London, July 30 .- In the House of Commons today Sir Samuel Montague, Radical member for Whitechapel, asked the secretary of state for India.Lord George Hamilton, whether, in view of the great increase of fiduciary notes and the large contraction of paper currency, the Indian government intend ed to coin on its own account silver on a sounder basis, Lord George Hamilton replied that he was not aware that the Indian government had any such intention. The Globe, commenting on the fall in

silver, says: "An augmentation of the world's gold yield could not fail to increase the value of silver. When Cali-fornia and Australia poured their auriferous riches into the market, silver, like all other commodities, acquired an enhanced value. But the United States then had no accumulation of the white metal; whereas now these have be come so enormous that silver sales can only be effected at a sacrifice. What steps the American silverite will propose to counteract this disastrous state of things, remains to be seen. Their attitude is a specific threat to tamper with the currency. Greedy Grasshoppers

Hit on a Brand New Article of Diet.

Chew the Binder Twine on Wheat
Shocks and the Grain Is Scatterhospital, while the former is hiding ed All Over the Fields.

Birmingham, Mich., July 30 .- Oakland county grasshoppers have invent-ed a new device which is greatly pestering farmers west of Birmingham. The hoppers are chewing binder twine in the wheat fields and leaving the ground covered with bursted sheaves. Jack Whitefoot, foreman on the Ed. Miller farm, has had to rebind 50 acres of wheat. He says there is no nutriment in binder twine to tickle the appetite of the solemn-visaged, bony-limbed hoppers. "It looks," said he, "as if they done it for pure devilish-

But the fact is this: hoppers will eat anything that they are standing on, i possible. If a pitchfork is left in the field where grasshoppers abound, the hardwood handle will sometimes be found chewed and honeycombed until a roost by a colony of woodpeckers. The twine to rebind the broken wheat sheaves on the Miller farm was first bath of "sheep dip," a nauseous decoction, used to kill "ticks" on sheep. This was all to no purpose. 
