interest to learn who will be declared worthy to occupy his chair. Speculation has been rife since the vacancy occurred, and many men have been mentioned as likely to be selected, but so far all is apeculation. There is no doubt that the Catholics have anticipated that the choice will fall on a British subject. Everywhere one hears this expression or belief and the expectation is so strong that it will be an Englishman or an Irishman who will be admitted to the sacred college, that, should the vacant cardinal's hat bejbestowed on a foreign prelate, the appointment will not find favor in the eyes of the Catholics of this country. Among those who have been mentioned as looking with expectant eyes on the red hat are the papal chamberlain, Archbishop Stonor, the Archbishop of Dublin and the Hon. and Rt. Rev. William Clifford, bishop of Clifton.

A meeting of interest to many scientific men of the Province of Ontario was commenced in this city to-day. It was the annual meeting of the Entomological Society of Ontario, the place of meeting being Victoria Hall, where the headquarters of the London Entomological Society are situated. The president, Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, D.C. L., president of Trinity College, Port Hope, occupied the chair. The following members were present: Rev. T. W. Fyles, South Quebec; Mr. Jas. Fletcher, Ottawa; Mr. J. A. Moffat, Hamilton; Dr. Woodruff, Mr. J. M. Denton and Mr. W. E. Saunders, London.

The council presented their annual report, setting forth the proceedings of the society during the past year and the progress which it, has made. Reference was made to the publication of the twentieth annual report to the Legislature; the continued success of the monthly magazine, the Can-adian Entomologist, now in its 22nd volume; the donation to the library of the University of Toronto of a complete set of the society's publications; the various additions of valuable books to the library; and the formation in April last of sections of the society in every department of natural science. Reference was also made to the loss which the society had sustained in the removal of Mr. E. Baines Reed from London to British Columbia, the council placing on record their feelings of deep regret at his removal. Mr. Reed was one of the original members of the society, and for more than a quarter of a century, one of the most active and zealous of its officials, having filled at various times the positions of vice-president, secretary-treasurer, librarian, curator and auditor. To him it was especially due that the library had grown to its present dimensions and value, and that so much progress had been made by the society in many directions. The council begged to thank Mr. Reed for his services in the past and wished him all success and prosperity in his new and important sphere of labor.

The council reported the purchase of large collection of insects, made by Mr. Johnson Pettit, of Grimsby, which were now safely deposited in the rooms of the society.



NIAGARA FALIS, Ont., Aug. 26.—D.
Davies, clerk for the locomotive foreman of the G. T. R. here, in some mysterious manner fell over the river bank at the foot of Queen street and struck on the rocks about 75 feet below about 10:30 o'clock last evening, and must have been stumed and remained unconscious the most of the night. His cries for help were heard by parties on the American side about 8 o'clock this morning, when a rescuing party made a descent and found him. He was immediately placed under chloroform to alleviate his sufferings, after which a rope ladder was lowered down and Davies was put on a stretcher, raised to the top of the cliff and taken to his boarding house. The place where he fell was a few feet from the Government fence. The shrubbery was stripped of its leaves where he went over. Evidently the unfortunate man grasped them as he went down after missing his footing. The doctors in charge expect to bring him through all right. Davies came here from Montreal about three years ago, where it is said his father resides.

A Wisconsin correspondent of the Breeders' Gazette writes of these sheep, a few of which have made their appearance in Canada, some coming recently to Westminster township, as follows, speaking apparently from personal knowledge and experience:

Horned Dorset sheep are now coming to the front and eliciting considerable at-tention from flock-masters and breeders. They belong to the medium-wool class and originated in Dorsetshire, England, many

In general conformation they have many points in common with the Shropshires and Downs generally; they are straight, deep in body, ribs more than ordinarily well arched, broad in loin and shoulder, and hind legs well let down, forming a good leg of mutton. The general appearance is pleasing—head erect, quiet and intelligent eyes, face rather long and thin, with an inclination to be a little convex, nose and lips pink or flesh color; horns in ewes thin, with a symmetrical downward curve. They are small and fine in bone, hardy, remarkably quiet, and easily handled.

Originally, it is said, they were very

Originally, it is said, they were very hardy and capable of subsisting on scanty pasture, and were chiefly noted for their remarkable prolificacy and being excellent unaities; also during the past few years, through careful selection, better feeding and care by the most eminent and skillful breeders, they have straightened and blocked their form, doubled in size, proof and weight of wool, and indeed so freely has this breed responded to the will of the Dorset breed that the Dorset lamb arrives at maturity even earlier than in any other breed.

In no breed has there been greater skill shown by the breeder than in the Dorsets. If those who moulded the straight, erect and well-rounded form of the Down, fixed their habit of early maturity and laying on the kind and quality of flesh desired, did well and merited praise, what shall we say to those who gave to the Dorset these qualities, and at the same time not only retained but increased their original habit of lambing twice a year? It is not infrequent for ewes to produce twin lambs twice a year, and occasionally triplets make their appearance, and more have been known to be produced? To develop these peculiarities, the Dorsetshire Agricultural Society offer prizes each year to the shepherds who shall rear the largest number of lambs with a loss of one-sixth of 1 per cent. of ewes.

We have used a Dorset-Horned ram on high-grade Shropshire and Merino ewes with very promising results. The lambs are growing rapidly, are healthy and strong, and in many cases at 7 weeks old stand quite as high as the Merino dams. Our poor Indians' crops are a total failure, some have not a spear of grass to cut, all is so dried up and one could scarcely tell any grain had been sowed in some of their fields, and I cannot tell what we shall do this winter unless we get more help from Canada than we did last year."
