When the doors were opened the crowd rushed to the platform and overcrowded the trains. Many sat on the floor rather than be left behind. The stench of the atmosphere was suffocating. Frudent passengers—; their own and their neighbour sat the tongues and feels the pulse of the passengers. Everybody protests that be or she is in perfect health. The train then starts. Often within a few minutes a passenger is taken ill with cholera. The immates of the patient's apartment at once become paniestricken. The patient is removed and the place where he sat is sprinkled with carbolic acid and the passengers immediately refill their places. A similar scene occurs frequently. At each station the same perfunctory examination is made. No wonder cholera is spreading in Tillis and other places.

WASHINGTON, July 21 .- In the House today Mr. Hooker, from the Committee or Foreign Aflairs, reported the bill to pro-vide for the calling of an international ar-

vide for the calling of an international arbitration congress.

Mr. Blount, from the Committee on Foreign Aflairs, called up the bill to force reciprocal relations between the United States and Canada. Mr. Blount said the President had in two messages called the attention of Congress to the fact that not-withstanding treaty rights American citizens were discriminated against in the matter of transportation through the Welland, St. Lawrence and other canals. A rebate was accorded to Canadian vessels which was not accorded to American vessels. This bill was designed to require that this discrimination should be abolished and that the treaty rights of American citizens should be preserved.

Mr. Lind (Minn.) inquired whether this bill might not be construed as an abroga-

bill might not be construed as an abroga-tion of the treaty.

Mr. Lind suggested that if it did it would be a very serious matter.

But while we did this we found that for every cargoe that passed through the Welland Canal we were charged ten times as much as were the Canadians. It was a bald fact that American trade was subject to ten times the exactions that Canadian trade was passing through the Welland Canal in For every \$5,000 paid on cargoes going to Canadian ports, \$50,000 was exacted from the grain raise and shipper of the Northwest.

RETALIATION AGAIN. The retaliatory war between Canada and the United States has reached another stage, the House of Representatives at Washington having unanimously passed a bill empowering the President to compel an equality of treatment of United States vessels and Canadian vessels passing through canals controlled by the respective Governments. These retaliatory movements on both sides of the lines are to be regretted. It is of the utmost importance that a policy of conciliation should be adopted by both countries, and that efforts to deal squarely with one another should be constantly made. There are jingoes on both sides of the border, but as a matter of course the jingoes in the smaller country are able to do the interests of their people infinitely more mischief than are the same class of men in the larger country. To advance their own personal and political fortunes, their own personal and political fortunes, to gain a few votes from people who believe in tail-twisting diplomacy, our rulers at Ottawa in recent years have talked and acted in a way calculated to destroy rather than to promote the close international trade relationships the second of the control of the c mote the close international trade relation-ships that are absolutely essential to the prosperity of a large number of our people. They have not profited by the advice of eminent British and Canadian statesmen, who have strongly protested against a policy so opposed to the promotion of in-ternational amity and the best welfare of kinsmen on both sides of the boundary, and their newspaper advocates persist in intheir newspaper advocates persist in in-viting retaliation by professing that it would be a good thing and by daring the United States to "Come on!" A policy founded on common sense can hardly be expected to prevail in a Government where such counsels are listened to. It is a dangerous state of affairs that can only be remedied by a change at Ottawa.

A HUMBUGGING ROYAL COM-MISSION.

An expensive "Royal Commission," ostensibly to consider the question of Prohibition, but in reality to shirk responsibility, is now at work under the auspices of the Dominion Government. What temperance people have to expect from a Government which includes a brewer, an ex-wholesale liquor dealer, and an agent of the distillery interest, may be imagined.

cating liquors and the drinking habits which result from it, are a great evil. The next question, asking for an opinion on the effects of the use of liquor, 'in any degree,' is open to the same objection. Only those who believe that the use of liquor 'IN ANY DEGREE,' great or small, produced bad effects could give an answer ascribing bad results to the traffic. Question 3 asks for an opinion on the effect of using intoxicating liquors 'in moderation'! Surely opinions on these points are not what the commission was appointed to obtain. The questions which follow are only for those who have lived where some form of prohibition has been the law, and are directed to find out opinions respecting the effect of such laws. The large number of persons who have not lived under prohibitory laws can contribute nothing under this head. In our simplicity we supposed it was the object of the royal commission to find what was the prevailing opinion of intelligent, disinterested persons respecting the effect of the legalized sale of intoxicating liquors and the drinking habit which the sale promotes, on the health, morality, industry and domestic happiness of the people. Our answer to this question is that in all these respects it is hurful and pernicious. This is the vital question; but the commission and domestic happiness of the people.

evades asking it. Their questions furnish
a good example of how not to do it."

IMPROVEMENT OF CITY PARKS AND STREETS. The suggestion has been made that the present system of managing our parks, oulevards and street trees would be vastly improved upon if these significant items in the civic assets were placed under the direct control of some capable commis sion made up of persons thoroughly well informed in regard to the best methods of improving and beautifying the city. The city engineer would naturally be a mem ber of the board, which, if managed as well as the waterworks department has been would prove a great advantage to tax payers. London has all the elements tha go to make up a beautiful city. As the 600 visitors who have been here during the past three days have freely admitted, it is the prettiest city in Canada, but its parks, streets, trees and embryo boulevards—that portion of the city that we hold in common should be maintained and improved as occa sion demands according to some uniform plan conceived by men specially adapted by nature or by training to carry out improvements in an aesthetic manner. The expense need not be large, while the benefits would be great. One of the ways that the present council could signalize the usefulness of its regime would be to inaugurate a reform in this direction. We are accustomed to take visitors to one or more of our handsome avenues, and point to them as model thoroughfares. They are indeed beautiful streets, though the shade trees are not all as well kept as they might be, but the question is whether it is not possible to steadily work towards a system that shall not only improve the appearance of these pretty parks and handsome highways, but shall make our other residential etreets like unto them? A well-kept city is a standing advertisement that will certainly repay the advertisers.

The Automatic Newspaper Distributing Company of Chicago, with a capital stock of \$200,000, is the outgrowth of a movement on foot for several months past to perfect the device and to secure patents. This has been accomplished and according to the promoters of the company, the financial backing is ample and its success is assured. The next step is to arrange for the manufacture of the machines and negotiations to that end are on foot. The general principle of the automatic machine to distribute newspapers is similar to the "nickel in the slot" machines by means of which the public occasionally regales itself with in the slot" machines by means of which the public occasionally regales itself with perfume, eigars or chewing gum. A penny or two cents, as the case may be, is dropped into a convenient slot and a handle pulled. Forthwith the purchaser is confronted with the paper he desires, which he removes and makes way for the next purchaser. The newspaper distributors do not stop at merely handing out to the customer his favorite sheet. They will make change when required and it is claimed they will never make a mistake.

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
