

Finally, when the outlook was almost hopeless, Congress took the affairs of the city in hand, and reforms were speedily effected. Perhaps Toronto is not yet quite bad enough to justify its being taken in hand in the same way; but if the Government of Oliver Mowat got possession of the city hall it cannot be doubted but radical and valuable changes would soon follow. 

GAS GUNS.

A New Agent for Propelling Dynan Projectiles.

New Agent for Propelling Dynamite Projectiles.

New York, April 27.—A Washington dispatch to the Herald says J. W. Graydon, formerly of the navy, has recently written from London to President Harrison directing the latter's attention to the new gas-producing agent for throwing large masses of high explosives in torpedo shape. He offers to convert all the smooth-bore cannon now mounted in the United States forts into dynamite projectors by applying the gas reservoirs thereto in a month's time at trifling expense. The composition of the new propelling agent, he says, is a secret, only the results being demonstrated. The advantages claimed for the new invention are the cheapness of manufacture, being as cheap as ordinary gunpowder, safety in handling, and the high velocity it gives the projectile with a low pressure.

high velocity it gives the projectile with a low pressure.

Mr. Graydov claims this new discovery greatly simplifies the projection of large masses of high explosives, doing away with the air compressers and other complicated machinery appertaining to pneumatic dynamite gams, sand is free from the danger of explosion within the gun incident to the use of gunpowder. The new agent is to be manufactured in different grades, each grade having a recorded acclerated pressure of from 5,000 pounds to 10,000 pounds to the square inch, so that charges may be selected to suit the distance to what it is desired to throw the projectile containing the explosive. Ordinance experts, while ignorant of the merits of Graydon's invertion, do not hesitate to say he is on the vertion, do not hesitate to say he is on the right track and that he really has a new gas-propelling agency giving the results claimed.

THE WORKING WORLD.

A Strike of Formidable Proportions—The Eight-Hour Movement.

Now that the pay-rolls of the trainmen on the Big Four have been adjusted it is shown that their pay is an advance of just 13 per cent over the old basis.

The Detroit street car companies and their striking employes referred their disputes to five arbitrators for adjustment, and the men return to work on their own terms pending the decision of the arbitrators.

A Berlin dispatch says: "The miners' strikes are attaining formidable proportions around Bochum. Most of the pits are closed. The strikers in the Essen district exceed 15,000. The Bochum miners have appointed 21 delegates to negotiate with the masters for a work day of eight hours and increased wages."
