Jailers and Burglars Conspire. CALCUTTA. Oct. 19 .- Two warders in the Baraset jail, near here, have been convicted Baraset jail, near here, have been convicted of a conspiracy which has probably no parallel in the history of criminal prisons. These unfaithful guardians of the cells conceived the idea of establishing a profitable partnership with certain burglars under their charge. To this end they selected three convicts, took them to the warders' quarters, exchanged their jail apparel for everyday clothing, and told them to go forth and break into the houses in the beality. The plunder was to be brought "hame" in the morning for equal distribution among the parties concerned, and the covicts were then to resume their peacefuldaily work. Fortunately for the interest disciety, the burglars became discontented ciety, the burglars became discontented with their share of the spoils and were overheard discussing their grievances by another warder, who gave information to the prison authorities. The warders with whom this audiciously ingenious scheme originated were sentenced to two years' rigorous imprisonment, but on appeal thoi case was committed to the criminal sessions

MRS. LUCY STONE DEAD.

One of the Ablest of the Woman Suffrage Boston, Oct. 19.—Lucy Stone, the eminent leader of the woman suffragists, died here last night. Mrs. Stone was born in Wost Brookfield, Mass., in 1818. While she was still a girl her mind became coentrated on the subject of women's rights, and she resolved to have a collegiate education. She graduated from Oberlin in 1847 and the following year began her lectures for female sufrage.

In 1855 she was married to Henry B. Blackwell, but as a matter of principle insisted on retaining her own family name. Some years later her property was seized

Some years later her property was seized for taxation. As a protest she published a pook, "Taxation Without Representation." book, "Taxation Without Representation." a She organized the American Women" a Suffrage Association in 1869. She had for several years been editor-in-chief of the Women's Journal in Boston, with her husband and daughter as associate editors. She published several books, and was recognized as one of the ablest of the leaders in the woman suffrage movement.

MONTREAL'S BIG FIRE.

The Canada Bank Note Company

Burned Out-Less \$150,000.

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 19.—Fire broke out in the building occupied by the Canada Bank Note Company on Craig street at 1:30 this morning, in the second story. The caretaker gave the alarm immediately, but before the brigade reached the secone the whole upper portion of the building was in flames. The scene the whole upper portion of the building was in flames. The fire, however, made great headway. In spite of the efforts of the firemen the flames spread to the roof of the building occupied by Wm. Clendinan & Sons, founders and stove manufacturers. The Bijou, a saloon to the west of the Canada Bank Note Company, was completely gutted. The loss of the building, stock, etc., is estimated at about \$150,000. The insurance on the Bank Note Company's stock is \$40,000. The building belonged to Jesse Joseph. It was insured for \$9,000.

GRAND TRUNK ACCIDENT.

An Excursion Train at Hamilton Rus Into-Trainmen Hurt, Passengers Escape.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 19.—An accident occurred on the main line of the Grand Trunk about a quarter of a mile east of the station here, about noon to-day, but as far as can be learned none of the passengers or trainmen were fatally injured. A special excursion train from the east, bound for Chicago, was coming into the city, when a switch engine of the N. and N. THE postoffice department at Washington has ruled that the writer has a right to regain possession of a letter provided that he can prove to the satisfaction of the post-master at the office from which it was sent that he was the writer of it. Even if the letter has arrived at its destination before it had been delivered to the before it had been delivered to the person to whom it was addressed, it may be reacalled by the writer by a telegram through the mailing effice. The reason assigned is that the United States is only the agent of the writer while the letter is in transit. This decision is important to business men and to private individuals. Grand Trunk People Said to Have Bettered Their Offer.

They May Yet Least the London and Port Stanley Road-A Detroit Coal Man Wants to Make a Bid.

The Port Stanley Railway Board met last night, and after the meeting was over the question—"Where are we at?" might have been asked of any of the members who were present and none could have stated definitely where they were drifting, or what corporation will be likely to get the road. The same old stercetyped reply was received from soveral of the members when asked what had been accomplished. "Nothing definite had been done," they answered, but something would shortly be accomplished and then they might not be so averse to talking. Before the board met a prominent representative of No. 4 ward, who is on the Board of Works, said he had it on good authority that the Grand Trunk would yet rent the road. He would not give his reasons, but a well-defined rumor that was passing among Grand Trunk officials during the day might have been sufficient ground for the statement. The rumor had it that the Grand Trunk had bettered its offer and that the amended proposals would come up for discussion at the meeting of the board at night.

It may be stated just here that the offer was bettered at last night's meeting, to what extent will no doubt be learned later on. Meantime the board has received word from Detroit—from a prominent coal man there—asking, it is said, that the deal with the Walkerville people be not closed until they heard from him.

There was a Detroit man who, when the road was first let to the Clevelanders, telegraphed at the last moment that he would better the offer, but he apparently thought he had better not, as he was not heard from again. He may be once more seeking to delay the action of the board. One member of the board stated last night that the sub-committee appointed to promote the deal with the Lake Erie and Detroit River people had reported progress. The meeting did not last long, and was adjourned to meet on Tuesday night. 





The shutting down of the works, through slackness of work or any other reason, for a period not exceeding six weeks in a year, was not to be considered as a breach of the agreement. The company further pledged itself to rebuild the works if they were burned down. If the works were abandoned or if the company ended the agreement the \$100,000 was to be repaid. If the company broke the agree ment in any substantial way, it was to be liable for actual damages only.

The reason why the city solicitor objected to the agreement was because it did not provide definitely that if the company did not "employ at least 400 men for six months at any time the city shall have the option of demanding the \$100,000." The corporation also asked that the company should pay \$5 a year for each man short of the stipulated 500.

THE BAPTISTS.

Encouraging Reports Presented at the Convention

the Grand Ligne Mission.

Waterford, Oct. 18.—Yesterday morning's meeting of the Baptist Association of Ontario and Quebec was practically devoted to prayer for French-Canadian evangelization. In the afternoon the report of the board of publication was read by Prof. Goodspeed.

The book-room report stated that the total stock is valued at \$5,650 66; cash sales, \$5,626 24; credit sales, \$7,832 94, showing gains of \$288,27 and \$108 68 respectively. The liabilities are \$309 23, the unpaid accounts of the present month. The management feel hopeful of a moderate profit in the future. The showing of the Canadian Baptist is still better, being a net profess from invostments, less the bookroom loss, makes a total profit of \$1,858 59. Under these circumstances a dividend of \$1,200 was declared, of which \$360 goes to home missions, \$90 to Manitoba and Northwest missions, \$360 to foreign missions and \$300 to the superannated ministers' fund. This is the largest diviand \$300 to the superannuated min isters' fund. This is the largest divi-dend and largest profit yet on record The report was adopted unanimously. Mr. W. K. McNaught, Rev. E. W. Dadson and

Rev. S. S. Bates at this point announced that the foreign mission board's estimate for the coming year for the Indian work is \$311 70 in all. To cover this the deficit, home expenses and other contingencies the sum total of \$365 is needed. The convention authorized the board to call for this amount.

GRAND LIGNE MISSION.

The Grand Ligne mission report, presented by Mr. George Richardson, referred to the Maskinonge and Sorel openings, and reported 37 baptisms, while the Feller Institute at Grand Ligne has had 132 pupils through the year. The total receipts were \$18,175 50, the expenses, including a slight previous deficit, \$17,865 07, and the balance would have been \$310 43 but for a loan to the Maskinonge iund of \$295 50, leaving a balance forward of \$14 93.

Rev. Its Smith moved the adoption of the report. He maintained the political importance of striving to gain Quebec to Protestantism, and spoke in the highest terms of the personnel of the workers and of the results achieved in many districts. He advised the McMaster students to study French and fit themselves for Grand Ligne work.

Rev. E. J. Stobo, of Quebec, seconded the adoption of the report. He spoke in high terms of the character of the French-Canadians, saying, indeed, that they show more courtesy to him than many Protes-

MANITOBA AND NORTHWEST.

Manitoba and Northwest missions came on next, Rev. H. G. Mellick taking the platform. He urged the importance of evangelizing Quebec as allied to the work in Manitoba among the Roman Catholics. His report showed that nine English-speaking and two German pastors have settled in the Northwest and Manitoba this year, while 25 pastors have occupied fields. In all there are 21 settled pastors, one Indian missionary and general superinfields. In all there are 21 settled pastors, one Indian missionary and general superintendent, besides ten students, who have labored there in the summer. Three churches were organized in the year, and there are 42 churches in all, five of them German-speaking—in all about 150 preaching stations. Of these churches 24 now have houses of worship. The givings from the east to help the mission work in the west were last year in round numbers about \$4,000, some \$2,300 in excess of the year before. Report adopted.
